LINDENWOOD RECEIVES MONSANTO GIFT

The Lindenwood Colleges has received an unrestricted gift of \$25,000 from the Monsanto Foundation in St. Louis. The award will be used for general operating expenditures, and is not a part of the institution's current 1983 Annual Funds Drive. According to President James I. Spainhower, "the gift represents Monsanto's expression of confidence in the direction Lindenwood is taking." The Monsanto Foundation has a record of support for the 156-year-old institution.

SPAINHOWER TO ATTEND ECS MEETING

President Spainhower is among area dignitaries invited to attend Friday's meeting of the Educational Commission of the States (ECS) at the University Club Building in University City. Comprised of representatives of state governments, the ECS was founded in 1966 as an organization to coordinate educational studies among state governments and to serve as a lobbying group in Congress for state educational concerns. A former state representative and treasurer, Dr. Spainhower is a past Missouri delegate to the ECS.

The February 18 session will feature a keynote address by North Carolina Gov. James B. Hunt, Jr., national ECS chairman. It also will include remarks by St. Louis County Executive Gene McNary and Missouri Rep. Gary D. Sharpe.

EXECUTIVE MBA PROGRAM APPROVED FOR LCIE

The LCIE has received approval to implement the Executive MBA program in a full-time format for working adults. Intensive weekly seminars combined with independent study will yield nine semester hours of credit each trimester. With class size limited to no more than 10 students to allow for interaction and discussion, the program is restricted to students with prior work experience of three years at the management level and undergraduate business coursework.

"The program will attract the manager who wishes to pursue studies in a more intensive and personalized manner than those available in the traditional college setting," said Patrick Land, coordinator for LCIE business programs. "Our MBA students will be highly motivated, career-oriented individuals with significant working experience," he said. "Currently, there is no other program in the metropolitan area which offers a full-time MBA geared specifically for the working adult. The full-time aspect of the program is important because it allows the student to become involved intensely in the learning and using of new information immediately. This combination of theoretical learning and direct application is the cornerstone of LCIE programs in general," he added.

With summer classes beginning May 14, the Executive MBA program will be available at LCIE facilities on campus and at the St. Louis LCIE Regional Center in Clayton. Applications are being accepted now for the program. Offered by the Leisure Learning Office, the noncredit course will cover how to write book reviews, how the publishing industry operates and how to get reviews into print. 1937 AWARD-WINNING FILM TO BE SHOWN FRIDAY

Jean Renois' 1937 award-winning film, "Grand Illusion," will be shown at 7 p.m. Friday in the Young Auditorium. Free to all students, it is sponsored by the Lectures & Concerts Committee as part of this semester's "Art of Film" series. Concerning three French prisoners and their escape from German officials during World War I, the film contains magnificent performances by Jean Gabin, Erich von Stroheim and Pierre Fresnay. Containing English subtitles, it has received numerous film awards, including one as one of the 12 "Best Films of All-Time" at the Brussels Film Festival in 1957. The short Polish animated film, "Shadows of Time," also will be shown. A discussion of both films will follow the showings.

Lindenwood's diagnostic and tutorial reading program for elementary school children has been expanded to serve junior and senior high school students in St. Charles County. Presented by the Leisure Learning Center, the noncredit course will be held on Wednesdays from 7-9 p.m., this week through March 9. Participants will use the fantasy-guided imagery technique to explore the potential of the mind and to discover ways of applying its power to athletic pursuits. It will be instructed by John T. Shaffer, D.Min., an LCIE adjunct professor and a certified pastoral counselor who has developed a unique imaging process for enhancing relaxation and wellness.

In the course, attention will be given to better integrating the functions of the right and left hemispheres of the brain, participating in mental exercises that complement physical training and learning to use "perfect-practice" sessions.
