\$1 Million Federal Loan to Renovate Dormitories

A \$1 million federal loan has been granted The Lindenwood Colleges to renovate dormitories.

The loan is from the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development's college-housing loan program.

Of the 68 colleges and universities across the nation to receive such loans during the year, only Lindenwood will be awarded money for the rehabilitation of dormitories, rather than the construction of new ones, said a spokesman for Rep. Harold L. Volkmer, D-Hannibal.

The Colleges will use the money to renovate Sibley, Ayres, Niccolls, and Irwin halls, said Rick Scott, director of financial resources.

McKay Recruits for Fall '81

Once again a new school year has started and The Lindenwood Colleges are preparing for the 1981-82 academic year. It would seem a long way off for many but to Dr. Bob McKay, Admissions Director, no time is too early.

Camilla Cave Honored by U. of Kansas

Camilla Luther Cave received a Distinguished Service Citation from the University of Kansas and its Alumni Association on May 17 at commencement. This award, the highest of all awards given at the University is presented in recognition of her service to her fellow man and her unrelenting career achievements.

Since 1946, 246 persons have been honored with this prestigious award. The nominations are solicited from faculty and alumni, while the final selections are made by a secret committee of nine alumni and three members of the KU faculty.

Camilla, a Lindenwood student from 1929-1931, pursued her life's work in her home town of Dodge City, Kansas. After graduating from the University with a bachelor's degree

in education in 1933 she began to devote her time to the welfare of her community and the world of the arts.

Her contributions are countless. But to name a few she has been a delegate to the World Crafts Council a member of the board of the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies, the Mid-America Arts Alliance, former president of the Kansas Arts Commission, The Association of Community Arts Councils of

Kansas, the Southwest Kansas Art Association and founder of the Dodge City Area Arts Council. Her achievements in other local and state endeavors could go on and on.

An art judge, a soloist in community choruses, an exhibitor, a dancer, a play director and a Girl Scout leader. Camilla is an inspiration to everyone.

Lindenwood is proud to salute a former student and mother of a former student.



LC Merit Awards for Barklage, Hamill

Dorothy Barklage and Dorothy Hamill were this year's Alumni Merit Award recipients. The two were honored at graduation, May 24.

Dorothy Barklage has a long history of service to Lindenwood starting in 1946 as secretary of the Director of Guidance. She left in 1950 to raise a

family, but returned in 1960 to the Admissions Office. She headed the Office of Dean of Students and Placement, the Office of Continuing Education and Placement and the Office of Alumni Affairs and Placement until 1976. Dorothy also earned a B.A. degree from Lindenwood in 1973.

Barbara Hamill graduated from Lindenwood in 1932 with a major in Home Economics.

She helped organize the Lindenwood Alumni Club in Oklahoma City and inspired publication of the cook book, *Quick Cooks*. Barbara has served on the Alumni Council and was President from 1966-1970. In 1970 she was elected to the Board of Directors of The Lindenwood Colleges.

In 1981 she will complete 20 years of service to our Colleges.

LC Mourns Death of Null

A great loss to the Lindenwood community occurred recently when Florence Null died just prior to her 94th birthday. She had been Lindenwood's oldest living alum until this time.

Mrs. Null graduated from Lindenwood College in 1905 and remained a St. Charles resident. She was a special member of the college community, as she was active in the Alumnae Association, serving two terms as the president. In 1964, Mrs. Null was awarded an Alumnae Certificate of Merit in recognition of her service and loyalty to Lindenwood.

Among her many achievements, she was: national president of Eta Upsilon Gamma sorority (1912); charter mem-

ber of St. Charles chapter of P.E.O., a national educational philanthropic organization; Sunday School Superintendent, Christian Endeavor Sponsor, and Christmas Pageant Director of the St. Charles Presbyterian Church.

Most recently, Mrs. Null donated her time to many activities at the George M. Null Elementary School in St. Charles. This school was named for her late husband
