



indenwood University has undertaken the consolidation and expansion of the baseball and softball fields into one complex. It will be dedicated to Lou Brock, the legendary St. Louis Cardinal, base burglar and Hall of Famer, and it will be named The Lou Brock Sports Complex, in his honor.

The kickoff celebration will occur on Thursday, April 15th at 4:00 p.m. on the upper parking lot of the Hyland Performance Arena. The cost of admissions is free, and it is open to the public. Scheduled to be in attendance are Cardinals players, Baseball Hall of Famers, local and county leadership, and others.

The new 2 million dollar facility is an exciting reflection of the growing prowess of the Lindenwood Athletic Program. The project will include an event plaza and state of the art baseball and soft-

ball fields with restrooms, concessions, and press boxes.

A special feature shall be the Gathering Plaza, which shall include a tribute to Brock and a memorabilia area. The field is to be finished for the 2005 season.

Come on out, and join us in celebration of this great baseball legend, Lou Brock.

Campus Expansion, part 5 Paul Lee

Have you seen the scoreboard lately? Well, if you haven't, then you definitely missed one of the most visible signs that things are on the move yet again here at Lindenwood University. The newest renovation project on which the university has broken ground is the Harlen C. Hunter Sports Stadium. This project, estimated cost of about 5 million dollars, will fill the stadium with new features and amenities that will impress even the non-sports fan. With the hard work and dedication of some of our graduate assistants and work-study students, the demolition phase has already begun on the awesome facility. As far as the demolition phase is concerned, the wood benches on the visitor side are being chopped into mulch and being reused on campus, and the aluminum bleachers will be recycled, saving the university money. The actual field will remain the same, but everything else is changing. The new bleachers, located on both sides of the field, will be concrete with aluminum seats, with possible growth to include backing for these. There will be a VIP section on the Spellmann Campus Center side, with bucket-style seats. Under seats on the opposite side of the VIP section will be the concession stands

and restrooms. There will be a walkway to gain entrance into the stadium, stretching from Hunter across Weber Drive going to the Hyland Performance Arena. This new facility will be able to hold over 6,000 people, with possible expansion to 17,000 people. The new press box will be a two-story building, to house both the radio and television departments. The Presidential Suite will also be within this complex. There will be a new scoreboard and sound system to enhance this beautiful arena that will host both male and female soccer and lacrosse.

Boone Home Restoration

The Daniel Boone Home, owned by Lindenwood University, is the recipient of a \$200,000 Save America's Treasures grant, which was approved by the U.S. Department of the Interior. The grant will be used to repair the roof and foundation masonry of the home, which is located in Defiance, Missouri,

Lindenwood acquired both the Boone Home and Boonesville Village in 1998. Since then, Lindenwood has worked to restore and enhance the 261-acre historical site and popular tourist attraction.

The Boone Home was originally constructed in the early 1800's. It was one of 63 historical sites chosen out of 452 nationwide applicants for the Save America's Treasures grant. The work funded by the grant will relate directly to preservation of the historic property. Lindenwood University expects to begin the renovation work in the spring.

During previous renovation work, the Boone Home and Boonesfield Village remained open for public tours, and the beautiful Old Peace Chapel was still available for weddings. Over the past several years, Lindenwood has acquired adjacent property to the Boone Home and has also purchased forgotten historic buildings and worked to restore them at Boonesfield Village. Lindenwood's plan is to turn the village into the "Sturbridge of the Midwest," modeled after Old Sturbrdige, a recreated 19th century New England village near Boston.

The Save America's Treasures program addresses the urgent preservation needs of the nation's most significant

historic sites and collections. The program is administered by the National Park Service in partnership with the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, the National Park Service, the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Laura Bush is the honorary chair of the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities. She said about the Save America's Treasures program, "The story of America is told through historic architecture, arts, and writings. The money provided by Save America's Treasures will help preserve the pieces of our heritage for future generations."



Three sessions of The Boone Challenge semester will begin May 24th, June 21st and July 19th. Students will live at the Daniel Boone Home Campus in historic buildings and work in Boonesfield Village as part of their learning experience.

The semester consists of courses in a threecore class and internship format, totaling sixteen credit hours. Some of the classes offered are Literature of the American West. Biology, Art of the American West, Character Education, Theater/Puppetry, Museum Studies and More. Saturday classes offered are Archeology and Site Interpretation. This is a great opportunity to spend your summer in a unique educational experience. Substantial Financial Assistance may be available.



lition Freeze

Lindenwood University wants to stay affordable and accessible for current and prospective students. With enrollment at the beginning of the spring 2004 semester being the highest in years, Lindenwood President Dennis C. Spellmann wants to continue to provide students with an affordable education, and he has proposed a freeze in tuition costs.

Lindenwood's Board of Directors recently approved the measure to freeze full-time undergraduate tuition for the third year in a row. Undergraduate tuition at Lindenwood stands at \$11,200 per year.

Tuition for full-time graduate students in the traditional semester program will also see a tuition freeze. Part-time graduate tuition will increase only 3.3%, while Lindenwood's adult accelerated program (LCIE) tuition will increase only 4.2%.

Three years ago when Lindenwood first froze tuition, the university made national headlines. While other universities increased their tuition costs by double-digit percentages, Lindenwood's tuition cost did not increase at all. This is because unlike most schools, Lindenwood does not rely on tax subsidies and government funding.

Lindenwood does not have to depend on state or federal money for income. Instead, the university is tuition and market-driven. Lindenwood raises money by recruiting more students. Therefore, when the state and federal governments experience a loss in revenue, it does not affect Lindenwood like it affects other universities.

Keeping Their Heads Above Water

Together we, the swimming and diving team, are a very big, very noisy bunch. On March 3-6, 2004, we took our enthusiasm with us to Lawrence, Kansas to compete in the NAIA National Championships.

We arrived in Kansas late Tuesday evening and spared no time; by Wednesday afternoon, our divers and their coach, Doug Beavers, began the Lions' assault. Jon Metcalf placed third on the three-meter board. Metcalf, a senior who won two national titles in 2002, came back after spending his junior year out of the water. Another returning All-American, Lee Scheurmann, placed fourth. On the girl's side, diving captain Kyla Kachman placed fifth on the one-meter board. All three divers received All-American Honors.

The streak continued. On Thursday, the swimmers began to make their mark. The men's 400-medley relay finished third. The relay was comprised of Danny Dasinger and Nick Smith, both returning All-Americans, and two talented freshman Tim Gibbons, of Newfoundland and John Gauntt of Florida. The 200-free relay consisted of Smith, Gibbons, Gauntt, and Andrew Bell finished fifth. Bell is a freshman from the Bahamas. Meanwhile, the divers continued to rack up points; they earned three more All-American titles on the men's one-meter board. Metcalf wrapped up his college career with a



third place finish, and Scheurmann was happy in fourth. Tom Lucido, a freshman who also runs and plays lacrosse, finished fifth.

Friday's first All-American was a diver, Kyla Kachman, who struggled in prelims but fought her way to fifth in three meter finals. Other female divers who participated in the meet included Julie Marsh, a junior transfer student, and Kelly Thompson, a senior from St. Louis. As for the swimmers, the men's 200 Medley Relay finished third. Ellie Kermicieva of Macedonia swam her fastest time ever, 59.53, to place fifth in the 100 fly. Katie Thompson of St. Louis placed sixth in the 100 breast. Kermicieva and Thompson are both seniors. The final All-American of the night was Tim Gibbons' 100 back. Gibbons received a total of four All-American titles in his first trip to Nationals.

By day four, we were tired, and the unusually high number of disqualifications had us down, but nothing can stop the heart of a Lion! Erin Nakamoto, a fresh man from Hawaii, earned All-American Honors placing fifth in the 100 yard freestyle. Danny Dasinger won the final individual award of the day by placing 5th in the 200 fly. As expected, the men's relays finished off well. The 400 freestyle relay finished 3rd.

When all as said and done, the men left ecstatic. They achieved their highest national finish ever—fifth. The women finished ninth, but they expect to train hard and add depth to improve their standing next year. According to swimming coach Craig Penrose, this has been the most competitive national championship ever, but the LU squad still left with many awards. Congratulations to our swimmers and divers!



finished second in 157 weight class. Heavyweight wrestler Miller finished third. Roger while junior David Bonilla finished fifth in the 184 weight class. Freshman Louis Edmonds (133 lbs.) placed eighth.

Each wrestler received NAIA All-American Honors because each finished in the top eight in the national tournament.

In the past three years, Lindenwood has finished fourth, second, and first at national championships. This is our wrestling team's fourth consecutive top-five finish at the national Congratulations, tournament. Lindenwood wrestlers; keep up the winning trend!

Frank McGinty was the starting quarterback for Lindenwood football his sophomore and junior years, but due to a surgery on his rotator cuff, he was kept off the field his senior year. Track and Field

Lindenwood's track and field team won the conference meet at Graceland University in February. The men won with 266 points, and the women placed first with 201 points.

Our team also did a great job at the 2004 NAIA Indoor Track and Field National Championships in Johnson City, Tennessee on March 6. The men used a strong performance in the triple jump to jump from 4th place to 2nd. The women placed 4th behind the strong performances of the sprinters.

Many of the men achieved All-American status. Bill John and Kurt Gibbons placed 4th and 5th in the 55 meter dash finals, with times of 6.4 and 6.43 seconds

respectively. Gibbons also placed 4th in the 200 meter dash finals with a time of 21.75 seconds. John Ryland and Mark Aschen scored in the pole vault. Both vaulted 15'5", with Ryland tying for 4th and Aschen tying for 6th.

Demetrious Totton, Elijah Simpson, Fabian Florant and James Jenkins all made it to the triple jump finals. Totton was inches off of his lifetime best, while Simpson (50'8") and Florant (50'3.50") set new lifetime bests.

Lindenwood's women earned 2 National Champions. Daveetta Shepherd and Kim Martin won the 55 meter hurdle finals. Shepherd set a school record time with 7.81 seconds, and Martin

finished 3rd in 8.16 seconds.

In the 200 meter dash, Danielle Norville won in 24.16 seconds, Genna Williams was 2nd with 24.40 seconds and Carol Clarke was 4th with 25.17 seconds. Ashley Nauman was 5th in the 600 meter dash finals with a time of 1:35.94.

"I didn't know what to expect going into this season. I really tried to create a whole team of kids with character and class. I coach with the intention of having kids do things the right way," stated coach Lane Lohr. When combined with the talent of our teams, such core values are the reason behind the team's amazing success. Keep up the great work!

Lions sophomore guard Justin Shrake earned an all-conference




Upcoming Shooting Events






