OVERVIEW

hroughout its history, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) has provided strong leadership for all aspects of intercollegiate sports. Since its introduction of intercollegiate championship basketball in 1937, the NAIA has maintained the highest standards while administering first-rate athletics programs.

Time and time again, the NAIA has stepped forward to address the important issues of the day — be it racial integration in the '40s and '50s or establishing the first women's championship program in 1980. The NAIA has not been afraid to enact changes while others have watched and waited.

In the past decade, presidents of the NAIA colleges and universities have assumed a position of responsible leadership. The NAIA's Council of Presidents, the organization's primary governing body, is comprised of 32 college and university presidents from all regions of the United States.

With its major emphasis on educational development, it was natural for the NAIA to further strengthen academic eligibility requirements in the mid-'80s. All NAIA participating student-athletes must maintain a certain grade-point-average (GPA) while accumulating credit hours for a declared academic degree. Unlike other associations, NAIA student-athlete academic eligibility is monitored on a semester-by-semester basis.

The All-America Scholar-Athlete program, a long-standing NAIA tradition, recognizes junior and senior student-athletes with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 (on a

Since 1937, the NAIA has administered athletics programs and championships in proper balance with the overall collegiate educational experience. 



Academic Opportunities

These activities enhance the excellent academic programs at Lindenwood," Spellmann said.


In January of 1992, Crotz was appointed Athletic Director after serving two years as head women's basketball coach. As a coach and athletic director, Crotz has maintained a high caliber program and has propelled the athletic program to new heights.

Highly recognized in St. Louis sports circles, Crotz has coached in the area for over 14 years. A native of Chicago, Crotz attended the University of Missouri-Columbia and earned a bachelor of science degree in education in 1979. He then went on to receive his master's of education degree from the University of Missouri-St. Louis in 1984.

After completing its fourth season of intercollegiate baseball, Lindenwood has established itself as a nationally competitive program. Over the past two seasons, the Lions have compiled a sparkling 60-37 record, have captured two successive District 16 titles and were Midwest Regional Finalists in 1993.

This year Coach Ward has a strong contingent of returning players. The Lions return nine Academic All-Conference selections and one of these players, Cory Tibbs, was an ABCA-NAIA All-American and the NAIA national RBI leader with 64 runs batted in 43 games, for an average of 1.49 RBI per game. Tibbs also finished in the top 10 in the nation in home runs (14), and batting average (.448). Also earning NAIA All-American honors were third baseman Tony Allison, and pitcher Scott Sherrer. Sherrer had seven wins for the Lions, to lead the staff, and also had nine saves, to go along with a sterling 2.42 ERA. His production earned him the District 16 Player of the Year award. Along with Sherrer, the entire Lion pitching staff returns next season, and includes Show-Me Collegiate All-Conference selection Buddy Smith, who accounted for six wins and a 3.71 ERA, left-handed stalwart Jeff Weiler and District 16 Tournament dual winner John Peel. Senior catcher Tim Nihart returns for his final season fresh off a summer tour of Asia with the Athletes in Action's top All-Star team. Last season, Nihart hit .424 and had a team leading 14 doubles, to go along with 22 RBI.

Ward had a successful recruiting season this year, and has added some strong armed pitching prospects to an already outstanding staff. Other new recruits are expected to add some extra offensive punch and stellar defensive help to the Lion squad.

After finishing nationally ranked in team batting average (15th), stolen bases (3rd), and team defense (15th), the Lions are looking to "three-peat" in the District 16 race, compete for the first American Midwest Conference Championship, and be competitive in the NAIA national tournament in the spring of 1994.

Ward is a graduate of Appalachian State and holds a doctorate from Middle Tennessee State University. He is entering his seventh year of coaching collegiate baseball, with a career mark of 150-91. During the fall, Ward also serves as the defensive coordinator for the football team.



Men's Basketball

Head Coach Rick Kestner

New coach Rick Kestner takes over at the helm of the Lion basketball program that is hoping to build on the foundation set by last season's 12-16 record, which included a best ever conference mark of 6-4. Kestner believes that the difference between winning and losing will be the team's defensive effort. Look for constant man-to-man pressure to be extended full court this season as the Lions create an offense keying on opponent turnovers, steals, and bad shots. The hope is that intense defense will spring the offense into easy transition baskets at the other end. However, Kestner expects that the offense will be flexible enough to score in many different and various sets, and "do a little of everything."

The Lions will return a solid core of players from last season, and a total of six letter winners. Said Kestner, "We will rely on them to lead us for Lion basketball to be successful." Senior guard Brandon Braswell led the Lions in scoring with a 16.5 average, and had a team high 72 assists in earning second team all-conference honors. He also led the team in three-point field goal shooting, hitting 41 of 96 attempts (42.7%), and had 59 steals. Senior guard Clint Bolser has always been an outside threat, and averaged 11.2 points a game, and Kestner hopes that Bolser will surpass these numbers and provide a balanced threat on the court. Sophomore forward Kris Pals was second on the team last season in rebounding, and Kestner expects Pals to be more of a threat offensively this season for the Lions in the post. Sophomore guard Brian Lloyd played in all 28 games last season, and is expected to be another vital player in Kestner's line-up. The Lindenwood basketball team also achieved recognition in the classroom last year as three Lions were named to the Show-Me Collegiate Conference All-Academic team: Dave Bauer, Jim Kagie and Kris Pals.

The 1993-94 schedule should provide a stern test for the Lions and features a road game at NCAA Division II Missouri-Rolla. A homecoming of sorts will be at Augustana, where Kestner returns to his alma mater to face the NCAA Division III Runners-up Vikings. The Lions also face four squads that made appearances in the NAIA tournament: Drury (Mo.), Eureka (Ill.), Incarnate Word (Texas), and conference foe McKendree. "When you look at our schedule, it is as tough a schedule that Lindenwood has faced in quite a while," said Kestner.

A native of Pekin, Ill., Kestner is a 1977 graduate of Augustanta (Ill.) College and also has a master's degree from Eastern Illinois.


The Lady Lions had perhaps the finest season in school history with a record breaking 22-11 mark last season. Head Coach Steve Crotz looks forward to the 1993-94 season and hopes to build onto the dizzying heights that last season's team reached. The team broke 10 school records last season, and Crotz returns almost all of his players from last year. The team again finished the Show-Me Collegiate Conference (this year known as the American Midwest Conference) with an undefeated regular season mark, and won the school's second SMCC post-season tournament championship in three years. In fact, the Lady Lions have won 14 straight regular season conference games dating back to the 1990-91 season. During the course of the season, Lindenwood won a school record 11 straight games, and 14 of 15 during one stretch in the season.

The Lady Lions ended the year ranked third in the nation in rebounding percentage, fifth in the nation in scoring defense, and eighth in three-point field goal percentage. Senior guard Daphne Hozée became the first basketball player at Lindenwood to ever be named as an NAIA Academic All-American. With Hozée leading the way, the Lady Lions had a conference leading seven student-athletes on the SMCC All-Academic team: Neel Hogh, Hozée, Cyndi Johnson, Chris Kenny, Julie Larson, Kristen Miller, and Josette Williamson. On the court, three Lindenwood athletes landed on the All-District first team, with Hozée, Shannon Malek, and Angie Warren earning honors. Named to the SMCC first team were Malek and Warren, while Hozée and Marni Johnson were named Honorable Mention.

Senior guard Warren led the team in scoring with a 12.7 average, was second on the team in rebounding, grabbing 5.3 boards a game, and was second in assists, with 94. Sophomore forward Malek had a strong impact on the front line, as she was second in scoring with a 11.7 points a game, and led the team in rebounding with a 6.5 average. Malek also set a school record for blocks in a season by rejecting 25 opponent shots. Senior guard Hozée

pitched in with 9.0 points a game, and had a team leading 110 assists. Add all of that to an outstanding recruiting class of 11 that Crotz considers his best ever, and the foundation for an even greater season is firmly in place.

Crotz, who is also Lindenwood's athletic director, is in his fourth season as head coach at Lindenwood, and has posted new school records for wins in every season he has been here. His career mark stands at 60-31, and has led the Lady Lions to two regular season conference titles, and two post-season crowns during his stint at Lindenwood. Before coming to Lindenwood, Crotz coached at Brentwood High School, and had a record of 210-50 there, including winning seven straight district championships and one state championship. Crotz has been named Show-Me Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year for the past two seasons.



CROSS COUNTRY

Head Coach Gary White

After many very successful seasons, District 16 Coach of the Year Gary White is looking at this coming season as a challenge for himself and his runners. Last year's team achieved the school's highest NAIA national cross country ranking as they were ranked number eight at one point in the season. This year the men's team returns all but two runners from last year's squad which finished second in District 16. Standouts Alan Schneider and Chris Rebello return for their final seasons of competition, and both were qualifiers for the national meet. White's team will also be bolstered by the return of sophomore Terry Tschlapper who was sidelined due to injuries. Junior Kevin Pinson is also expected to be very competitive for Lindenwood. White has added seven new runners to his roster, and will look to a few of the newcomers to add some depth to the squad.

The story is much the same for the women's team. The entire team, which placed second in Districts, will be returning, but senior standout Janel Teiken will be sitting out the cross country season to save her eligibility for the track season in the spring. That leaves the leadership role to be carried by returning veterans such as junior Alisa Gilliam, and

sophomores Monica Haun and Alysa Walsh. White hopes that a few of the new recruits along with a strong team effort will keep the cross country team at the lofty heights that it has become accustomed to. This fall the Lions will host the Lions Invitational on September 4, and travel to four different states to face some of the top teams in the nation.

White came to Lindenwood in 1989 to start the cross country and track teams and has enjoyed a great deal of success. He has coached for many years in District 16, and during his years, he has won nine conference and 10 District 16 championships, and has also been named District 16 Coach of the Year seven times.

A native of Goergetown, Ohio, White earned a bachelor of arts and a master of science degree from Morehead State University.

The Lions will look to rebound from an injury-filled 1992 season in which Lindenwood finished a deceiving 1-9 against an extremely difficult schedule. Second year coach Jeff Driskill returns 17 starters from last year's team which lost four games by three points or less. Driskill hopes that the squad has learned from last season's experiences and that this year's team will be able to win some of the close contests this season. Said Driskill, "It should be more of a promising season because we will not be relying so much on youth."

The strength of the team will be found in the lines, and how well they play should be a big factor in how well the team does. Leading the defense is senior defensive linebacker Jim Broderick who was voted as the team defensive MVP, and was second on the team with 74 total tackles, which included a team high seven sacks.

On the offensive line, Driskill is expecting returning linemen Bob Koons, Shawn Curtis, Jon Taylor, and junior college transfer Matt Volk to anchor the line and provide some stability for the Lion offense. There are many contenders for the quarterback slot, and competition for the position should be intense. The running back spot is open, but senior Shawn Worman is the leading candidate for the starting nod. Last season Worman was

pressed into service and gained 177 yards with three touchdowns in limited action. Joe Fiorino is a transfer from Southern Illinois, and should also receive strong consideration at the tailback spot. The Lions have some holes to fill, but Driskill has signed another strong recruiting class and hopes that they will provide some depth for the Lions.

Despite the tough losses last year, the Lions had some bright moments and record performances. The 1992 team was the best passing team that Lindenwood has ever had, with 1,197 total yards through the air. A highlight was the 45 point outburst against Panhandle State, which set a record for most points scored. 1992 also saw some memorable big individual plays: the record 80 yard touchdown rumble that Jim Paddock had against Campbellsville; the 80 yard Bryce MacDonald pass to Paddock in the Panhandle State game, which was the longest pass play in school history; and the monstrous 52 yard field goal Steve Pinkerton kicked versus Southwest State.

The Lions again face a difficult schedule this season, as they play six home games, and a record 11 contests overall. The 1993 season will be the last for the Lions as an independent in football, as next year Lindenwood will become a member of the Mid-States Football Association, a football-only Division II conference. Overall, four Lion opponents are ranked in the NAIA Top 25, and two other foes received votes for the Top 25 poll. Included on the schedule are two past NAIA National Champions (Georgetown and Peru State) and one of the top defensive teams in the nation (Missouri Valley). Driskill said, "I'm looking forward to getting started this season. The experience that we gained last year should help us to be more competitive. The schedule is as competitive as last season, but I'm cautiously optimistic."

The second season of Lindenwood College golf showed the Lions ending the season with a 16-9 record and capturing the Show-Me Collegiate Conference Championship for the second straight year. The Lions beat second place finisher McKendree by a whopping 10 strokes, as Jeff Lewis was a medalist and finished second overall in the individual standings. Coach Art Siebels was again named conference Coach of the Year. The Lions fared quite well throughout the entire season as they hosted two tournaments, and then proceeded to win both of the championships, with Lewis shooting a team season best 70, and Roger Holdenried a 71 in the Lindenwood Tournament.


As well as winning the SMCC (this season known as the American Midwest Conference) championship they finished in second place at the McKendree Tournament, missing first place by just one stroke and finished a strong fourth at the District 16. However, Siebels was disappointed in their play at districts, because he felt they did not play to their potential. The majority of the team returns this season, with four out of the top five expected to be back. Siebels expects a boost from the return of Doug Felske, who was a red-shirt last season, and with the addition of several fine incoming golfers, the Lions hope to improve last season's mark, finish atop the AMC, and hope to fare even better in the district tournament.

Siebels is in his third year as coach of the Lindenwood Lion golf team. He is a 1966 graduate of the University of Arizona and has a career coaching mark of 38-20.

The 1992 Lindenwood men's soccer team was expected to have a strong season based on the 17-3 mark posted the previous year. The team was hot at the beginning of the year, winning their first six contests, including victories over NCAA Division II opponents Northeast Missouri and Missouri-St. Louis, and 10 out of their first 11. Then the Lions hit a slump and lost their next four games. They recovered to again claim the Show-Me Collegiate Conference championship, but drew a low seed for the District 16 tournament. Showing great character, they travelled on the road and fought all the way through to reach the district finals, but lost a bitter 2-1 match in overtime to rival Rockhurst.

The 1993 edition of Lions soccer looks to make that last step and reach the NAIA national tournament. Lions Head Coach Thom Champion saw six seniors graduate from the team, including his entire backfield, but a solid returning group of veterans remain. The burden of offense will once again fall upon senior forward Kevin McDonough who led the team in scoring with 10 goals, and also added three assists. Senior sweeper Terry Berhorst was the anchor of the defense and contributed three goals and a team high 12 assists. Junior goalie Jeff Schneider is the only returning netminder for the Lions. He had many solid outings in relief appearances and had an outstanding 0.86 goals against average. Overall, Champion returns 18 players who saw action last season and with a recruiting class that should provide some depth, the Lions could contend for the new American Midwest Conference and District 16 crowns.

The schedule is a demanding one and should prepare the Lions for the AMC, the District 16 tournament, and hopefully the NAIA national tournament. The conference will be even more difficult this season as two new schools have joined (Iowa Wesleyan and Park), and rematches with NCAA Division II powers Missouri-St. Louis and Northeast Missouri State loom as they both look to avenge losses to the Lions from last season. A trip to Miami highlights the year, as the Lions face traditional powerhouses Lynn and Nova Universities in the Sunshine State. The schedule is the toughest that Lindenwood has ever faced.

A 1979 graduate of Harris-Stowe State College, Champion enters his third season at Lindenwood with an outstanding 127-50-10 record. He holds a United States Soccer Federation "A" coaching license and is a member of the National Soccer Coaches of

America. Dennis Baez, former Wentzville coach, will return as Champion's assistant and will oversee the JV program, which had a very successful 10-2-1 mark last season.

By hosting the 1993 NAIA National Soccer tournament, the Lady Lions automatically receive a bid to nationals. That should allow for a relaxed regular season right? Wrong, says Head Coach Debbie Washburn. She wants to challenge her players to play to the best of their abilities and earn a ticket to nationals. "There is a certain pride in making it to nationals without an automatic bid," said Washburn. They want to win the first-ever American Midwest Conference championship to be contested this season. After that, goals are to win the District 16 title, and then the regional crown and finally on to the national championship.

The 1992 Lady Lions did not suffer a loss until the 10th game of the season as they went on to complete an outstanding 17-3-3 season. Along the way, the Lady Lions went on a stirring road run to win both the District and Regional crowns until their season ended at the hands of eventual national champion Lynn University. Washburn loses five players to graduation, but looks to the returning players and a strong recruiting of 18 to fill in the holes. Honorable Mention All-American Krista Neidenbach was the leading scorer for Lindenwood with 13 goals and six assists, and the scoring load will once again be on the senior forward. Sophomore defender Tisa Bauer was named to the NAIA National Championship All-Tournament team and senior Jackie Herren was named to the NSCAA All-Midwest Region Team and both will help spearhead the defense in front of goalie Kris Tebbe, who had a 0.93 GAA, including 12 shutouts.

Washburn has also added some fine recruits into the mix. Said Washburn, "We have supplied a lot of depth. I think that we have added good players at nearly every spot, and competition for playing time should be fierce." A new addition to watch is Jamie Casillas, who was the 1991 National Tournament MVP for national champion Meramec Community College. Casillas attended Lindenwood last year, but did not participate in soccer.

The 10th edition of the NAIA Women's National Soccer Championship is being hosted by Lindenwood College and St. Louis Soccer Park. The games are slated for November 22-26, and mark the return of the games to St. Louis. The very first women's national championship was staged here in 1984. Said Washburn, "Getting the national tournament here is a great honor, and we're really excited about it."

Washburn is a 1973 graduate of Southeast Missouri State University and holds a master's degree from UMSL. She has built the Lindenwood soccer program into one of the best in the nation. The Lady Lions have reached the national tournament four times in her tenure, and Washburn has been named District 16 Coach of the Year three times, as well as being recognized as 1986 Central Region Coach of the Year. This will be her 11th season at Lindenwood, and she enters it with a 125-69-19 career coaching mark.

The Lindenwood College athletic teams are nicknamed the Lions, and the women's teams are called the Lady Lions. The school's athletic colors are black and gold.

The Harlen C. Hunter Stadium and Sports Complex is home to Lindenwood's football and soccer teams, and features an artificial turf field with a stadium seating capacity of 5,000. Area high school football and soccer teams also use the stadium for special games and events.

The Lindenwood Athletic Complex serves as the home court for the Lion basketball and volleyball teams. Located in Bridgeton, (2.5 miles from Lindenwood's St. Charles campus) the complex is also used by the spring sports teams as an indoor practice facility.

Lindenwood students may also take part in a variety of intramural sports offered during the school year. Intramural activities include competition between teams, dual and single competition sports.

An exciting new addition to the campus is the new Fitness Center, located next to the fieldhouse. The Center houses all the workout equipment, including stair step machines, Lifecycles, free weights, a treadmill and an indoor track.

Students may use the lower west practice fields, as well as baseball and softball diamonds located behind the College's athletic fieldhouse. An outdoor track featuring an area for field event practice, and sand volleyball courts are also available for general use. Students are welcome to use an outdoor swimming pool behind Cobbs Hall.

The Butler Student Center offers an all-purpose gymnasium with a full-sized basketball court and an adjoining game room featuring foosball, table tennis and billiards. The Dorothy Warner Indoor Swimming Pool is open during the cold weather months to all Lindenwood students.

A Top 20 NAIA rating, American Midwest Conference and District 16 championships are ambitious, yet attainable goals which await the 1994 Lady Lion softball program. Achieving a 1993 ranking as high as 26th, a competitive yet unsuccessful bid for the conference title, and a Final Four District 16 appearance prove that Lindenwood softball is on course to meet the challenge of their lofty goals.

With the new softball field taking shape, the Lady Lions look to take their 30-19 record from the 1993 campaign forward and make people take notice. The future of Lady Lions softball continues to base its foundation on their district leading offensive power. Offensive leadership will come from the returning letterwinners. Leading the way is junior Kris Tebbe who garnered much recognition as All-Conference, SMCC player of the Year, All-District 16, and District 16 Player of the Year Runner-Up. Last season, Tebbe hit .420, with seven home runs, and 43 RBI's, to leading the team in all three categories. Other returners include Heather Bigott (SS, Academic All-Conference and All-District), Tammy Dewald (OF, Academic All-Conference), and Peggy Schmelz (C). The addition of some new recruits should help add some additional punch to the Lady Lion attack. Newcomers include: Danielle Miller (C, Dodge City C.C.); Brenda Hawkinson (OF, Spartanburg (S.C.) Methodist J.C.); Lynette Overstreet (U, Brown Mackie C.C.); and Jennifer Humphries (IF, Warren County). In an effort to improve the quick slap aspect of their game, the Lady Lions will look to returning letterwinners Stacy Bogle (IF), who led the team in steals with 24, and outfielder Robyn Fahs, as well as new recruits Lori Gray (IF, Parkway West H.S.), and Beth Kuhne (OF, St. Thomas Aquinas H.S.).

The primary job upon completing last season was the need to find some depth to the pitching staff. Krassinger feels that 1994 will be successful in that regard. The Lady Lions return their staff ace Tiffany Bogle, who earned All-Conference and All-District honors by posting a 16-6 record and a 2.14 ERA, and a healthy Shannon Malek. New arms added to the staff are: Jenny Lane (Florissant Valley C.C.); Melissa Jones (Olathe East, KS); Jeanne Loedewyck (Meramec C.C.); and Heather Hensley (Mehlville H.S.).

Defensive success will continue to be critical versus the tough District 16 schedule, and Krassinger sees much depth and support from infielder Cathie Cook, infielder Jennifer Siess, catcher Denise Shrum. Krassinger also is hoping that several other newcomers will be able to contribute in a positive manner: Karen Kenny (OF, Kennedy H.S.); Becky Salter (OF, Notre Dame H.S.); Nicole Breitlow (IF, Milwaukee Lutheran); Stephanie Aubuchon (OF, Armwood, FL); Cara Lessley (U, Moberly J.C.), Kelly Bowen (IF, McCluer North H.S.); and Josette Frazier (IF, Valencia (Fla.) C.C.).

Krassinger enters her second year with Lindenwood sporting a 30-19 collegiate record. Previously, she spent two years in the high school coaching ranks at Ursuline Academy in St. Louis where she compiled a 26-5 record, and has also served as an assistant coach at Northeast Louisiana University while completing her master's degree in education. The St. Louis native spent her playing career at conference rival William Woods College, where she ended her career with a 64-14 career record, and a 0.73 ERA, garnering NAIA All-American and All-District 16 selections. Krassinger continues to play select women's softball for the St. Louis Express, and assists with area select teams.



TENNIS Head Coach Sue Ward

Tennis is the newest sport to be added to the Lindenwood College athletic program, and as a women's sport, will equalize the number of intercollegiate sports offered to men and women, at seven each. When the team starts its schedule in the spring of 1994 under the direction of Head Coach Sue Ward, tennis will be contested for the first time at the school since the 1984 season. The team will be hosting its home matches at McNair Park in St. Charles.

Ward has started the program off in the right direction by signing a small, but solid core of players who should be the beginning of the future of tennis at Lindenwood. In addition, Ward will be holding open tryouts for the 1994 team early this fall.

Tennis is not a conference sport yet, but the Lady Lion netters will have plenty of opponents lined-up due to the hard work of Ward. Tentatively scheduled are all schools currently contesting women's tennis in District 16, including Central Methodist, Culver-Stockton, Drury, William Jewell, and William Woods. Also slated to face the Lady Lions are local teams Missouri-St. Louis, and Washington University.



"The women return everyone and hope to defend their District 16 title. The men have added quality in areas which we needed, and should challenge for the District 16 championship."


Coach White



The 1993 track season proved to be a successful one for Lindenwood. Lindenwood hosted the District 16 track meet, and coach Gary White was so busy running the meet as the director that he did not know that the Lady Lions had claimed the district crown until he pressed the button on the computer, and the results showed the Lady Lions on top with 172 points. The men had an excellent chance for the crown, with the running events giving the Lions an early lead, but a lack of depth caused them to be edged out and finish second in the meet.

The women will look to defend their District 16 championship with what should be almost the same cast as last season. Senior Janel Teiken will sit out the fall cross-country season, but will be running for Coach White this spring and should lead a strong long distance contingent. Last year at districts, Teiken won the 5,000 meter run, and led four Lady Lions into the top five. Also returning will be junior Alisa Gilliam, sophomore Monica Haun, and sophomore Alysa Walsh, who at districts, ran the 10,000 meters for the first time in the season, and won the event. Michele Candray was strong for the Lady Lions in the jumping events, and Hayley Billingsley contributed all season in the sprints. White has signed several women to strengthen the team, and expects to add more talent before the start of the season.

The men's team suffered some heavy losses due to graduation, but return stalwart distance runners Alan Schneider and Chris Rebello. White is also looking for a boost from the return of sophomore runner Terry Tschlapper. Sophomore Ed Dreyer performed well for the Lions in the sprints and middle distances, and White expects an even better year from Dreyer. The Lions did not have as much depth in the field events last season, and White hit the recruiting trails hard for some help there. Julian Smith was the 4A Missouri state high school champion in the triple jump last year, and pole vaulter Josh Dickinson placed in the Class 3A state meet. The Lions only had one thrower in the shot put and discus, and that need was addressed with the signing of two additional weight men who should really help.

The new face leading the Lady Lion volley call team this season is Bob Hebrank. Hebrank enters his first season at Lindenwood with very high expectations, and the program is looking to build onto its accomplishments of the first three seasons in existence. Each year, the volleyball program has shown an improvement and the 1993 season should improve on last season's 20-29 mark.

Hebrank inherits a solid group of returning players to provide experience and leadership for the newcomers. Among the returners are: senior Lynn Hall (Tucson, Ariz.), senior Stacy Hargrove (Mesquite, Texas), junior Angela Boland (Wentzville, Mo.), junior Shelly Gibson (Potosi, Mo.), sophomore Yvonne Lada (Carbondale, Ill.), and sophomore Amy Woods (St. Peters, Mo.). Hebrank hit the recruiting trail hard, and landed a class that is a good balance of experienced college players and talented freshmen. A few of the recruits will be some familiar faces to Hebrank as transfers Trudi Junk (Quincy, Ill.) and Bethany Franklin (Sullivan, Mo.) played for Hebrank last season. Also coming via the transfer route will be Sarah Dueker and Shanon Replogie, both of whom played at Central Arkansas. Hebrank also recruited Tonya Wells from Three Rivers Junior College as well as Alisia Reidner (Forest Park Community College) and Kristie Hackmann (Missouri Valley). Hebrank strongly recruited the high school ranks, and signed many outstanding local products. Among the freshmen recruits are: Kim Krus (Cor Jesu), Erin Brennan (Aquinas -Mercy), Wava Engle (Mansfield), Jennifer Fry (St. Charles), and Kim Fahle (Pattonville).

A big addition to Lindenwood volleyball will be the establishment of a junior varsity program. Hebrank believes that a JV program is beneficial to develop the new players who have yet to experience the level of play in collegiate volleyball. One other addition to the Lady Lions program is first year graduate assistant Jennifer Hepburn. She comes from Northeast Missouri State, where she played for four years on a volleyball scholarship.

Hebrank comes to Lindenwood from Fontbonne College where he had coached for the past two seasons, including an 18-9 mark last year which was highlighted by a perfect 14-0 slate in the St. Louis Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, and their second straight

conference championship. Hebrank is a native of Mehlville, and a graduate of the University of Missouri-St. Louis. He started his coaching career at Florissant Valley Community College, where he served as an assistant for six years. He then became assistant coach at Incarnate Word, before leaving for Fontbonne. Hebrank has also coached teams for the USVBA, AAU, CYC North, and the St. Louis Volleyball Club.

The Lion wrestling team will have a unique situation in that they will have two head coaches. Due to Coach Dale Schallert's extensive football duties and the quality of the wrestling expertise of Coach Stacy Weiland, the men will share the head coaching responsibilities, with each being named Associate Head Wrestling Coach. Schallert has over 25 years of coaching experience, and Weiland was a two-time All-American while wrestling at Meramec J.C. and the University of Oklahoma.

Last year, in their first year together, the two wasted no time in establishing a team that shot to national prominence. With a team that started an unheard-of eight freshmen, one sophomore, and one junior, the team was able to achieve a national ranking in the Top 25. Of this group, seven wrestlers, sophomore John Michel at 118 pounds, freshman Eric Caldwell at 126, freshman Kris Bixby at 150, junior Jerry Neitenbach at 158, freshman Jason Clark at 167, freshman Marc Botindari at 190, and freshman Brian Wisdom at heavyweight, all qualified for the National Tournament held in Butte, Montana.

After the season was over the duo signed an amazing 44 wrestlers to add to the 26 returners. In this group are eight former state champions, led by two-time Wisconsin State Champion Aaron Sieracki, and Missouri State Champions Gary Newman and Chad Matlick. The young team was solidified with the signing of some talented and experienced transfer students. Weiland tapped his former alma mater, Oklahoma, to sign four former Sooners, led

by former World and Junior National Placer Keith Ketcham, and two time All-American Roderick Alton. He was also able to ink the early favorite for the 1994 national heayweight champion Brian Jackson. Jackson earns such a distinction because he placed fifth at the NCAA Division I National Tournament for North Carolina State University.

"The group of transfers we were able to sign, along with the strong incoming freshman class, has taken this team on a two year journey from an inexperienced team to one of the best in the NAIA," said Weiland. Coach Schallert is a graduate of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, and also has a master's degree from Winona State University in Minnesota. Coach Weiland is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma.






