In January, America found itself engaged in its largest military action since the Vietnam War.

United States' General
Norman Schwartzkopf lead the twenty-eight member U.N. force in the effort to free the country of Kuwait from Iraqi leader Saddom Hussein's control. The American people showed support for our soldiers and a high sense of patriotism. The high technology of today al-
