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FACULTY, STAFF SUPPORT SOUGHT FOR FUND DRIVE

All faculty and staff members are being asked to contribute to Lindenwood's first Annual Fund Drive, a multifaceted campaign to raise \$500,000 in gifts from the board of directors, faculty and staff, alumni, the St. Charles community and friends of Lindenwood from beyond St. Charles County. Money from this year's campaign will be used for 1983-84 operating expenses and will establish the groundwork for annual fund drives in succeeding years.

In announcing details of the Annual Fund Drive, President James I. Spainhower emphasized that while every employee is being asked to make a voluntary contribution, Lindenwood realizes that not everyone is capable of giving because of personal obligations and current economic conditions. To aid faculty and staff members, payroll deduction cards will be enclosed with next week's paychecks so that contributions can be programmed over a 12-month period. All deductions are tax-deductible.

Dr. Spainhower said that strong support from faculty and staff members will demonstrate to the community Lindenwood's united commitment to begin eliminating unstable financial conditions that have plagued the institution for a number of years. Strong internal support also will lay the groundwork for raising additional money from other sources, such as the community and alumni groups, to achieve the \$500,000 goal.

The president pointed out that as little as \$2.10 per week, or a monthly payroll deduction of \$8.40, would raise nearly \$40,000 from Lindenwood's nearly 400 full and part-time employees. Spearheaded by a \$1,000 gift from Dr. and Mrs. Spainhower, several employees already have rallied to support the 1983 Annual Fund Drive. Staff employees have contributed several gifts of \$500 and \$1,000, while faculty members have given several gifts, one of which was a \$400 contribution.

This year's Annual Fund Drive will continue through June 30th. Individuals and committees are being named to spearhead other segments of the fund-raising campaign, with details to be announced in upcoming issues of "Communique."

COORDINATION URGED IN DEVELOPMENT EFFORTS

In an effort to coordinate all development and fund-raising activities, the Office of Development is asking all faculty and staff employees to notify it of any pending grant proposals or fund-raising endeavors. The office also requests that no fund raising of any kind should be initiated without prior consultation.

The Office of Development encourages proposals from all faculty and staff members, and it soon will be circulating proposal possibilities for consideration by faculty and staff members in specific areas of work, study and research.

COUNTRY'S TOP ANGLERS TO APPEAR AT LINDENWOOD

Some of the nation's top bass anglers will be on campus when Lindenwood presents its second Bass Fishing Techniques Institute, February 11, 16 and 23 and March 2 from 7:30-9:30 p.m.

Headlining the four-lecture event will be Roland Martin of Cleuwiston, FL, the holder of 17 national bass fishing championships and one regarded by many as "the world's best bass fisherman." Capturing the prestigious "Bass Angler of the Year" award a record of nine times, Martin ranks first among all-time money winners in bass fishing. At the February 11 session, he will discuss the art of fishing strange lakes, fishing during extreme conditions, such as high and low water levels, and catching a limit through versatility.

Appearing February 16 will be Randy Fite of Conroe, TX, an angler acknowledged as America's leading expert on the use of electronic fishing equipment. Qualifying seven times for the Bassmaster Classic of the United States, Fite will discuss how to use electronic equipment to locate more bass. He also will explain how the chart recorder can assist the serious bass angler.

The instructor on February 23 will be Roger Moore of Branson, MO, a three-time Missouri professional bass champion. He will discuss how to select fishing tackle, from rods to boats; the use of ultra-light equipment for more bass; lures with light fishing lines; and "Solving the Mysteries of Clear Water Lakes."

Appearing at the final session, March 2, will be Rick Clunn of Montgomery, TX, the nation's number two all-time money winner in bass fishing. A two-time world champion, he is the only angler to win in two consecutive years the Bassmaster Classic, a three-day fishing contest featuring 40 of the country's top bass anglers. He will discuss the overall organization of bass fishing for better success, how to locate bass during the four seasons and how to establish fishing patterns for large and small-mouth bass

The eight hours of presentations will include actual casting demonstrations, audio-visual showings and question-and-answer periods. The cost for the four weeks of instruction is \$42. Enrollment is limited so those interested in attending are urged to make reservations early. Several of Gwendolyn Brooks' works are on a three-day reserve in the Butler Library as well as photocopies of biographical articles about the internationally renowed poet. The Chicago poet, winner of the 1950 Pulitzer Prize for her poetic portrait of the black urban poor, makes a special appearance at Lindenwood February 11 to open a series of events for the institution's observance of Black History Week, February 13-19. From 9-10 a.m. in the MAB Parlor, she will lead a discussion on the importance of studying Afro-American history, culture and literature during an event sponsored by the Coalition for Black Students. From 4-5 p.m. in Butler Hall's English Lounge, she will conduct a creative writing workshop, sponsored by the Griffin Society. And, at 7:30 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre, Ms. Brooks will present a selected reading of her poetry, followed by a reception in her honor in the MAB Parlor. The day's activities, all of which are available free-of-charge to everyone, are being supported by a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities, Inc., the Missouri-based organization of the National Endowment for the Humanities.
