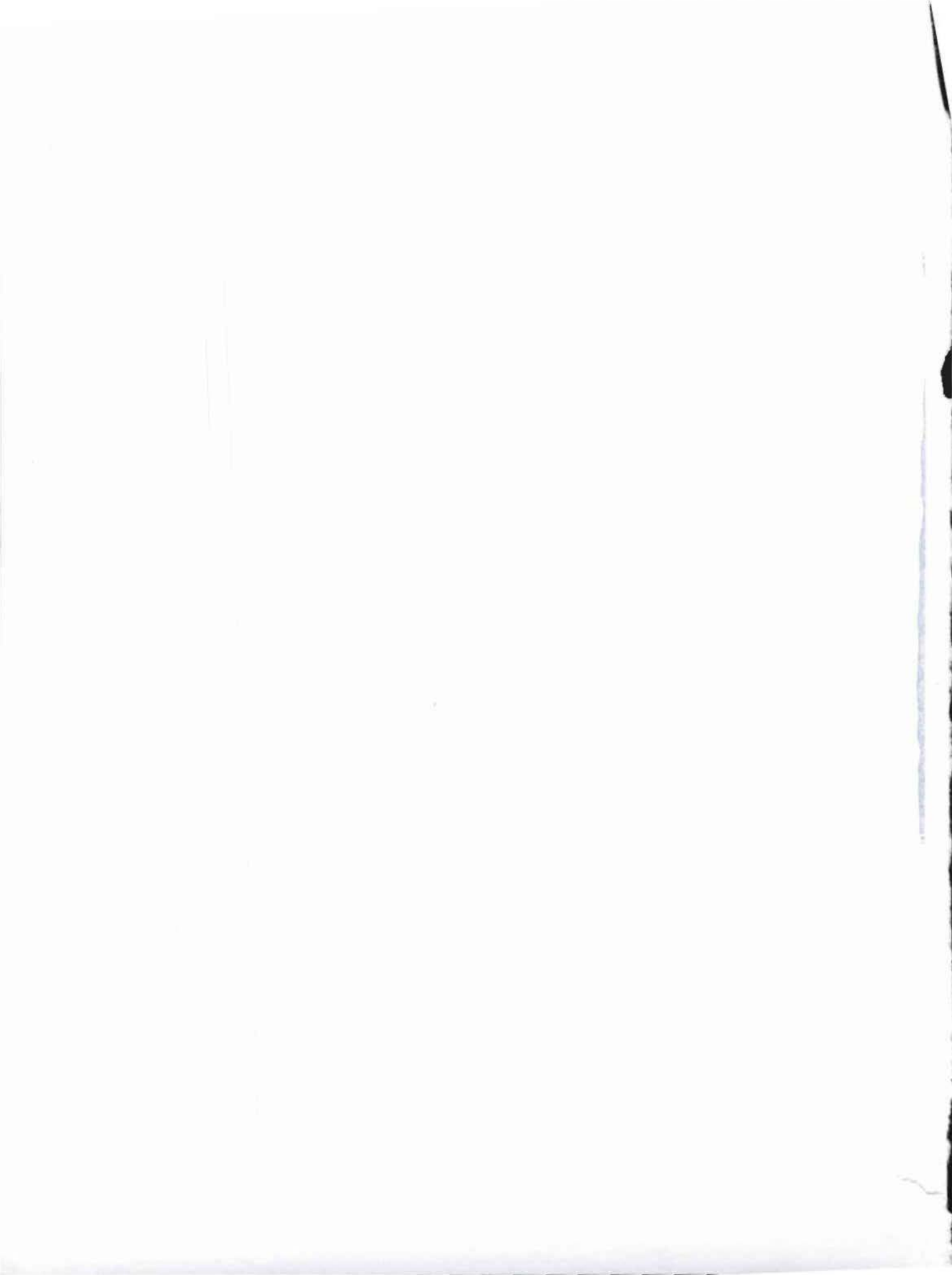

# Lost in the 'Wood...

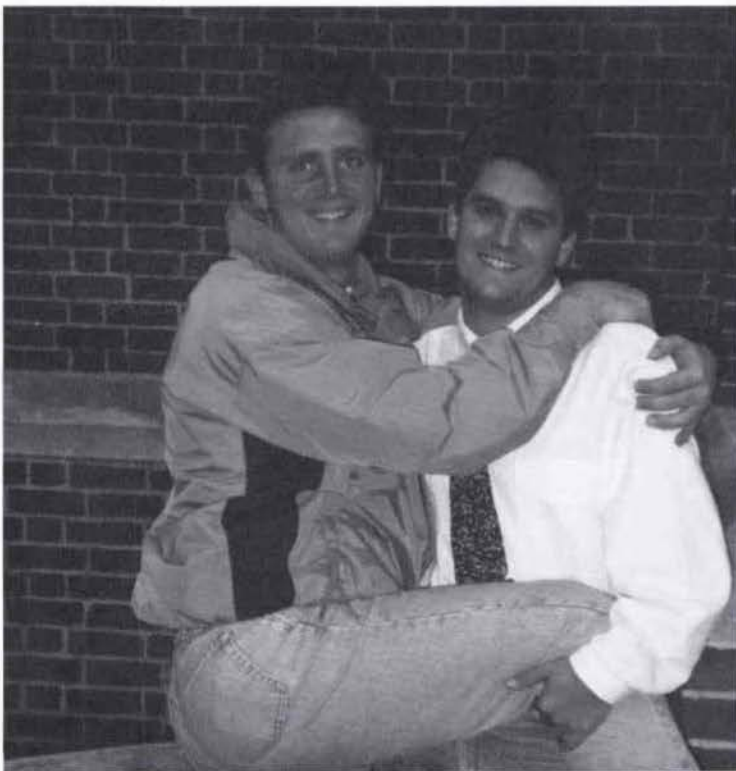

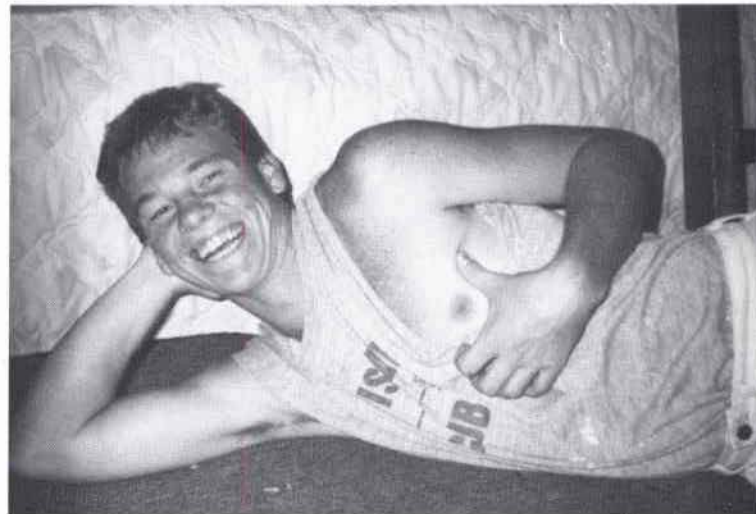

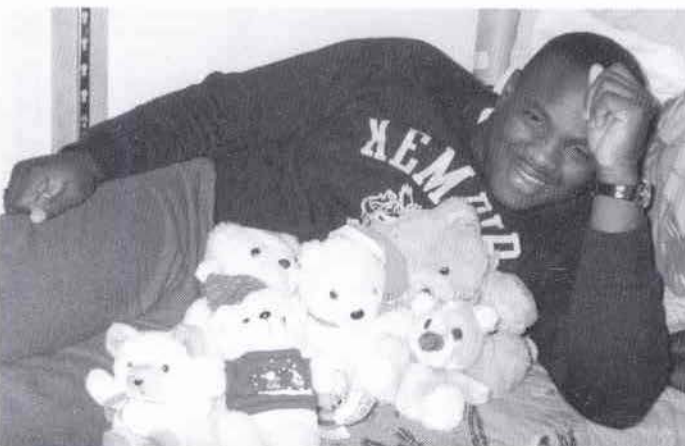

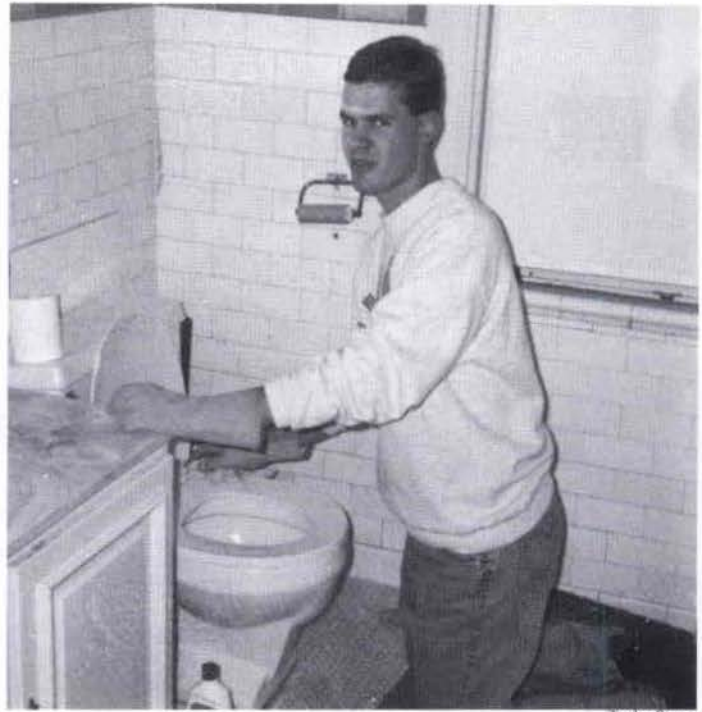

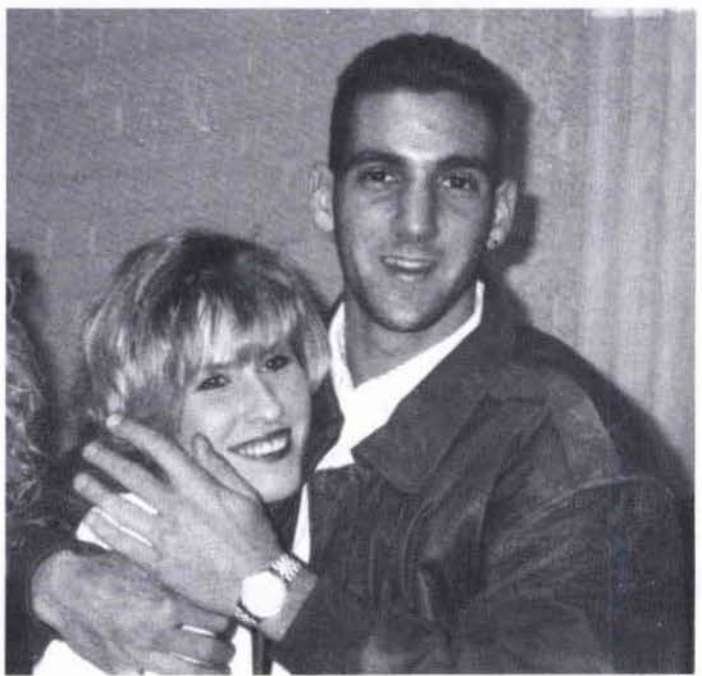

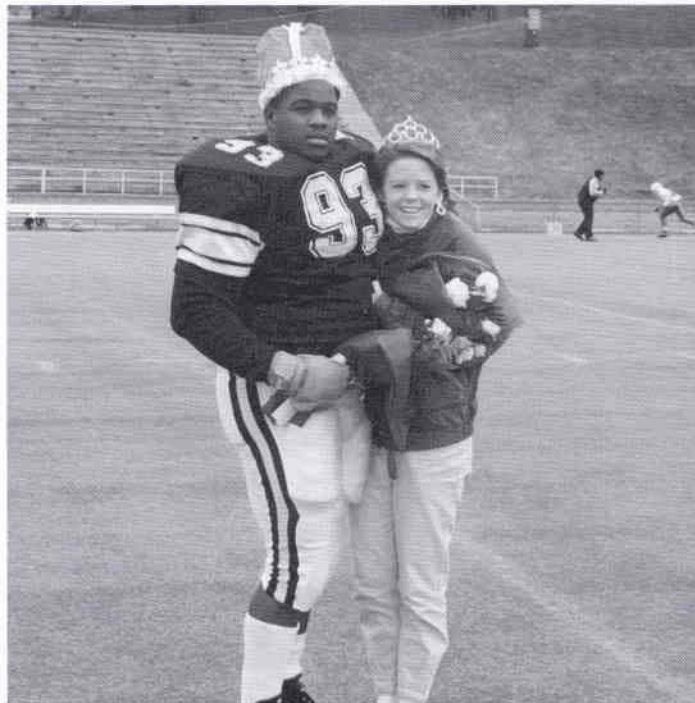
Making a day in history, students were excited to be a part of the first parade at LC.

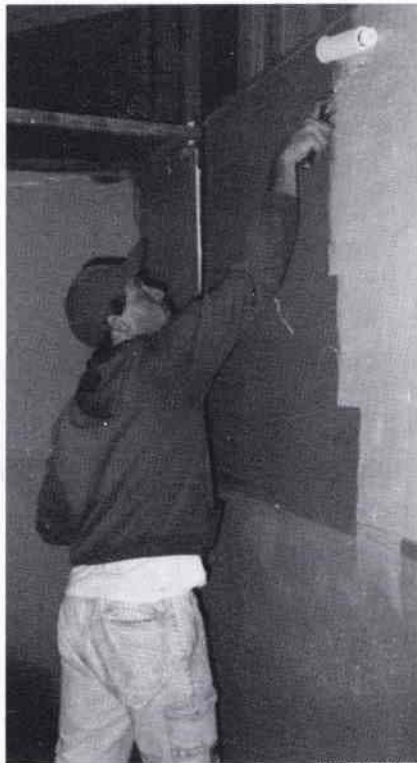

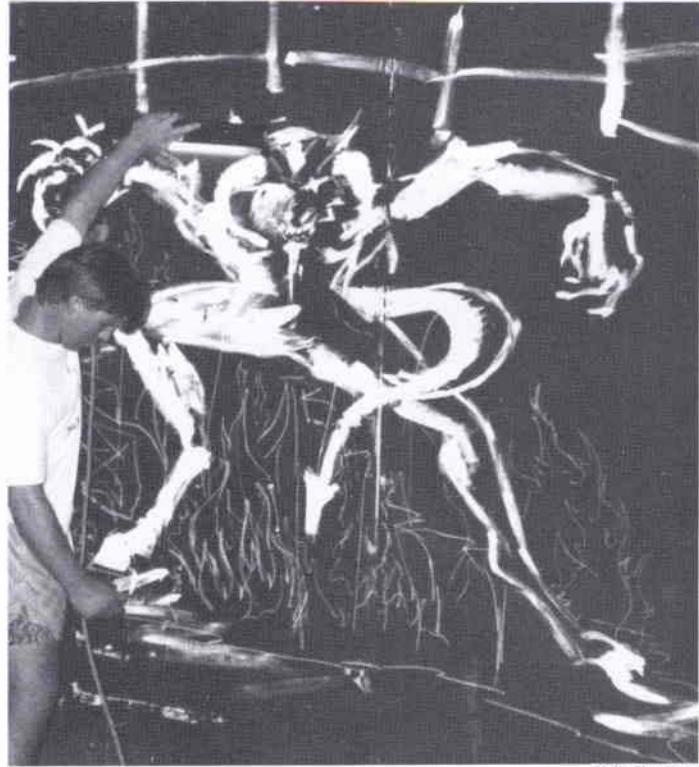

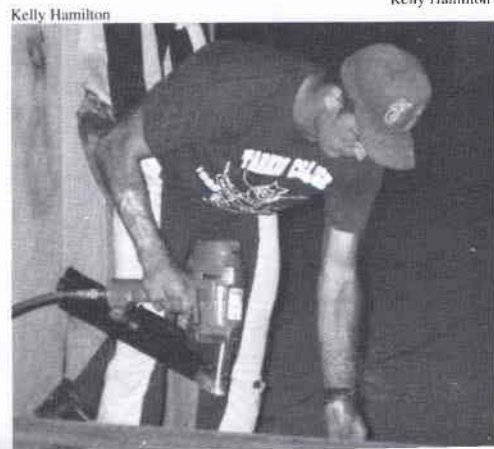

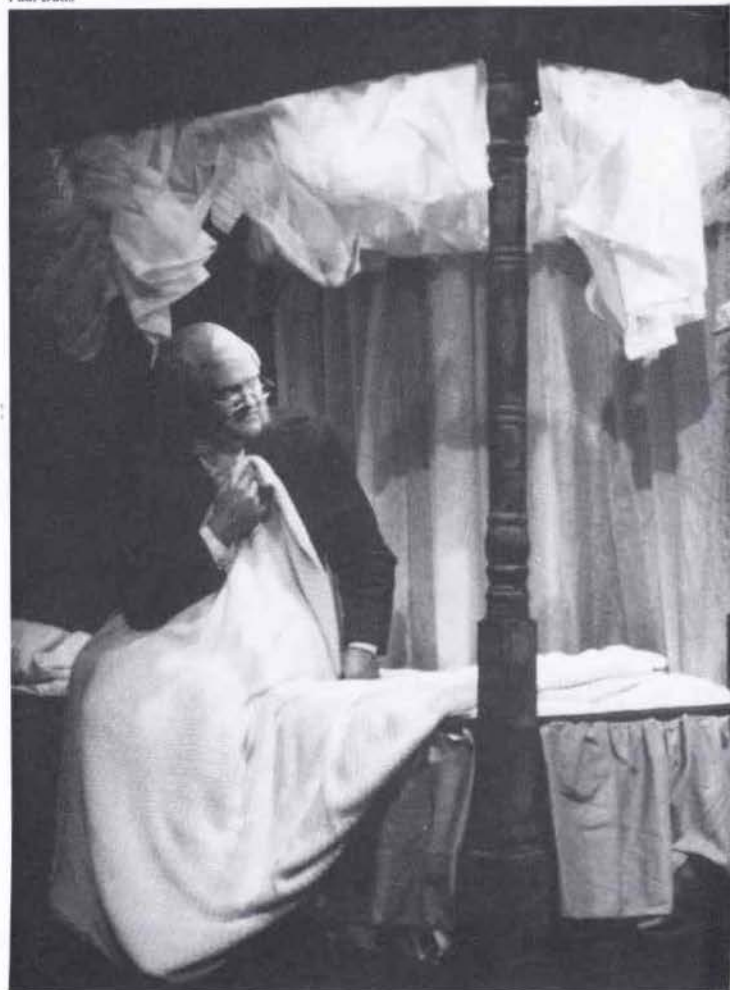

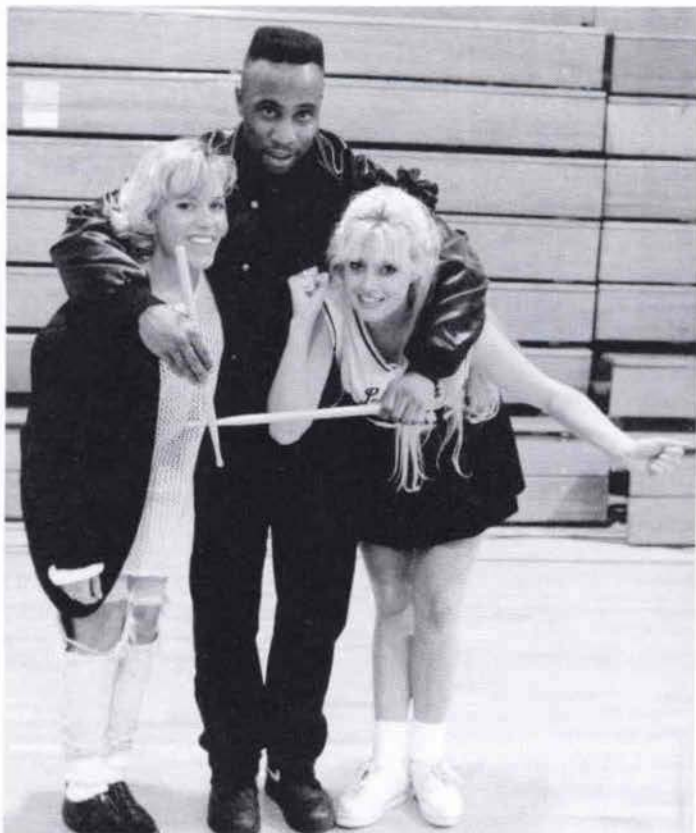

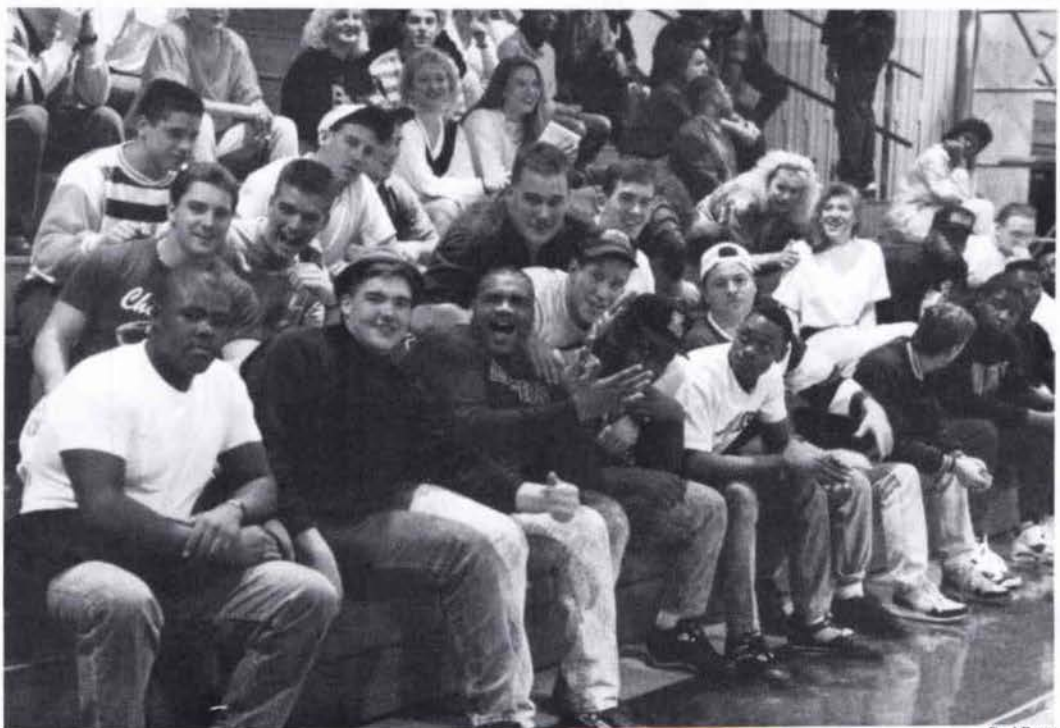

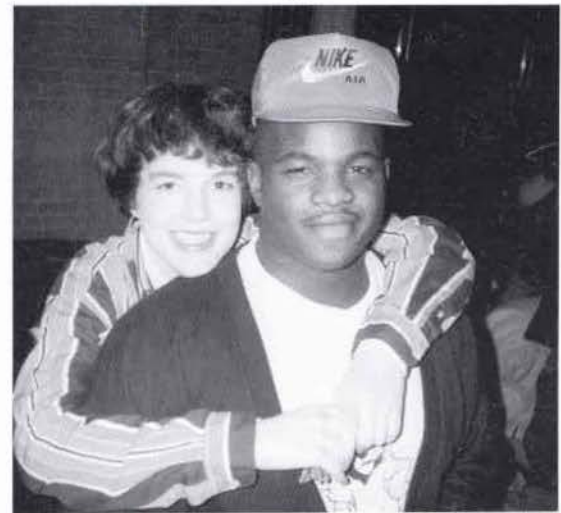

Soon the week ended, far too soon for some and not soon enough for others, and everyone returned to Lindenwood to become their intellectual selves again.

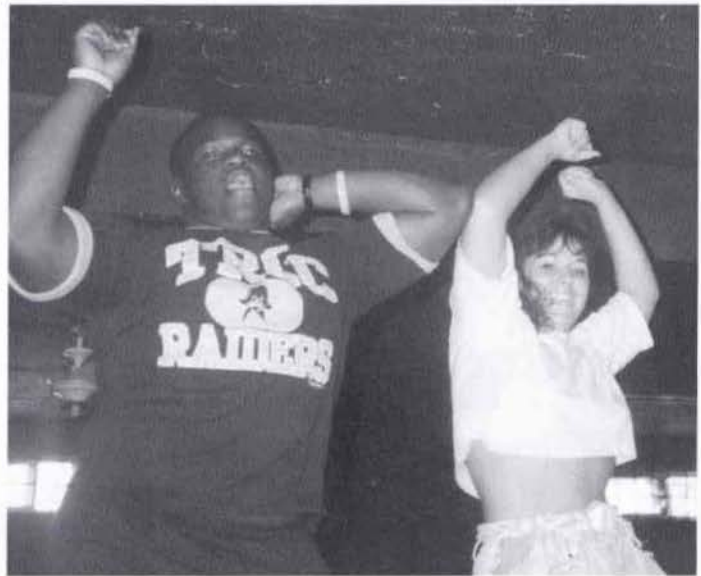

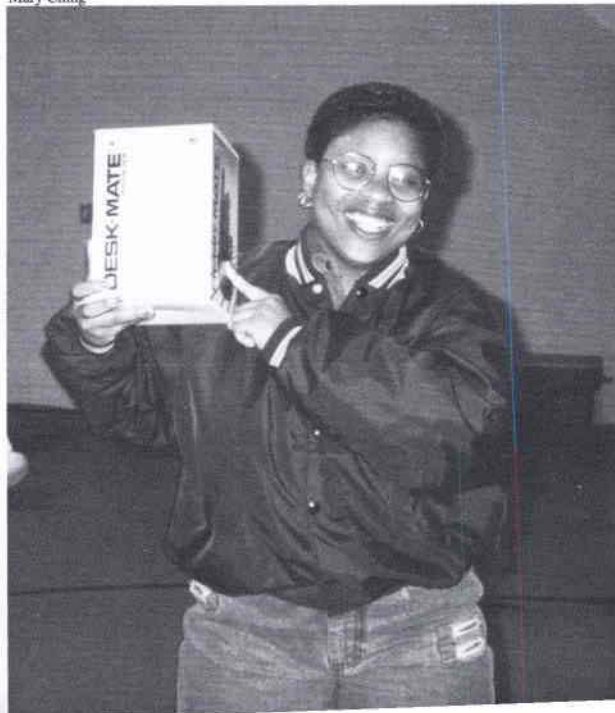

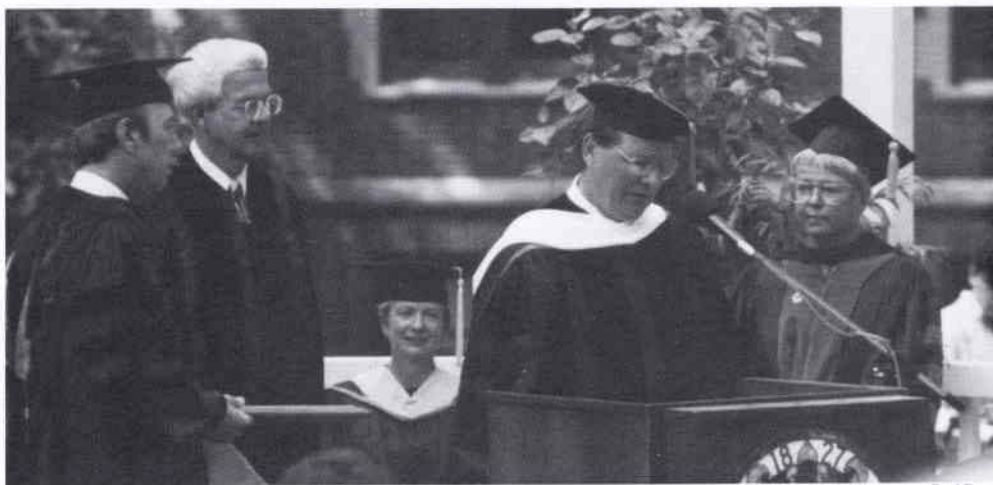

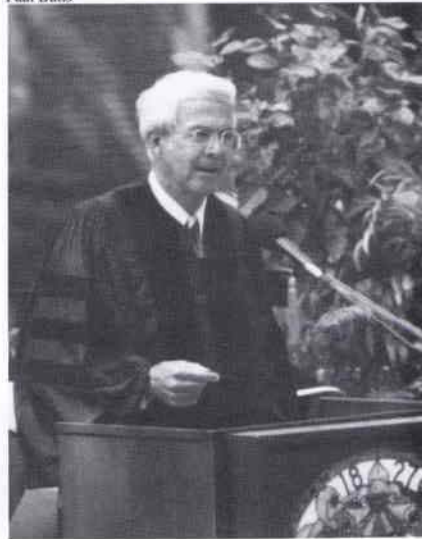

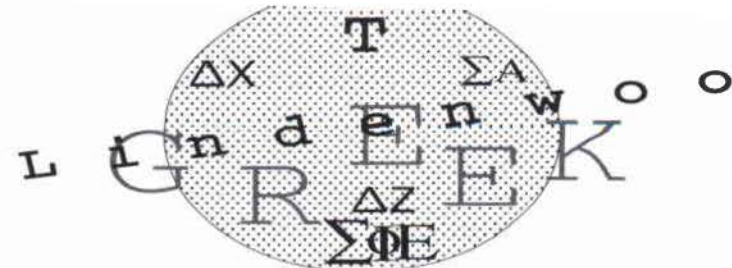

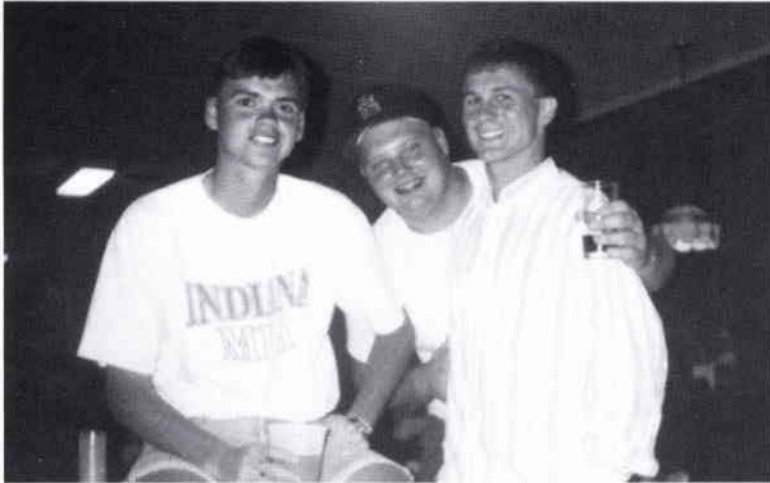

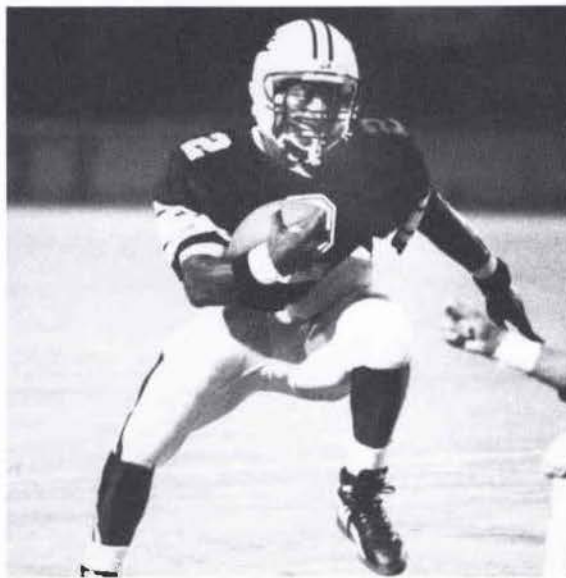

It will take hard work and determination to carry on this winning tradition, but with a strong off-season program, the Lions will be ready to roar again in 1992.

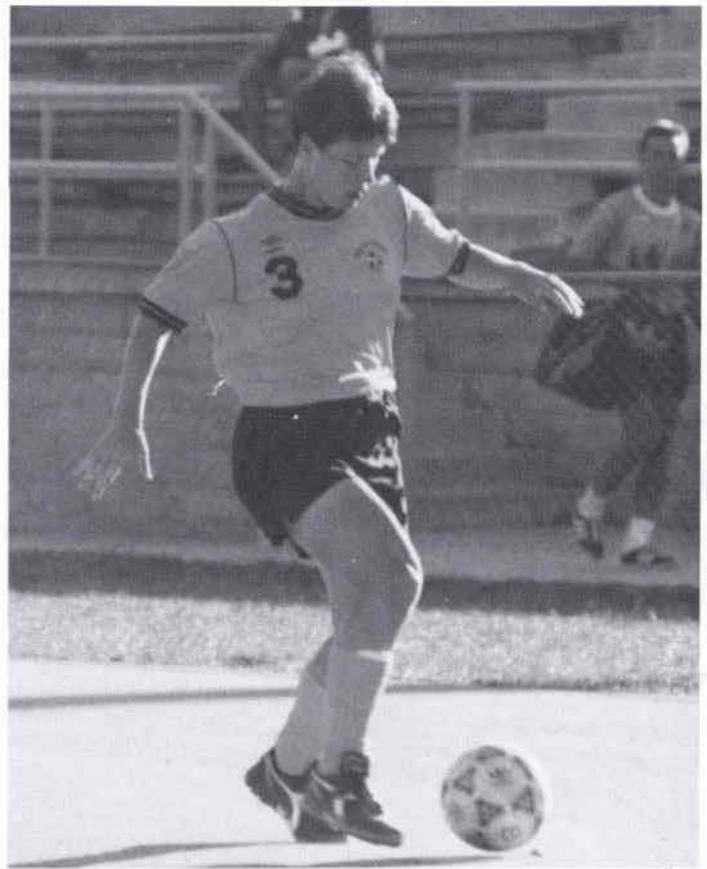

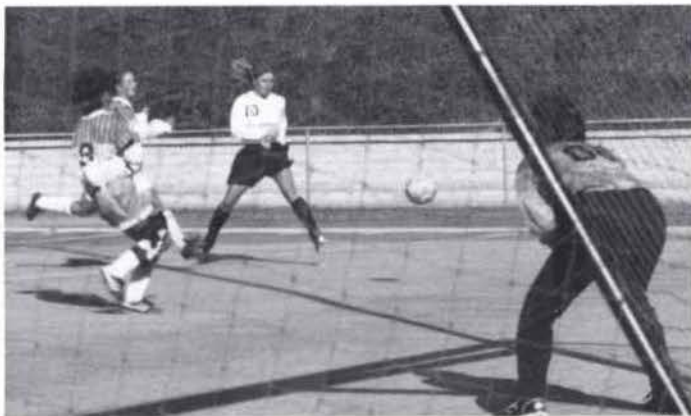

Kassen's program consisted of intense practice sessions where there was much expected of the girls. The squad was well into

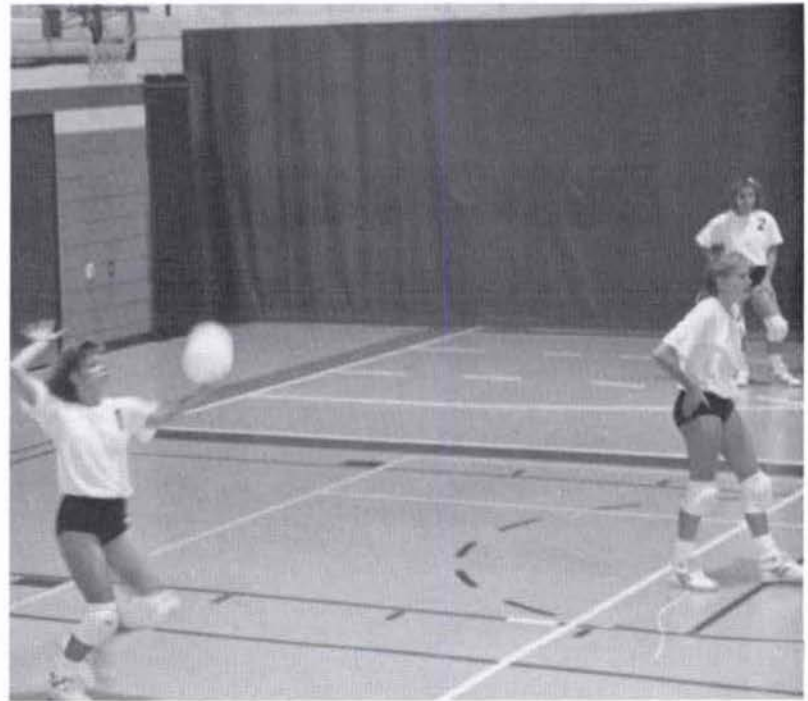
the season before they picked their first win against Harris Stowe on September 19.

Bolser averaging 12.4 points per game. Center Jody Scott finished fifth in the conference in rebounding averaging 7.5 per game.

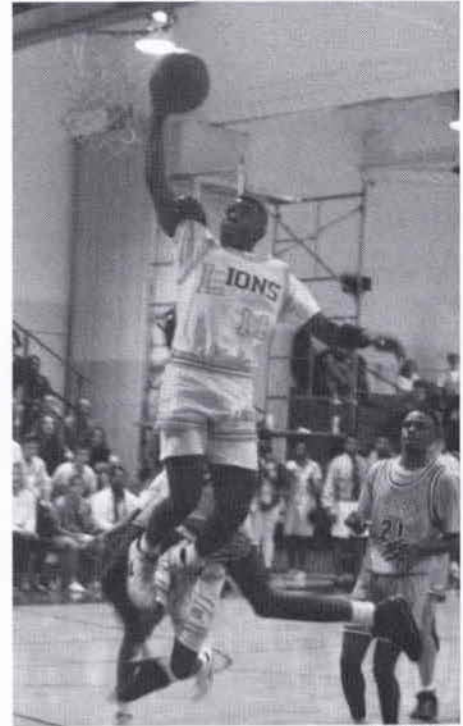
The Lions will graduate only two seniors, Roosevelt Durden and Dave Schilp. The Lions were a young team and hopefully next year the team will mature, and be contenders

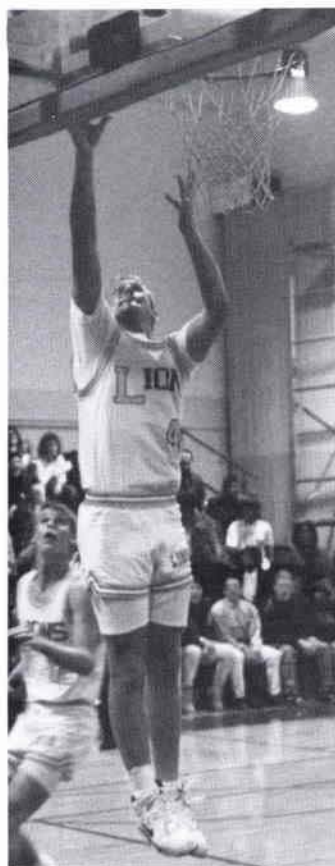

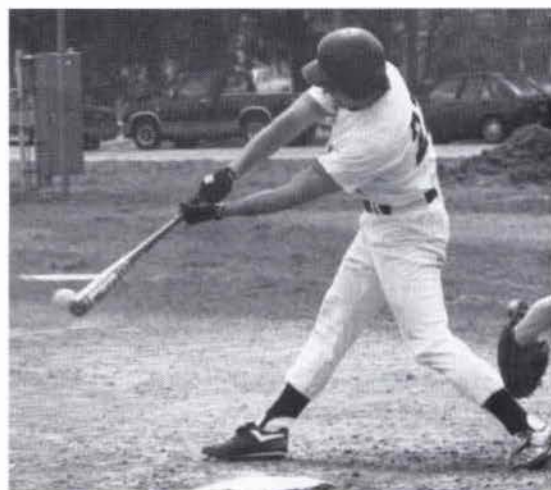

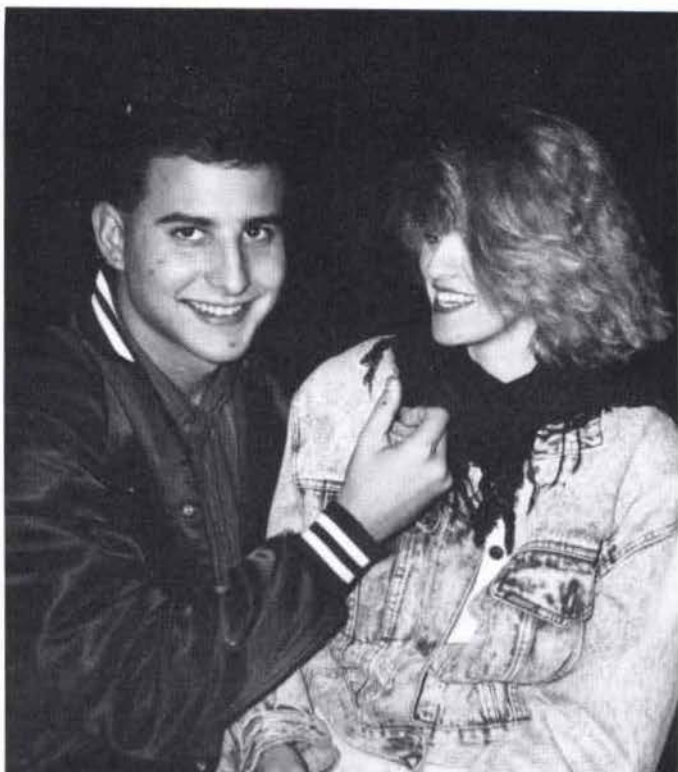

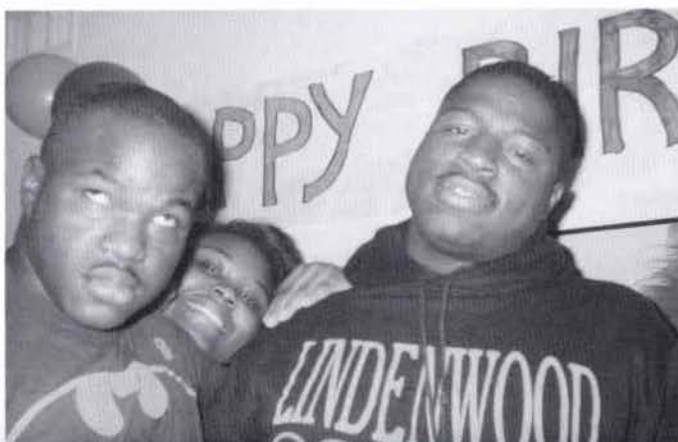

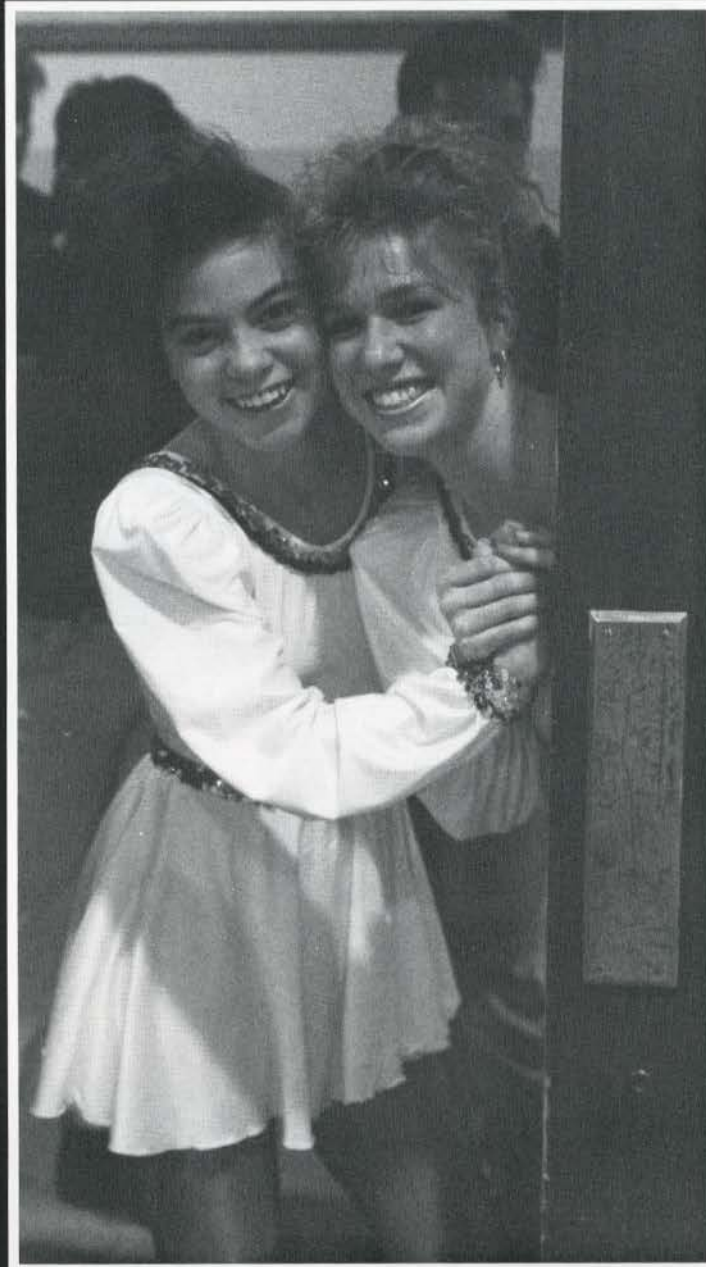
# *A Year Lost..*
