

Forty-three hits, two cloudbursts, 28 runs, a player with a sore knee, 14 doubles, a frightened manager's wife, three home runs, one broken window and five baseballs lost in the weeds above the dirt pile behind the right field fence.

Oh, yes, And add two happy teams in blue pin-stripes. Kutis held off a rally by L & P Sales and won, 6-5, increasing its first - place margin over the Colts, who lost to Kirkwood in East St. Louis. 


Armbruster wore glasses while batting, but not while pitching. "It just works out better that way," he said.

The story of the Muslim uprising that snuffed out the life of Johnnie E. Moore, dubbed a karate expert in the initial stories and seriously wounded two others including the leader, Clyde X, is history now.

Mr. Moore, it developed, is the versatile athlete who claimed among his feats, the batting championship in the Tandy League one season, several others as the allstar shortstop in the 44 year old loop and wore the mantle of being the 'best guard' in industrial league basketball!

Henderson S. Gully, popular local businessman who sponsored a team known as "The Gullys' remember the heavy mustached Johnnie as the brilliant little playmaker that made the charges champions a few years back. "He was the best guard in the league", Gully opined to the St. Louis American.

Normal 'Tweed' Webb, recently announced retired statistician of the Tandy Loop went searching back into his books to record the premier season Johnnie enjoyed in the loop as a member of Teannie Edwards perennial champion

Braves (who won league honors in nine of twelve seasons).

Moore blended his talents with the likes of Doc Brackens, Palmer Hubbard, Dennis Ballard, Zoll Ramsey, Gil Gleghorn, A mos Henderson, Charlie King, Leonard Clark, Wilbert Mosby etc. etc. to help foster the Braves dynasty.

In 1961 he had 35 hits in 65 official trips for a .538 average that led the Tandy league. His 35 hits was the tops in that department as was his 30 runs scored, 25 runs batted in, and his 12 doubles.

In 1959 he had batted .450. Five years earlier he had hit .438. He was named to the all-star team in 1954, 55, 57, 59 and 61.

Tweed speaks glowingly of his top performance. It occurred in 1956 against their heated rivals, the Dodgers. Moore supplied the muscle that summer afternoon, clouting two homeruns, a triple and a double batting in 8 runs!
