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Lindenwood's School Administration Team Involved in State Certification Efforts

During the past several months, Lindenwood's School Administration faculty have been busy working with The Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and the Missouri Professors of Educational Administration (MPEA) in creating new certification requirements for prospective school leaders. Dr. Graham Weir is one of four key authors of the state's new performance assessment, The Missouri Performance Assessment for Aspiring Principals. Committee work began in April 2017 and the new assessment replaced the Missouri School Leaders Performance Assessment (MoSLPA) that was offered through Educational Testing Service (ETS). The MoSLPA cost students approximately \$400.00, and the new assessment is currently free for Lindenwood students.

Several Lindenwood faculty members attended training in August, September, and October as scorers for the Missouri Performance Assessment for Aspiring Principals. These include Dr. Dennis Cooper of the Southwest Missouri campus, Dr. Joyce Shepherd of the Mid-Missouri campus, and Dr. Robert Steffes of the St. Charles campus. Dr. Weir was the lead presenter for the training workshops. All Missouri university school administration programs were required to have faculty members trained, and a total of 90 professors completed the mandated program.

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Doctoral Student Using Dissertation Study to Combat Human Trafficking

The first Midwest Human Trafficking Conference was held at Lindenwood University, St. Charles on September 28, 2018. The goal of this conference was to raise awareness and educate people about human trafficking, attracting educators, school counselors, law enforcement, attorneys, social workers, community members, and other professionals working in the field of human services. The conference had almost 300 attendees from the Midwest including Indiana. This conference was a collaboration between Gateway Human Trafficking, Lindenwood University, Missouri Attorney General's Office, Office for Victims of Crime Training and Technical Assistance Center, U.S. Attorney's Office, and St. Charles County Prosecuting Attorney's Office.

This conference was one aspect of a project called the Yellow Butterfly Project (YBP). Shima Rostami, the founder of YBP, is a doctoral student at Lindenwood University working on her dissertation to develop a moral education environment to combat human trafficking. Shima was concerned about the leadership aspect of any movement against human trafficking thus she became

interested in studying Servant Leadership Theory. Consequently, she decided to play the role of a servant leader while conducting her dissertation and established the YBP as a tool and simulation game to measure what motivated participants to collaborate and follow her in this study as a Servant Leader. The goal of YBP was to focus on raising awareness, education, and engagement regarding human trafficking by developing a Positive Youth Development (PYD) environment with an emphasis on Character Education (CE). The conference received was covered by FOX 2, LU TV, and Lindenlink.

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Mad City Money Invades Local High Schools

In November, the Economic Education Center began offering the Mad City Money Financial Reality Simulation. Mad City Money was created by the Credit Union National Association. This experiential-learning tool teaches high school students important personal finance skills, including budgeting, saving, and debt management. Students discover the impact of their decisions, learn important financial concepts and practice money management skills in a creative role-playing activity. Importantly, Mad City Money helps local schools provide required personal finance content to their students. The Economic Education Center facilitated the program at Maplewood-Richmond Heights High School on November 8 and at Oakville High School on November 19-20. Around 160 students participated in these events. Twenty volunteers from twelve local financial institutions assisted with the events by participating in the role playing activity. The Economic Education Center is now planning events at area schools for the spring semester.

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Open Educational Resources

Dr. Anthony Scheffler, Dean of the School of Education, recently encouraged the staff and faculty of the School of Education to begin to research Open Educational Resources as a possibility to replace traditional text books as we plan our classes.

Open educational resources (**OERs**) are freely accessible, openly licensed text, media, and other digital assets that are useful for teaching, learning, and assessing as well as for research purposes. (Open educational resources. Wikipedia.org)

The use of Open Educational Resources (OER) could potentially be a cost savings for our students. To date, several instructors are researching the use of OER for their courses. Any change in text book suggests a look into OER as a possible resource for a course. Right now behavior analysis course work, through the Counseling department uses OER exclusively. Instructors in the departments of Higher Education and Initial Teacher Certification are also exploring OER as a textbook alternative.

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Behavior Analysis Cohort Receives Exciting Approval

The Behavior Analysis Fall 2019 cohort will be one of the first in the world to be approved for the BACB/ABAI 5th edition task list curriculum! We received approval on November 26 and are officially all set to implement the new program for our next set of admitted students.
