BRIGHTON BEACH MARCH

Brighton Beach March, composed in 1954, was Latham's first published work for band. It was an immediate success among band directors and was listed among the 100 most popular marches four times between 1960 and 1976. The style is British, in the tradition of Edward Elgar, Gustav Holst, William Walton, and Ralph Vaughan Williams. The title (chosen by the publisher) refers to a famous resort on the southern coast of England.

HORN CONCERTO NO. 1 IN E-FLAT MAJOR

Horn Concerto No. 1 in E-flat Major, written for orchestra and French Horn by German composer Richard Strauss, first performed in Meiningen, Germany, on March 4, 1885. The band transcription was completed in 1987 by John Anderson. The concerto is one of the most demanding solo works for the horn, using the highest and lowest notes in the instrument's register, often in quick succession. Because his father, Franz, had been the principal hornist of the Munich Court Orchestra, it was natural for Strauss to spotlight the instrument. Franz Strauss was still an active performer when Richard composed the concerto, and he wrote the piece intending for his father to give the premiere.

,The composer writes...."Everyone is still. The countdown begins. And in a single moment, adrenaline surges in an eruption of energy and power. Commissioned by the Indiana Bandmasters Association, this piece has roots in the Indy 500; however, as I began working on the piece, I realized that there is a universal response to nearly any countdown -- it could be a race, a launch, or a multitude of other scenarios. 3, 2, 1... explores the building moments ahead of the countdown as well as the unleashing of energy immediately afterward."

SCAVENGER MUSIC

This piece requires the players to do some of their own "scavenging" to find and create all of the instruments necessary for the performance.

RAIN

The composer writes....."Rain is a gentle work with a great deal of expressiveness. It paints a picture of a quiet rainfall with distant rolling thunder. The sound of droplets hitting the ground often puts me at ease for a reason I cannot adequately describe. For this reason, I

chose to explain my thoughts through music, which has always been a more powerful means of expression for me than words. The melodic and harmonic lines convey the complexity of rain -- the sadness it brings to some, the calmness it brings to others, and its ability to rejuvenate; the soft droplets outside our window that can be so relaxing yet can also be the cause of a raging river."

FANTASTIC JOURNEY

This thrilling fantasy showcases how all lives are fantastic journeys. The uplifting spirit of the opening theme (based on a hymn by Haydn) permeates the entire work in various forms, rhythms, and textures. Ultimately, the piece shines as dynamic flourishes interact with powerful brass fanfares before the piece comes to an amazing and dazzling conclusion.

EIGHT ON 3 AND NINE ON 2

Eight on 3 and Nine on 2 is a multipercussion duet like no other. Written for eight pitched tom toms, 2 rototoms, 2 bongos, and a bass drum, this piece tests percussionist's abilities to split rhythms. Two players perform the piece facing each other, sharing instruments just as they share in playing almost every rhythm in the piece. The listener is engaged aurally and visually as both performers sound like one in an exciting and captivating percussive showcase.

HYMN TO THE DAWN

The composer writes....."Hymn to the Dawn was originally the second movement of a work for brass quintet. It was composed in memory of Charlie Carter, staff arranger for the Florida State University Marching Chiefs and one of my first composition teachers."

OLYMPIADA

Olympiada was premiered on October 12, 1997, by the Duquesne University Wind Symphony, conducted by Dr. Robert Cameron, at Carnegie Music Hall in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Olympiada was written to capture the human conditions of intense glory and pain that only the Olympic Games can inspire, while musically tying themes with a historic Greek feel to modern chord changes and melodies. It opens with an Olympic style brass fanfare to set the tone, and quickly breaks into a variety of themes and settings representing athletic struggle before recapitulating the fanfare at the end.

STUDENT CONDUCTORS

WILLIAM HARMS is pursuing a degree in Music Education. Organizations include NAfME-C, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Spirit of St. Louis Men's Chorus and Chords Against Tonality Quartet. Following graduation, William plans to be a middle or high school band director.

JANAE BURSEY is currently in her junior year of completing her K-12 Music Education degree. Her primary instrument is the cello. She is a member of the National Association for Music Education Collegiate (NAfME-C) and the Jazz Education Network (JEN). After she graduates, she plans on returning to St. Louis to revitalize the orchestra programs in urban areas.

HEATHER HILL is a senior music education major whose primary instrument is percussion and secondary instrument is piano. She is a member of the Percussive Arts Society (PAS) as well as a member of Lindenwood's NAfME-C. She has been a member of Lindenwood's percussion ensemble for 6 semesters, section leader of the Lion Pride Marching Band's drumline, and principal percussionist in Lindenwood's Symphonic Band for the past 3 semesters. In addition to her school work, she has served as the percussion caption head at Wright City high school in Wright City, Missouri, for the past 4 years. She has had the privilege of writing full-show percussion books for marching bands and leading high school percussion groups in solo/ensemble events. Heather has provided private lessons for many young percussionists throughout the area and has also held percussion teaching positions at Holt High School and Liberty High School. She has performed with the accredited organization Freedom Percussion in 2016, 2017, 2019, and 2022 and holds a bronze medal from the PIO world finals. After graduation, Heather has plans to teach music throughout k-12 while continuing to enhance young percussionists' education in the marching arts world.

SOLOIST

EMMA STUBBLEFIELD is in her final semester as a Music Business Major, and she has dedicated every part of her being to her craft. She's been playing horn since 2011, and since then, she's played with multiple groups including Lindenwood Pit Orchestra, the MMEA All Collegiate Band, and the STL Wind Symphony Youth Orchestra. When she's not playing horn she's in the studio

recording, mixing, and composing music for a variety of people. It's been a long road, but after all that hard work, and help from her professors and peers, she is excited to finally perform Horn Concerto No.1 by Richard Straus with all of you.


