'The Wedding Bandit' to make world premiere at Lindenwood

The theatre program at Lindenwood University will produce a world premiere work, "The Wedding Bandit," which was translated by and directed by Lindenwood alumna Hsiu-Lu Lin, of Taiwan, Republic of China.

The play will be performed at 8 p.m. on Oct. 29, 30 and 31 at Lindenwood's Jelkyl Theatre in Roemer Hall. Tickets are available in the Lindenwood box office, at 949-4878 between 1 and 6 p.m. on Mondays through Thursdays and between 1 and 5 p.m. on Fridays. Lindenwood students will be admitted for free.

Based on an ancient Chinese

novel, the original script was written by Yao I Wei, the foremost Asian dramatist of his generation, who died in 1997. That script was never produced. The story revolves around a wealthy bride-to-be; her fiance, a powerful but cowardly general; her poor suitor, who still hopes to win her hand, and an infamous bandit, Sun Fe Hwu, who plots to kidnap her on her wedding day.

Hsiu-Lu Lin, who earned a master of fine arts degree in theatre from Lindenwood in May of this year, sought to combine eastern and western theatre traditions on stage while addressing an issue common

to all humankind – the issue of who we are.

Lou Brock addresses LU students at Leadership Experience


Baseball Cardinal Hall-of-Famer Lou Brock played his familiar role as leadoff hitter at Lindenwood University's Leadership Experience. The Leadership Experience kicked off the school year at Lindenwood as outstanding college students of all academic classes gathered from around the country to learn about and celebrate the art and science of leadership. The event was made possible because of a unique partnership with the Boy Scouts of America – Greater St. Louis Council, the Leadership Center at Lindenwood and students in the Lindenwood American Humanics program.

The Leadership Experience is an idea conceived by Lindenwood President Dennis Spellmann and Leadership Center Director Brian Watkins. Spellmann said the purpose of the Experience was to "build character, instill values and foster the development of our future community leaders."

Watkins noted that a capacity of more than 70 students participated in the four-day, three-night event. Applicants included Bright Flight scholarship winners, residential student advisors, Dean's List recipients and student organization officers.

The Experience took place at the beautiful, yet rugged, S-F Boy Scout Ranch near Farmington, Mo. On opening night, Lou Brock and his wife, Jacqueline, shared stories about their lives to illustrate their message on "Crossing the Line to Success." Other speakers included leaders from the government, business and nonprofit sectors; some discussion topics included Leadership and Change, Group Dynamics and Entrepreneurial Leadership. In a refreshing blend of academics and adventure, students participated in hands-on team-building activities, including the challenging low ropes course at the ranch.

Watkins said the Leadership Experience is in keeping with the purpose of the newly designed Leadership Center: "To bring out the best in our students and prepare them for leadership in life."

Each Experience registrant also enrolled in a co-ed Explorer Post, a leadership program offered by the Boy Scouts of America that engages youth in high adventure activities aimed at building character, trust, responsibility and leadership.
