

Uniform Drefses for Sabbath and Holydays.

IN WINTER .- Black silk or worsted dress, and green cloak. IN SUMMER.-White dress and pink sash. Bonnets trimmed with green in winter-in summer with pink. (Mourners, of course, will be exempt from these uniforms.)

LINDEN WOOD occupies one of the beautiful heights of St. Charles, one mile westwardly from the town, and twenty from the city of St. Louis. Although entirely secluded from noise and dust, it is conveniently accessible. Its ample grounds, groves and gardens, afford abundant space for exercise and recreation; and the experience of many years, fully attests its healthfulness.

As all the pupils admitted, must necessarily be boarders at Linden Wood, they will consequently be, at all times, under the care and observation of their Preceptresses. Their health, apparel, expenses, recreations, amusements, associations, manners and behaviour, will all be regarded with parental watchfulness.

The plan of this school, except in one particular, will remain as heretofore. It proposes a thorough course of Instruction, Intellectual, Moral, and Domestic-based on the settled principles of Christianity, and adapted to those on which are founded the free institutions of our own highly favoured country.

The Intellectual Branch, embraces such studies as are usually deemed requisite to form a chastly cultivated and well informed mind. In the other two branches, are comprised all the moral and domestic duties of Woman, which will be inculcated, under a deep conviction of their paramount importance, and in a manner to give a decidedly national bias to the youthful mind. It will be the constant aim of the conductors of this Institution, to furnish the youth under their care (sufficient time being allowed) such an education as will enable them to become respectable, useful, and enlightened members of society: to fit them, not only to enjoy the rational pleasures of life, as accountable beings, but also to discharge with ease and grace, all the peculiar duties of the sex.

"Woman is the most important sex; and if but half of our race can be educated, let it be woman instead of man. Woman forms our character: she is with us through life; she nurses us in infancy; she watches us in sickness, soothes us in distress, and cheers us in the melancholy of old age. Her rank, determines that of her race: if she be high-minded and virtuous, with a soul thirsting for that which is lofty, true and disinterested, so it is with the race : if she be light and vain, with her heart set on trifles, fond only of pleasure, alas for the community where she is so-it is ruined!"

MISS ROSSETER has had the benefit of experience, in some of the best and most celebrated eastern schools, and is, in all respects, well qualified for the station she has undertaken to fill. Well qualified assistants will be employed when necessary; and as it is intended that the School at Linden Wood shall be a permanent one, it is contemplated to make it contribute, in some degree, to elevate the character of our Western Literary Institutions.
