


This residence hall houses the gymnasium and the swimming pool, too. The big college parties and dances are held in Butler.




COBBS HALL



Individual Guidance ...

Recognition of individual differences and attention to individual needs is basic in the Lindenwood program. Every student is known by teachers and administrative officers as a person. This acquaintance with persons and a systematic counseling program make it impossible for a student to drift along as an unknown unit in a great mass.

Each entering student has a student advisor who assists her in getting started in a new community. And each student has a faculty advisor who counsels with her many times during the year.











Each of the nine members of the music faculty has a studio for individual instruction. These studios are situated in the Fine Arts Building.




St. Louis Symphony
