



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




A Christmas Carol






The theatrical Indiana town during The Diviners, the mid 1930's, Buddy on by James becomes friends with a preacher, C.C. Showers.









The very warm day of May 16, saw more than 600 students graduate with the various degrees and honors they earned.





Jason Mink announced the winners of the answering machine, the walkman, and the other prizes that wouldn't fit in a business size envelopes.




















