






# Do You Believe In Magic? Cotillion '93





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






Powder Puff

Blood Drive







Alpha Sigma Tau, founded at Lindenwoood in 1922, honors graduating seniors who have demonstrated excellence in their studies. Those seniors achieving a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 or higher are invited to membership.

Alpha Lambda Delta is a national scholarship honor society for first year or transfer students. The Alpha Lambda Delta chapter at Lindenwood has been active since 1949. This honor society recognizes superior academic performance among entering college and university students.

Who's Who recognizes students for their scholastic achievement and contribution to community life. The students are nominated by their peers and teachers.

**Linden Scroll** is a service honorary organization at Lindenwood. Its main purposes are to promote college loyalty, to promote and maintain high standards of scholarship, and to encourage leadership.

The Dean's List is an honorary society for semester students who excel in the academic field. Students must maintain a 3.5 G.P.A. to become a member.



DeAnna Strong, clarinet player, said, "Being in the band was a great learning experience for all of us."




dance was fun for the dancers and the guys, who gave it their best.








Athletics play...








# Men's Soccer

The Lion soccer team was hot at the beginning of the year, winning their first six contests. Then they hit a slump and lost their next four games.








Volleyball













Cross Country

# Women's Basketball

The Lady Lions had the finest season in school history with a record breaking 22-11 mark, and again finished the Show-Me Collegiate Conference with an undefeated regular season mark. The team broke 10 school records and won the school's second SMCC post-season tournament championship in three years. The ladies won a school record 11 straight games and 14 of 15 during one stretch. They ended the year ranked third in the nation in rebounding percentage, fifth in scoring defense, and eighth in three-point field goal percentage. Guard Daphne Hozée became the first Lions basketball player to be named NAIA Academic All-American, and the team had a conference-leading seven studentathletes on the SMCC All-Academic team: Hozée, Neel Høgh, Cyndi Johnson, Chris Kenny, Julie Larson, Kristen Miller and Josette Williamson. Hozée, Shannon Malek and Angie Warren earned All-District First Team honors. Malek and Warren were named to the SMCC first team, while Hozée and Marni Johnson were named Honorable Mention. 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






After completing its fourth season of intercollegiate baseball, Lindenwood has established itself as having a nationally competitive program. Over the past two seasons, the Lions have compiled a sparkling 60-37 record, have captured two successive District 16 titles and were Midwest Regional Finalists in 1993.


Nine of the players were named Academic All-Conference selections. One of these, Cory Tibbs, was an ABCA-NAIA All-American and the NAIA national RBI leader with 64 runs batted in 43 games, for an average of 1.49 RBI per game. Tibbs also finished in the top 10 in the nation in home runs (14) and batting average (.448). NAIA All-American honors were also earned by third baseman Tony Allison and pitcher Scott Sherrer, who had seven wins for the Lions and nine saves. For this, Sherrer won the District 16 Player of the Year award. Pitcher Buddy Smith was selected Show-Me Collegiate All-Conference.

At the end of this season, the Lions were nationally ranked in team batting average (15th), stolen bases (3rd) and team defense (15th). Coach Ward was honored for his leadership by being voted the District 16 Coach of the Year.





In their first year together, Dale Schallert and Stacy Weiland wasted no time establishing a team that shot to national prominence. Starting with an unheard-of eight freshmen, one sophomore and one junior, the team was able to achieve a national ranking in the top 25. Of this group, seven wrestlers, including sophomore John Michel at 118 pounds, freshman Eric Caldwell at 126, freshman Kris Bixby at 150, junior Jerry Neitenbach at 158, freshman Jason Clark at 167, freshman Marc Botindari at 190, and freshman Brian Wisdom at heavyweight, all qualified for the National Tournament held in Butte, Montana.


## Saturday, May 22, 10 a.m.






