Very fine day- fandango at Gov. Narbona's in honour of the conquest of St. Juan d. Uluo. It is Reported that 9 Beaths have occured in Town since yesterday Morning-

Monday 2d.

Another very fine day- the Americans gave a fandango to night, at the Govrs. House, in compliment to the Recent victory &c.

Wrote to Gov. Narbona & Sent him a Map &c. See file, also Sent him \$21. to pay for the hire of his Mules &c. - fine day.

Another fine day- the Mail went off at Sunset-

MS. cool and cloudy- turned out a fine day- The Measles has been in Town for the last 10 days, & many are down with it-

Mr. Ward & Mr. Floyd arrd. from the Passo-Sunday 8th.

fine day- Wrote to P. Baillio, & Jnº. S. Davis- great Stir in town catching Thieves and Housebreakers-

Friday 13th.

A most delightful day- The Mail arrd, at 1 P. M: no news of importance.

Still another very fine day- a funeral of a Child in afternoon The Measles very bad in town

Tuesday 17th.

It Snowed a very little, late last night- the ground just coveredthe morning fair and pleasant and the day- proved a very fine one two burials to day- one of a grown person- the other of an Infant- born prematurely, in consequence of its mother (Senora Baca) having the Measles-

### Wednesday 18th.

Morning cloudy & Showing-Bargained with a Er. Bempsey of Missouri; for 3 Mules to be delivered immediately at Taus to Capt' Brannin, for which I agree to give him an order for one of the 5 Waggons & Gears now in Missouri, or if the Waggons are Sold, to pay him \$30 a piece for the Mules-

The Mules to be good ones or not to be Received .- Walker & Reynolds come down from Taus this Morning- pleasant day-

Thursday 19th. January

The Morning cloudy & warm. It began to Snow abt. 12, & cond. abt.

2 Hours- Snow 4 Inches deep the day moderately coolFriday 20th. January.

a fine pleasant day, the' much colder than usual.

The People continue to die with Measles & fever &c.

Saturday 21t. January.

Very fine pleasant morning- Bot. 2 Mules for \$70 .- But the Man

Rued & took one back- He left the best, & took \$30 for it- the day

Sunday 22d.

The Morning cloudy & Snowing- abt. 2 Inches of Snow has fallen Since midhight- there were two burials to day; One in the Morning of a Grandson of Gov. Baca's 6 or 7 years of age- & one in the evening of a Poor Lad.- the day cold & fine-

It is Said that many persons are ill in Town, & this evil is augmented by a Quack Doctor who has Recently located himself here, from Kentucky-

# Monday 23d. January.

A. Mr: Young with whom Benjamin Robinson (one of my Men) went out Trapping in Novr. arrived here Testerday, and Reports that Robinson died of Sickness before they had got out of the Settlements-

I am Resolved to Send Six of the Men in to Missouri, and to Start them about the 10<sup>th</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup>. February- and I am providing Mules for them to Ride & Pack (two for each)- There are abundant Reasons, and good ones, for this Step- It will save considerable expense for one thing- and afford better means of proceeding in the Spring with our Work- Engaged to day writing Letters &c. M<sup>6</sup>. cold and fair- the day cont<sup>d</sup>. fair & cold-

Tuesday 24th. January.

This is my dear Wife's birth day- God bless & preserve her; & may She live to enjoy many more happy years.

The morning <u>sold</u> and fair. Walker & Reynolds, Started back to Taus; they took one Mule with them, that I bot. from Mr. Switzler-Mr: Young took another for me, a White one that Mr. Stanley bot. for me-on Saturday for \$30:-

The Morning fair & pleasant the day a very fine one Funeral of an Ind. child- Busy writing all day, and till after midnight

Thursday 26th. January.

A very fine morning- funeral of Juan Baca's oldest child, a Daughter, at 10 0'Clk:- the child died Might before last of Bysentery after the Measles- the family very much afflicted- The Corpse was very Richly dressed and carried above the heads of the People Standing upright the procession was a very long one chiefly composed of the most Respectable Inhabitants, many of whom marched in front of the Body, carrying lighted Tapers and wreaths of Flowers- The Priest was dressed in his Richest Robes and the whole moved with a Solemn pace Several Voices Singing and Several Violins playing- The day was fair & pleasant

A very light Snow last Night Morning cold and cloudy- The day Raw & unpleasant Two funerals to day.

I was indisposed all day- the Mail arrd. in the evening Sunday 29th.

Two Letters to the Same, advising them of my having Sold three of our Waggons now in Missouri to T: H: Boggs & Mr. Dempsey, including the Harness belonging to them, for Nine Mules that I have Recd. from them-In case the Waggons are Sold before these orders are presented Boggs is to be pd. \$210 and Dempsey \$90 in full for their Mules, in Cash-These Letters are deld. open; one to Boggs & the other to Dempsey-One Letter to the Same principally on the Same Subject, and advising them to Retain the two Waggons Nos. 4 and 6- and to bring them out with them in Spring- That Boggs & Dempsey are to Receive the Waggons as they find them without any allowance for common Wear and Tear-4th. Another Lr. to the Same, in Relation our official affrs. generallyadvise them not to bring out any other Men than the Six I Send in -(Brannin- Pyles- Barbee- Walker, Vaugh and Reynolds) give my opinion that the \$30,000 will be enough, if we use proper economy- That men enough may be hired here in the Spring on good terms- that the Horses now in Missouri Should all be Sold, & that Mules only Shd. be brought out in Spring- That I have promised the Men who go in, that they Shall

fine Morning- finished my private Journal up to & including this day, the last page is 75- This Jl. and another of 100 pages from the Notes of my Journey from St. Louis to Ste. Fee, from 22d. June to 30th. Nov. I enclosed to Mrs. Sibley.

Tuesday 14th. Feby.

In addition to the Letters already noted: I have to day written 1 to Cols: Reeves & Mather, to ay that I have Sent them 12 Mules and 2 Horses & List of which, with the Saddles, Bridles, Ropes, bags &c.

who go in- I also advised them that I Shall not Sell the Waggon No. 1 but Return it; a that I have told Mr. Baillio that if either of the Waggons, No. 4 or No. 6 Shd. be Sold in Missouri, he Shall have the Refusal of it at a fair price if not otherwise previously engaged.

### Thursday 16th. Feby.

fine day- This MS. I wrote to Cols: Reeves & Mather by Mr. Baillio, to advise them that I have this day drawn on Tracy & Wahrendorff for \$128 for P: Baillio \$70 on acct. of Jno. S. Davis & \$58 on acct. Wm. J. William's Wages that I had arranged with Mr. Baillio to take one of the Waggons, No. 4 or No. 6, at a fair Price to be Settled here with him, as in Payt. for Wheat &c. Mext Summer- I Wrote also to Tracy & Wahrendorff advising them of my Dft: &c. and informing them that I have entered into a copartnership with Baillio to carry on the Wool Trade, & think he, Baillio, Starts to day for St. Louis to procure necessary Goods, which he may apply to them for, & they may furnish if they choolee, upon my credit, understanding clearly the Situation of my Affairs &c.- Mr. Baillio & I Signed a Memo. contS. the terms of the New Copartnership, which is to be Styled "Sibley & Baillio"- &s. Pd. Baillio \$55 on acct. in Gash- At 11 Mr. B: Started, to overtake the party pretty well equipped for the Journey-

In the evening, a Spaniard found & brought back the Runaway Mule, & I immediately "tarted Thorp off to overtake the Party & deliver the Mule to Capt: Brannin- Thorp Returned ab. Midnight & "eported that he overtook the party ab. 15 Miles on the Road encamped- I directed him to tell Capt: Brannin to deliver the Mule to Col: Reeves, with the others & to explain to him ab. it running off & being found &c.

Thorp Says Mr. Baillio Requested him to bring him a Vial of Laudanum that he forgot, & which he may Suffer much for the want of .-Friday 17th.

Thorp Started early this MS. to take the Laudenum to Mr. Baillio, He Returned abt. 11 0 °Clk: P: M: & Says that he overtook them abt. 25 Miles from the Village going on Pretty well, tho the Snow is pretty deep & has a hard carst on it, but not quite hard enough to bear the Mules-He Says that Mr. Boggs has got the Sorrell Horse; but has no Mule to give

for him, that Capt: Bransin will Receive; & that in consequence, he expects to pay \$40 to Col: B- at Franklin for the Horse.

On his Return Thorp met 3 or 4 Men on their way to overtake the party- which will be about 22 Men Strong, when they all get together-I count upon their getting to Ft. Osage, about the 25th. of March-I have paid away the following Sums. Since I left Sta. Fee-

Tuesday 21t: Feby.

To day I bought a Saddle Bule from Senor Erstana for \$100 Cash- the price is high, but the Mule is very good- I want it to Ride on my Journey down the country, on which I am to Start in a day or two.

Wednesday 22d.

Settled to day with Davis in full, up to the 1t. of April. His work Since 1t. Nov". Amts. to about \$176 - He has been uncommonly industrious, & has worked early & late, & is as I think fairly entitled to

all he has made, deducting out of it his "ages Since 31. Octo". He has attended to his two Horses, & done other Services about the quarters &c. equivalent to the Am. of his Subsistence, which has been pd. him up to the 1. of April.

Davis is now dischd. from the Service of the Commers., & is pd. up in full, & owes them about \$40 - which I am to Settle for him- I have promised him that if he Shd. wish to Return to Missouri with us in July, that he may join the Party them as a hand if he chooses-

I have also exchanged my Yager, Powder Horn &c. with Davis for a certain Bay Horse colt that he left at my House (the Same that he got from Rothwell) on condition that I get the Colt on my Return homeIt is also understood, that if I want the Yager again, when I am Starting home, I am to have it, & then the bargain is annulled-

If I get the Colt, I am to have a New Snaffle Bridle with him that Davis left at my House, in the care of Betty, as he Says-

The Weather is now Mild & pleasant, & I am in hopes Capt: Brannin & his party are getting on well.

Thursday 23d. Feby. 1826.

Fine pleasant day- I walked over to the Village to meet 2 Men who were Sent to me from the Alcalde to Say, that he is Ready to Settle a Judg . Rendered by his predecessor ag . a Man who Stole Some Axes, &c., the detention of which pay . by this present Aled- Alcalde I had complained of- I Settled it with the Men, that the Alcalde is to pay the Judg . \$29, the day after tomorrow, to Mr. Brown- in default of which I will complain to the Gov.

I Sent word to the Alcalde that I expect him to investigate the facts in relation to a Man who Stole corn Some time Since, & that Remuneration will be looked for &c.

Friday 24th . 1826.

At a past 9 A. M: Started to Ste. Fee, & on my hourney to Sonora &

Chihuahua- On the Top of the Mountain Met Williams just Returning from his Trapping expedition, he Says he has hed good Success- An hour after dark got to Senor Diego Visnero's & Staid all night- fine day-

Started after Breakfast, pretty wealy- Arrived at Ste. Fee 2 Hours before Night very much fatigued & quite unwell, went to bed early- fine day

# Sunday 26th.

Cot up this morning wih a pain in my breast. The Cov<sup>r</sup>. Sent me over a Letter that had been enclosed to him from Mexico- it is from Mr. Poinsett, dated the 31<sup>t</sup>. Dec<sup>r</sup>. it acknowledges Rec<sup>t</sup>. of my L<sup>r</sup>. to him of 12<sup>th</sup>. Nov<sup>r</sup>., and informs me that he has "hitherto failed to induce the President of these States to take any part in the Survey of the proposed Road, until after we Shall have concluded our Treaty of limits. As there has been lately a change in the Administration, I have again Renewed the Regociation, and will inform you of the Result by the earliest opportunity. Your account of the Route is highly Satisfactory, and will I hope aid me to bring this affair to a favourable conclusion"

I was quite unwell all day, and did not call on the Governor, as I intended.

### Monday 27th.

I waited on the Gov<sup>r</sup>. this Morning with Mr. Beard for Interpreter, to enquire if he had Received any official intelligence from his Gov<sup>r</sup>. in Relation to the Road. He assured me that he had not heard a word, & appeared Surprised when, I told what Mr. Poinsetté had written to me.

Tuesday 28th. Feby.

fine day- Unwell Still- I hear Nothing by the Mail; So I give up my journey below, & Shall Return to Taus, to Stay as Soon as I arrange my affairs here, and get well enough to Ride- at present the pain in my breast would make it impossible for me to travel without great injury
Wednesday March 1t. 1826.

A most delightful Spring Morning- I am much better to day- engaged writing all day- Find out that my Servant Abram has been carrying on a pretty extensive game of thieving & Roguery here- Thorp has got on the track of Some of his theftsac. and the more he enquires and examines, the more he discovers; to get to the end of them Seems to be hopeless, & to Recover anything equally So- all that is left for it, is to punish the Villain as he deserves- fine day.

Thursday 211

The day is very pleasant- Sent Robinson's map to The Govr., as a present, having no further use for it, & it being not worth taking home- if offered for Sale it wd. not bring a Bollar here-

Friday 3d.

Sold a Black Horse to Mr. Ward for \$45- the weather Still fine.

Saturday 4th.

very busy all day writing and arranging my Papers & Accts. &c. I am Still unwell

Sunday 5th.

fine day- I wrote to Mr. Poinsett to day in answer to his LT. to me of 31t. Decr. See file . See this LT. to the Gov . & Requested him to

forw<sup>d</sup>. it to Mexico by the Mail which departs tomorrow, which the Gov<sup>r</sup>. Sent me word he will do- I am more unwell to day than I have been before, Since I came here. I had a pretty high fever last Night, & am by no means clear of it to day. The pain in my breast is also very troublesome Still- very fine day.

Monday 6th. Mch.

I fell much better this MS. and am determined to Set out today for Taus & to Start all my baggage &c.

Having packed up all my baggage, I put it in charge of Sen<sup>T</sup>. Vigil, who has engaged to Transport it up to Taus; at at & past Ten I mounted my Mule, and Set out for Taus, accompanied by Thorp- We Reached the Village of Ste. Cruz (25 Miles) just at SunSet, & Stopped at the Priest's who Received me with much politenesses kindness, & treated me with the utmost hospitality.

### Tuesday 7th. Mch:

I indulged myself in bed, 'till it was pretty late this ME. - When I arose, found a Bervant with "ater, Napkin &c. & after I had finished Washing, was Berved with a Cup of very fine, Rich chocolate- & in half an hour Breakfast was Ready-

I left the hospitable Priest's at & past 9, and felt every way
the better- The pain in my breast was only Slight, and I had no fever.I Rode Slowly, but Steadily, about 20 Miles to Senr. Lusaro's, and
halted for the day at 2 0.01k: I felt very unwell, & lay down on a
Mattress & went to Sleep, for an Mour- wedin I got up felt worse- directed Thorp to make me Some Coffee of which I drank a little, & felt
better- Went early to bed- very fine day, as was yesterday.

where he had gone with a Small party of Buffalo Hunters, and Reports that he fell in with about 100 Pawneses who Stripped him & his whole Party, of their Mules, Horses, Meat, Clothes, Arms, &c. & were Seriously inclined to kill them all- He Says that he knew Several of the Principal Men of the Party, having Seem them at Ft. Atkinson once- they knew him also, & Seturned him his Gun, but kept every thing else- He understood that another party of about 100 Men were gone down South towards the Settlements of Moro & San Miguel, with the view of driving

off Stock &c.- this Man did not know of the Puebla's having killed any of the Pawnees the other day, & he Supposes that the band he Met must ha have been ignorant of that affair too, otherwise they would Surely have killed him & all his Party- He means to Start to Ste. Fee tomorrow I Understand, to See The Gov. about this affair.-

Sen<sup>r</sup>. Lurio from whom I Rent the house I am in, informs me that he Shall want it very Soon, & that I may occupy his House in the Village-As this will be extremely inconvenient I Sent Thorp yesterday, to find another House, & he Reports, that a Sen<sup>r</sup>. Romano who lives at The Rancho, offers to Rent me a large House &c. Situated ab. a Mile & half lower down the Creek.

I walked down to look at the Tenement offered, & find that it will answer extremely well, & determine to move to it as Soon as I can.-

I wrote to Mr. Stanley on the 11th. to Say that I wished him direct Mr. Floyd to purchase for ms 20 breeding Jennets, & a Horse at the Passo, & to Sent them up to me here, by the middle of May.
Monday 13th. March.

Another fine day- busy preparing to Move.

Moved to day into the Houses Rented from Sen . Romaro-

In the evening Mr. Chambers called, & I took occasion to have the bargain between me & Romaro well explained- it is in Substance as follows- I am to have the use of the buildings, Forse Pen, & Basture ground belonging to the establishment, uninterrupted as long as I wish it, at the Rate of 110 p. Month-

# Friday 17th. March

a Very Windy & Stormy day- Sen . Romano called, & Requests me to Ride to The Ranch tomorrow morning, to arrange Something formal Respecting

the Rent &c. Having no interpreter at hand I could but imperfectly understand his meaning- I promised however, to bee him at the Rancho early tomorrow-

Saturday 18th.

After early Breakfast I Rode to the Ranch, abt. 4 Miles, accompanied by Thorp- I found Sen'r. Romaro at the Alcalde's, & he gave me to underatand, that his object was to have our bargain explained & put in form, before the Aldalde- I Sent for a Mr. Gordon, who lives in this Village, and who Speaks the Spanish Language pretty well, & employed him to interpret for me. After he had conversed Some time with Romaro & the Alcalde he informed me, that it was proposed to have a written contract drawn up by the Alcalde which would probably cost me about \$2- I immediately discovered that the plan was to get a fee out of me for the Alcalde; and I told them at once, that I would Submit to no Such imposition, that I wanted no written instrument from Romaro; having already had the bargain fully explained by Mr. Chambers & that I Should Sign no paper but of my own writing- That there needed no writing at all about the matter, but I was willing to give Mr. Romaro my bbligation to pay him \$10 p. Month for the Rent of his Place, as Long as I occupied it without interruption- & to pay at the end of every Month- I wrote & Signed an Article to that effect, gave it to Romaro, & went home. Romaro is a Simple well meaning fellow, I think- But the Aldalde is as thoro' going a Scoundrel, I belive, as I ever came across- the day was cold & windy

The Spring is Rapidly advancing. The People Seem to be busily engaged of preparing to Pitch their little Crops in all directions I observe them plowing & clearing off this little Patches. Some have already put in their Wheat. They Plow with Oxen & Wooden Plows, & Seem to Succeed pretty well...

Monday 27th. Mch.

The Morning cloudy, & Rainy- We had April Weather to day- Showers and Sun, shine- It "ained as I Suppose, a great deal in the Mountains They were often entirely obscured by dark heary clouds- Some Thunder-

Tuesday 28th.

MS. Cloudy & quite cool- ground covered with Snow, & it contind. to Snow, lightly, 'till 10 O'Clk: when it cleared off & became windy- the Snow lay but a few Hours in the Valley; but the Mountains are all White-

Wednesday 29th. March

The Morning fair & pleasant. Employed the Men lying Gorn for Hominy We are obliged to make Ashes of the Gorn Gobs there being no other material convenient, & not half enough of that-

This is a fine warm day, and makes the grass grow very fast- the Horses are very exidently improving already, altho' the Grass is but just beginning to look green-

Busy all day arranging my Accounts &s.

Thursday 30th, March

A very delightful morning- Heavy White frost last night. The day turned out a very pleasant one- Pavis came down this evening to See u us and to Settle Some Acc<sup>ts</sup>. Ac. Mr. Brown went up this evening to See Senor Luno ab<sup>t</sup>. Rent, Horse Troughs, &c. and to effect a final and complete Settlement with him- which he did, after Some little difficulty- Luno charges me \$16 for 3 or 4 Troughs and Some foragethis is to be Sure a very high charge indeed, but is less by about \$5 than he demanded at first- the \$16 was finially allowed him, which wi with \$16.50 for Rent of His Houses makes \$32.50 that I have paid him altogether- and Mr. Brown Says he expressed himself entirely content and Satisfied-

I occupied his Houses Five Months and a half- So that the Rent including Troughs &c. may be Set at \$5.91 p Month.-

The troughs were very materially injured by the Horses & in fact Rendered unfit for the uses they were originally intended forTwo of them I had Removed to my new quarters, where they are wanted to feed the Horses in- Upon the whole, I have got off better than I expected with Senor Luno.-
