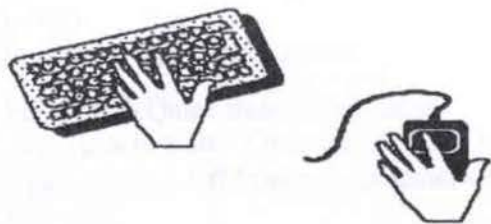
## Information Superhighway Comes to Campus

Through the Missouri State Library and the Missouri Library Network Corp., libraries in the metropolitan St. Louis area will participate in a two-month, no-charge trial of OCLC's FirstSearch service during September and October.

FirstSearch is an online reference system that links you to 55 popular databases providing information on business, science, the humanities, psychology, education, and popular culture. You don't need computer or online search experience to gain access to this comprehensive offering of databases. You can conduct in-depth subject searching, compile comprehensive bibliographies, locate hard-to-find materials, and display, print, and e-mail records back to your electronic address.

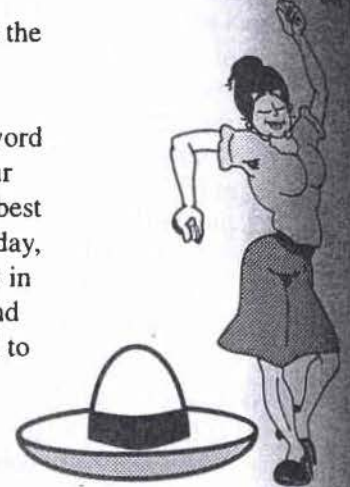
# Spanish Theme for Homecoming

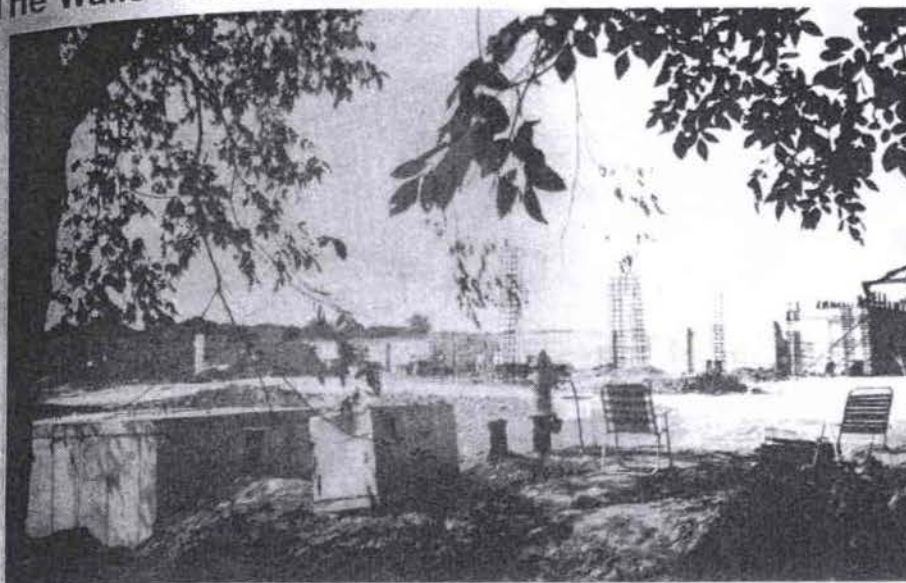

4. Authorization number, type **100-118-752** (enter)
5. Password, type **butler** (enter)

## Lindenwood's Earth Science Program Looking Towards Expansion

The Earth Science program meets a large need for practical science courses in Lindenwood undergraduate curriculum. When the program was established, faculty anticipated the substantial demand for Earth Science courses would come from education majors, but were pleasantly surprised to find that the general student body has flocked to these courses to fulfill part of their general science requirements.

One of the most exciting developments of Lindenwood's earth science program is the start of construction of a state-of-the-art earth science laboratory in room 112 of Young Hall. The room has been gutted and expanded in preparation of modern laboratory tables, rock displays, and specimen analysis equipment. The facility will accommodate lab sections of 30+ students.

## 1995 Lady Lions Soccer is Better Than Ever

The Lady Lions made it to the national tournament last year for the sixth time in the past 12 years, compiling a 19-2-1 mark. They finished seventh in the final national standings and outscored opponents 84-10.

But second year head coach Tim Champion says this year's team is even better. "There is more depth on this year's team," said Champion. "We'll get much better as this season progresses. All we have to do is keep putting the ball in the net."

Lindenwood came into this season with a majority of last year's team returning. The NAIA preseason poll ranked them sixth in the nation, setting lofty standards for the squad to begin the season.

The mix of veterans and new players for the Lady Lions is led by 1994 All-Americans Kelly Bowen (junior), Lynn Naeger (junior), and Caryn Chasteen (senior), who was also the 1994 American Midwest Conference Player of the Year. Kelly Massman, a freshman, also is among the top offensive threats for Lindenwood.

The Lady Lions face a difficult schedule this year, but play nine of their 19 games at home. The most notable home date is October 10 when Lindenwood faces Park College. Park handed the Lady Lions its only two losses last season, before Lindenwood beat them 1-0 in the regional championship match.

The 1995 men's soccer season is off to a great start with the help of many of last season's returning key players and some fine recruiting.

Last season the squad finished 14-7-2 under first year coach Carl Hutter. Out of last year's squad, Then freshmen Kurt Reinheimer and Willy Nymo were named to the American Midwest First Team All-Conference; then sophomores John Hylla and Randy Schaberg were second team picks. Hylla was also named to the NAIA All-Midwest second team, while Nymo received the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's third team honors.

With these returning performers plus the new recruits, Hutter is looking forward to an even stronger year. This season nine upperclassmen were successfully recruited from other colleges to play for the Lions, contributing to this years tough schedule. The Lions will be competing against a very competitive number of regional and local teams.

The squad is already on their way towards their goal; making it into the post season with a good seed and eventually playing over the Thanksgiving weekend in the national tournament.



## Lindenwood Football Searching for Home Field Advantage

Home is looking more inviting each week as the Lindenwood football team struggles on the road.

The Lions played two games at home before starting a four-week road schedule pitting the Lions against three nationally-ranked teams. The Lions, behind first-year head coach Dan Kratzer, will be welcomed back October 14 for homecoming and will finish the season with a five-game home stand.

The Lions definitely have had their work cut out for them early in the season, facing four teams ranked in the top 15 in the NAIA Division II preseason poll. The young football team tries to improve on a 2-8 record of a year ago.

Coach Kratzer, after building a strong football program at Hastings College, is trying to bring the same work ethic and competitiveness here at Lindenwood.

Leaders on the team include sophomore receiver Eric Holloway, junior quarterback Corey Nessler—a St. Charles native—and defensive performers Kyle Rego, a junior; Shane Collins, a senior; and Ron White, a junior.

Lindenwood junior Julian Smith sparks the kick and punt return duties, while sophomore Donnie Dillard has been the top running back.

The strength of this year's team is its passing game, featuring a pair of strong-armed quarterbacks in Nessler and freshman Max Brown. The receiving core also includes junior Mario Patton and freshmen Darian Benton and Carlton Rivers. Seniors Justin Meeks and Doug Kerr anchor the offensive line.
