The faculty of Lindenwood College held its first meeting of the school year, 1918-1919, Thursday evening, September 19. Dr. Calder offered prayer, and was followed by Dean Templin who spoke a few words of welcome to the new members of the faculty.

Following the election of Miss Mc Mahan as secretary, Dr. Roemer suggested a number of committees, such as schedules, recitations, schedule of dates, library, bulletin, class organizations, state organizations, Y.W.C.A., sanitation and health, student government, table lists, sororities, and classification of students. A committee on war work was added by Mrs. Roemer. After the reading of faculty names suggested for these committees, Dr. Roemer announced that he preferred to have the faculty assist in the appointment of these committees, and he therefore appointed a standing committee on the appointment of permanent committees, consisting of Dean Templin, Miss Pugh, Miss Oldfield, Miss Linneman and Miss Lear.

Dr. Roemer then welcomed the new faculty members explained what the past year has brought to the

college, and discussed the bright future before Lindenwood.

The use of the typewriters by students and faculty not taking work in the secretarial department was discussed by Dr. Roemer and Miss Allyn, and it was announced that only students in this department should use the machines.

Dr. Stumberg was called upon as head of the new medical department and told how his work was for the purpose of protecting the well as much as for the aid of the sick. He announced that he would have a consultation hour daily for the students and that he would meet faculty members by appointment.

The advisory system was then explained by Dean Templin, who also invited new teachers to meet her later for an explanation of the grading system.

Dr. Roemer appointed Misses Linneman, MacLatchy, Findlay, Godfrey and Minor as a special committee to arrange a social meeting of the faculty for Tuesday evening, September 24. Dean Templin, Miss MacLatchy and Dr. Calder were asked to arrange a program.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of the Lindenwood faculty for October 1 was opened by prayer by Dr. Roemer. The minutes of the preceding meetings were read and approved, and reports from committees were called for. Miss MacLatchy first gave a report of the social meeting of the faculty of September 24, when the old members entertained the new at a delightful dinner in the rooms of the home economics department.

The report of the nominating committee was read by Dean Tempkin and adopted without a dissenting vote, thus electing the following standing committees:

1. Classification of Students - Misses Godfrey, Pugh, Allyn, Anderson and McMahan.
2. Recitation Schedule - Misses MacLatchy, Lear and Templin.
3. Library - Misses Findlay and Rauch and Dr. Roemer.
4. Schedule of Lectures and Public Entertainments - Misses Roberts, Cross, Oldfield and Linneman.
5. Sororities - Mrs. Roemer, Miss Templin and Mr. Motley.
6. Bulletin - Miss McMahan.
7. Class Organization - Misses Minor, Jones and Schmitt
8. Y.W.C.A. - Mrs. Roemer, Dr. and Mrs. Calder, Misses Proudfoot, Gaines, Porterfield and Laipple.
9. Sanitation and Health - Dr. Stumberg and Miss Childs
10. Table Lists - Misses Porterfield, Sykes, Childs and Cox.
11. Student Government - Miss Weissgerber, Mr. Motley, Miss Templin, Mrs. Roemer, Mrs. Motley and Mrs. Roberts.
12. War Campaign - Mrs. Roemer, Misses Findlay, Templin and Weissgerber.
13. Program of Faculty Meetings - Misses Pugh, MacLatchy, Porterfield, Lear and Laipple.

Dr. Roemer then spoke of a number of matters of

interest to the faculty. First, the advisory system, urging faculty advisors to become acquainted with their students and placing the responsibility upon the advisor in seeing that the girls keep up the school standards. Second, the morale in the dining room, dormitories and chapel; he urged that faculty members be prompt upon all occasions and that they stand behind the student board in all matters of discipline and maintaining of order. Third, excusing students from classes (to be done only by Mrs. Roemer) Fourth, grading of students. Some discussion followed these last two topics and it was decided that students should be graded carefully upon their work and that excuses should not be granted by anyone but Mrs. Roemer, as the aim is to keep up every girl's work from day to day and not to let it lag at any time. Fifth, the state teachers' convention in St. Louis in November; Dr. Roemer urged all teachers to attend these sessions and any other meetings which might aid them in their school work. Sixth, he announced a meeting of the Board of Directors for October 7, at which time the question of "Is it time to begin a four year college?" was to be brought up. Dean Templin, Dr. Calder, Dr. Stumberg, Mr. Motley, Miss Godfrey and other members of the faculty ex-

presses their opinions, the consensus of opinion favoring the four year course for next year.

Miss Templin then asked that all teachers report I students not only to their advisors but to the dean before the end of the week and asked the instructor as well as the advisor to talk to poor students. She also spoke of the examination in English which is given each year and urged that every instructor in every department aid the English department. The poor lessons on Monday were also discussed by Dean Templin and other members of the faculty and it was decided that Friday assignments for Monday should be made as long and as difficult as on other days, if not more so, in order that the girls might not go away for week-end trips so often, therefore weakening their school work. It was also suggested that all students who make poor recitations on Monday be reported to Mrs. Roemer.

A committee to arrange programs for faculty meetings was appointed by Dr. Roemer consisting of Misses Pugh, MacLatchy, Porterfield, Lear and Laipple.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The faculty meeting for October 15 opened with prayer by Dr. Roemer. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and Miss Pugh followed with a report of the program committee:

- October 22 - Mr. Motley, The Cost of a College Education; Miss Porterfield, Some Illusions in Education.
- November 5 - Miss Anderson, The Drama of Moliere; Dr. Calder, The Place of the College Bible Department in the Coming World Order.
- November 19 - Mrs. Roberts, The Influence of Lindenwood on the Girls of Today; Miss Findlay, The College Library.
- December 3 - Miss Roberts, Music and The War; Miss Godfrey, Recent Dietary Studies.
- December 17 - Miss MacLatchy, The Evolution of The Ghost Story; Miss Pugh, The Development of the Modern Short Story.
- January 7 - Miss Linneman, Art in War; Miss Gross, The Development of the Opera.
- January 21 - Miss Templin, Vocational Guidance; Miss Proudfoot, The Place of Athletics in Private Schools.

A discussion of the college year book was then held, the consensus of opinion being that, if the annua; should be published this year, the subscriptions should be secured and paid for in advance and that there should be careful and thorough supervision and cooperation on the part of the faculty not only in the literary but in the financial departments. A motion in favor of the publishing of an annual in 1918-19 was presented and unanimously accepted. Dr.

Roemer appointed a faculty committee to serve as an advisory board, consisting of Miss McMahan, Mrs. Roemer, Miss Templin, Miss Linneman, Miss Pugh and Miss Cook. The name of Louise Child was then presented for editor in chief and was accepted without a dissenting vote.

Miss Templin urged that students who had been ill be required to make up the work soon so that the grades could be made. Dr. Stumberg reported that health conditions had improved and that there was little danger of further influenza illness. Miss Findlay spoke a few words on the library, reporting that two hundred new volumes had already been received this fall, that a hundred more were on the way, and that altogether we now have 3,200 volumes. The circulation is better than usual, she said, but the attendance not as great as last year.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of the Lindenwood faculty for October 22 opened with prayer by Dr. Roemer, followed by the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting.

A report of the faculty advisory committee to the annual board was read by Miss McMah^{an}; the committee recommended the following names: Rowena Gamber, associate editor; Irene Stephens, literary editor; Dorothy Dunn, Leontine Ginter and Helen Peck, local editors; Florence Graves, organizations editor; Zelle Whitmarsh athletic editor; Martha Scroggin, Margaret Lohman and Constance Adamson, art editors; Loula Franklin, business manager; Mary Frances Bains, assistant business manager. These names were voted upon and unanimously chosen by the faculty as members of this year's annual board.

Dean Templin requested that instructors excuse all classes on time and that all monthly grades be sent in before the first of November.

Mrs. Feind announced a new set of rules for the dining room sent out by the government which would go into effect October 31. She spoke especially of the saving and serving of meats (no second helpings unless regulations are changed); the necessity of using only ~~two~~ teaspoons of sugar per person each day; the rule

prohibiting further use of whipped cream; and the one asking that no fourth meals be served, no refreshments during the afternoon or evening at any function.

Dr. Stumberg reported no new cases of the "flu" and gave little hope that our quarantine would be lifted very soon.

The business meeting was followed by a program, Mr. Motley speaking on "The Cost of a College Education" with special reference to Lindenwood. Miss Porterfield read a highly entertaining paper on "Some Illusions in Education", proving that the present always goes back to the past and illustrating with a number of original verses.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of the faculty for October 29 was opened with prayer by Dr. Roemer, and the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved. Miss MacLatchy reported that the war campaign committee was making plans for the campaign to be held next week and Dr. Roemer announced that the state teachers' meeting dated for November 7 in St. Louis was postponed until December 26, 27 and 28.

There was some discussion of grades, and the faculty seemed to feel there had been some improvement since the poor students had been reported to their advisors. The chief difficulty, several thought, was that a number of students did not know college methods of study.

Poor spelling in all classes was then discussed, Miss Porterfield suggesting that each class president award a prize to the best speller in her class. Carelessness and difficulty with new words were given as causes of the errors. The Latin and English departments were then appointed a committee to suggest a plan for improving the spelling.

Miss Linneman made a report of the work done in the art department, telling of the courses in poster designing, house furnishing, introduction to

art, and other work in charcoal, water color, enamel and china painting. She announced that Mr. Ankeny would come the last of December or the first of January for a lecture.

Miss MacLatchy spoke a few words at Dr. Roemer's request on the psychology of applause, saying that, following Miss Oolooah Burner's recent talk, she felt that something of the message was lost in the action of clapping.

Miss Laipple told of the work in the botany department during the quarantine and reported that during a field trip on the campus, the fruits of sixty-five plants had been found.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The faculty met in regular session on November 5, Dr. Calder leading in prayer. Following the reading and approval of the minutes of the preceding meeting, Miss Porterfield, chairman of the spelling committee, made a report. The committee recommended that there be: first, unceasing hammering by the individual teachers; second, that there be not only an oral spelling match in the spring but a written one as well, awarding a prize to the winner in each contest. To create more interest in good spelling, the committee suggested frequent class contests as in athletics, with the class sponsor and officers as the prime movers in establishing more interest in spelling correctly.

Miss Templin announced that she was now working on the new catalogue and was ready for corrections and additions.

Following the business meeting, Miss Anderson read a paper on "The Drama of Moliere" and Dr. Calder read one on "The Place of the College Bible Department in the Coming World Order."

The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of November 12 was opened with prayer by Dr. Calder, followed by the reading and approval of the minutes of the preceding meeting.

Miss Porterfield, chairman of the spelling committee, reported that plans were now ready for the class sponsors and officers to arrange spelling contests and that lists of words would soon be given out.

Miss Templin reported that more letters regarding poor grades had been sent out this past month than during any other month since she had been dean. She asked that instructors report to her all students regarded as hopeless in class work. This was followed by a general discussion as to why so many students were getting low grades, Dr. Calder raised the question of the number of hours at the disposal of the students for study and of how much each instructor should expect of her class. Several agreed that it was not lack of time but lack of attention and concentration on the part of the student. Dr. Roemer requested everyone to impress the study habit upon each student.

The war fund committee reported that more than \$3,000. had been subscribed and that more than \$900 had already been paid to Miss MacLatchy, treasurer.

The meeting of November 19 opened with prayer by Dr. Roemer. The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved, and the rest of the evening was devoted to a program, as no business was brought before the faculty. Mrs. Roberts read a paper on "The Influence of Lindenwood on the Girls of Today", dealing with the changes in girls' colleges during the past thirty years and showing the advantages of such educational improvements as have been made. Miss Findlay discussed "The College Library" from many angles, and was followed by a discussion by different members of the faculty on what the library meant and could mean to each department.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of November 26 opened with Miss Templin presiding as Dr. Roemer was absent. Dr. Calder offered prayer, the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved. Miss Templin asked that the November grade be in before December first and Miss Pugh again requested that students poor in English be reported to the English department. Miss Porterfield of the spelling committee announced that a new list of words would be posted during the week, in order that students might prepare for the annual spelling contest.

As no new business was brought before the faculty, the meeting was then adjourned.

Dr. Roemer opened the meeting of December 3 with a short prayer, and the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved. Mrs. Roemer announced that ^{were} students/not calling for excuses for absence from class, and requested that all instructors be strict in demanding such excuses.

"Honor in school work" was a subject brought before the faculty by Dr. Roemer, and the discussion of the part of the different teachers showed that there was considerable trouble in this direction. Dr. Roemer advised the faculty, first, to secure their proof of dishonest work; second, to give the student warning and a severe reprimand; and third, upon the second offense to report the student to him for dismissal from the college.

The faculty voted to re-establish the old-time Lindenwood family Christmas dinner with a tree and entertainment, and the following committee was appointed to arrange the details: Misses Porterfield, Templin, Sykes, Minor, Mr. Motley and Dr. Calder.

Miss Macatchy, treasurer of the war fund, reported that more than \$3,000. had been received and she was asked to remind the girls daily in chapel to pay to her their subscriptions as soon as possible.

A literary program followed the business session, Miss Roberts reading a paper on "Music and the War" and Miss Godfrey one on "Recent Dietary Studies."

A motion was made to postpone the meeting of December 17 until after Christmas, because of the party planned for that evening. The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of December 10 was opened with prayer by Dr. Roemer, followed by the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting. Miss Porterfield reported that the Christmas committee had made its plans and Miss Minor read the program. Dr. Roemer reported that the Board of Directors had decided upon a four year college course for Lindenwood, and that the third year would be added next year and the fourth year the year following. The first year of academy will be dropped next year, but the other three years will be retained until the directors vote a change. He also reported two recent purchases of land, so that the college now had a frontage on the state highway and owns the pro-

perty from Jefferson to Clay streets on King's Highway.

Dean Templin spoke on the changed curriculum and suggested presenting the entire four year course this spring, announcing which courses would be given in 1919 and those in 1920. She was appointed chairman of a committee to thresh out questions on the curriculum for discussion; other members are Mr. Miller, Miss Schmitt, Dr. Calder, Dr. Stumberg and Miss Linneman. This committee was asked to make its report at the second meeting in January.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The meeting of January 21 was opened by prayer by Dr. Roemer, followed by the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting. The subject of examinations was discussed and it was decided that finals should count one-third toward the final mark. Miss Findley announced that the library would be open the usual hours during examination week. Miss Templin announced that all classes for the second semester would meet on Friday, January 31. She requested that registration be hurried.

The faculty opened the meeting of January 28, which was held in the Jubilee parlors, by repeating the Lord's prayer, followed by the reading of the minutes. Miss Templin requested instructors to keep classes the full hour on Friday, the first day of the second semester; to hand in first semester grades as soon as possible; to give out no grades to students; to consider the flu epidemic in marking; and to send in at once the names of all students who failed and are not capable of continuing work. The meeting was then adjourned.

Miss Templin, who had returned from a short visit at Missouri University, reported that she had had several conferences at Columbia on the subject of two additional years of college work at Lindenwood and that she had been assured that students who complete the junior year here would be entered at the university by certificate as seniors. She also reported that credit would be given for courses in Bible study.

Dean Templin announced that Professor Ankeney and Dean Eva Johnston of Columbia would be guests of Lindenwood on Friday evening; Miss Adelyn Miles was welcomed as a new instructor in the history department; and the meeting was then turned over to Miss Linneman who read a most interesting paper on "Art and the War". The meeting was then adjourned.

Dean Templin presided in the absence of Dr. Roemer, who was in West Virginia. Dr. Calder announced that the national week of prayer for colleges and institutions would be observed at Lindenwood and that meetings would be held this week at 6:45 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Sunday evenings.

Meeting of February 25

Following a short prayer and the reading of the secretary's minutes, Dr. Calder reported on the religious meetings which had been held during prayer week. He said 185 cards had been returned during the Sunday night services; 154 cards were signed as members of church. Of the thirty-one remaining cards, seventeen were signed as church members although the school records do not show them as such. Fourteen students declared a confession of faith.

Dr. Roemer urged the advisors to be especially watchful and suggested that perhaps some system of recording the visits of advisors might be arranged so that there could be no disputes at the close of the semester. He suggested that a system be devised in regard to excuses for absence, so that a record might be kept in the office where the excuse was given and that the student secure the signature of each teacher and then return the excuse to the office for file. There was a discussion of the number of absences that might be allowed and the effect of the cuts upon the semester grade. To ascertain what other schools do in regard to this matter, Dr. Roemer requested Miss Godfrey to write to the University of Wisconsin, Miss Findlay to Simmons, Miss Pugh to Vassar, Miss Porterfield to

Mount Holyoke, and Miss Anderson to Wellesley. They were asked to make a report at the next meeting.

Adjournment was then in order.

The faculty held the regular business meeting in the Botany room on March 17, Dr. Roemer leading in prayer and the secretary reading the minutes of the preceding meeting.

To avoid trouble at the end of the semester, the advisors were asked by Dean Templin to write

on the back of each card received the date and the character of the interview and to return the card to her office for filing. She also asked that all students reported be reported to her.

Dr. Roemer announced that five dollars/^{for board}would be charged teachers, who remained at Lindenwood during spring vacation.

The rest of the evening was spent discussing the grading systems of other schools with the idea of a possible change in the system used at Lindenwood. Miss Porterfield reported upon Mount Holyoke, Miss McMahan upon the University of Wisconsin, Miss Pugh upon Vassar, Miss Anderson upon Wellesley, and Miss Findley upon Simmons. The secretary of the faculty was asked to make a digest of these reports, to be filed with the minutes for future reference.

The next faculty meeting was announced for April 7, at which time a literary program is to be given. The program committee in charge of the meetings reported that a new schedule of programs for the rest of this year would be announced at this meeting.

Adjournment was then in order.

Digest of Grading Systems

Mount Holyoke

The system of grading consists of "excellent" (A), "good" (B), "fair" (C), "passed" (D), "conditioned" (E), "failed" (EE). A is from 90 to 100; B from 80 to 90; C from 70 to 80; D from 60 to 70; E below 60; EE means that the course must be repeated. Intermediate grades may be represented by plus and minus signs.

The make-up of the final grade differs in departments; some instructors give more weight to the final test and some greater weight to the daily work. No absolute uniformity required because different subjects and different methods of giving the courses make different treatment necessary.

There is no system of cuts and a student is supposed to be at her class each day. If, however, she has to be absent because of illness, she secures permission from the resident physician and the physician reports this permission to the dean's office, from where, in turn, it is reported to the instructors. Students may, however, remain away a few times from classes if there are reasons why these absences are absolutely necessary. An excess of such absences will probably bring upon the student a "quiz" for the work which she has lost or a refusal to take the final examination in the subject.

Students receive report cards after the mid-year examinations and after the June examinations. Mount Holyoke requires for graduation a grade of at least "c" in half of the work of the courses and half of the work of the senior year. Percent of failures is small; low grade students are advised or requested to drop from the college before they reach the junior year; occasionally a junior is asked to withdraw.

Simmons College

The grades are handed in under the letters A, B, C, D, and E, E indicating a complete failure; if a student receives the mark of E in her term work she is automatically excluded from her examination. Courses in which E is received must be repeated.

At the end of the year, the unexcused absences are counted by the instructor and a proportional amount is deducted from the term grade. This varies according to the instructor. No cuts are allowed, but excuses are given for absences due to illness or for unavoidable reasons.

Smith College

A is practically equivalent to 90-100; B to 80-90; C to 70-80; D to 60-70.

There is no cut system and therefore there is no rule in the way in which absences affect the grade. The teachers use their own judgment in this respect. All unexcused absences are supposed to lower the grade. Absences incurred through illness or some necessary reason do not lower the grade if the work is made up satisfactorily. A student, however, must not present herself for examination without permission if she has more than the following number of absences: seven in a three hour course, five in a two hour course, and three in a one hour course.

Grades are sent to the student at the end of each semester; freshmen are advised of low standing in particular subjects just before Thanksgiving. In other cases, teachers use their own judgment in informing students of their standing.

Vassar College

Students do not learn their exact records until the end of the first semester of the senior year when they may learn the number of marks by grade for each year. They may inquire about general grade of their work at any time during the semester either from the instructor or the dean. In December and April reports are made to the dean's office of all students who are doubtful or deficient at that time; parents and students are then notified if there seems to be any

likelihood of failure to pass the required amount of work at the end of the semester. Failure, however, may occur in a course in which no warning was sent.

For graduation at least one-third of the student's marks must be above C. Students who fail to complete nine hours in the first semester are not allowed to remain for the second; in all cases of failure to complete twenty-four hours during the year, students are not allowed to return the following autumn - the only exceptions to these rules are unavoidable illness or other extraordinary circumstances beyond the control of the student.

There is no cut system: every absence from a class must be accounted for by a warden's excuse, by an excuse from the resident physician for frequent illness for more than one day, or by a self-excuse, which is a statement made by the student that she was absent because of illness. This is only for occasional use and may be accepted for one calendar day only at a time. It must be presented within a week from absence. A student who has been absent from more than fifty percent of her recitations in any course may not take the examinations without special permission from the faculty.

Wellesley College

The college distinguishes two general grades in work which reaches the passing mark: one, "passed"; the other, "passed with credit". In order to be recommended for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, a student must have "passed with credit" in not less than six hours in the first semester of the freshman year and in not less than nine hours in each succeeding semester. Deficiency of such work in any semester may be offset by a surplus in subsequent work. A student whose work is not of diploma grade may be placed on probation; she is liable to immediate dismissal if she absents herself from academic appointments for any reason other than illness and may at any time be excluded from college.

Opportunity for making up term work lost through absence, or for obtaining credit for work presented late, will be afforded by the instructor only upon presentation of a note from either the resident physician or the registrar, and will then be optional with the instructor. An undergraduate student who ab-

sents herself from the college so as to interfere with academic appointments for the two calendar days before or after a single holiday, or at the beginning of the second semester, must send a letter of explanation to the registrar. In case the reason for absence is judged inadequate by the academic council, the student will be subject to the academic penalty established for unexcused late registration (excluded from examination).

Excellent from 93 to 100; good, 85 to 93; fair, 77 to 84; poor, 70 to 76; conditioned, 60 to 70; failed, below 60. It is not the policy of the university to give information to students respecting their numerical marks.

In order to receive a degree the student must gain not only the number of credits required in the course which he is pursuing, but his studies must reach a certain average of excellence. For grade excellent, three points are awarded for each hour of credit; for grade good, two points; for grade fair, one point; for poor, no points. The maximum number of points that can be secured by a student graduating in a course which requires, for example, 120 credits, is 360 points; the minimum is 120 points.

Students are expected to be present at all classes. If at any time he is absent, he must satisfy his instructors that such absence was for good and sufficient reasons. If he is absent, with or without excuse, from twenty percent or more of the exercises of a given class in any semester, he is required to take an extra examination. Students absent, without excuse, from a recitation immediately following or preceding the Christmas or Easter recess or at the opening of the second semester, will not be permitted to enter the semester examination in that study.

The meeting of April 7 was called to order by Dr. Roemer, who led in a short prayer, followed by the secretary's reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting.

Dr. Roemer asked that teachers make out their requisition lists of anything they might need and to hand these to Mr. Motley, registrar. Miss Findley, at the request of Dr. Roemer, suggested that a part of the library fund be saved each fall to be used throughout the year instead of being spent all at once at the beginning of the school term.

The catalogue proof had been received, according to Miss Templin, who asked each member of the faculty to read the proof on her department pages.

Following the business meeting, a very interesting paper on "The Appreciation of McDowell" was read by Miss Gaines.

The next meeting of the faculty was announced for April 14, Monday, because of the Gray concert the following Tuesday. The meeting was then adjourned.

Miss Gaines reported that the program committee had planned programs for every two weeks, and that Dr. Roemer and Miss Sweeney were to be the first speakers. As there was no more business to come before the faculty, the meeting was turned over to the program committee.

Dr. Roemer spoke on the subject of "Pitting the Girl for the Useful Life" and raised the questions of: How can Lindenwood offer work to help her particularly and Shall the college curriculum be extensive or intensive? Dr. Roemer was followed by informal discussion among different teachers as to whether or not a school can be both cultural and vocational and as to which one should be stressed; among the speakers were Dr. Calder, Miss Pugh, Miss Spahr, Miss MacLatchy, Dr. Stumberg, Miss Moreland, Mr. Motley, Dean Templin, and Miss Porterfield. The consensus of opinion seemed to be that, although Lindenwood's aim is to fit women for the useful life, the school must also regard cultural education as important.

Miss Sweeney then gave a very interesting talk on Switzerland and illustrated her lecture by means of lantern slides.

Adjournment was then in order.

Miss Lena Allison, president of the Y.W.C.A. appeared in behalf of her organization to request the cooperation of the faculty in the giving of a Quaker dinner on April 21. The amount of money secured from the fines for talking and laughing will be used to send delegates to the national convention in Estes Park in August.

The secretary then read the minutes of the preceding meeting. Two students, Marguerite Bowers and Lucile Johnston, were presented by the student governing board. After a short talk by Dr. Roemer, they were dismissed and the faculty disciplinary committee advised to pass sentences and to notify the students of their actions.

The teacher's part in student discipline was then discussed by Dr. Roemer, who urged teachers to be especially careful about excusing students from the dining room and emphasized the fact that this responsibility of the individual teacher is great. Things which at first seem trivial are apt to develop seriously, he said.

The program was postponed a week and, there being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The faculty met on April 21 in the Y.W. rooms, Dr. Roemer opening the meeting with prayer. The secretary's minutes were read and approved. Dean Templin announced that final grades should be handed in as early as possible. She asked that girls who persistently cut classes be reported to her office.

Dr. Roemer reported that the enrollment for next year was especially heavy among college students and that those girls who were wasting time this year would not be allowed to return next fall. He also told of the historical booklet which is being published as a souvenir of homecoming week.

The remainder of the evening was turned over to the program committee. Miss Kinsley entertained with a vocal number, and Miss Barnes with a reading. The meeting was then adjourned.

Mrs. Roemer requested the teachers not to excuse any student from the table except in cases of illness and to report any absentees from the dining room to her office. She also extended an invitation to the faculty to the home of Dr. and Mrs. Stumberg on the evening of October 13, which was accepted at once by Dr. Roemer in behalf of the entire faculty.

As there was no further business, the remainder of the evening was turned over to the program committee.

Dr. Roemer was the first speaker, taking for his subject "Lindenwood". ~~He spoke of the academy, bringing up the question of whether or not the academy work~~

He discussed the academy work, the standardization of courses, the place of a private school ^{offering} with four years of college work, ~~and~~ the new administration building and the more efficient equipment and facilities which will be Lindenwood's in such a short time.

Following Dr. Roemer's inspiring talk, Dr. Stumberg, after his usual number of excuses, gave a most interesting talk on "Food Idiosyncrasies".

Dr. Roemer then appointed Dr. Stumberg and Mr. Motley a committee to see about the voting of non-resident ballots for the resident teachers. He also announced that all dates for entertainments or lectures should be handed to him in order to avoid conflicts.

A report from the election committee was called for and both Mr. Motley and Dr. Stumberg expressed themselves optimistically. Dr. Roemer urged teachers to vote at the St. Charles election Saturday for a

motorized fire department, explaining how such a department might be an advantage to Lindenwood. Dr. Roemer also briefly discussed the political situation in the state for the benefit of faculty members who know little of local conditions but who intend to vote here.

On first offense the offender is to appear before the Student Council, her name announced in student meeting and her grade for the month in the subject in which she cheated forfeited.

We earnestly believe that with the co-operation of the faculty and the student body these measures will create a spirit that will finally bring about the elimination of cheating from our college.

Recommendations of the Student Activities Committee - 1921-22

First, - That a point system be established to regulate the outside activities of the student. The purpose of the point system is to be two-fold - 1. Preventing any one girl entering too many activities - 2. Distributing the honors.

There shall be a committee to work out the original system. This committee should consist of three members of the faculty, appointed by the President, and three members of the student body, appointed by the student council or elected by the student body.

(The committee may inform themselves as to what has been done in other colleges by writing to Miss Reed of William Woods who has made a study of the point system.)

The duties of the committee shall be:

1. To inform themselves as to what other schools have done with the point system.
2. To determine the relative work and honor of different organizations on this campus.
3. To determine which offices and activities should be included in the point system.
4. To decide upon the scale for the system.
5. To rate each office and activity to be included in that system.

The Vice-President of the student council shall keep a card catalogue with the name of every girl in activities. It should be her duty to inform any girl when she is carrying too many points and request the girl to withdraw from any of the activities which she chooses.

Second - That there shall be an organization composed of a representative of the executive heads of each type of organization on the campus. The large organizations shall be represented on this board by the executive head. Class presidents, and the presidents of state clubs, departmental clubs and honorary organizations shall elect a member from among themselves to represent them.

2
One person should not represent two groups.

This group should consider all matters which pertain to the organizations as a whole on the campus.

Duties should be :-

1. To arrange a chart recording all regular meetings of each organization in school. If any regular meetings conflict the organizations concerned should be notified and the conflict corrected.

2. To make rules and regulations insuring attendance to the regular meetings in preference to special meetings and special activities such as athletic games, music recitals, preparing for banquets, etc.

3. To make a legible copy of the chart and post in a convenient place in the office of the Dean of Students.

X 4. To collect information in regard to the comparative responsibility of each office in each organization for the aid of the committee on the point system.

5. Any other points of interorganization which the board sees fit. The board need not meet more frequently than three or four times a year.

Third - That the freshman be organized to encourage scholarship, stimulate interest in student activities, and train for leadership.

At the end of October the student council shall appoint freshmen leaders in the ratio of one leader for every fifteen freshmen. The leaders shall be appointed on the basis of their apparent potentiality for leadership. The freshmen class shall be arbitrarily assigned to groups of fifteen and one of the appointed leaders shall be assigned to each group.

The duties of ~~the~~ ^{each} leaders shall be ::

1. To get acquainted with the members of her group and to make sure that the individuals of the group know each other.

2. To encourage members of her group to enter activities in which they would be most interested.

3. To watch for girls in her group who are awake to responsibility and to recommend them as committee members or chairman in the organizations in which they are active.

3

4. To encourage scholarship.

5. To lead in good sportmanship and earnest support to the student government.

The commission of freshman leaders shall elect "Big Sister Adviser" from the Junior or Senior class.

The duties of the upperclassman adviser shall be:

1. To get acquainted with the freshman leaders and see to it that they get acquainted with each other.

2. To keep the spirit of sportsmanlike competition at a high pitch.

3. To give each group an equally fair chance to help at odd jobs such as decorating for parties and the like.

4. To make sure the freshmen leaders fulfill their duties.

The group which has the highest record in scholarship, lowest record in student council offenses, and has generally shown itself to have excelled in spirit toward activities shall be *awarded appropriately* designated at commencement as the Sophomore honor society. The exact nature of the Sophomore honor society shall be determined by the freshmen leaders and their advisor as soon after their appointment as possible. The honor should be one which would lend a spirit of keen, but friendly competition.

Fourth - That there be an honorary senior organization. The members shall be announced by the Dean of Students on May Day. The members shall be chosen at the end of their Junior year on the following basis :---

1. Service to the school and classmates
2. Scholarship - average or above
3. Womanliness
4. Spirit toward the school in general and student government in particular.

The first members shall be chosen by a faculty committee of three, elected by the students. The organization from then on shall be self-perpetuating, all members being approved by the Dean of Students before being announced.

The first membership shall be elected from the Senior and Junior classes, all succeeding shall be members of the Junior class.

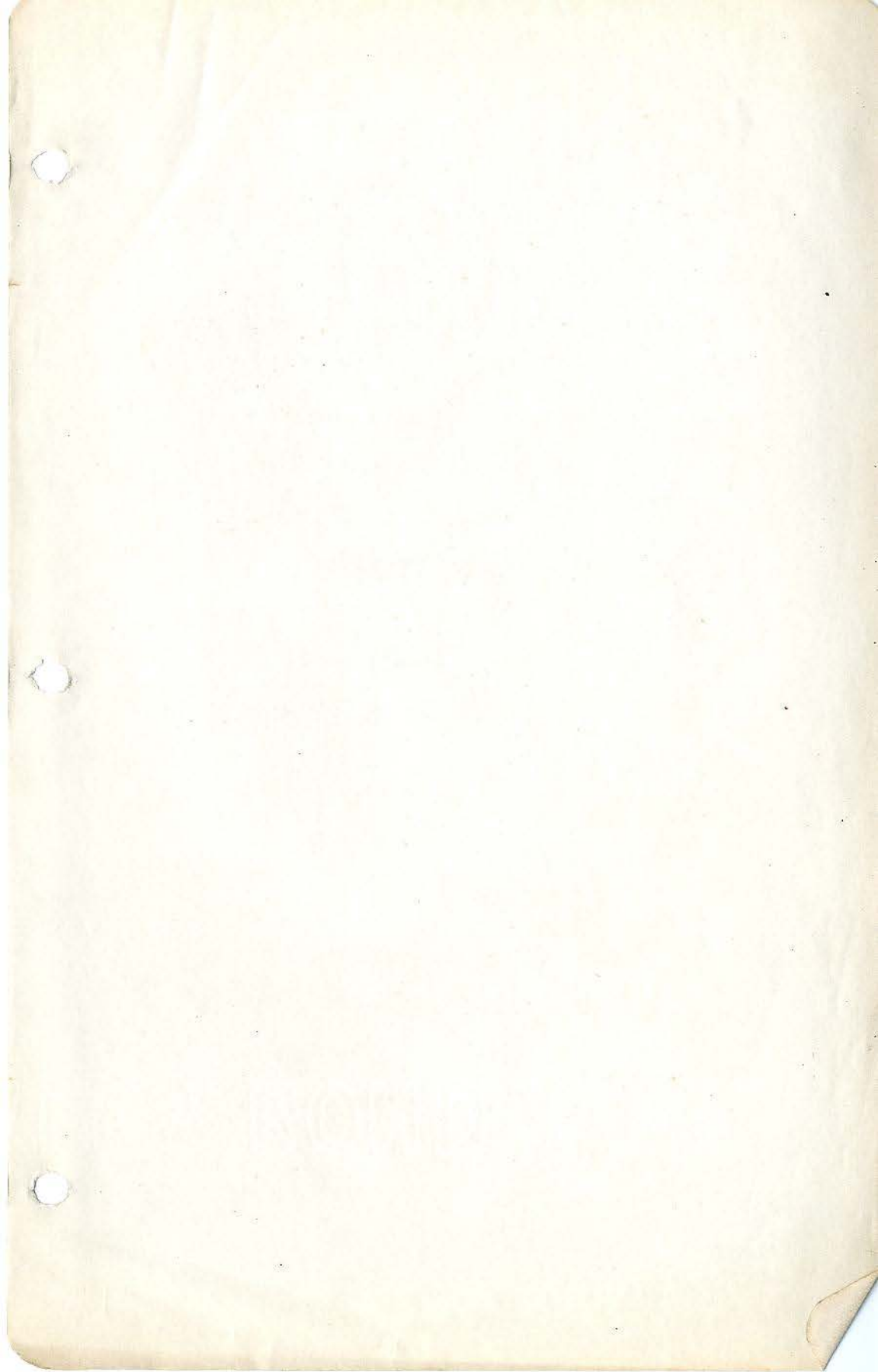

The Bible requirement is four hours taken during the first two years preferably. It was requested by Dr. Calder that freshman be enrolled for only two hours during the year.

Instructors were requested to read the rules in the handbook and note particularly the information on the grading system, P.21, and on unexcused absences, P.10.

Library science does not count toward a degree. However, all new students are required to have it.

Faculty members are requested to see Mr. Motley for equipment and book orders.

Miss Spahr gave a few further instructions on registration.

The meeting adjourned.

At the regular meeting of the faculty held in Room 225 Roemer Hall, Sept. 19, Miss Templin presided and Dr. Calder offered prayer. BUDGETS OF STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Requirement of Budgets: Every student organization must present a copy of its budget for the approval of the Dean of Students by 5 P.M. the first Monday of October.

Items to be Included in Budgets: The budget of every organization must include an itemized estimate both of expenditures and of receipts. The estimated receipts must be clearly classified as receipts from membership dues and receipts from the organization's earnings (from sales, etc.), and the estimate of earnings must be specifically itemized. Fines (to be exacted only for failure to attend regular meetings) must not be considered a means of income.

Observance of Budgets: After a budget has been approved by the Dean of Students, it may not be altered to provide for additional revenue. That is, no organization may make a special assessment upon its members or undertake to earn money by means not included in its budget. Expenditures may be altered at the discretion of the organization provided that total expenditures do not exceed total receipts.

Financial Reports: At the close of the college year every organization must prepare a report of actual receipts and expenditures and submit the report to the bursar of the college. This report must be used as the basis for the organization's budget for the following year.

COLLECTION OF DUES

Pay Day: *(A Pay Day must be held on the first Thursday of October immediately after Assembly.) At this time the treasurer of every student organization must hold an office hour in the Library, and all dues for the year must be paid. A student unable to pay her dues on Pay Day must make a special arrangement with the treasurer of the organization concerned. A twenty-five cent increase shall be made in all dues not paid or arranged for on Pay Day.

Dues of New Members: A student who joins any organization after Pay Day must pay her dues before or at the first meeting of the organization after her membership therein.

* Two pay days will be held during the year. One on the first Thursday of October immediately after Assembly. The other on the day of registration for second semester classes.

FRESHMAN SQUADS

That the members of the freshman class may have opportunity to develop leadership and interest in the various fields of student activities, the Freshman class shall be divided by lot into twelve competitive squads. The division shall be made by the first of October and a leader shall be elected by each squad before the fifteenth of that month. Before the first of November the freshman class as a whole shall select twelve members of the three upper classes to serve as upperclass advisors. The advisors shall be assigned to the various squads by lot.

With the assistance of the president of the Student Council and of their upperclass advisors, the Freshman squads shall encourage their own members in scholarship, loyalty to Lindenwood, and participation in student activities. At the close of each semester the standing of each squad shall be calculated on the basis of (1) the scholarship records in the office of the Dean of the College, (2) the records of the Student Council, and (3) a record of participation in student activities. The squad making the best record each semester and the squad making the best record for the entire year shall be announced at the Commencement exercises.

THE POINT SYSTEM

In order to distribute honors and prevent overwork on the part of a few, all students activities at Lindenwood are rated in accordance with a point system. No student may hold positions aggregating more than ten points. In case she exceeds this ten-point limit she must resign from enough of her activities to bring her total number of points within the maximum.

The point system is to be administered by a Point System Committee composed of the presidents of the three upper classes with the Dean of Students as faculty advisor. The Senior president shall serve as chairman and the Sophomore president as secretary. The Point System Committee shall keep a record of the points of all students and the Sophomore president shall notify any student who exceeds the maximum of points allowed. The Sophomore president shall take all reasonable care to keep the record accurate, but it is also incumbent upon the secretary of every organization to keep its record accurate and up-to-date.

Miss Spahr reported for the schedule committee that M- was unsatisfactory in regard to honors and in giving information to advisors. The motion was made and seconded that the report be adopted. Discussion followed. The fact was brought out that the catalogue and other schools do not recognize the plus and minus signs. On a call for the question the motion was put to a vote and failed.

The motion was made and carried that in practice the faculty adopt the five letters now in use for official records, i.e. that only the letters E, S, M, I, F be used in class grades, on advisor cards, on students cards, and on the record in the Dean's office. Since there will be no more plus and minus grades it follows that only the grades I and F will be reported to advisors. The motion was made and carried that the students be notified of this action.

Dr. Roemer made a change in the personnel of the Christmas committee by removing Miss Nye at her request and making Miss Hough chairman.

Miss Schaper announced that she had slips for membership in the college section of the Missouri Teacher's association.

Dr. Roemer read an excerpt from a paper on "Why the Private School".

Miss Spahr requested that the members of the faculty write full names of students whom they recommend for advice and that they explain on the card the reason for the students' low grade.

The meeting adjourned.

Secretary.

At the regular meeting of the faculty, Oct. 24, Miss Pugh as chairman of the program committee presided. Dr. Calder offered prayer. The minutes were read and accepted. Mr. Motley spoke on "Modern Political Questions!" Dr. Calder talked on "The Discoveries of a Bible Teacher!" The motion was made and carried to adjourn.

Secretary to the Faculty

Dr. Roemer opened the regular meeting of the faculty for Nov. 7, and Dr. Calder offered prayer.

Mr. Dailey gave a comprehensive report on grades for the ^{second} semester of 1921-22. Dr. Roemer discussed grades in relation to unexcused absences. It was decided that we should abide by the custom that three tardinesses make a cut. Written excuses are to be expected from members of the music faculty who keep students over time. We were reminded that absence immediately before or after a holiday counts a double cut and that all absence slips should be returned to the dean of students. Miss Spahr was requested to explain the excuse system to the student body.

At roll call the following were absent: Misses Boyce, Oldfield, Clements, Walters, and Mrs. Roberts.

The meeting adjourned.

Secretary to the Faculty

Dr. Roemer opened the regular meeting of the faculty, Nov. 21 with prayer. The minutes of the last meeting were read and accepted. The secretary read letters of appreciation from Mrs. Roemer and Miss Templin. Dr. Roemer then discussed the catalogue, commenting on the fact that he wished to make several changes that would

make Lindenwood more modern in her curriculum. He also reiterated the question of the demands made by outside activities upon the student's time.

Miss Spahr read a lucid and enlightening paper on "The Interallied Debt Situation".

Miss Schaper presented an equally enjoyable discussion of "The Sociological Sides of Education."

The meeting adjourned.

Secretary of the Faculty

Dr. Roemer opened with prayer and presided over the regular faculty meeting of Dec. 5, 1922. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Dr. Roemer pointed out that the next meeting of the faculty would be the social meeting of Jan. 23 unless special arrangements were made for an extra meeting Jan. 9 and that since the imminence of examinations and other matters would doubtless make a meeting desirable he would call one for that date.

After a summary of the Missouri College Union meeting by Dr. Roemer and a discussion of the work done in various departments the question of returning grades to students came up.

Several widely different methods of procedure and contradicting sets of directions from the dean were reported. The motion was made and seconded that for this year teachers give grades on written work and quizzes(not finals) at their discretion. The motion was ruled out by Dr. Roemer and Miss Nye's suggestion that the matter be referred to the dean was adopted with the understanding that each teacher would continue without modification her own practice until the matter could be adjusted by a report from the dean.

The meeting was adjourned.

Secretary of the Faculty

The regular meeting of the faculty held Jan. 8, 1923 in room 225, Roemer Hall, was opened with prayer by Dr. Roemer. The minutes were read and accepted .

A letter from the Dean read by Dr. Roemer, stated that no mid-semester ~~or daily~~ grades were to be returned to the students but that daily or quiz grades may be marked on papers that are returned to the students.

Miss Spahr announced that examinations

would occur Jan. 26, 29, and 30, and that registration would take place on Jan. 26.

The regular meeting of the faculty, held in room 225 Roemer Hall, May 1, was opened with prayer by Dr. Calder. Dr. Roemer presided. The minutes of the last meeting were read and accepted. We were reminded that library requisitions should be in.

Miss Weld as chairman of the committee on student activities gave ^{the following} ~~the~~ report: "the committee feels that inasmuch as the regulations adopted last year and approved by the students and the faculty have greatly improved conditions, further effort to correct faults which this year's test have brought out are justified. It therefore submits last year's set of regulations with the following changes:

1. After chapel meetings/called on days scheduled shall be announced from the platform. Any other meetings shall be announced from the floor by the person calling it.

2. Pay day shall be held only once a year.

3. A student shall be automatically a member of only two organizations: her college class and the student government association. Membership in a state club shall be optional.

4. The student government association shall include in its budget the expenses for the Thanksgiving activities.

5. One point shall be given in the point system of membership for membership in a departmental club.

6. The freshman squad system shall be dissolved. The big sister movement shall be organized to take the place of the squad system. The main object of the big sister movement shall be to establish a contact between upperclassmen and the freshmen by having approximately 60 upperclassmen who will each be responsible for three or four freshmen in the capacity of advisor or big sister.

7. That information in regard to pay/day, automatic membership in student government and college classes, point system, and big sister organization be included in the handbook.

8. That some system be arranged through the dean of students whereby some organizations might give entertainments only every other year.

9. that no girl be allowed to participate in more than one major performance during a season/
A season to be: fall, from September to Christmas; winter, from Christmas to Easter; spring, from Easter to June. A major performance to be one which requires 10 hours of rehearsal.

REPORT OF STUDENT ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

A report of the Student Activities committee was accepted by the faculty October 1922. Profiting by the experience of the past year the committee is hereby ready to make further report. The systems organized were as follows;

1. Schedule of Regular Meetings and provision for special meetings and activities.

2. Budgets and Pay Day for Student Organizations.

3. Point System to Limit Participation in Activities.

4. Freshman Squad System.

1. Schedule of Regular Meetings, Recitals, Rehearsals, and Games.

It is believed that this system has greatly relieved the confusion caused by the former conflict of hours for meetings. Each girl has known where her obligation lay and although she has not always attended the meeting of preference she has had no excuse for not paying the penalty imposed for absences.

Meetings after chapel have given the greatest cause for trouble. Due to this fact the committee recommends that the ruling be made that only announcements for the meetings of preference for that day be sent to the platform to be read. Any other meeting should be announced from the floor by the person calling it.

2. Budgets.

Although the plan used this year has brought a marked improvement in the finances of Student organizations, the following defects in the present scheme have become apparent:

1. The provision for two Pay Days proved unfortunate for various reasons especially:

- (a) Many organizations needed almost the whole of their funds before the second semester.

(b) Some students desired to resign from organizations after certain activities had ceased and refused to pay second semester dues.

2. The provision for a uniform fine on late payment proved unsatisfactory as there was no incentive for prompt payment after Pay Day had once passed.

3. Organizations with automatic membership had serious difficulties in collecting their dues because:

(a) Every student was required to pay dues to three different organizations---her class, her state club, and student government association.

(b) Many students felt that their state clubs filled no purpose and declined to connect themselves with organizations that meant nothing.

4. The full expense of the Thanksgiving activities fell on the members of two state clubs, the Kansas and Missouri clubs.

5. The classification of the Choral Club, the Choir and the Orchestra as student organizations appeared unreasonable in theory and awkward in practise. Recognizing these defects, the committee on Pay Day and Budgets recommends that the following provisions be introduced into the regulation concerning the finances of student organizations.

1. A Pay Day shall be held on the first Thursday in October immediately after the assembly hour. At this time all dues for the year must be met either by cash or by promissory notes payable before the close of October. A student admitted to an organization after Pay Day must pay her dues for the year before or at the first meeting of the organization after her admission thereto.

2. The fine for late payment for dues shall be twenty-five cents for each month or fraction thereof that elapses between Pay Day and final payment. Fines shall be collected from those who neglect their dues on Pay Day and from those who fail to meet their promissory notes when due.

3. A student shall be automatically a member of only two organizations: Her college class and the student government association. The dues for the student government association shall be collected by the class treasurers and turned over to the treasurer of the student government association. The combined dues shall approximate five dollars, of which one dollar and a half shall go to the student government association for:

- (a) The present expenses of that body.
- (b) The expenses of the Thanksgiving activities.

4. State clubs shall be organized on a purely voluntary basis, or entirely discontinued.

5. All voluntary organizations shall prepare their budgets on the basis of probable and not potential membership.

6. The Choral Club, the Choir and the Orchestra shall no longer be classified as student organizations. They shall not be required to prepare budgets and shall not be assessed for the annual.

III Point System

It was found that some offices were rated too high and others too low. Changes have been suggested as noted on separate sheet.

Due to the fact that it takes a considerable amount of time and energy to be an active member of any organization, it is suggested that one point be given for membership in any departmental club, and also the Athletic Association. It will be noted that the Student President and Annual Board Editor have been dropped to nine points to allow for the new ruling.

IV Freshman Squad System.

This system of organization of the freshman has proved unsatisfactory. The reasons for its failure are believed to be:

- 1. The groups are too large for the upperclassman advisor to become well acquainted with all of the members.
- 2. The freshman squad leaders have in many cases not been sufficiently

interested.

3. The upperclassmen advisors have either not been allowed sufficient number of points to give time and interest to the work or have not grasped the real object of the system.

It is felt that there is a distinct need on the campus for bringing the upperclassmen and freshmen closer together for the purpose of helping the freshman in her scholastic, social, spiritual life on the campus. At the present time there are two forms of organizations existing on the campus for the purpose---the Freshman Squad System, and the Big Sister organization---If each were to function properly their work would overlap.

Since a great deal of interest is taken in the membership of college classes, it is thought that organization through the classes would be the most effective way of carrying on the Big Sister Organization.

The suggestions take the following form:

(a) During the last week in April the Junior, Sophomore, and Freshman classes each elect a member to the Big Sister Committee.

(b) The Junior class member shall automatically become chairman of the committee.

1. This committee shall secure the names of all the girls who are planning to return to Lindenwood the following year.

2. Choose from the three classes which they represent approximately 60 girls whom they believe will have sufficient interest to be Big Sisters to three or four Freshmen.

3. Arrange with the Secretary of the College to receive by the close of August the names and addresses of all entering students.

It shall be the duty of each of the 60 chosen girls to:

(a) Write to the Freshmen sisters in September to give them a contact of interest with the school even before they arrive.

(b) To help her Freshmen to feel at home after they arrive, especially

during the first few weeks.

(c) To stimulate the interest of her Freshmen in scholarship and activities throughout the year. Also to help create for them a true understanding of and cooperation with the student government.

V. Additional Suggestions:

1. That the student's handbook should include information regarding:

(a) Pay Day, Budgets, and Fines with approximate dues of every student organization.

(b) Automatic membership in student government and college classes.

(c) Point System to limit activities.

(d) Big Sister Organization.

2. That no girl be allowed to participate in any more than one major performance during the fall and winter seasons. The fall season shall be from September until Christmas, the winter season from Christmas to Easter. A major performance is one which requires 10 hours of rehearsals or their equivalent.

3.

4. That each organization submit to the Dean of Students in the fall the names and character of the entertainments which they wish to present the following year in order that she might arrange for some organization to give entertainments only every other year, alternating with others.

provided with a typewritten copy of the full report and in as much as the above nine changes have been written on the board the committee hope that some definite action either of rejection or adoption may be taken immediately."

Dr. Calder moved that the report be adopted seriatim. Miss Spahr seconded the motion. Dr. Stumberg expressed the opinion that the changes were too complicated to permit of action without further study. Mr. Motley expressed the same opinion, and moved to amend the motion for adoption so that we might have each member again provided with the committee's report and so that each might have more time in which to consider said report. This seemed to be equivalent to a motion for postponement. As such it was seconded and adopted. Mr. Motley and Dr. Stumberg were appointed as a committee to see that every member of the faculty received a copy of the above report in ample time to study it carefully.

Mrs Roemer extended to the faculty from Dr. and Mrs. Stumberg an invitation to a reception at their home on Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. The faculty expressed prompt and cordial appreciation and indicated their acceptance of the invitation.

Mr. Franklin K. Lane, formerly director of the Junior Red Cross, spoke to the faculty on conditions in Europe. Mr. Lane was here under the auspices of the International Relations Club.

The meeting adjourned.

REPORT ON STUDENT ACTIVITIES

The following suggestions are presented for consideration.

The system to be organized as follows:-

- I. Schedule of Regular meetings and provision for special meetings and activities.
- II. Budgets and Pay Day for student Organizations.
- III. Point system to limit participation in Activities
- IV. Big Sister Organization.

- I.
 1. Only Announcements for the meetings of preference for the day will be read in chapel.
 2. The President shall nominate a committee to make a schedule of hours and days for regular meetings, games, rehearsals and entertainments.
 3. No special meeting of students will be held immediately after chapel. If it is necessary for a member of the faculty to call a meeting of students the notice may be given in chapel but the time of the meeting must be set for later in the afternoon.

II. BUDGETS

1. There shall be one annual day for the payment of all dues. This day to be the first Thursday in October.
2. The arrangements for Pay Day to be in charge of the Student Board.
3. The President shall appoint a faculty committee to advise with the various organizations in deciding on their budgets.
4. Choir, Choral Club, and Orchestra are to be considered--Student organizations but their budgets are to be limited to a minimum account.
5. A student who is admitted to an organization after Pay Day during the first term shall pay the regular dues for the year.
A student entering an organization after February 1st will pay dues for one semester only.

6. The fine for late payment for dues in any organization shall be 25¢ for each month or fraction thereof that elapses between Pay Day and final payment.
7. Every student shall automatically become a member of three organizations-- Student Government Association, her College class and her State club.
8. The combined dues for the above three organizations shall not exceed \$5.00 annually, unless special permission is granted by Faculty Budget Committee.

III. The President shall appoint a committee to work out a schedule of the maximum number of points for each office in the various student activities.

IV. The Freshman squad system seemed not to be a success and it is suggested that the Big Sister Movement be reorganized on a more permanent basis throughout the entire College Course.

The details to be worked out by a committee appointed by the President.

ADDITIONAL SUGGESTIONS

1. That above regulations be included in the Student Hand Book.
2. No girl will be allowed to participate in more than one major performance during a season. The fall season shall be from September until Christmas. The winter season from Christmas to Easter and Spring season from Easter to June. A Major performance shall be one that requires a maximum of fifteen hours rehearsal. No girl whose record is not satisfactory will be permitted to take part in any performance. A satisfactory record shall include scholastic standing and conduct.

The eligibility of those taking part in activities shall be investigated before rehearsals commence by the Student Board which will be notified of activities by the Chairman of the Faculty Committee on schedule of meetings.

The above committee shall determine which organizations shall give performances during current academic year.


