'84-85 Yearbook

The Lindenwood Student Government (LSG) has high hopes of initiating the rebirth of a campus yearbook. The college has been without an updated annual since the last publication of the *Linden Leaves* during the 1979 academic school year.

Following presentations by two firms, the LSG Executive Council has chosen to contract the Herff Jones Co. to publish the new yearbook. In turn the government has signed an agreement that it will put together a yearbook with the assistance of the company.

Funds to finance the new yearbook will come directly from the student activities fee which are paid by each student this year. The LSG then can resell the yearbook in order to replenish itself.

At this point, the LSG is considering the possibilities of hiring a student editor who will take responsibility for the publication. This would include putting a staff together and assigning respective editors for the news, sports, feature and advertising positions.

'Crimes of the Heart'

Theatre Season Opens October 6

Beth Henley's award-winning play, Crimes of the Heart, opens the 1984-85 theatrical season of the Department of Performing Arts with a five-engagement run beginning October 4 in Lindenwood College's Jelkyl Theatre.

This warm-hearted, zany and brilliantly imaginative play teems with humanity and humor as it examines the plight of three young Mississippi sisters betrayed by their passions. It is the winner of the Pulitzer Prize and the New York Drama Critics Circle Award.

Performances are scheduled at 8 pm October 4-6 and 12-13 in Jelkyl Theatre.

First in Series for Jazz Buffs

Full-time students can pick up free tickets for the September 16 performance of the Jay McShann Jazz Trio, the first of six musical, theatrical and entertainment events of the 1984-85 Visiting Artists Series.

The concert begins at 3 pm in Jelkyl Theatre in Roemer Hall.

In the heyday of the jazz era, Jay "Hootie" McShann led the swinging Kansas City big band that included such jazz greats as Charlie Parker, Gus Johnson and Gene Ramey.

Renowned as a boogie-woogie pianist and a master of the blues piano, McShann will play a repertoire at Lindenwood that includes the blues, Tin Pan Alley standards and traditional jazz originals.

Individual tickets for full-time students are available on a first-come, first served basis. Season tickets are priced at \$18 each, representing a 40 percent savings from individual tickets, which if available, are priced at \$5 each.

His performance is made possible by support from the Missouri Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts through participation in the Mid-America Arts Alliance of St. Louis.

Upcoming events in the Visiting Artists Series include Bob Kramer's Marionnettes October 14, Charles Leader as Mark Twain October 23, the St. Louis Brass Quintet in February, 1985, and the St. Louis Black Repertory Co. and Flemenco guitarist Ronald Radford in March 1985.

AFA Is Illinois-Bound This Month

An exhibit of works by Edgar Degas, a leading French Impressionist artist, at the Art Institute of Chicago and a tour of a Springfield, Illinois, residence designed by architect Frank Lloyd Wright, are scheduled this fall by the Associates of the Fine Arts (AFA), a St. Charles community and Lindenwood College organization of 150 enthusiasts and supporters of the fine arts.

Slated September 21-23 for both AFA members and nonmembers as well as students, the tour coincides with the 150th anniversary of Degas' birth, according to W. Dean Eckert, PhD, an AFA member and chairman of the Art Department at Lin-

denwood College.

"To commemorate the anniversary, the Art Institute of Chicago is presenting a comprehensive exhibit of 91 works by the artist, including paintings, drawings, pastels, prints and sculptures," Eckert said.

"Widely noted for his portrayal of ballet dancers, Degas also sought themes for his creative endeavors at the race tracks and in the cafes of Paris, which will be viewed in the exhibit," he added.

The Springfield stop will allow participants to view the Dana-Thomas House, called a prime example of the Prairie Style houses designed by

Wright and completed in 1904.

"This residence is unique among Wright's early houses in that the furniture and other furnishings also designed by Wright have been preserved. Recently, this residence became the property of the State of Illinois and is now open to the public," Eckert said.

Coeds Sought for Ensemble

"On the strength of a highly-successful first year, the Lindenwood College Women's Ensemble is prepared to launch its second season," states Nancy P. Fleming, director of the group and assistand professor of choral music at Lindenwood.

Open to all women without the need for an audition, the group sings a wide variety of music, but with an emphasis on the lighter side, she exlains.

"Last year's concerts received a great deal of enthusiasm, so if you're a woman and you like to

sing, come and join the fun."

The Women's Ensemble meets Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30-7 pm in the Fine Arts Building, and up to two hours of academic credit are available through participation and enrollment in the course, Music 110.

Further information on the Women's Ensemble can be obtained from Fleming at extension 246.

The tour will depart St. Charles at 8:30 am September 21, returning the evening of September 23. Following the viewing of the Degas exhibit on the morning of September 22, the balance of the time is free for individual activities until departure from Chicago at noon September 23.

The tour fee ranges from \$85-\$125 for AFA members and \$95-\$135 for nonmembers, based upon choice of accommodations. The fee includes bus transportation to and from Chicago, accommodations at the Palmer House in Chicago and admissions to the Degas exhibit and the Dana-Thomas House.

Reservations are recommended, and they can be secured with a \$25 deposit per individual, due by August 31 and payable to the Associates of the Fine Arts.

Health Promotion Is Centers Goal

The Student Health Center has been a part of Lindenwood College for many years even though its location has changed many times recently, reports Jane Henthorn, the registered nurse and director of the facility that, for the third year, is located on the lower level of Cobbs Hall.

"The emphasis of the Student Health Center is reflected in its name-promoting the good health of students at Lindenwood College," she said.

Henthorn, who consults with local physicians when the need arises, interfaces with various people on campus to work toward the goals of providing ways to meet emotional and spiritual needs, proper nutrition, adequate exercise, safety, clean living and working conditions and emergency procedures to work toward wellness for students.

The Student Health Center usually is open from 9 am to 2:30 pm Monday through Friday, and students are advised to make appointments for visitation. Henthorn frequently leaves the office during these hours to visit students in residence halls who are too ill to walk to the center.

Fall activities planned by the Health Center include educational programs on exercise, weight counseling, cardio-pulmonary resusitation (CPR) training and first-aid measures.

Henthorn invites new and returning students to stop and see the facility and get acquainted, and she hopes "everyone has a healthy, happy year at Lindenwood College."

Lindenwood President To Teach Fall Political Science Course

James I. Spainhower, PhD, president of Lindenwood College and former state legislator, will be the instructor for "Introduction to the Study of Politics," a three-credit undergraduate course being offered this fall at the St. Charles campus.

Scheduled from 7-10 pm on Mondays beginning September 10, the course will present an overview of political science, including fundamental political concepts, values, institutions and processes. Spainhower said much of the course will be geared to local, state and national elections.

Perhaps best known for his role as a political leader in Missouri, Spainhower served for seven years as a member of the Missouri House of Representatives and for an additional eight years as state treasurer. Spainhower also was a Democratic candidate for governor in 1979.

While serving in the House of Representatives, he chaired the Committee on Education and the Committee on School District Reorganization and was a member of the Appropriations and Legislative Research committees.

Spainhower was an instructor of political science at the University of Missouri-St. Louis and president of the School of the Ozarks in Point Lookout,

Missouri, prior to assuming the Lindenwood College presidency in January, 1983.

A native of Stansberry, Missouri, he holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in history and Bible from Phillips University in Enid, Oklahoma, a bachelor of Divinity degree from Lexington Theological Seminary in Lexington, Kentucky, and master's and doctoral degrees in political science from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He also is the recipient of five honorary degrees and numerous awards from educational, religious and public service organizations.

With the fall presidential election, another political science course being offered by Lindenwood College is "The American Presidency," a three-hour undergraduate offering on Wednesdays from 7-10 pm., beginning September 10, in St. Charles.

To be instructed by Richard Wier, PhD, assistant professor of political science, the course is an analysis of the functions and powers of the office and role of the presidency in the American political process.

Wier, who holds a juris doctorate degree from St. Louis University Law School, is a 1961 graduate of Blackburn College in Carlinville, Illinois, and has a master's degree from St. Louis University and a doctorate in political science from Georgetown University in Washington, DC.

"Introduction to the Study of Politics" and "The American Presidency" are offered through the Lindenwood Evening College. Further information and registration procedures for both courses can be obtained by calling the Evening College at extension 276.

Extended Hours for Business

Lindenwood's Business Office in Roemer Hall has extended its hours August 30 and September 4-6 as a service to new and returning students this fall. In addition, the office will remain open until 5 pm Monday through Friday, with business conducted after 4 pm credited to the next business day.

Extended hours of the Business Office combine with other recent service-hour extensions of the Admissions and Financial Aid offices.

The Admissions Office is open until 6 pm Monday through Friday and also is staffed on Saturdays.

The Financial Aid Office is open until 7 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays in addition to normal hours of 8:30 am until 5 pm on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

'Fun Run' Slated September 30

The St. Charles Jaycee Women has teamed with Lindenwood College to sponsor a five kilometer (3.1 miles) and a one-mile Fun Run on September 30 that will benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Open to Lindenwood students, the Fun Run will feature a one-mile run on campus beginning at 8:30 am. The five kilometer run will begin at 7:30 am on campus, stretching to the Missouri River in downtown St. Louis and back to the Lindenwood campus.

The event is open to men and women ages 14 and younger, 19 and younger, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59 and 60 years of age or older. The top three

finishers in the five-kilometer race will receive trophies, while ribbons will be provided to all in the one-mile event.

T-shirts will be provided to the first 200 entrants, according to Marilyn Morris, director of day admissions and athletic director as well as treasurer of the St. Charles Jaycee Women and one of the organizers of the Fun Run.

Entry fees before the event are \$5 per person or \$15 for families. Fees from September 24 until the race are \$6 each.

Student Parking Permits on Sale Now

Parking permits for full and part-time students are available in the Security Office, 17 Roemer Hall, and must be placed on vehicles this week.

There is no charge for resident students, but all resident students must have a valid parking permit. For others, a \$10 permit fee must be paid first at the Business Office in Roemer Hall, then the receipt taken to the Security Office where permits will be issued along with a campus map that explains parking regulations.

Parking permits, which are effective until Sept. 1, 1985, must be placed on the left bumper of vehicles. Failure to register a motor vehicle and display a permit will result in the issuance of tic-

kets and/or the towing of the vehicle, reports Security Chief Duance France.

The new parking permits, which contain the Lindenwood College logo, are color coded in black and red and white for faculty and staff members.

Unrestricted parking is permitted in lots adjacent to the tennis courts and behind Sibley Hall, faculty and staff parking is permitted in lots adjacent to the Butler Hall Gymnasium and Ayres Cafeteria as well as those next to Butler and Young halls and the Memorial Arts Building; and student parking is permitted in lots adjacent to Irwin, McCluer and Cobbs halls as well as the parking lot near Commerce Bank of St. Charles.

Chamber Singers Volunteers Sought

Auditions for the Lindenwood College Chamber Singers will be held September 6-7 in Room 107 of the Fine Arts Building.

All interested students are asked to sign up for an audition time of the schedule that is posted outside the door of Room 107. No special preparation is necessary.


