A Proud Past... A Promising Future


Amidst the beautiful linden trees, Lindenwood College was founded on the highest ground between two rivers nearly 170 years ago; today, it is the second oldest college west of the Mississippi. Since 1827, when it was founded by pioneering educator Mary Easton Sibley as a school for young ladies, it has enjoyed a reputation as an innovative force dedicated to liberal education in the highest sense and meaning of the term.

Mary Sibley, along with her husband Major George Sibley (himself a prominent pioneer and frontiersman, who helped chart the Santa Fe Trail), sought to establish an institution which reached across all fields of knowledge, teaching a solid academic core along with the balanced sense of self-worth which accompanies dedication to the larger community and nation...an institution which was always up-to-date with the times, in teaching both the breadth of the liberal arts along with the attention to detail of the sciences, seeking to synthesize all knowledge in an effort to educate the whole person.

In May of 1996, Kratzer was appointed athletic director after serving one year as the associate athletic director and football coach. His football squad made drastic improvements in the first year under his direction and the entire athletic department is also feeling the effects of his positive leadership. "We want Lindenwood to be known as having the best athletic program in the country," Kratzer said.

Dan Kratzer came to Lindenwood via Hastings College where he led his football squad to three national football playoffs in five years.

This season will be one of exciting changes. A new head coach, a new conference, a new schedule and many new outstanding athletes will keep things interesting throughout the season.

The 1995 men's and women's cross country teams each ran to banner years as both squads advanced to the NAIA National Championships. The men finished as the 23rd place team in the nation and it was the second consecutive year that they advanced to the national meet. Christopher Kebenei became Lindenwood's first ever cross country All-America runner, finishing 10th overall. The women, in their first ever national appearance, finished 24th in the nation.

Due to a very good recruiting season, both the men and women have added great quality and depth. The men's team added athletes who finished second, fourth, seventh, 33rd, 45th and 96th in the state high school championships last fall, as well as a handful of college transfers who will bring much needed experience to this young team. The new runners will be needed to fill some big spots since five of the top seven runners were lost to graduation. The women, however, return eight of their top 10 runners and will welcome a half dozen new recruits.


David Spetnagel, the new head coach, comes to Lindenwood from the strong St. Charles West HS athletic program, where he coached the 1995-96 state cross country and 1600m champion. Spetnagel also coaches some of the St. Louis area's top adult road racers. He and his wife own a specialty running store in St. Charles County. Assistant coach Greg Reece, in his second year at Lindenwood, has coaching experience at the high school and collegiate level, including three years at Maryville University.

The 1996 football campaign will look to improve upon the successes of last year under the direction of head coach Dan Kratzer. This year's squad will be a very young football team, but because of so many freshmen that played and lettered in 1995, the Lions will have some valuable experience to compete in their first year of the Heart of America Conference.

The team returns nine offensive starters and seven on the defensive side. Strengths of the squad will lie in the offensive line (four returning starters) and quarterback positions. Defensively the line

and linebacker groups should be able to match up with anyone. Senior All-America linebacker Craig Burch and senior noseguard Michael Choate are two of the strongest and quickest players on the team and will lead the defense. The secondary returns a few players but lacks experienced depth.

Offensively, the Lions will be lead by sophomore quarterback Max Brown, who started the second half of the season last year, along with sophomore quarterback Kevin Dyer will look to go to an experienced receiving group led by sophomore All-Conference tight end Carlton Rivers. The Lions will need to build a strong running game to offset the passing game and will also need to strengthen all aspects of the kicking game.

Coach Dan Kratzer, who is also the Lindenwood athletic director, is in his second year as the head coach of the Lions. Last year the team competed in the very strong Mid States Football Conference and finished 4-7, which was the best finish in the school's history. The squad only lost four games by six points or less in 1995. Prior to coming to Lindenwood, Kratzer led his Hastings College program to three national NAIA football playoffs.

The volleyball squad will take on a new look this season as it enters the Heart of America Athletic Conference under the direction of new head coach Dave Witter. Not only will the team experience a new conference and new coach, they will be the first Lindenwood athletic team to play in the newly constructed Robert F. Hyland Performance Arena.

The Lady Lion volleyball team will have a strong foundation of senior leadership, but also will look for key newcomers to step in and make an immediate impact. Four seniors, led by All-America Scholar Athlete Lori Pike, will emphasize teamwork to make an impact in the HAAC. Pike was an honorable-mention American Midwest Conference pick and was the team leader in aces, pass percentage, digs. She was named the team's Most Valuable Player. Erin Brennan and Kim Fahle were both named to the academic all-conference team.

New head coach Dave Witter comes to Lindenwood after one year as head volleyball and basketball coach at William Woods. He will also be the new Lady Lions basketball coach. Coach Witter was the head coach at the University of Missouri-Kansas City and coached four years at the high school level.



Not only did the Lindenwood women's soccer team make it back to the national tournament last year for the seventh time in the past 13 years, but they finished second in the nation, the highest finish for any Lindenwood athletic team in school history.

The road to the championship game was difficult, however the Lady Lions, led by two-time All Americans in Lynn Naeger and Caryn Chasteen, defeated Southern Nazarene 3-1 to reach the NAIA Championship match against Lynn (Fla.). Lynn, now a NCAA Division II school, downed the Lady Lions 4-1. The Lady Lions finished the season at 20-5-1.

This year's squad features the return of senior midfielder Lynn Naeger, a two-time All-America pick, and Kelly Bowen. Bowen, a senior sweeper, was named to the NSCAA All-America team.

"This squad has the ability to continue the dominance they attained over the past few years," head coach Kevin Kilcullin said. "I am looking forward to working with these fine student-athletes."

New head coach Kevin Kilcullin replaces Tim Champion who accepted the same position at St. Louis University. Kilcullin coached and played at Rockhurst College, a major regional rival of the Lions.

Last season was a banner year for the Lion soccer program. The team made great strides to position themselves as one of the top programs in the nation. The Lions finished the year 17-7 and ranked 15th in the country.

The squad returns a solid core of returning players, leading Coach Hutter and the rest of the team to feel very optimistic about the upcoming season.

"We have a good nucleus of players returning that have been in the same system for two seasons," Hutter said. "We are looking forward to the returners setting the tone for the new players."

Senior forward Jim Osterholt garnered All-America honors last season while junior sweeper Willy Nymo made the All-Region squad.

"Entering the Heart of America is going to be a good challenge for us," Hutter said. "The HAAC is a strong conference and we look forward to the competition."

The goal of the Lion squad is to get into the post season play with a good seed and then eventually play over the Thanksgiving weekend in the national tournament. To accomplish these goals daily hard work is necessary.

Carl Hutter is in his third year as head coach at Lindenwood. Prior to that he was the head coach at Missouri Valley and Harris-Stowe State College.

Lindenwood among top in nation

The Lindenwood College athletic teams combined to finish sixth in the nation in overall athletic success. Headed up by the women's soccer team which finished second in the nation and two National Champion wrestlers (Ricky and Brett Williams), Lindenwood had 11 of 17 programs that competed in national championship playoffs.

The wrestling program finished third in the nation for the second consecutive year while the men's cross country team, the women's basketball team and both track teams all made repeat showings at the national level.

With the completion of the new LC Robert F. Hyland Performance Arena and the other new athletic facilities, Lindenwood looks to improve the depth and quality of the athletes and finish higher in the Sears Cup in 1996-97. 

The Lindenwood men's program made great strides during the 1995-96 campaign. Under the direction of first year head coach Bill Goodwin, the Lions improved to 13-19 and 5-7 in the American Midwest Conference. The record does not reflect the grueling start of 13 of 14 road games at the start of the season that left the squad with a 3-11 record entering conference play in January.

The turn about was led by returning junior transfers in Garth Braxton and Chad Nichols. Braxton was named the Lion Offensive Player of the Year by leading the team with a 13.6 point per game average. He also was voted to the American Midwest All-Conference Team and garnered the honor of being the AMC's top newcomer of the year. Nichols and Jessie Camacho both were named to the academic team.

Coach Goodwin has a number of quality incoming freshmen that should add depth to the team which the Lions lacked last season. Goodwin came to Lindenwood via Kearny, Ariz. where he led his high school team to five consecutive state tournament appearances, winning the state title once.

The 1995-96 season resulted in an unprecedented fifth consecutive American Midwest Conference championship as the Lady Lions posted an 11-1 regular season league record and finished 21-12 overall. For the third straight year the Lady Lions qualified for the National Championship Tournament in Jackson, Tenn.

Graduation took four seniors from last year's squad that had been a part of four conference titles, a remarkable 37-3 conference record and three trips to the NAIA National Tournament. 



Before the season began, head baseball coach Shane Bowyer knew the schedule the team was about to face would either help or hinder their chances of making the playoffs. The Lindenwood softball team entered the 1996 season knowing that it would be tough to repeat as the American Midwest Conference champions because graduation took eight starters. What the team did not know was that they would finish as good as they actually did.

The Lady Lions finished the season 31-19, 5-7 in the AMC and fourth in the post-season tournament. The squad also finished four tournaments with a record of 4-1. As a freshman, catcher Tracey Dames led the offensive attack with a .427 batting average while freshmen Katie Thompson had a team high 45 hits and a .302 batting average. Outfielder Angie Knobbe was the clutch hitter in scoring opportunities as he tabbed 28 RBI's on the season.

The pitching duo of Shannon Smetana and freshman Stephanie Theobald held the opposition in tuck throughout the season. Women's Golf


In only their second year of competition, the Lady Lion golf team won the American Midwest Conference Tournament, thus advancing to the NAIA National Golf Tournament.


key recruits and the 1997 Lady

An outstanding class of freshmen and returning students combined to break 29 school records in 1996. The squads were led by returners Frank Barncord (high jump), Andre Berry (sprints), Jason Wood (throws), Amy Knobloch (distance events), Karen Isaac (hurdles), Deanna Morris (middle distance), Amy Menzie (distance), Jennifer Coplin (hurdles), Shannon Weber (sprints) and Amy Gravitz (throws).

The track and field teams had eight representatives at the NAIA National Indoor Meet with freshman Christopher Kebenei placing fourth in the country in the 3000 meter. At the outdoor championship meet, nine Lindenwood athletes participated with freshman Jason Wood placing third in the discus.

"With our depth of returning athletes and the incoming class we are confident that we will make an impact at the national meets," Creer said. "Joining the Heart of America Athletic Conference will provide additional opportunities to compete in a championship event. We anticipate immediate success in the conference the first year."

John Creer is currently the Dean of Students at Lindenwood and will continue in that position, in addition to his coaching responsibilities. Prior to coming to Lindenwood, Creer was the athletic director and cross country/track and field coach at Missouri Baptist College. He coordinated cross country and track and field programs at Wayland Baptist University in Texas, the University of Florida and Troy State University in Alabama, in addition to several high school programs in Florida. Creer coached the Saudia Arabia National Team in preparation for competition in the 1980 Olympic Games held in the Soviet Union. He has led teams to three women's and four men's national track and field championships and received seven national Coach of the Year honors. Creer has coached two World Champions in track, as well as four Olympic medalists and nine participants. In addition, he has coached 97 individual national champions and 357 athletes who have received All-American honors in track and field.

Vince Bingham, the assistant head coach, is widely recognized throughout the state and around the country as an outstanding coach and recruiter. He works with the sprints, jumps, hurdles and multievents. Cross country coaches Dave Spetnagel and Greg Reecht also work with the distance events with the track program.


Lion Line/Cheerleaders






The architect's conception of the arena was designed to complement Lindenwood's beautiful historical buildings. Hastings & Chivetta, Inc., architects for the project, utilized the gable style and pitched roofs of Roemer Hall as influence when planning the appearance of the new structure.

"We wanted this modern performance center to harmonize with the rest of the campus," said Dennis Spellmann. "Thanks to generous supporters, several buildings were constructed on the campus during the administration of John Roemer. They each have a unique beauty. We wanted our newest building to invoke that atmosphere of Gothic Revivalist architecture found in Roemer Hall, and many of the other buildings on campus."

Spellmann said reaction to the look of the new building has been



overwhelmingly positive. "Everyone — especially many of the alumni — is very excited that we are designing this building of the future to be a reflection of Lindenwood's glorious past. It will be a thoroughly modern sports and performance facility on the inside, but on the outside, this building will be pleasing to the eye and atmosphere of this community."

Destined to serve as a convergence of campus and community activity, the Robert F. Hyland Performance Arena will be a superior, state-of-the-art facility that maintains the unique beauty of existing campus architecture.


