




Athletic Director Steve Crotz

The 1994 men's and women's cross country teams capped off another successful season. The men's team opened the season by winning the Lion's Invite for the fourth consecutive year, and then finished strong by winning the Midwest Regional Championship. The women's team, in a rebuilding year placed third at the opening meet and continued to improve by placing in the top four all season.


The 1995 version of the Lion and Lady Lion teams appears to be an exciting one. Both teams will open the season with experience. The men's team returns 13 runners, while the women return all seven runners. Due to a very good recruiting season, both teams have added great quality and depth. The men's team is the pre-season pick to repeat as the Midwest Regional Champions. "The men's team will be very strong and competitive and will be in a position to be a national powerhouse," head coach Gary White said. "The team should be ranked in the top ten teams in the nation."

The women's team looks as though they are ready to make their own run towards a Midwest Regional title. "The women are returning all the runners from last year plus the quality of the recruits should allow the team to make a move into the top 20 in the nation," White said.

Gary White is entering his sixth year as head cross country coach for the Lion and Lady Lion squads. White has been named District 16 Coach of the year five times and in 1994 was Midwest regional Coach of the Year. He also serves as the NAIA Midwest Regional cross country rater. White was also the men's and women's track and field coach before relinquishing those duties to pursue a new position.

defending national champion Westminster (PA), the #3 ranked team University of Findlay (OH), and #8 Trinity University. To make matters even more difficult, all three games against these nationally-ranked teams are on the road. "The schedule will be a challenge of challenges, but I look forward to playing such fine teams which will show everyone where we are and what we'll need to do in the future to mirror programs of this caliber," Kratzer said.

The squad will have some key skill people returning in QB Corey Nesslage, WR Mario Patton and RB Alvino Giles. The offensive sees Justin Meeks and Doug Kerr returning to anchor the line. Linebacker Shane Collins, defensive back Brian Stegman and Matt Metz will lead a young and aggressive defensive unit. Sophomore Mike Feinstein will lead the kicking duties.

"The 1995 recruiting class may have been the best I've ever been associated with. Hard work, hours, and persistence will pay off as the freshmen class of 1995 gains necessary experience for the future. The key for this season will be the play of our offensive and defensive lines. Their development will be watched closely and early progress can spell success. Careful development of young athletes blended in with some mature leadership will get us started in the right direction."

Coming off a 15-19 season, the Lindenwood volleyball team looks to be a much improved squad with a number of returning players. "The number of returners is definitely a positive aspect for our team this year," head coach Jane Jackson said.

The Lady Lions finished the 1994 campaign fifth in the regular conference season with a 4-4 mark. However the spikers finished the conference tournament on a better note as they placed third.

Despite returning a number of starters, the squad only returns four senior hitters in Lakhisha Starks, Bethany Franklin, Trudi Junk and Yvonne Lada.

Jackson was also pleased with the 1995 recruiting class. "With the new recruits coming in, it should make for tough competition for starting positions," she said. "This competition should make us a strong team with some depth. We are also adding more height in our lineup which will be a big asset for us."






The Lindenwood women's soccer team made it back to the national tournament last year for the sixth time in the past 12 years and enter the 1995 season ranked sixth in the nation,

The Lady Lions finished the regular season at 19-2-1 and were ranked seventh in the final national standings. The team set a new school record with 84 goals scored while allowing just 10. The lone losses on the season came at the hands of second-ranked Park in the second game of the season and then in the American Midwest Conference Championship final. However, Lindenwood defeated Park 1-0 in the Regional Championship match.

Kelly Bowen, Lynn Naeger, Jamie Casillas and Caryn Chasteen were on the All-American team, while Cindy Scheffer and Jennifer Siess both were named All-American Scholar-Athletes. Siess was picked as the recipient of the prestigious A.O. Duer Award presented by the NAIA and also received a national Shelter Insurace Scholarship award for maintaining a 4.0/4.0 through her first three years at Lindenwood and lettering in all three.

Head Coach Tim Champion is in his second year at the helm of the Lady Lion soccer team. He began his coaching career in 1982 as head coach at Cardinal Newman College, which finished second in the NAIA National Tournament in 1984. Besides his coaching duties at Lindenwood, Champion continues to coach the Nerinx Hall (St. Louis) High School girls team in the spring which finished as Missouri State Champions in 1988 and and advanced to the final four in '94 and '95. From 1987-93 Champion was also an assistant men's coach at St. Louis University.

The outlook for the 1995 men's soccer program is an optimistic one. The Lions return a solid nucleus of experienced players and as a result of a strong recruiting year, have added a number of fine studentathletes to the squad that ended 14-7-2 under first year head coach Carl Hutter.

The Lions entered the post season tournament last year looking to continue with the strong play of the late season. The team won in the first two rounds before falling to the #1 seed Columbia College.

Freshmen Kurt Reinheimer and Willy Nymo were named to the American Midwest First-Team All-Conference; sophomores John Hylla and Randy Schaberg, along with junior Chad Middleton were second team picks. Hylla was also named to the NAIA All-Midwest second team, while Nymo received NSCAA third team honors. With these returning performers plus the new recruits. Hutter is looking forward to an even stronger year.

"Our schedule is a big reason for our recruiting success. We compete against a very competitive number of regional and local teams and we look forward to the challenge," Hutter said.

The goal of the Lion squad is to get into the post season play with a good seed and then eventually play over the Thanksgiving weekend in the national tournament.

Lindenwood senior Jennifer Siess has managed to live the dream thus far as she has been perfect for three years. Siess enters her fourth year at Lindenwood with a amazing 4.0 GPA. What is even more amazing is that she has been a letterwinner on the soccer team that has gone on to the national tournament each of those three years.

The feats she has accomplished have not been just in the classroom or gone by unnoticed. Siess is a two-time academic all-conference selection and was named to the NAIA Academic All-America team last season. She was the recipient of the prestigious A.O. "Jennifer is the type of person all organizations dealing with colleges should aspire to attract and develop," Lindenwood President Dennis Spellmann said. "Her presence is felt far beyond leading our soccer team to three national finals. In class, she lifts instructors and fellow students to a higher level and her example of campus citizenship sets a standard to be emulated."

The 1994-95 season resulted in an unprecedented fourth consecutive American Midwest Conference championship as the Lady Lions posted a 12-0 regular season league record and finished 21-12 overall. For the second straight year the Lady Lions qualified for the National Championship Tournament in Jackson, Tennessee. During the course of the season Lindenwood broke 13 school records. Head Coach Steve Crotz anxiously looks forward to the 1995-96 season as the team returns eight letterwomen including five seniors. "This is the most experienced squad that we have enjoyed in my six years at Lindenwood. We are hoping that their tremendous ability, superb attitude, and dedicated summer preparation will propel us to another outstanding season." said Coach Crotz.

The Lady Lions concluded the year ranked fourth in the nation in team scoring defense allowing a stingy 55.5 points per game and ranked sixth in the nation in total rebounding percentage. Senior Shannon Malek was the AMC Player of the Year for the second successive season as she reached the 1000th career point milestone midway through the 1994-95 campaign. In addition. Shannon captured first team all-conference honors for the third time in as many years. Joining her as all-conference selections were LaToya Brown and Stacia Parsell, second team, and Patti Perkins, honorable mention. Once again the Lady Lions dominated the Academic All-Conference team placing Sandy Bade, Gwen Briscoe, Joy Fillmore, Danielle Hongo, Marni Johnson, Karen Sykes and Vanessa van Parijs on this prestigious squad. Senior forward Shannon Malek averaged 15.3 points per game, pulled down 6.6 rebounds and compiled 58 steals to pace the Lady Lions. Shannon scored 506 points this past season to place her as the all-time career scoring leader in Lindenwood history with 1,290 pts. Junior Stacia Parsell also returns averaging 6.0 points while dishing out 137 assists and swiping 48 steals. Seniors Michelle White and Patti Perkins round out the returning starters adding tremendous experience to the squad. Add all of that to an outstanding recruiting class of 13 and the foundation for an even greater season is firmly in place.







golf team."


Women's Golf
