SERVICES HELD FOR DEAN EMERITUS CROZIER

Memorial services were held yesterday afternoon at the St. Charles Presbyterian Church for Doris B. Crozier of St. Charles, dean emeritus, who died January 28 of an apparent heart attack at the age of 68. A native of Burlington, VT, she was a 1935 graduate of Trinity College and held an M.A. degree from New York University and an L.H.D. degree from St. Joseph's College.

Following Lindenwood's switch to coeducational status, she joined it in 1972 as Dean of the College for Women, serving in the position until 1979. She retired in 1980 after being named dean emeritus in 1979 and serving one year as an associate professor of sociology.

Prior to the Lindenwood appointment, Miss Crozier was dean at Kenyon College from 1969-72, assistant to the president at Chatham College from 1964-69 and an assistant professor of anthropology at Danbury State College from 1961-64. During her lifetime, she held several teaching positions in Germany and traveled to more than 30 countries throughout the world. From 1958-61, she served as an advisor to the Cambodian government and is credited with helping to establish the country's first teachers' college.

Listed in the 1971 edition of Who's Who Among American Women, she was a member of the American Anthropological Association, the Trinity College Board of Trustees, the American Association of University Women, the St. Charles Community Council and the Higher Education Coordinating Council of Metropolitan St. Louis.

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ACTING DIRECTOR NAMED FOR CAP CENTER

Susan E. Toben of Ballwin has been named acting director of Lindenwood's Consolidated Advising Plan (CAP) Center. A 1981 graduate of the University of Missouri-Columbia, she holds a B.S. degree with a major in marketing and distributive education.

Prior to joining Lindenwood, she served as an inspector for the St. Louis County Department of Health & Medical Care and as a student teacher at Parkway South Senior High School in Manchester. Certified as a teacher/coordinator of high school cooperative education, Ms. Toben placed high school students in occupations based upon career and skill evaluation in her capacity with the Parkway district. She also developed and implemented management, training and evaluative procedures for cooperative on-the-job and in-class training, and, in a vocational rehabilitation practicum, conducted occupational skills and personality inventories for career assessment and placement. She is a member of the American and Missouri Vocational associations and the National Association of Distributive Education Teachers.

LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE MEMBERS NAMED

Fourteen members representing community, student, faculty, alumni and board interests have been appointed to Lindenwood's Long-Range Planning Committee. The 16-member group is charged with (1) redefining and sharpening Lindenwood's statement of mission and purpose in light of its past 20 years of history, (2) establishing immediate and long-range goals and (3) recommending organizational changes to meet such goals to the Lindenwood Board of Directors.

The committee is composed of area citizens Alfred Fleishman, president emeritus of Fleishman-Hillard, Inc., St. Louis, and the Rev. Robert R. McGruther of the St. Charles Presbyterian Church; alumni Eric Stuhler of St. Charles and Gail Griffin of Spanish Lake; students Vic Avellino of St. Charles and Earlene Hill of St. Louis; faculty representatives Joe Ancona of the Business Administration Department, Dr. Howard Barnett of the English Department, Nancy Polette of the Education Department and Rebecca Glenn of the LCIE; administrators Lawrence E. Elam, chief financial officer, and Dr. Aaron Miller, dean of faculty; and board members Jefferson L. Miller and Walter L. Metcalfe, Jr., both of St. Louis. Board Chairman Robert Hyland and President James Spainhower serve as cochairmen of the committee.

The committee is composed of the Subcommittee on Values, chaired by Hill with members Dr. Barnett and the Rev. McGruther; the Subcommittee on the Work Program, chaired by Metcalfe with members Ancona, Avellino and Glenn; the Subcommittee on the Resident College, chaired by Dr. Miller with members Griffin, Miller and Polette; and the Subcommittee on Non-Traditional Studies, Evening College & Graduate Offerings, chaired by Elam with members Fleishman and Stuhler. Appointed to various task forces on the subcommittees are Dr. Edith E. Graber of the Sociology Department; Edward D. Watkins, director of development; Dr. James F. Hood, acting associate dean of faculty; and Dr. Arlene Taich, director of the LCIE.

MARKETING SESSION SET FEBRUARY 22

"Marketing Your Degree" is the title of a half-day seminar for Lindenwood seniors on February 22 at 323 Roemer Hall. Sessions are scheduled from 12:30-3 p.m. and at 4:30-7 p.m. To be presented by William Savage & Associates, a St. Louis-based placement service, the sessions will examine preparing resumes, analyzing strengths, developing market plans, understanding recruiters, developing interviewing skills and learning how to follow through with prospects. Instructors are Susan Moore, manager of executive search for William Savage & Associates, and John Kaczmariski, senior personnel consultant for the firm. The seminar fee is \$40. The seminar fee includes a personalized critique of the student's resume.

CHINESE MOVEMENT, MEDITATION COURSE SET

T'ai Chi Ch'uan is an ancient form of Chinese movement and meditation that will be the subject of a 10-week course to be offered by the Leisure Learning Office on campus, February 15 through April 26. The noncredit course will be held on Tuesdays from 6:30-8 p.m. It will be taught by Keith Polette, technical director in the Department of Performing Arts, and will consist of a series of exercises, discussions and meditative techniques.

Exercises will consist of slow, predetermined and continuous circular movements that emphasize the harmony of breathing in ways that promote better movement, increase strength and stamina and improve coordination and circulation. Polette will discuss the philosophy behind T'ai Chi Ch'uan and demonstrate the practice of various meditative techniques. The fee for the 10 weeks of instruction is \$50, with a discount available to faculty and staff members. President James Spainhower will conduct convocations for students of the Evening College on February 8 and 10 at West Port Center beginning at 6 p.m. each night. The convocations are part of efforts to unite all Lindenwood students "to build a sense of a total college among its various components," Dr. Spainhower said. This week's addresses follow similar convocations to day students on campus last month and to Evening College students last week at the Mansion House Center. Similar ones are planned for Evening College students on campus and to students at the Lake St. Louis Center, the president said.

A FEW SEATS REMAIN FOR BASS FISHING INSTITUTE

A number of seats remain for Lindenwood's second annual Bass Fishing Techniques Institute, which opens Friday on campus. Featuring some of the country's top bass anglers, the institute continues from 7:30-9:30 p.m. February 16 and 23 and March 2. Headlining the opening session will be Roland Martin of Clewiston, FL, the holder of 17 national bass fishing championships and one regarded by many as "the world's best bass fisherman."

Other scheduled lecturers include Randy Fite of Conroe, TX, a seven-time qualifier for the Bassmaster Classic of the United States and one acknowledged as America's leading expert on the use of electronic fishing equipment; Roger Moore of Branson, MO, a three-time Missouri professional champion; and Rick Clunn of Montgomery, TX, a two-time world champion of the Bassmaster Classic. Martin and Moore are the first and second-place all-time money winners in bass fishing, respectively.

Cost for the session is \$42. Classes consist of lectures, audiovisual presentations, demonstrations and question-and-answer sessions. If you're interested in attending, act quickly and give Barbara Ludwig a call at extension #346.
