




The sophomore, junior, and senior players were excited to beat Fontbonne College twice. They enjoyed defeating their former coach's new team.


The team compiled a record of 15-10. Home games were played at St. Charles High School.

Good Job



Satisfying Season












Each job has a set salary of \$4.00 per hour. After the ten hour week, signed time sheets are handed in and immediately deducted from that student's tuition.


People Change



The Soviet Exchange Program began in the Spring of 1989 when a group of fifteen students from Lindenwood visited Moscow, Leningrad, and Azerbaijan over the course of two weeks. In November 1989, fifteen students from the University of Baku came from halfway around the world to see Lindenwood. In a short ten days, those foreign students seemed as close as next-door neighbors. Although they liked their Pepsi hot and their strictly continental breakfast cold (they just said nyet to our bacon and eggs), we shared the mutual goal of peace and understanding of cultures beyond our own. Everyone at Lindenwood was amazed to see the Azerbaijani's bright faces and hoped to receive a small souvenir (which the students brought by the suitcase). There were pins and pioneer scarves, albums of their national music, Russian chocolate, and a national Azerbaijani silk scarf or two.

Members of the Soviet Exchange Project took the Azerbaijanis on field trips such as Cakohia Mounds, the Arch, and a special shopping spree at Walmart. The Soviets especially likes pizza at Pio's and crashing a wedding ceremony in St. Louis' Old Cathedral (downtown). Tearful goodbyes marked the end of the Azerbaijani's stay in St. Charles, but soon another delegation will travel to Baku in August or September of 1990. There the exchange of songs and smiles will begin again, halfway around our little Earth. - Sophia Wehmer




Spring Break '90


