A New Computer Lab is On the Way!

Out with the old, in with the new. That's what will be happening to the old computer lab in Young Hall when it is moved to a new location in the Latzer Great Hall on the upper level of the Memorial Arts Building.

Associate Professor of Management,
Donald Babbitt, says the move will benefit
the students by providing more space. The
new computer lab will house approximately
15 Macintosh computers and 15 Personal
Computers. The new Macs will be, what
Babbitt called "Schizophrenic Macs," both
Mac and PC compatible.

The area will also serve as a study hall for students. Tables, chairs and couches will be set up so students can work together in groups without the fear of being too loud. Babbitt says the idea was to create a different, more relaxed setting than the library, where students have a place to congregate and work.

The lab is also designed to serve as an area for commuter and evening students to go before and after class. The lab will hopefully be up and running by the beginning of the school year. (They're waiting for the Schizophrenic Macs!)



A NEW BUILDING ON THE HORIZON

Behind the Harlen Hunter Stadium, at one time, for as far as the eye could see, were grassy fields. Now, all you'll see is dirt and concrete and by the time school begins, you'll see a steel superstructure. What you're looking at is the new Lindenwood College Performance Arena.

Ben Blanton, of Blanton Construction Co., says despite the rain in April the arena is progressing nicely. He hopes to have the structure under roof by the time bad weather hits in November and be able to work on the indoor portions of the building so students can have limited access to the structure. The hope is to have the Arena

completed by the end of next summer. The outside of the building will look much like Roemer Hall, with the gable style and pitched roofs. The inside of the Performance Arena will house a comprehensive sports and performing art center.

Lindenwood Lions basketball, volleyball and wrestling teams will call the building home, with the capacity to seat 3,000 fans. Room will also be provided for classrooms, dance/wrestling floor, equipment, training and locker rooms, a community room and conference rooms.



Returning Lindenwood students know the best ideas for a fun date that doesn't cost much and doesn't even need outside transportation are our own great Mainstage productions in Jelkyl Theatre, located in Roemer Hall. Each student is entitled to two free tickets for every performance, and this year's selection of plays is sure to be a hit with anyone you're really trying to impress.

"We're continuing our tradition of providing a diverse season, "says Bryan Reeder, Director of Theatre at Lindenwood. "We will have something for everyone - comedy, drama, classical, and musical - that will benefit the theatre students who are involved and it will benefit the audience, too, by getting them involved."

The shows feature Lindenwood students in a variety of roles, such as acting, set designing, and behind-the-scenes production. The majority of plays this year will be directed by graduate students.

The first performance after school starts will be *Everyman*, who represents all humanity and is called to make a reckoning with God. Of course, Everyman is totally unprepared and must call on his old reliable comrades to go with him. These old friends (money, friends, family) all leave him to face the music alone. "The audience will be surprised and have a great deal of fun with the allegorical people who will represent Everyman's comrades," says Reeder of the play.

Everyman will be held Sept. 22, 23, 24 at the newly refurbished Sibley Chapel at 7:30 pm.

The first performance in Jelkyl, Noises Off, is a rollicking contemporary farce that deals with the trials of a not so wonderful touring company. Act I has the actors rehearsing their play, Nothing On, and no one, from the director to the stagehands, really knows what's going on. The second act takes us backstage to watch the madhouse that the production has become. And Act III shows us how the play has deteriorated while touring. "Audiences get two plays in one because each actor plays two parts, the actors in the play inside the play," says Reeder. "It's physical, slapstick humor that audiences love."

Noises Off will run Oct. 12,13,14, 19,20, 21 at 8:00 pm and Oct. 15 at 2:00 pm. The play was written by Michael Frayn and will be directed by third year MFA student Jennifer Forest.

A Christmas Carol returns for another year to the Lindenwood campus with what Reeder calls "a special gift to the community for all the support we receive from the community. This year we continue the tradition of this beloved Yuletide classic with something different - tradition with a twist. We think the Ghost of Christmas Future will take everyone by surprise." And a surprise it will remain because Reeder isn't letting anyone in on the secret. Reeder

does say though, "The technical effects will be dazzling!"

Charles Dickens' novel takes us on a long night's travel through time with the most famous skinflint of all time, as he visits the past, present, and the future, and of course, discovers the true meaning of Christmas. A family tradition for many families, A Christmas Carol will be presented Nov. 30, Dec. 1, 2, 7, 9, at 8:00 PM and Dec. 2, 3, at 2:00 pm. It will be directed by Jeff Corriveau.

In February, Lindenwood's Mainstage presents Enter a Free Man, by Tom Stoppard. "This is Stoppard's second play," Reeder points out, "written after the success of his hugely popular first play, Rosencrantz and Gildenstern are Dead." It is a comedy / drama that revolves around Riley, a dreamer with all sorts of off-beat inventions and his latest one is a double-gummed envelope that can be used twice: one for sending and once more for reply. His daughter, whose job it seems to be to support her father, is running away to marry a motorcyclist. But even this matters little to Riley, even as his dreams continue to burst in his face.

Stoppard is one of Britain's most loved authors and Enter a Free Man "is a well-written play, somewhat serious, to round out this year's season," says Reeder. It will be directed by graduate student Jeff David. Presentations are Feb. 15, 16, 17, 22, 23, 24 at 8:00 pm, and Feb. 18 at 2:00 pm.

Starting new traditions is almost a tradition in itself at Lindenwood, and this season's Wild Card! promises to do just that. Performed at the Lindenwood Country Club, a surprise musical will focus on the performers by using a smaller, more intimate scale of production. Reeder expresses excitedly, "We're hoping to create an environment where the audience comes through the door and actually is part of the play. It will also create an excitement for our students, as we figure out new ways of set design and production capabilities. "The evening will also include food, merriment, and camaraderie for all.

Wild Cardl will be directed by Katherine Cuba and has its debut performance March 16, at 8:00 pm, with additional performances March 17, 18, 23, 24, and 15, also at 8:00 pm.

Rounding out the Mainstage season will be the restoration comedy *The Relapse* by John Vanbrugh. The restoration period of comedy dates back to the 1600's, after the Puritans relinquished the throne back to Charles II. The Puritans had banned comedies, and the British "restored the theatre" Fairly liberal for their time, restoration comedies

Incoming freshmen, transfer and returning students are encouraged to visit the Student Development Office, located on the first floor of Butler Hall. There, Lindenwood students are offered the tools for success through the Talent Accomplishment Program (TAP).

TAP Helps Establish Your "Running Resume"

The TAP begins for the student once application to Lindenwood has been initiated. In addition to helping the student academically, socially, physically, and spiritually, the program also prepares the individual for a vocation. TAP helps the student recognize their talents and interests, explores career options, establishes a "running resume," and utilizes the individual's skills, community involvements, and talents to establish career goals, and identify needs and objectives.

Tutoring Available Through The TAP

Located on the third floor of Butler Hall, the TAP Learning Center is designed to offer tutoring in all academic areas to the undergraduate population at Lindenwood.

Tutoring is available for the most commonly taken general education courses and the Math and English refresher courses. Assigned mandatory English tutoring and peer paper reviews are conducted in the Learning Center as well. The TAP Learning Center also provides unique learning experiences for

the peer tutors and coordinators who participate.

"Talent Transcripts" Help Lead To Jobs


Many graduating seniors are profiled in the College's annual LIONetwork Talent Transcript book, which is distributed to area corporations and business leaders.

The catalogue is composed of "Talent Transcripts," which are resumes of students' extracurricular activities and accomplishments.

"The Talent Transcript is designed to complement the student's academic transcript," Ed Watkins, Lindenwood consultant and creator of the concept, said. "It gives prospective employers a more accurate picture of what the student is all about: his or her community involvement, club activities, etc. This information, combined with the official record of the

Representatives from more than 50 large and small companies met with Lindenwood students, exchanging information and job-hunting tips.


According to Pundmann, the College's Second career fair was a big success. Many students heard from the employers who were involved, and were quickly placed in full or part-time jobs, or internships.



Football Program: New Leader, New Beginning

Dan Kratzer inherits a program that has enormous potential at Lindenwood College and a very young football team that was 2-8 last season. After building a strong program at Hastings College, Kratzer plans to bring the type of recruiting effort and work ethic to Lindenwood that has put Hastings in the national playoffs three straight years after never having been there before.

"We are very excited about the 1995 season. It will earmark the start of a new era of Lindenwood football and it will be very challenging," Kratzer said. The Lions will play the #1 ranked team and defending national champion Westminster (PA), the #3 ranked team University of Findlay (OH), and #8 Trinity University. To make matters even more difficult, all three games against these nationally-ranked teams are on the road. "The schedule will be a challenge of challenges, but I look forward to playing such fine teams which will show everyone where we are and what we'll need to do in the future to mirror programs of this caliber," he said.

The squad will have some key skill people returning in QB Corey Nesslage, WR Mario Patton and RB Alvino Giles. The offensive sees Justin Meeks and Doug Kerr returning to anchor the line.

"The 1995 recruiting class may have been the best I've ever been associated with. Hard work, hours, and persistence will pay off as the freshmen class of 1995 gains necessary experience for the future. The key for this season will be the play of our offensive and defensive lines. Their development will be watched closely and early progress can spell success. Careful development of young athletes blended in with some mature leadership will get us started in the right direction."

Optimistic Outlooks for Soccer Teams

For the second straight year, the Lindenwood women's soccer team made it back to the national tournament. This was the sixth trip in the last 12 years.

The Lady Lions finished the regular season with a 19-2-1 and were ranked seventh in the final national standings. The team set a new school record with 84 goals scored while allowing just 10.

Kelly Bowen, Lynn Naeger, Jamie Casillas and Caryn Chasteen were Honorable Mention All-Americans while Cindy Scheffer and Jennifer Siess both were named All-America Scholar-Athletes. Siess was picked as the recipient of the prestigious A.O. Duer Award presented by the NAIA and also recieved a national Shelter Scholarship award for maintaining a 4.0/4.0 through her first three years at Lindenwood while taking part in intercollegiate athletics.

Head Coach Tim Champion is in his second year at the helm of the Lady Lion soccer team.

The outlook for the 1995 men's soccer program is an optimistic one. The Lions return a solid nucleus of experienced players and as a result of a strong recruiting year have added a number of fine student-athletes to the squad that went 14-7-2 under first year head coach Carl Hutter.

The Lions entered the post season tournament last year looking to continue with the strong play of the late season. The team won in the first two rounds before falling to the #1 seed Columbia College. Freshmen Kurt Reinheimer and Willy Nymo were named to the American Midwest First-Team All-Conference, sophomores John Hylla and Randy Schaberg along with junior Chad Middleton were second team picks. Hylla was also named to the NAIA All-Midwest second team, while Nymo received NSCAA third team honors. With these returning performers plus the new recruits, Hutter is looking forward to an even stronger year.

"Our schedule is a big reason for our recruiting success. We compete against a very competitive number of regional and local teams and we look forward to the challenge," Hutter said.



Harrier Squads Looking For Another Strong Season

The 1994 men's and women's cross country teams capped off another successful season. The men's team opened the season by winning the Lion's Invite for the fourth consecutive year, and then finished strong by winning the Midwest Regional Championship. The women's team, in a rebuilding year, placed third at the opening meet and continued to improve all season by placing in the top four all season.

The 1995 version of the Lion and Lady Lion teams appears to be an exciting one. Both teams will open the season with experience. The men's team returns 13 runners while the women return all seven runners. Due to a very good recruiting season, both teams have added great quality and depth. The men's team will be the pre-season pick to repeat as the Midwest Regional Champions. "The men's team will be very strong and competitive and will be in a position to be a national powerhouse," head coach Gary White said. "The team should be ranked in the top ten teams in the nation."

The women's team looks as though they are ready to make their own run towards a Midwest Regional title. "The women are returning all the runners from last year plus the quality of the recruits should allow the team to make a move into the top 20 in the nation," White said.

Gary White is entering his sixth year as head cross country coach for the Lion and Lady Lion squads.


Reeder also reminds students, staff, and faculty that to receive their two free tickets, they need to show their student I.D. cards at the box office from two weeks up to performance time.

Historic Chapel Gets New Look

Sibley Chapel, located in Sibley Hall, has been renovated and refurbished. A replica of the original organ is currently being restored and will be delivered for the chapel's grand opening this fall. Once this happens, the chapel will once again be a showcase for music, theatre, dance and lectures.

The chapel/performance hall was originally built during the construction of the north wing in 1887, and has been used for church services, musical recitals, and small theatrical performances.

Through the years, modifications have been made to the chapel, but this is the first time in its history that a complete renovation has been undertaken. At the advice of acoustical engineers, the chapel will retain its wooden floor, because wood enhances the sound of organ music. Thanks to many generous Lindenwood friends, quite a few of the original wrought iron and wood chairs have been donated back to the College and are being refurbished.

The Chapel was dedicated May 19 in honor of Dorothy DuQuoin Warner, Lindenwood College alumna, for her generous commitment to the arts and her dedication to higher learning.

Members of the Fine and Performing Arts division are especially excited as they will produce a series of concerts and productions in the space. In conjunction with college productions, Lindenwood will schedule professional groups to perform in the intimate 125-seat space. First up will be the Metro Winds Quintet, featuring Robert Carter, assistant professor of music, on September 17.
