## DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR HIRED

Walter M. Hundley, former vice-president for financial development for the Florida Sheriffs Youth Fund, has been named Director of Development for the Lindenwood Colleges.

A native of St. Louis, Hundley attended the University of Missouri-Columbia and is a 1950 graduate of Washington University.

Prior to his previous position, he served as executive director of the 5,000-member Florida League of Anglers in Winter Park, FL; as the owner of Hundley & Associates, a Winter Park-based advertising agency; as director of alumni affairs for Rollins College in Winter Park; and as associate alumni director for Washington University. He also has held sales management positions with Hill Packing Co., Topeka, KS, and for Ralston Purina Co. at offices in Atlanta and St. Louis.

## SOCIETY OF FELLOWS FORMED

Twenty-five community leaders and residents of St. Charles have been named to the Lindenwood Colleges' Society of Fellows, a newly-formed organization designed to recognize distinguished service and contributions to the community and the colleges. All were admitted into the society during a special banquet and induction ceremony, held recently in Sibley Hall.

"This honor is being extended to a very limited number of outstanding citizens in the St. Charles community," said President Robert Johns. "They were selected because of their past contributions to the community and for their interests and efforts on behalf of the Lindenwood Colleges."

Among the privileges conveyed with admittance into the society are those of participation in Lindenwood's academic honors program, including commencement, Honors Day and other programs that recognize students and college activities. The 25 fellows also will be invited as guests of the colleges for various events, including theatre programs, concerts, lectures, exhibits and athletic events.

#### WORKSHOP FOR SCHOOL PRINCIPALS

"Improving Instruction through Teacher Evaluation" is the subject of a workshop for elementary and secondary school principals, scheduled August 18 at Young Hall.

Designed for teacher supervisors, the one-day workshop will probe topics such as classroom climate, teacher improvement goals, classroom interaction patterns, evaluation policies and classroom management. It will be taught by Karl Openshaw, an author, researcher, consultant and professor at the University of Colorado in Boulder. A former director of the Ohio State University Center for the Study of Teaching, Openshaw is a teaching consultant to schools and school districts throughout the country. His research is included in the 15-volume work, Mirrors for Behavior, published by Research for Better Schools.

"Involvement," a 12-week series of 30-minute discussions and interviews with faculty members is being aired each Wednesday at 8:30 p.m. on KCLC-FM. The summer schedule is - June 23, Daryl J. Anderson, chairman of the Biology Department, will discuss the subject of healing plants; June 30, Arlene Taich, faculty administrator for LCIE, will discuss gerontology; July 7, Nancy Polette, assistant professor of education, will discuss gifted children; July 14, John N. Bartholomew, chairman and associate professor of sociology, will discuss the plight of cities, comparing St. Louis to European metropolitan areas; July 21, Beverly Bimes, director of the Institute for Master Teachers, will discuss writing in schools; July 28, Alan Tubbs, assistant professor of biology, and John Nichols, assistant professor of math, will discuss environmental issues; August 4, Michael Castro, faculty administrator of LCIE, will discuss American Indian literature; August 11, Aaron Miller, dean of the faculty, will discuss American Indian culture; and August 18, William Tietjen, assistant professor of biology, will discuss computers.

All remaining sessions in the 12-week program will be moderated by Emil Wilde, KCLC station manager and a member of the faculty.

### SOCIOLOGY DEPARTMENT CHAIRMAN

Edith E. Graber, former assistant professor of sociology at Washington University in St. Louis, has been appointed chairman of the Department of Sociology.

A 1949 graduate of Bethel College, she holds a Master in Religious Education degree from Bethany Theological Seminary, an M.A. degree in sociology from the University of Oklahoma and a Ph.D. degree in sociology from the University of Denver.

An author, Dr. Graber has published several works, including the book, Teacher Strikes and the Courts, coauthored with David L. Colton and published this year by Lexington Books. A researcher, she has been involved in several research projects, including a \$160,000 grant for the National Institute of Education.

Prior to joining Washington University in 1974, she served as a graduate teaching assistant at the University of Denver and the University of Oklahoma, as an instructor at Regis College in Denver and as an elementary public school teacher.

Dr. Graber is a member of the American Sociological Association, Alpha Kappa Delta, the Society for the Study of Social Problems, the Law and Society Association, the Midwest Sociological Society and the Sociologists for Women in Society.

Married and the mother of four, she and her husband, O'Ray C., regional director for the National Conference of Christians & Jews, reside in St. Louis County.

Her research efforts have included the investigation of the language constructs of young children and the examination of the differential educational experiences of elementary school children by social class and gender.
