SPOTLIGHT-LINDENWOOD COLLEGES FACULTY

Tom Pettit, a new faculty member, joined Lindenwood this past fall for the 1981 semester. Pettit is an Assistant Professor of Journalism in the Communication Department and also Advisor of the student newspaper "The Lindenwood Ledger."

In 1970, Tom Pettit graduated from the University of Kansas with an Education degree in Journalism. He then went on to teach at Wellsville High School in Wellsville, Kansas until 1973. Pettit later returned to the University of Kansas and received his Master's degree in Journalism in 1973.

From 1974 to 1977, Pettit taught journalism and advised the newspaper publication at Kearney State College in Kearney, Nebraska. In 1977, Pettit moved on to Emporia State University in Emporia, Kansas where he taught journalism, freshman English composition and was also advisor to the newspaper publications.

In 1978 to 1979, Pettit worked at the

Omaha World-Herald in Nebraska as a copy editor. Pettit then moved in 1980 to Tucson, Arizona to work as copy editor of the Arizona Daily Star.

In 1981, Pettit worked for the Albuquerque Journal in New Mexico, also as a copy editor.

Pettit is the first full-time print journalism professor to teach at Lindenwood. His job is to booster print journalism and develop the newspaper. This year at Lindenwood he has already revised the journalism courses for next year and "The Lindenwood Ledger" is being published on a monthly basis.

Dr. Bob Peffers, the new Chairman of the Department of Performing Arts has brought many new ideas to Lindenwood. The department of performing arts is music, theatre, and dance combined.

Dr. Peffers graduated from Manchester College in Indiana. He received his Masters Degree from Miami Univer-



sity of Ohio. As Dr. Peffers studied further he went on to the University of London to receive his Ph.D.

Dr. Peffers' specialties are speech, theatre, directing and arts management. He taught at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon where he was also Chairman of the Division of Performing Arts, Music and Theatre.

Dr. Peffers was an American Representative to drama studios in London. He acted as a consultant of overseas study programs. His major interest is grant development for theatre and art programs.

Since he has started his work here at Lindenwood he has introduced a graduate certificate program in Art Management in the Fine Arts. He's also developing an active jazz program for the summer.

Dr. Peffers is a founding member of the new communities, St. Charles Theatre Guild.

"BLUEGRASS FESTIVAL"

KCLC NAMED TOPS IN BLUEGRASS BROADCASTING

Radio station KCLC-FM, a 1,500-watt station on Lindenwoods campus, has been awarded first place as the top bluegrass broadcaster in the country.

The first-place award went to the four announcers who run the show Mondays through Thursdays from 6-9 P.M.: Gene Roberts, Wade Cross, Gary Price and Ernie Nowlin. Roberts, who has hosted the show for the past two years, was the 1980 third place winner in the best bluegrass category, and was the fourth place winner in that category in 1979.

The award was presented by the Society for the Preservation of Bluegrass Music in America (SPBGMA) at the 8th annual judging on December 12.

LCIE DIRECTOR NAMED

Dr. Arlene Taich has been appointed director of Lindenwoods College for Individualized Education and was acting director of LCIE from August, 1981 to January, 1982.

In August 1980, she came to Lindenwood as a faculty advisor for LCIE, in charge of Health Administration, Gerontology and Social Science Programs. She received her Ph.D. in Sociology from St. Louis University in Social Gerontology and Medical Sociology.

Dr. Taich is an author of a book soon to be published by Western Publishing — Social Problems as Social Processes, is on the Board of Directors of Covenant House II Senior Adult Housing Project and on the Mayors Commission for Senior Citizen Housing in St. Peters, Missouri.

DR. JOHN CRAIGHEAD SPEAKER AT LINDENWOOD



Dr. John H. Craighead, Director of the Wildlife Wildlands Institute, spoke March 16 in Jekyl Theater on Lindenwood's campus and lectured in the Biology classes March 18.

Dr. Craighead earned his A.B. degree from Pennsylvania State University and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in ecology from the University of Michigan. A freelance wildlife researcher early in his career, he served in the armed forces during the Second World War and, with his brother, Dr. Frank Craighead, Jr., developed the Land/Sea Survival Training Program for U.S. Naval Aviation. In 1952, he assumed the leadership of the Montana Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit at the University of Montana.

He continued in that capacity until his retirement in 1977; he is now Professor Emeritus of Zoology and Forestry at the University of Montana.

Although he is world-recognized for his definitive research on the biology of the grizzly bear, Dr. Craighead is also known for pioneering radio-tracking and satellite biotelemetry techniques and for his leadership in originating our National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. He has co-authored four books with his brother, has authored or co-authored 80 scientific papers and for over half a century has been a guiding force in producing numerous documentary films about wildlife, wildlands and wild rivers. In recognition of his great contribution to the field of Wildlife Biology, Dr. Craighead was the recipient of the American Motors Award, the Arthur S. Einarsen Award of The Wildlife Society and the coveted John Oliver La Gorce Gold Medal of the National Geographic Society.

After retiring from government and university service, Dr. Craighead chose to continue his research and, to this end, establish the Wildlife-Wildlands Institute with financial support from the Richard King Mellon Foundation. Since

its beginning in 1980, the Institute has demonstrated a serious commitment to wildlife research and conservation advocacy. Nine publications on subjects ranging from Indian archaeology to grizzly bear biology and satellite-assisted habitat analysis have been produced by Dr. Craighead and his colleagues. The Institute has been deeply involved in the programs of the Bear Biology Association and in the creation of a USDI grizzly bear population recovery plan. Much time has also been devoted to developing scientifically-based recommendations for U.S. Congressional Hearings and state and federal agencies regarding wilderness designations, land use and wildlife management.

Currently, the Institute maintains an ongoing research program on breeding and release of golden eagles and is finalizing the manuscript of an important scientific monograph on analysis of wilderness ecology by means of satellite reconnaissance. Entitled *A Definitive System for Analysis of Grizzly Bear Habitat and Other Wilderness Resources*, the monograph presents detailed methodology for evaluating the vegetation/landform characteristics of large expanses of remote wilderness by means of computer-processed satellite photographic imagery. The system will have virtually unlimited applications in the assessment of the environment and in the management of grizzly bear and other wilderness wildlife species.

On completion of the monograph, the Institute plans to concentrate its efforts on wilderness studies, raptor and grizzly-brown bear biology, satellite-tracking technology, and further development of techniques for mapping the vegetation of large wilderness ecosystems using satellite multispectral imagery and computer analysis.

Dr. Craighead has appeared on the NBC Today show and has had numerous photographs and articles in the National Geographic Magazines.

Dr. Thomas W. Doherty, Professor Emeritus of Modern Languages, was decorated with the Order of Academic Palms by the French Consul General in Chicago on October 18, 1981 for services rendered to the French Language and Culture.
