

In 2012, Larkin decided to take a leap into entrepreneurship and pursue her lifelong passion, leaving IBM and getting certified as a wedding and event planner.



will see her acclaimed book Curveball come to life in the Off-Broadway play Toni Stone this spring and summer. The play will be produced by the Roundabout Theatre Company at the Harold and Mirian Steinberg Center's Laura Pels Theater in New York City.

Toni Stone was the first female professional baseball player in the Negro Leagues. The play will star Obie Award winner April Matthis in the title role and is scheduled to open June 20 with preview performances beginning May 23.

Ackmann released Curveball eight years ago. After seeing the book featured on ESPN, producer Samantha Barrie contacted Ackmann's agent about adapting Curveball for the stage. Later, Ackmann and Barrie met in New York and agreed to pursue the project together.

"It is important to choose a person with the same artistic vision as you," said Ackmann.


Toni Stone is directed by Tony Award-winning director Pam MacKinnon and written by Lydia R. Diamond. Ackmann said she has enjoyed working with Diamond.

"This is my first collaboration with a playwright, and Lydia has been open and generous," said Ackmann. She said she is enjoying seeing her book visualized for the stage.

"I'm just delighted!" she said. "The experience has been positive, and Lydia is taking the story into a new realm. It has been quite wonderful. It is the first all-female baseball production for the American stage."

Many plays have begun in an Off-Broadway setting and made the transition to Broadway theaters. There are hopes that *Toni Stone* will do the same. In the meantime, the play has been added to the 2019-20 seasons for the American Conservatory Theater in San Francisco and D.C. Metro Theater Arts Arena Stage.

"Off-Broadway simply means the size of the theater," Ackmann said "We are in the heart of Times Square. This is actually our first run to see if the audience likes it, and our hope is that it will do well.'

Ackmann, who graduated in 1973 with a double major in English and communication arts, has another iron in the fire as well. Her book The Mercury 13: The Untold Story of Thirteen American Women and the Dream of Space Flight has been optioned as an event miniseries and is currently in development with Bradley Whitford (The West Wing) for Amazon. Liz Hannah, who wrote the film The Post, will write the script for *The Mercury 13*.

The book tells the true story of the 13 women who trained as astronauts alongside the men for the Mercury 7 mission in 1961 but were let go from the program despite completing the same training.

"(Mercury 13) has been a long time coming as well," Ackmann said. "I have been very happy that Brad and his team are moving it forward. He has the kind of vision I'm looking for that aligns with the story."

Ackmann recently finished a new book about poet Emily Dickinson titled These Fevered Days: Ten Pivotal Moments in the Making of Emily Dickinson, which was at this writing scheduled for release by W.W. Norton in April 2020 for National Poetry Month. Her newest project is a book about country music legend Dolly Parton.

BOYLES ATTENDS UN COMMISSION on the Status

As a member of the non-governmental organization Sociologists for Women in Society and as co-chair of that organization's Women of Color Committee, Boyles joined other experts in the field of gender equality as a catalyst for social change.

"I have a unique opportunity as a feminist race scholar and researcher to represent an academic organization and committee in a global space and be engaged in ways that help shape what we know about gender inequality," said Boyles.

During the gathering, Boyles joined international women from diverse backgrounds and engaged with other women who are leaders in the advancement of gender equality. Other UN entities and non-governmental organizations from throughout the world attended the event.

"This is important to me because I've been engaged in this work throughout my career," said Boyles. "I had the opportunity to



work with peers who specialize globally in the kind of work I do."

Boyles intends to bring her experience back to the classroom with her and further her students' knowledge by giving them relevant real-world examples and experiences to study.

"Education fuels research, and from there research fuels education," said Boyles. "So, it's essential to me that I bring these experiences and knowledge back to the classroom with me."

The CSW's annual two-week convention is entirely dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women and also focuses on promoting women's rights, documenting the reality of women's lives around the globe. Boyles has been a member of the SWS for nearly 11 years.

Boyles has been teaching at Lindenwood University-Belleville for nearly eight years on issues of gender and race, bringing her research and experience into her classroom lessons and discussions. She has a Ph.D. in sociology with concentrations in gender and criminology from Kansas State University and a master's degree in sociology and a bachelor's degree in English from Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Mo.

She is the author of Race, Place, and Suburban Policing: Too Close for Comfort and was a contributor/essayist in Segregation by Design with a forthcoming manuscript on Community Disorder and Social Ties in Post-Ferguson and is involved an a number of other social initiatives.



Dr. Stephanie Yearian a teacher of teachers at Lindenwood University-Belleville, was recently honored with the 2018 Jerry Johns Reading Educator of the Year Award by the Illinois Reading Council at its annual conference in Peoria, III.

The award recognizes an outstanding teacher who makes significant contributions in promoting literacy among students, colleagues, and schoo communities. The award winner receives a monetary award, an engraved plaque, a personalized banner, and recognition at the annual Illinois Reading Council conference.

Yearian, associate professor of education leadership, was nominated for the award by fourth grade teacher and Lindenwood Belleville alumna Sharon Ray; Tracy Keilbach, parent of a student at

Mascoutah Middle School; and the late Dr. Steve Suess, former chair of the Education and Counseling Division at Lindenwood Belleville.

"Since 2010, Dr. Yearian has served...at Lindenwood University-Belleville, where her major deployment revolves around reading and literacy pedagogy," wrote Suess in his nomination letter.

He cited her broad scope of reading analysis and methods class, as well as her direction of Camp Lynx Tales, a summer reading camp in which children from the community learn from Lindenwood Belleville reading methods teachers, which helps struggling young readers and provides valuable experiences for education students.

Beyond her impact at Lindenwood Belleville, nominator Jackye Biehl, administrator from the First Baptist Academy, said Yearian has worked with that school to provide one-on-one instruction to struggling readers in the Opportunity for Academic Restoration (O.A.R.) program.

"Stephanie has an exciting classroom that engages students to think deeply while reinforcing comprehension, oral reading fluency, and phonetic foundations, and does it all with excellence," said Biehl. "Without a doubt, she is one of the most skilled and creative teachers I have had the pleasure of working with over my years at the First Baptist Academy."

Likewise, Keilbach's daughter received tutoring from Yearian to assist with her reading skills, which her mother said gave her the tools she needed to enhance her reading ability.

Teaching by example

Mead Finds Publishing Success with Dancing Madly by Chris Duggan

As DIRECTOR OF LINDENWOOD UNIVERSITY'S MFA IN WRITING PROGRAM, **Beth Mead has watched with great satisfaction** as her students and graduates have placed their works in literary magazines and even published book-length manuscripts. This year, she will celebrate some publishing success of her own with her new book, **Dancing Madly**, a collection of short pieces due out this summer.

Though she has placed numerous short works in journals, this is her first book, published by Adelaide Books in July of this year. It contains 25 pieces: short stories, flash fiction, and flash nonfiction.

"The stories in *Dancing Madly* explore how we keep trying to survive in our flawed ways as life breaks us down, sends us spinning—that mad dance that gets us through each day," Mead said.

Mead's prose is hauntingly gripping, steeped in yearning, regret, and memory (an excerpt is on the facing page).

The book deal sprung from the publication of her short story "Mothers," published last year by Adelaide Literary Journal in New York. After the story was published, she was approached by a representative of Adelaide, who told her they were accepting manuscripts and asked her if she had one available.


"I said I had a collection of fiction, flash fiction, and flash nonfiction, and he asked me to submit a proposal," Mead said. "Then shortly after that, he asked for the full manuscript."

Mead strongly urges her students to submit their works to literary magazines as much as they can; though it is a sometimes frustrating process filled with rejection, it is the best way to build toward getting a full-length work published.

"Start by getting individual pieces published in literary journals," Mead said. "After about 15 or so pieces have been accepted by strong journals, then you can send query letters to reputable presses that accept unsolicited manuscripts."

An as-yet-unscheduled event is in the works in which Mead, MFA faculty member Gillian Parrish, and MFA alumni and faculty will read from their books. Details will be posted on the MFA program website at www.lindenwood.edu/MFAwriting and on the program's Facebook page.

Lindenwood's nationally recognized MFA in Writing program is available in-classroom and entirely or partially online. The program publishes a literary magazine, *The Lindenwood Review*, annually in the spring.

Lions' Reserve Fund Helps Students in Need





PUBLISHING SUCCESS COMES TO Exercise



CONTINUING an impressive string of publication success by Lindenwood University exercise science students, faculty, and alumni, a team consisting of two current Lindenwood students, a Lindenwood alumna, and a faculty member recently produced an article that was published in the high-quality peer-reviewed journal Sports Medicine-Open.

Patrick Harty, a current graduate student; Megan Cottet, who earned her bachelor's in exercise science in 2014 and master's in human performance in 2017 from Lindenwood; and James Malloy, a current undergraduate student in the School of Health Sciences, were authors on the paper along with Dr. Chad Kerksick, associate professor of exercise science and director of the Exercise and Performance Nutrition Laboratory.

Titled "Nutritional and Supplementation Strategies to Prevent and Attenuate Exercise-Induced Muscle Damage: a Brief Review," the paper addresses how athletes minimize soreness and maximize their recovery from strenuous exercise.

"Several different nutritional ingredients have been researched for their ability to help with this recovery," Kerksick said. "Several papers have been published, but few papers have summarized the outcomes from these studies."





Cottet, who currently works for Lindenwood as an exercise science instructor, said she started the project her first year of graduate school in 2016.

"I dove into finding all of the research studies that had anything to do with nutrition interventions for muscle damage and found close to 200 articles," Cottet said. "After spending over 200 hours reading, charting, and writing, we decided to press pause and wait for the rest of the crew to complete their part of the project. Two years later, Chad and I had Pat finish it up for one of his many independent study projects, and James did an awesome job making the charts and tables for the paper."


The paper took between 8 and 10 weeks to organize, prepare, and submit to the journal. Kerksick said he is proud of this paper and the work of the team.

"At the end of this semester, I will have been at Lindenwood for five years," Kerksick said. "During that

time, we have seen exponential growth in the number of students involved in all aspects of the research process. This one stands out because only current or former Lindenwood students are co-authors on the paper and it has a combination of graduate and undergraduate students involved. It will be a continual resource and reference for current and future investigations."

Malloy, who will graduate in May with a bachelor's in exercise science, said he hopes the research will help people better understand delayed-onset muscle soreness.


"I believe our diligence resulted in a comprehensive review that will greatly benefit its readers and the future study of this topic," Malloy said. "Assisting in this project provided me great insight into the research process, and it gave me much to look forward to when I pursue graduate education."

GYMNASTICS ACHIEVES RARITY in Trip to NCAA Regional

HE LINDENWOOD GYMNASTICS
TEAM HAS ONLY BEEN IN EXISTENCE
FOR SEVEN YEARS AND HAS MADE
HISTORY YEAR IN AND YEAR OUT.
In 2019 the team did so again, becoming just
the third NCAA Division II gymnastics program
to qualify for an NCAA Regional. Lindenwood joins
Bridgeport (2013) and Seattle Pacific (1988)
as the only non-Division I institutions to qualify
for an NCAA Regional.

The Lions will were selected to the Baton Rouge Regional against power-5 conference members LSU, Auburn, George Washington, and Arizona. All five teams in the regional were ranked in the top 30 in the country while Lindenwood ended the season ranked No. 36.

The gymnastics program started competing in 2013 and has completed seven seasons of competition.

No gymnastics program in the country at any level has ever made an ascent to the regionals as quickly as Lindenwood has.

"Seeing the caliber of gymnasts the first year of the program and the desire they had, I thought eventually we could do this," said Head Coach Jen Llewellyn, who started at Lindenwood as a graduate assistant in 2013 and became head coach in 2014. "It's always been n my radar, and we talked about it last year as a team. We didn't actively say it was our goal but knew it was possible. At each meet, we just focused on how we could get a 10th better."

NCAA gymnastics has a format that allows programs from all divisions to reach the national championships based on their national qualifying score, which takes the top six scores of the season, eliminates the best and averages the remaining five.



There have been a lot of firsts in the history of the program and preceding the first regional trip were the first wins over Division I teams: Iowa State and Mizzou. So, this grand stage isn't entirely new for the Lions.

"We made the schedule a lot more difficult," Llewellyn said. "We have the luxury of choosing where we go. I tried as much as possible to get more power-five teams and Division I schools to build our confidence. So, strategically we made it more competitive, and they handled it well."

The Lions have won two USA Gymnastics Women's Collegiate National Championships in their seven-year history. Lindenwood captured its first title in 2015 and secured its second title the following season at home in Hyland Arena.

Last month, Lindenwood secured a share of the Midwest Independent Conference (MIC) title for the fifth consecutive season, setting a new conference record in the process. The Lions set a new program record this season with a Regional Qualifying Score (RQS) of 195.400, the highest mark in program history.

Impacts USA Eagles at Americas Rugby Championship by Phil Vida

HREE CURRENT AND FORMER LIONS were selected for the USA Men's National Team squad for the 2019 Americas Rugby Championship that concluded March 8 in Seattle, Wash. Chance Wenglewski, Tadgh Leader, and Malon Al-Jiboori all gained valuable international experience during the premier competition in the Western Hemisphere.

Wenglewski was one of only two current college players selected to the 35-player squad, continuing

an already impressive international career. The senior graphic design major played at Soldier Field against New Zealand last fall and again in Ireland a couple of weeks later.

Leader, a recent Lindenwood graduate, experienced his first international appearance for the USA after emigrating from Ireland, Leader recently moved to Boston after inking a deal with the New England Free Jacks in Major League Rugby (MLR).

Al-Jiboori also signed a new professional contract in the MLR with the Glendale Raptors and was picked for the USA XV's team after a long stint at the Olympic Training

Center. He made the switch in codes after being featured in nine different HSBC Sevens World Series tournaments.

On the staff side of the equation. former Lindenwood assistant coach Jimmy Harrison served as the performance analyst for Team USA.

at World University

HE NO. 3-RANKED LINDENWOOD UNIVERSITY-BELLEVILLE women's ice hockey team had three players selected to the U.S. team at the 2019 World University Games in Krasnoyarsk, Russia, March 1-9: freshman goaltender Hannah Stone, junior forward Alicia Williams, and junior defenseman Katie Stelling.

The roster consisted of players competing in the National Collegiate Athletic Association and American Collegiate Hockey Association.


"This shows a tremendous amount of success for our program." said Lindenwood Head Coach Kat Hannah. "With the high percentage of Canadians on the team, we have seven Americans on the team and three of them made it to represent their country."

This season, the Lady Lynx defeated multiple nationally ranked opponents and achieved their highest ranking in program history. They also claimed the championship at the Robert Morris-Chicago Showcase Tournament, upending three ranked teams on their way to the crown.

Williams, a native of Virginia, Minn., is in her third season with the Lynx.

"Alicia came here without me having ever seen her play before," said Hannah. "She reached out to me and said, 'If you bring me in, you won't regret it,' and I haven't for a minute."

She expressed gratitude for being placed on the U.S. team.



"I am so grateful to be named to this team," said Williams. "It is such a privilege to represent my country. I was surprised to be picked for the team, and it's a tremendous opportunity. I already play with some of the best players in the league every day, so to be chosen for this team is such an honor.'

Stone, a freshman goalie from Killingsworth, Conn., has broken many school records in her first year of college play. Perhaps the most impressive feat by Stone this season came on Feb. 10 as she led the charge in a 23-save, 1-0 shutout of No. 1-ranked Adrian College.

"She has made her mark early on," said Hannah. "In her second performance against Liberty, the national champs, she gave us the opportunity to tie and eventually win the game."

"I was speechless when I was named to the team," said Stone. "It has always been a goal and dream of mine to represent the United States, and it's nice to see the effort paying off."

Stelling, a junior defenseman from Santa Cruz, Calif., is the second Lady Lynx defenseman to be named to the University Games squad, following Alex Brown's selection in 2017.

"Katie is a fierce competitor and more than deserves a chance to play at the highest level," said Hannah.

In her freshman season, she scored 14 goals with five assists in 33 games, including five power-play goals and four game-winning goals. She followed up an injury shortened sophomore year with another strong season as a junior.

"I'm grateful and honored to be selected and to have this amazing opportunity to play for my country," said Stelling.




