# **MBA ALUMNUS GOES FROM BEAN COUNTER TO BEAN ROASTER**

Peter Cohen ('98) is having fun. Cohen owns Stringbean Coffee Company, a coffee wholesaler in St. Louis. Mo.

One look around the Stringbean Coffee Company headquarters gives you a glimpse into Cohen's life. A wall full of guitars. A neon sign. A '50s-style diner booth. Cohen's journey to becoming a full-time coffee roaster is like no other. Cohen worked in the banking industry for 14 years and earned an MBA from Lindenwood University in 1998.

"I liked the campus," Cohen said. "A few of my friends went to Lindenwood and were faculty, and I had been to some of the events and was able to see the campus grow. It's such a pretty campus and has continued to blow me away with their success and growth."

While still working at the bank, Cohen, who loves coffee, began roasting coffee as a hobby in his garage in March 2011.

"I thought, 'Maybe I could do it better,'" he said. "I got a very small roaster that didn't come with instructions, and I bought some beans. I started with really expensive Fair Trade organic beans, so you don't want to screw up a whole lot. The first batch I did was inside and the smoke alarms went off and dogs were howling, and then it became more of an outside sport. It then moved to my garage, so I would roast at 10, 11 o'clock at night, and I came out with a roast called Midnight Run."

He started Stringbean Coffee Company in May 2011, and after an eight-month overlap of banking and roasting, he said goodbye to the corporate grind and focused on Stringbean in October.

The Stringbean roasting room features a 25-pound San Franciscan roaster, built especially for him, that resembles a train engine, a wall full of framed vinyl records, and the original disco ball used from 1972 to 1978 on the television show Soul Train.

"Folks would ask, 'Why would you roast coffee under a disco ball?" and I would respond, 'Well, why wouldn't I roast coffee under a disco ball?" he said.

Cohen said that Stringbean is a labor of love and a combination of his interests. which include music and coffee. Cohen plays bass guitar, collects music, and used to review music with around 200 published articles to his credit. He still uses his Lindenwood education regularly.

"I use my MBA more now as an independent, self-employed coffee roaster than I did as a commercial banker." Cohen said. "I handle billing, marketing, bookkeeping, collections, play guitar, and drink coffee. I do roasting, help with bagging and distribution. I was a bean counter before I became a bean cooker, but I'm still a bean counter."

Cohen said the Stringbean mission statement is to educate, motivate, and entertain as many people as possible in an honest and ethical manner and have fun doing it.

"I just want to have fun doing what I'm doing," he said, "and I've accomplished that."

# USA, HENSLEY WIN GOLD IN WOMEN'S HOCKEY

The United States women's Olympic hockey team and goalie Nicole Hensley, who graduated from Lindenwood in 2016, won a thrilling gold medal hockey game early in the morning (CST) on Feb. 22 against Canada in Pyeongchang, South Korea.

The 3-2 win makes Hensley the first Olympic gold medalist among Lindenwood's students and alumni. Alumna Laia Pons won bronze in the 2012 games for Spain in synchronized swimming before she was a student at Lindenwood, and sled hockey player Josh Pauls has won gold in the Paralympics and captained the gold medal-winning U.S. sled hockey team in the Paralympics in South Korea in March.

In addition to women's hockey, Lindenwood students and alumni have participated in the Olympics in shooting, track and field, and synchronized swimming. Hensley, who joined the U.S. women's hockey team in 2017, was in goal against Canada when the team won the World Championship in the fall, and in the Olympics, she started the game against the Olympic Athletes from Russia on Feb. 13, recording a 5-0 shutout and stopping 13 shots on goal.

The next day, Feb. 14, Hensley told KSDK TV's Rene Knott in Pyeongchang that Lindenwood helped make her the competitor she is. During her career at Lindenwood, she stopped more than 4,000 shots and won the NCAA's Top 10 Award, which is given to the top 10 NCAA athletes in any sport at any level.

"It was definitely the right place for me to be...to grow as a goaltender," Hensley told Knott.

Canada had won gold in women's hockey the four prior Olympics, defeating the U.S. in the final game three times, including a heartbreaking come-from-behind win in Sochi, Russia, four years ago. This time, the U.S. team returned the favor after falling behind 2-1 in the second period and tying the game at 2-2 in the third period, which was the score at the end of regulation.

Neither team scored in a 20-minute sudden-death overtime period, which led to a tense shootout in which the U.S. came out on top for a 3-2 victory. It was the first U.S. Olympic gold medal in women's hockey since 1998 in Nagano, Japan.

# MCCORMICK NAMED POET LAUREATE FOR TECH HAVEN

#### Kaecey McCormick ('16) has been a writer as long as she can remember.

"As a kid, I journaled, made up stories," she said. "I never had the courage to call myself a writer, though. My fiction and poetry I kept to myself."

The Lindenwood MFA in writing grad was installed in January as the poet laureate of Cupertino, Calif. It's fair to say she's comfortable wearing the mantle of writer now

"I had a moment when I decided that what I wanted to do was write," said McCormick. "I looked at a lot of MFA programs. I have four children and was working part-time. I wanted flexibility and had a sense it would be a really great place. What kept me in the program was the community of students and instructors."

She entered Lindenwood's program as an online student in 2014 and started publishing short works not long after. She currently works as a freelance writer and also teaches writing as an adjunct for Foothill College. In addition to multiple publications in literary magazines, she has written a book of poems titled Sugar & Spice: Growing up Girl.

The process of applying for and being selected as poet laureate began with her predecessor, Ann Muto, who met McCormick at some poetry workshops she was conducting and encouraged her to apply for the position.

To apply, she submitted writing samples, beginning last summer, and letters of recommendation, including one from Beth Mead, who chairs the Lindenwood MFA in Writing program.

With its recent ranking by BestColleges.com as the second best writing MFA program in the country, behind only Harvard, McCormick's appointment is another feather in the program's cap.

An interview process followed with a selection panel, including readings of her poetry; the panel ultimately selected McCormick as its finalist. The final step

was an interview with the Cupertino City Council, which voted in September to appoint her to the volunteer post. She began her two-year term Jan. 1 and is the fifth person to hold the position, which began in 2011.

Her main charge is to celebrate and promote creativity in the community. Toward this end, she conducts community poetry nights, runs booths with activities at festivals and events, offers a series of poetry workshops, and works with kids on their writing and reading of poetry. In April, poetry month, she will be a judge for Cupertino's poetry competition.

McCormick points out that Cupertino, the home of tech giant Apple, is a very STEM-oriented community. She believes her job is to inject the arts to help make it a STEAM community.

"Adding creativity and the arts in a tech world only helps," McCormick said. "I'm passionate about the transformative power of poetry. Giving back to the community, doing something I love—it's a good fit."

# LAIA PONS EXCELS IN SWIMMING, BUSINESS

From the Lindenwood swim team to working for a successful business technology consultation firm, Laia Pons ('17) succeeds in her endeavors. But if the path has been like swimming upstream, it's hard to tell based on her many achievements.

At Lindenwood, Pons, a former Olympian, starred with the synchronized swimming team and also in the classroom.

As a double-major in finance and international business, Pons is experienced at multitasking. At one point, Pons was taking seven classes, interning at Maryville Technologies, acting as the Accounting and Finance Club president, competing at the CFA Financial Analyst Competition, and practicing synchronized swimming. She did so while maintaining a 4.0 GPA that semester.

"It is all about time management and prioritization," Pons explained. "Being able to manage all that workload requires you to have a very clear picture of what your objectives are."

Pons' impressive résumé helped her get the internship with Maryville Technologies, and she clearly made in impression, as she now works as a consultant for the company.

Pons' job is in technology business management, where she focuses on creating cost transparency for the corporate information technology clients of the company.

"I personally find this to be a very interesting area to be involved in at this point in time, Pons said. "It allows me to use my financial background while also giving me an understanding of the technology era that we live in.

"My Lindenwood education provided the financial background that supports my day-to-day activities at my current position, but, more importantly, it has helped me expand the networking capabilities that brought me to meeting the CEO at Maryville Technologies in the first place."

Before finding success in the business world, Pons helped the Lindenwood synchronized swimming team win a national championship in 2014 as a freshman. Pons, who hails from Spain and won a bronze medal with the Spanish synchronized swimming team at the 2012 Olympics, said her time at Lindenwood helped her see the sport from a different perspective.

"There are many dynamic differences between competing for a top national team and a college team," Pons said. "There are also cultural differences between the style of the two nations. One of the biggest takeaways for me has been learning to actually have fun in and out of the pool, rather than taking it so professionally."

Lori Eaton, who was Pons' synchronized swimming head coach at Lindenwood, said Pons played an integral role in shaping the personality of the team.

"She led from within, exhibiting the maturity and creativity necessary to lift her teammates to new heights," Eaton said. "In that sense, she's the ideal student-athlete-committed, respectful, positive, and supportive."

Pons said she draws from her experience in both Spanish and American cultures to help her personally and professionally.

"Getting immersed into a new culture teaches you tons about the world that we live in," Pons said. "It also gives you an extra dose of acceptance. You look at differences and go from saying 'that is weird' to saying 'that is different,' which, although it means the same thing, has a very different connotation."



# THE REALITY OF JEFF KEANE ALUMNUS BUILDS MEDIA PRODUCTION COMPANY

St. Louis native Jeff Keane ('92) has a firm grip on reality—reality television, that is.

Keane got his start in communications in college, spending parts of four years at Miami University of Ohio and completing his degree in mass communications at Lindenwood in 1992.

While attending Lindenwood, Keane had a shift at KCLC 89.1 FM, calling it a great experience.

"Getting that firsthand experience at the radio station and doing some of the things I really liked to do was a lot of fun," he said.

After a stint in Lexington, Ky., Keane and his wife moved back to St. Louis, where he worked at a local ad agency and as a freelancer. In 2002, he started Coolfire Studios.

"I felt like I always wanted to have my own business, and I felt like I was finally ready," he said.

Coolfire began as a commercial and post-production company, but Keane had bigger ideas, adding reality TV, digital entertainment, and interactive media to the mix.

"We could have remained a commercial production company and still have a successful business, but I always wanted to grow it into something bigger that had a little bit more to offer," he said.

He longed to do something more creative than commercials, which led to reality television.

"It was an opportunity to tell longer form and more creative stories than 30-second TV spots or short corporate videos."

By leveraging the Midwest location often overlooked by coastal production houses, Keane found great characters, developed concepts, and was able to sell television shows.

The first ideas from Coolfire to make it to air were Fast N' Loud on Discovery and Welcome to Sweetie Pie's on OWN. Coolfire partnered with Pilgrim Films to get those first two shows on the air, but in 2012, the company was able to get its own shows to television: Mom Friends Forever on Nickelodeon and Resale Royalty on Style.

"There's a tremendous amount of blood, sweat, and tears that goes into creating and producing a TV show, and when you finally see it on the screen, there's a great sense of satisfaction." Keane said.

Keane said he has encountered people during his travels who have told him how much they enjoyed shows produced by Coolfire, including a cab driver from Ireland and an American couple he met in Costa Rica.

"When you run into somebody who has seen it and likes it, that feels really good, because that's what you're trying to do," he said. "You're trying to put something out there that people are going to enjoy and something that's going to entertain people. And when you get that feedback from a stranger that they've seen it, that they like it, they enjoy it that you've entertained them, that's a really good feeling."

Keane said Coolfire has about 50 ideas in various stages of development at any given time.

The goal is to get bigger and better at what we're doing," he said.

Six top law enforcement officials in the Metro-East have one thing in common on their résumés—they all hold degrees from Lindenwood University-Belleville.

Link, Watson, and Wise earned

degree in human resources. According to
faculty member Dr. Thomas Trice, a retired
captain with the St. Clair County Sheriff's
Department, many other Lindenwood
Belleville graduates hold high ranks
within the chain of command at local
police agencies.

Watson, who began his law enforcement career nearly 40 years ago in 1978, said he was repeatedly asked by younger classmates what he hoped to learn at Lindenwood Belleville after his many years of experience?

"One reason I chose to go to Lindenwood Belleville is because it is local, so it was an easy commute," said Watson. "But I also chose Lindenwood Belleville because the instructors are practitioners in my field. They have lawyers, judges, and U.S. attorneys, people with real experience in the field, teaching there. It was very interesting to take their classes, and I'm glad I did it, because I truly learned a lot. I see the benefits every day."

Gailius said he sought an MBA because, beyond the work of solving crimes and enforcing the law, running a police department is like running a business.

"A police chief is in a leadership position that in many ways isn't much different than a leadership position in the business world," said Gailius. "We have human resources and personnel issues, and we have a \$7 million annual budget that has to be carefully managed. My MBA is definitely a benefit, and I am a better chief for having it."

Dr. Cindy Manjounes, campus dean for Accelerated Degree Programs, said it was important to create degree programs that allow area officers the opportunity to get their education while still allowing them to do their jobs.

"The flexibility of our degrees fits with the sometimes-unpredictable lives of our law enforcement community," said Manjounes. "These men and women understand the value of education in helping them to be the best they can be in their positions.

"I feel truly honored and blessed that so many have gone through our ADP programs. I have been fortunate to get to know many of them, and the level of their character and integrity as well as their determination to make our communities better places is, indeed, commendable."

# KUROGI LANDS MARKETING GIG WITH TOP CONSTRUCTION FIRM

Rodrigo Kurogi ('16) began preparing for an American education when he was just 9 years old. As a boy growing up in Sao Paulo, Brazil, he was certain about two things—he wanted to earn a degree and play tennis at an American university.

"I began studying English at a very young age in preparation for studying in the United States," said Kurogi. "Then, when I was 18, all of the hard work I put in as a child paid off because I came to Lindenwood Belleville in pursuit of playing collegiate tennis and earning a degree in business administration with an emphasis in marketing, a degree that would be internationally recognized."

As a member of the Student Government Association, Kurogi participated in service projects and volunteer work for organizations like Habitat for Humanity, which directly affected his employment prospects post-graduation.

During his senior year, Kurogi spent about two hours each day applying for job opportunities, and even solicited the help of his professors and the campus president on his quest for employment.

"I really had a great mix of professors while at Lindenwood, and many of them stay in touch with me now," Kurogi said, "but what really surprised me is that the president of the university was willing to meet with me and gave me advice and tips on how to secure a job after graduation. I get the sense that doesn't happen at a lot of universities."

With that, Kurogi received a call from the construction firm TopBuild, based in Daytona Beach, Fla. Now, as a marketing analyst, Kurogi is in the front line for his company, analyzing various markets to help determine where the company may want to invest resources or deploy sales teams.

"My transition into the professional world of work couldn't have been any smoother," said Kurogi. "I am very grateful for the support and guidance offered to me by so many faculty and staff members at Lindenwood Belleville. It was a perfect starting point for my time in the United States."

As an international student on an F-1 visa, Kurogi was eligible for Optional Practical Training (OPT) for up to a year following his graduation. Upon completion of an international student's OPT, the student must either return to his home country or be sponsored by his employer to begin the process of securing a work visa. The Human Resources Department at his company recently reached out to Kurogi to begin his sponsorship process.

"I really like TopBuild and the analytical side of developing and running a company," said Kurogi. "So, I hope to stay with TopBuild and gain the necessary industry experience to move up in my career when the time is right."



"I'm very proud of all the 'firsts' I made at Lindenwood Belleville," said Gainor. 
Upon graduation, Gainor said she immediately started job hunting and was looking to find something in the field of graphic design, which had been her long-time passion.

"In March following my graduation in December, a friend of my mom's said her company was hiring a marketing and website manager" said Gainor. "Though I didn't have much experience in marketing, I applied for the job anyway because of my design and web background and was offered it shortly thereafter."

Gainor held that position for two years but decided she wanted to pursue something more closely related to graphic design. With that, she recently accepted a position as a lead designer at a company called My Scratch Offs, LLC, in Swansea, III. In her new position, Gainor manages the design of custom orders like wedding save-the-date cards, business cards, gender reveal items, and company contest items.

# UNFORGETTABLE ODYSSEY SENDS ALUMNUS BIKING ACROSS SOUTH AMERICA

Attempt. Excel. Transform. Repeat.

That's the mindset that's guided **Lindenwood University alumnus** Ryan Griffin ('12, '13) from one adventure to the next and recently led him on a personal quest to ride a bicycle across 9.000 miles of South American terrain.

"My life has never felt average." Griffin said. "I've learned to fight against the formula of what's expected."

To understand where he was headed, you have to understand where he came from. A native of Sydney, Australia, Griffin came to the United States to play baseball for a junior college in Texas. Shortly thereafter, he was recruited by Coach Doug Bletcher to play for Lindenwood.

During Griffin's junior year, his season was cut short by an emergency appendectomy. He used his recovery time and the off-season to change his left-handed overhand style to a submarine-style. His new approach was a success. He was halfway through the next season before he gave up a single run.

Academically, Griffin started college as a business administration major but soon switched his focus to marketing after taking a class with Lindenwood Professor David Arns. Griffin went on to become Lindenwood's second-ever first-team Academic All-American and also earned the Joseph G. Mathews Award for graduating at the top of his marketing class.

After earning his MBA, Griffin worked full-time as an account executive for a digital advertising firm in Australia. He quickly rose through the ranks, earning promotions to an executive-level position and managing a team of staff within three years of being hired.

Then, seemingly all at once, life threw Griffin a few curveballs. He suffered a car accident, and, soon after, unrelated health issues required two separate surgical procedures. The aftermath had a devastating effect on him physically and mentally. "For 10 months. I was basically bedridden," he said, "I'd become overweight and depressed," Griffin said. "I was desperate for a new challenge."

Griffin quit his job, moved out of his apartment, sold most of his belongings, and found a riding partner. They bought bikes, packs, and camping gear and soon found themselves in Ushuaia, Argentina, a small town located at the southernmost tip of South America nicknamed "The End of the World.'

"We picked out all the things we wanted to see: the Perito Merino glacier, Chile's Carraterra Austral, Bolivia's salt flats, and Machu Picchu," Griffin said. "We just connected the dots from there and traveled north as our general travel map.









"We initially thought the whole trip would take about six months, but about two months in we realized that was drastically off-base," he recalled. "But, I wasn't in a rush. I had plenty of food, water, good company, and enough funds to ride for a few years if necessary."

Through blazing sunshine, torrential downpours, and intense altitudinal changes, the duo rode as far as their legs would take them each day. They camped on roadsides, in fields, and at schoolhouses and police stations—wherever they could find shelter from the elements and a safe place to rest.

"The South American beauty of Patagonia and the Andes Mountains was great, but I found that the most beautiful part of the trip was the people. For the full 10 months of the trip, I was never told I couldn't stay somewhere. People would stop on the roads and give us food and water. Everyone was absolutely lovely and welcoming."

About eight months into the excursion, Griffin began to suffer ill health effects from a bacterial infection he'd acquired along the way. He continued to bike for several more weeks after the onset of symptoms, but eventually he became too ill to carry on and was forced to end the trip in Lima, Peru.

Now recovered and living back home in Sydney, he's had some time to reflect on the trip and what he gained from it. The answer, he said, is a more memorable life.

"For me, four years at a desk job melted into just a couple of highlights. I'd gone on autopilot and found it difficult to

distinguish one day from another," Griffin recalled. "But, every night on the bike trip I would record my GPS location and write a small note about that day to specifically remember and smile about.

"The days weren't always positive. Many of them were actually miserable, but they all have a story behind them and I can vividly remember each one like it was yesterday. I set out to create something from every single day, something I would remember forever. I accomplished that."

Griffin is currently working as a scuba diving instructor, running an independent advertising consultancy, and planning his next trip—most likely riding a motorbike around the world. Whatever his future plans are, he's sure to carry them out with a keen appetite for adventure and a determination to live life to the fullest.

"To me, the destination has always been and will always be second to the journey."

In Lindenwood's current period of growth, dating back to the late 1980s, the university has added numerous new buildings and major renovation projects. including the J. Scheidegger Center for the Arts, the Evans Commons, a renovated and expanded Harmon Hall, and, most recently, the Library and Academic Resources Center, which opened in fall of 2017.

During the same period, many athletic facility projects were completed, such as the Lou Brock Sports Complex, a renovated track facility, a tennis complex, a renovated Harlen Hunter Stadium, and the Student-Athlete Center, among others.

The university is an economic power in the region, bringing hundreds of millions in

economic impact to St. Charles County and the surrounding region. # SPRING ATHLETES MAKE THEIR WAY AS **PROFESSIONALS**

Among the many reasons that springtime is a special time of year at Lindenwood is the success of the team's athletic programs during this season. Just last year, the women's lacrosse, baseball, and men's golf programs all advanced to the final site of their respective national championship events.

Lindenwood's spring sports have also produced some of the top individual athletes in school history, and four of those alumni are currently still playing their respective sports at the professional level.

The top men's lacrosse player at Lindenwood is Graeme Hossack, who finished his collegiate playing career in 2015. He was a four-time first-team all-conference selection, a two-time conference Specialist of the Year, and a first-team All-American during his senior season. Hossack ranks fourth in NCAA Division II history with 452 ground balls. He is also Lindenwood's all-time leader with 145 caused turnovers and finished with 33 goals and 18 assists.

Since leaving Lindenwood, Hossack has played professionally in both lacrosse leagues in North America. In the National Lacrosse League, which is played indoors, he is a defenseman for the Rochester Knighthawks. He made his pro debut on Jan. 9, 2016, and scored a pair of goals in his first game. He went on to be the 2016 Rookie of the Year for the Knighthawks and was named to the NLL All-Rookie Team.

The following season, Hossack led the team with 215 ground balls and 29 caused turnovers. He earned the team's top defenseman award and was a finalist for NLL Defensive Player of the Year. In just his second season, he was named an NLL Second-Team All-Pro.

In the Major League Lacrosse Association, which is an outdoor league, Hossack has played for the Atlanta Blaze. In two seasons, he has collected 83 ground balls and caused 36 turnovers.

Three Lindenwood baseball players are also working their way up the minor leagues: Geoff Hartlieb, Connor Law, and Brendan Feldmann.

Hartlieb finished his Lindenwood career in 2016 after he was selected by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 29th round of

the baseball draft. Last season, he started the season in single-A and was promoted to Class A Advanced midway through the season. Between the two teams, Hartlieb had a 2.12 ERA, and, thanks to a fastball clocked as high as 100 mph, struck out 62 batters in 63 2/3 innings.

Connor Law and Brendan Feldman were the two pitching leaders on last year's team, which reached the NCAA Division II College World Series. Both players had ERAs under 3.20, and they combined for 16 wins and 13 saves.

After the season, both players signed free agent deals and played rookie ball. Law signed with the Toronto Blue Jays organization. He spent most of the year in the Gulf Coast League and had a 1.54 ERA in 14 relief appearances. Feldman signed with the Houston Astros organization and also played in the Gulf Coast League. He had a 0.54 ERA in 12 relief appearance and struck out 21 batters in less than 17 innings.



Roller hockey reached several milestones January 26-27 during **Great Plains Collegiate Inline** Hockey League (GPCIHL) action at Midwest Sport Hockey in Ballwin, Mo., and Matteson Square Garden in St. Peters, Mo.

The first major accomplishment was win number 1,000 in program history encompassing all three squads: the Division I Lions and the D3 Gold and Black teams.

After a win from the D3 Gold squad over the D3 Black squad early Friday night, the Division I team defeated conference

nemesis Bethel University (Tenn.) 4-2 to achieve the 1,000th victory. After the remainder of the conference schedule over the weekend, the overall program record stood at 1,005-153-21.

The next milestone was victory number 200 for D3 Gold Head Coach Jon Hilke, which came in the next game for the Lions, a 5-2 win over the Bethel D3 squad. With another victory on Saturday, Hilke has now compiled a lifetime Lindenwood record of 201-37-5 since taking over the reins of the team in 2009. The Gold team has another milestone in its sights. Win number 350 is just four victories away.

Major accomplishments continued on Saturday when Lindenwood stopped the University of Missouri 9-2 for win number 500 for the D1 squad. The Lions added a 3-2 victory over Bethel later in the day and now sit at 501-41-5 overall. In his 15th season, Head Coach Ron Beilsten has been at the helm for most of those games. His Lindenwood record now sits at 428-18-5. He will have several chances to add to that mark before the current season ends. The GPCIHL Regional Championship is February 23-25 at Midwest Sport Hockey, and the National Collegiate Roller Hockey Association National Championships take place April 11-14 in Fargo, N.D.

# LADY LYNX BASKETBALL RANKED NO. 20-**OGRAM HISTORY**

The Lindenwood University-Belleville women's basketball team (22-8, 19-5 in conference play) has been ranked No. 20 in the nation by the NAIA, which is the highest that the team has been ranked in program history.

The Lady Lynx started American Midwest Conference play on Thursday, Nov. 16, with a home matchup against the Williams Baptist College Eagles and came away with a 73-50 win.

Two days later, the Lady Lynx pulled off perhaps their most impressive win of the year over No. 3-ranked Freed-Hardeman University, which was 4-0 at the time, 83-79 in Lynx Arena. After losing to No. 16 Columbia College on Nov. 30, the Lady Lynx went on a five-game winning streak to close out the first half of the season.

When the squad returned to Lynx Arena on Dec. 30, it played host to the Missouri Baptist University Spartans and passed two milestones. The Lady Lynx won 11191, the first time since Feb. 20 and 24 of 2014 that the team won back-to-back games with more than 100 points.

Also, senior guard Torre Kohrmann accomplished something that only her older sister Shelby had achieved with the program, passing the 1,000-point threshold for her collegiate career.

Two months later, on Feb. 17 in Hannibal, Mo., Kohrmann passed her sister for most career points recorded in program history when she nailed a three-pointer to put herself at 1,172 points for her four years at Lindenwood.

The Lady Lynx then earned their sixth straight victory with an 86-68 win over the William Woods Owls on Jan. 2.

The Lady Lynx continued their surge as the second half of the season began, recording two eight-game winning streaks for the first time in program history and earning themselves a No. 4 seed in the AMC tournament and a bid to compete for the national title.

"This is the greatest group of individuals that I have coached during my tenure here at Lindenwood," Head Coach Jeff Reis said. "Not only do we have a great group of student-athletes, but they're great people as well. Good team chemistry, leadership. and a willingness to help each other out has paved the way for our success this season, but we still have a lot of work to do."

Despite a tough loss to the William Woods Owls in the quarterfinal round of the American Midwest Conference tournament, the Lady Lynx earned a spot in the NAIA championship tournament in Billings, Mont., for the second straight year, where they were slated to play Mid-America Nazarene (25-6) on Thursday, March 15.
