New university president wants better communication

Lindenwood President James Evans has plans for the university. He wants current and future students to be aware that this is an ideal learning environment.

"We want to be seen as the finest student institution in the Midwest," he said. "Some of our faculty already see us that way, but I want the Midwest in general to see it."

Evans said he never thought he would be in a position to be president until former President Dennis Spellmann became ill last spring.

"I realized that if the Board of Directors were willing, I would be the logical person to take the reins," he said. "I'm in a position to directly boost and promote good ideas."

Evans said he does not take his duties lightly.

"Whoever occupies this office has to be on the job 24 hours a day, seven days week," he said. "In many respects, I'm the icon representing the university."

Evans said one of his main goals is to increase student and administration communication.





Wrestlers pin down national title

The Lindenwood Lions won the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics national wrestling championships in Sioux City, Iowa, last weekend, claiming their second championship in three years and their third in the last six years. All 12 Lions earned All-American honors as they scored 177 points, 65 ahead of second place Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University of Arizona.

Two Lions captured individual national championships, Jake Dieffenbach in the 165-pound weight division and John Salter at 174 pounds. After the meet on Saturday, Coach Joe Parisi was named

2007 NAIA national coach of the year. The NAIA title came after the Lions won their third straight regional title on Feb. 23 at Lindenwood's Hyland Performance Arena. Individual regional champions were Josh Sampo at 125

pounds, Randy Vanderveen at 165 and

LU wrestlers placed second in regionals at 125 pounds, 165, 174, 197 and in the heavyweight division. Parisi also was named regional coach of the year.

"Winning the regional championships is obviously another objective in our overall goal," Parisi said after winning the regional title. "It is something that is very important to us and we have to have the realization that we wrestled

for national seeds."

The Lions entered nationals last Friday as the favorite to win the team title. "They have done it before and they have proven it," Parisi said.

The Lions went undefeated this season in dual matches, 8-0, and were number one in the NAIA rankings most of the year.

SWIMMING – The Lindenwood men's swimming and diving team placed second and the Lady Lions fourth at the NAIA national championships in San Antonio, Texas, last weekend. The men scored 499 points as runners-up to champion California Baptist's 937.5 points. California Baptist also won the women's title with 783.5 points.

Kevin Winkelman, a freshman transfer student from Meramec, is anxiously awaiting the start of online registration at Lindenwood. "Meramec had online registration as well as having an adviser be able to do it," he said. "I think it's great. If you're lucky, you can get what you want without having to get up early and waste time.

Ryan Guffey, assistant dean of campus life, will be in charge of setting up the process.

"The program should expedite the sharing of information, increase speed, and allow for more institutional accounting," he said.

"It will integrate the administrative offices so that they'll be in one central location. It will also restrict access so people from one department can't get in to another area of an account that they don't need to be in," Guffey added.

The program will be run through Three Rivers Systems, a third party provider specializing in information technology. The company has developed what it calls "CAMS Enterprise (Comprehensive Academic Management System)."

The system will allow students access to their accounts 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The new technology will allow them to not only register for classes, but also keep track of their grades, participate in discus-

sion groups, and check their degree requirements online, in addition to other features.

Students will be able to go over their four-year plans by logging on to their account via the Web. But that's not to say that trips to their advisers won't still be a necessity. "One thing that we really value here is the strong student faculty interaction. So we're still going to encourage that, of course," Guffey said.

While the specifics of the arrangement – and a date for online registration to begin - are still being hammered out, the intentions have been made perfectly clear. Guffey said, "We're working to make it easier on both the students and the institution."

"The student and administration contact has not been as good as it could be," he said. "We can improve." He said that e-mailing the "Lindenwood Snapshot," a newsletter for students, was a step in the right direction.

Evans said he plans to be out with students, not just be a guy in an office. He attended the Lindenwood Student Government Association meeting on Feb. 20 to answer student questions.

"Students ask some hard questions," he said.

With bouts of the flu and colds going around, some students wondered about the possibility of a student nurse or a health clinic on campus. Evans said there were no current talks about creating one

business, not medical treatment business," he said. "We have a list of clinics and medical professionals at the campus life office should students need treatment."

Given the housing shortage that occurred at the beginning of last semester, Evans said he was confident housing issues won't be as severe in the future.

"I'll be personally keeping an eye on spaces to see that we don't have an overflow of more than 24 hours," he said.

With the report of a female student assaulted Feb. 18 near off-campus housing, some students at the SGA meeting expressed concern about safety on and around the campus. Evans said that LU and the St. Charles community are relatively safe places.

"A menacing, deranged individual could come on campus. Short of issuing a bodyguard to every student, we can't really do much about

that," he said. Evans said it was likely LU would install more lighting and sensor lights around off-campus housing. He is reviewing whether there is enough security to cover LU property. According to Evans, Lindenwood has more than 100 security employees, a number that includes resident advisers and resident directors.

Maintenance of student housing has always been a hot topic at LU. Evans said students with complaints about conditions of their housing should report them to Terry Russell, dean of students. Russell will forward

the problem to the appropriate personnel.

Evans said one of his main duties is problem solving. Some problems require a presidential authority.

"The recent qualification of our dormitory visitation policy was a significant question," he said. "Our visitation policy was way out of step with what other universities do, (and) it was a major frustration for students. The decision to change that had to come from a presidential authority. It affects campus culture."

Under the visitation policy, revised last fall, students can sign in to visit on the weekends in dorm rooms with doors open.




