

The University has acquired the former Roller Rink, located adjacent to Lindenwood Village on First Capitol Drive.


The Roller Rink is being redecorated, repainted and repaired, so students can lounge, skate, dance, watch television, munch on snacks, and study with friends.

This name change has no affect on Lindenwood's accreditation status or mission, nor would the change make LU start "acting larger" and lose its friendly, small institution atmosphere.

The term "university" better defines and recognizes what Lindenwood has become: undergraduate, graduate, professional, international.

#### New Majors, Programs Keep Lindenwood Up To Date, Out In Front

Lindenwood's emphasis on putting students and their needs first has always been at the forefront of its mission. Because the University takes a flexible, innovative approach to higher education, we can offer academic programs in response to student demand and marketplace trends.

This year, Lindenwood introduces four new majors all of which are firmly rooted in the liberal arts tradition.

A Bachelor of Arts in Social Work is now available for students who wish to enter the helping professions. According to recent trends, the need for qualified service agency professionals is expected to increase 45 percent by the year 2002. This is due in part, to the aging of the very large Baby Boomer population, and to changes in government allocations to human service agencies.

The surge in the fashion and retail industries over the past decades has inspired Lindenwood to establish a **Retail Merchandising** major in the Management Division, and a **Fashion Design** major in the division of Fine and Performing Arts.

In addition to becoming proficient in the creative artistry of design, students in the Fashion Design major will also become acquainted with the merchandising and management end of the profession. Subsequently, the Retail Merchandising major is a business program that is specifically geared to buying, selling, and operating in the retail industry.

The Dance major evolved out of the very popular and successful minor in dance, which was established just six short years ago. Offering traditional dance classes, this new major will also include classes in music literature and technical theatre so students can be fully prepared professionals. Students will also take internships with area dance organizations, studios and schools, which will give students the opportunity to gain experience in fundraising and public relations. Lindenwood dance students have already experienced success by winning national awards and performing original choreography and music for large audiences.

#### Fall Season Preview

#### Men's Soccer

The 1996 men's season finished with many highlights. Three All-Americans and numerous All-Regional and All-Conference selections led the team to their best finish in school history. The Lions finished the season with a 19-5 record and ranked 17th nationally. Coach Carl Hutter says the future looks very exciting due to the returning nucleus of talent and a skilled group of new student-athletes in freshmen and transfers.

#### Women's Soccer

The Lady Lions enjoyed their first year in the Heart of America Conference as they brought home the title. The Ladies ended last season with a 17-5 record and a final season ranking of 12th in the nation. The team finished the HAAC with a record of 6-0 as well as winning the conference tournament. The Lady Lions are led by a trio of returning Midwest All-Region selections from last year and one All-American, under the leadership of Head Coach Kevin Kilcullin.

#### Cross Country

The upcoming season for the Lion cross country programs for both the women and men is not only packed with optimism, but filled with challenges. Under the direction of Head Coach Clark Wille, the Lions will open their season on September 6 at Southern Illinois-Carbondale, with stops at the Kansas Jayhawk Invitational, Eastern Illinois and Oklahoma State before entering the HAAC meet.

The Lions finished the 1996 season strong, winning three of their last four games and had a strong off-season commitment from the returning squad. With eight offensive starters and six defensive starters back, the team can field their first experienced team under Coach Dan Kratzer. He is optimistic about the upcoming season. The Lions' first action of the season will be a scrimmage against Greenville College on August 29.

#### Volleyball

The Lady Lion volleyball team will look to take the successes of the last 10 games into the 1997 season. With a strong recruiting class, the team looks to be much improved and compete in the upper tier of the conference standings. According to Head Coach Dave Witter, new members on the squad will create more depth and strength in key positions.

#### Tennis, Anyone?

Lindenwood University is serving up two new sports teams this year. The Lions and Lady Lions tennis teams are forming now. The teams will play on the brand-new Lindenwood Tennis Complex...which is located right next to the almost-but-not-quite-as-new Hyland Performance Arena.

Head Coach Michael Gardner and other coaches are heavily recruiting new tennis talent from around the metro area...and are looking for players from among the returning student ranks as well.
