



Dean's Message






Provides resource accessibility and supports the information needs



Access Services: Receive and Respond

The Access Services team works to provide library users and anyone in the LARC with the information they need to be successful. High-quality service, consistent communication, and problem solving are important pillars for how the access services team connects with the Lindenwood community.

The Circulation Desk is the main point of service for the library and functions as a guide for anyone who enters the LARC. The Access Services staff and student employees strive to embody approachability and positivity in order to provide helpful responses to all library users. The Q2 service excellence model is the foundation for every interaction at the Circulation Desk and throughout the library. The questions 'What do you need' and 'How can I help' are crucial for providing strong service to all library users. The Access Services team continuously listens to library users and responds quickly to their information needs.






Access Services: Connecting Users to Materials

The Access Services team connects the Lindenwood students, faculty, and staff to the resources they need through the Lindenwood collections as well as several resource sharing opportunities with other academic and public libraries. Resource sharing, through borrowing and lending, grants widespread access to items outside of Lindenwood for class assignments, research, and other information needs.

Access Services: Collection Development

The library maintains a balanced and diverse collection that reflects the educational mission of the university and supports course curriculum. The main way the library does this is through a collection development initiative. Adding new titles and new technology to the library increases the research value and functionality of the collections. When selecting what to add to the collection, librarians strive to choose titles in print, audio, and e-book to increase the accessibility of the collection.





Reference Services: Partners in the Journey to Academic Success

The reference team is made up of professionals whose job it is to serve the Lindenwood community by providing them with the knowledge to access and utilize the educational resources that best serve their academic discipline and research needs. The reference librarians work to enhance the educational experiences of all Lindenwood students by teaching information literacy skills, quality research methods, and providing course collaborations both online and inperson. They work with faculty and staff to support scholarship and professional growth.

Developing Educational Tools for Students

Reference librarians expand the scope of educational tools available for students and faculty by continuously developing:

- Video tutorials to improve resource accessibility and website navigation
- Subject research guides
- Course specific research guides
- Workshops focusing on:
 - Career preparedness
 - Information literacy
 - Conference and poster presentations
 - Citation management
 - Publishing

Reference Services: Course Collaborations

In the 2018-19 Librarians:

Taught **111** instructions

Held **684** individual reference interactions

Were embedded in **27** courses both online and on campus

Academic Disciplines Reached:

18 for the library's instruction initiatives

5 for the library's embeded initiatives

Course collaborations contribute to student success because they provide the students with the benefit of an accessible librarian who has expertise in the subject of the course. Course collaborations include research instructions in classes, assignment support for students, and semester long embedding in courses.

When librarians embed in a course, either in person or online, they spend the entire length of the course acting as a library resource for the students and help the professor manage research questions that students have when completing projects. Embedded librarians function as another professional in the course who students can go to for research and library support. The embedded librarian is in communication with the professor to provide an experience of continuity and support for students as they work to complete assignments and reach the learning goals of the course.

Reference Services: Open Educational Resources(OER)

Open Educational Resources (OER) are educational materials that are openly available in the public domain.

Benefits of Using OER

For students:

- Drastically reduces the cost educational materials
- Easily accessible
- Materials can be retained for future use

For Faculty:

- Ability to revise and customize materials to support a course
- Consistent access to the same material for all students
- OER materials can be re-used, re mixed, and re-distributed

Media and Gaming Lab: Spaces for Creativity

The Media and Gaming Lab (MGL) exists so all students can utilize technology and software that helps them develop their professional skills, build a portfolio, and enhance their creative opportunities. The MGL provides students with reliable accessibility to specialized software and technology that they would not otherwise have access to outside of their classroom. The library staff in the MGL create a space for students where they can express their creativity and produce professional level work. The MGL consistently updates their technology to make sure it aligns with students needs and course requirements.

The gaming room is a stress-relieving space with comfortable seating that allows students to have fun with their friends and host collaborative e-sports tournaments.



Archives and Special Collections: Mary E. Ambler Archives

The main goal of Lindenwood's Mary E. Ambler Archives is to be a tool that Lindenwood students, faculty, and staff will find useful in their research of institutional and regional topics. The Archives is run by librarian and university archivist, Paul Huffman. The Archives serves as an institutional memory for Lindenwood and is a mix of physical items and digital records. The Archives works to centralize access to university publications, meeting minutes, reports, course catalogs, yearbooks, student newspapers, and photographs.







Archives and Special Collections: History Preserved

The Archives holds several collections which depict the early history of Lindenwood including information on the founders, George and Mary Sibley. Lindenwood's transformation from a women's college to a university is chronicaled in the school's archives.








Library Services: Designing Spaces for Learning

The library has multiple types of spaces that were designed to help students learn more collaboratively and efficiently. These spaces provide students with comfortable learning environments that have the technology they need to accomplish their work and collaborate with others.



The Grove

A collaborative study space with open seating and wireless printing access. The Grove is popular for studying and relaxing between classes



Group Study Rooms

These technology enhanced rooms provide large quiet spaces for students to collaborate. Equipped with the productivity software Solstice, a dry erase board, comfortable seating, and webcam these rooms are perfect for group projects, meetings, and virtual class sessions.


