Students Make Kutis Foes Smart

The totals after 7 1/2 hours of semipro league baseball battling yesterday at Heine Meine field:

Forty-three hits, two cloud-bursts, 28 runs, a player with a sore knee, 14 doubles, a frightened manager's wife, three home runs, one broken window and five baseballs lost in the weeds above the dirt pile behind the right field fence.

Oh, yes. And add two happy teams in blue pin-stripes. Kutis held off a rally by L & P Sales and won, 6-5, increasing its first-place margin over the Colts, who lost to Kirkwood in East St. Louis. And the Hoffmeisters lashed out nine of the day's 14 doubles and drubbed Red Villa, 14-3, moving past their victims into undisputed possession of third place.

The Colts, who began the afternoon only a half-game out of first place, were surprised by fifth-place Kirkwood, 7-4, as Larry Ross went 4-for-4 for the winners and pitcher Phil Landes contributed two big hits. The Colts now are 6-3. Kutis is 8-2.

Kutis, perhaps more than any other Semipro League team, typifies the league's slow trend away from veteran professionals who are back from the majors and high minors and toward the young, hard-muscled college athletes who still have visions of the big leagues before them.

Yesterday the new breed was much in evidence. Six of the nine Kutis starters were college players. Some of them went to work on L & P in the first inning. Bill Yancey of (Valparaiso) was hit by a pitch. Rick Lessman singled and then Ray Thorpe (a Missouri U. baseball and football letterman) reached base on a fielder's choice, driving in Yancey.

In the second, Kutis's Dave Loos (Memphis State) singled and Dave Ritchie hit the first of his two doubles. After Bob Abelen (Harris Teachers College) struck out, Hal Wertich (Monmouth) lashed a single that scored two runs.

Kutis finished its scoring in the third when Lessman and Thorpe walked, Loos hit an RBI single and Ritchie drove in two runs with his second double.

Dick Swift started the L & P scoring in the second inning with a 337-foot home run that landed just inside the left-field foul line. But the Swift family got no better than a draw for the day. An inning later, Dick's brother Bob was waiting in the on-deck circle for his first time at bat. Mike Devine, batting, swung hard and the bat flew from his hands.

It struck the frantically jumping Swift on an already injured right knee, and the first baseman had to be carried from the field.

Devine's RBI double in the eighth helped bring L & P within one run, 6-5, and the red-sleeved athletes of Tom Bond put the tying run on second with none out in the ninth. They loaded the bases when, after a walk, Bond's son Denny hit a slow dribbler that relieving pitcher Jack Lentz couldn't pick up on the wet grass.

But then slow-ball pitcher Lentz coaxed Dick Swift to ground out, ending the game.

Rich Roberts relieved starting pitcher Jim Mueller, and the lanky lefthander was effective in his six and one-third innings for Kutis.

A seven-run second inning in which 12 men batted propelled Hoffmeister to its victory over Red Villa. Ted Schamburg started the frame with a 380-foot, opposite-field home run, and stayed around long enough to break a window, a bat and Villa's morale.

With four runs already home and the bases loaded Schamburg came up again. He fouled off a pitch to the left, and it sailed over the screen and bounced directly in front of Mrs. Tom Bond, who was carrying a Coke to her husband, the L & P manager. The ball then crashed through a clubhouse window.

On the next pitch Schamburg hit a broken-bat double to right field that bounced past Tom Turner and drove home three runs. That finished Mal Murphy and virtually assured Villa's fourth straight loss.

Bob Robben, Hoffmeister second baseman, had two doubles in the inning. Each starter except fielder Ron Paul had at least one hit and one run for Chip Rathman's winners.

The victory went to Dick Armbruster, a 36-year-old knuckleballing pitcher who had been in the Detroit organization. Armbruster went the distance, and Red Villa hitters were observing him closely they might have had second thoughts about digging in.

Armbruster wore glasses while batting, but not while pitching. "It just works out better that way," he said.

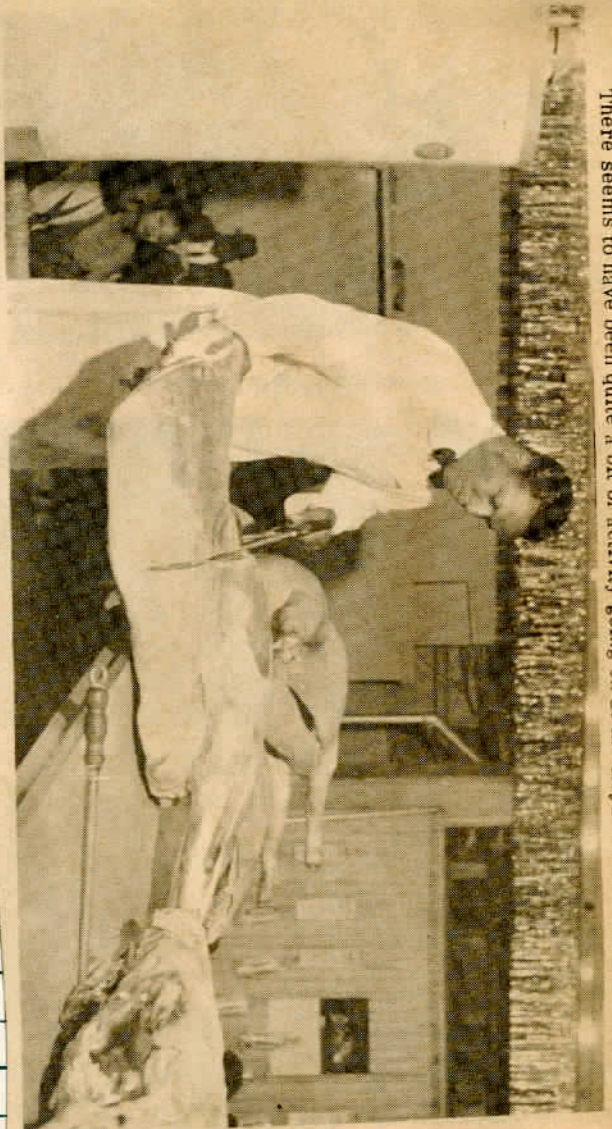

Blues Hire Fletcher As Canada Scout

By Bill Beck

General manager Lynn Patrick of the St. Louis Blues named a scout yesterday for the eastern Canada hockey territory. At the same time, he expressed the hope that National Hockey League president Clarence Campbell would have a voice in determining how six new NHL clubs are stocked with players.

Patrick, said Cliff Fletcher, 30-year-old career hockey administrator, had resigned from Montreal Canadiens' organization and would join the Blues. Fletcher's area will include parts of Quebec and the maritime provinces.

"He served as scout and junior amateur coach and organized junior amateur affiliation for the Canadiens for 10 years and I want him to do the same thing for us," said Patrick.

Fletcher never played as a professional. He became interested in the administrative side of hockey and joined the Canadiens' front office shortly after he had completed his junior training, Patrick said.

St. Louis and the five other expansion teams are scheduled to begin play in the 1967-1968 season. Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Minneapolis-St. Paul are the other cities.

Patrick said he was concerned about the still shadowy plans that existing NHL teams have for stocking the new teams with 20 players each. The new teams must pay \$50,000 a man—a total of \$1,000,000.

"The last I heard, the old clubs want to protect 11 players (on rosters of 17) and also be permitted to draft a minor leaguer the moment we take one of their established players," Patrick said.

"If that is to be the system, we'll be a long time reaching any kind of competitive parity," Patrick said he would be "happy" to have NHL president Campbell settle on the final player-stocking plan because, "he knows that there must be quick competitive parity to keep the league strong."

Campbell is known to be critical of the player plans used by organized baseball and football in recent expansions and publicly has expressed confidence that the NHL will be more generous and practical.

The appointment of an eastern scout indicated that Patrick had altered his organizational plans slightly. Originally, he had planned to name a head scout and personnel director first.

"Now I hope we can name an assistant general manager next week and the two of us will name central and western scouts who will serve as Fletcher's counterparts in the rest of Canada. That will be our work force for a time," said Patrick.

The Blues' general manager became acquainted with Fletcher when Patrick's son became involved in a junior amateur program that Fletcher had operated for Montreal.

"I was impressed by his terrific enthusiasm and, to put it plainly, by his day-in and day-out ability to work like hell," said Patrick. "We are very pleased to have him on our side, just as Montreal is sorry to lose him. Finally, we offer him

NOTE TO BIG LEAGUE MANAGERS: If the dying minor leagues have you wondering where your future recruits are going to come from, take a look at Willie Spooner's clinic for kids in the May issue of EBONY Magazine. Standout among the Baton Rouge school's "graduates" now playing pro ball is Lou Brock, flashy outfielder of the St. Louis Cards.

When Willie Spooner read about a Baton Rouge baseball clinic for white boys which barred Negroes, he went into action. Coach of the city's McKinley High and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Spooner lined up civic support and enlisted big leaguers to teach basics to Negro youths from 8 to 18.

— Willie Mays left no doubt he would hit the 535th homer of his career "one day soon," to become baseball's all-time right-handed home run hitter and second only to Babe Ruth

Mays, who celebrated his 35th birthday last May 6 and now is in his 15th big league season, all with the Giants, hit No. 535 Wednesday afternoon against the

St. Louis Cardinals.

It was Mays' 30th of the season and came in the Giants' 12th game of 1966.

A year ago, he reached a career high of 52, hitting a record 18 in August. "I'm no kid any more."

says Mays, while reflecting on his 535th homer, which put him ahead of Jimmie Foxx in second place. Ruth has 714, a figure Mays said he doesn't think he'll ever reach.

"I'm swinging at the ball about as good as I ever have," says Mays. "but there have been times I thought I should have had a homer only to see the ball stay inside the park. You'd have to say I'm not as strong as I used to be."

Mays discounts a possible reason for his slowdown in home run output to better pitching.

"I'll admit the pitching is better now than, say, a few years back," opinions Mays. "but that's not the reason. I'm just getting older and it's getting tougher all the time to hit it out."

Mays, who started the 1966 season with 505 homers and passed Mel Ott and Ted Williams enroute to his 53 plateau, said he never once in his baseball life set any goals.

"You just can't do that," Mays says. "If you do, then you start pressing and wind up not doing anything." He pointed to his own

New Breakthrough In Baseball

On a recent Monday afternoon, the baseball season opened in Washington. The Sky was blue, the grass was green, the crowd enthusiastic, the ballplayers determined. The Vice-President was there for the annual ceremony of throwing the first ball of the season; in short, everything was quite usual, just another spring day -- except for one thing. One of the umpires was Emmet Ashford, a Negro.

And this was unusual, because never before has there been a Negro umpire in the major leagues. Like Robert Weaver in the Cabinet, like Andrew Brimmer at the Federal Reserve, like many other talented and gifted individuals, Emmet Ashford has broken new ground; he is a first, setting the pace for others of his race.

What is so heartening about his appointment too, is the lack of fanfare about it. Twenty years ago Jackie Robinson joined the Brooklyn Dodgers as the first Negro ballplayer to make the big leagues. It seems incredible now, but Jackie's appearance was treated as if it were a major revolutionary step. And in a sense it was.

Outstanding Negro players played in Negro leagues for Negro audiences, and many a major league team in those days lost a pennant because the Satchel Paiges who could have won it for them were not allowed to take part in our segregated national pastime.

But Jackie broke the ice. After a few seasons of play, in which he had to put up with abuse and trials because of his color, Jackie was accepted by fans and players alike. Teammates from Mississippi found that not only was he a nice fellow, but that his sterling play helped put World Series money into their paychecks. Nothing breaks down prejudice as much as these economic facts of life. Soon he was joined by others, and now the game of baseball is truly a national pastime, with talent, not color, the only way a man is judged.

It is to the everlasting credit of Branch Rickey that he realized that color discrimination had no place in a decent society. It was he who took the step which brought Jackie Robinson into the big leagues. The story is well known and I needn't repeat it here.

But some time ago I spoke with Branch Rickey's son, and he told me that although his father left him the material elements of the good life, the most valuable thing he gave his son was his name and the meaning it carried -- courage, integrity, honesty, and freedom from prejudice. This is indeed a magnificent heritage to leave a son. Our businessmen and politicians would do well to consider the importance of such a heritage.

Just as Jackie Robinson had his Branch Rickey, so Emmet Ashford has his Dewey Soriano. Soriano is the president of the Pacific Coast League who elevated Ashford to the post of umpire-in-chief of this high minor league. His nine years as umpire and three as umpire-in-chief convinced the majors that he was ready and this season he joined the American League's umpiring staff. His experience as an umpire includes handling key series in towns like Dallas and Little Rock, where he met with complete acceptance on the part of fans and players.

So today Emmet Ashford is a major league umpire, to be followed in the future by other umpires, then coaches and managers, and front office staff. The progress of race relations in baseball is heartening when one considers that 20 years ago it was a segregated sport. Today Willie Mays is the highest-paid player, and many other Negro stars command fantastic salaries.

This offers a lesson to the rest of us, as an example of the rapid progress that can be made when a man is judged on talent and skill and not by color. Many of the people in the stands aren't even aware of color -- they just see the uniform and the performance, and cheer or boo alone.

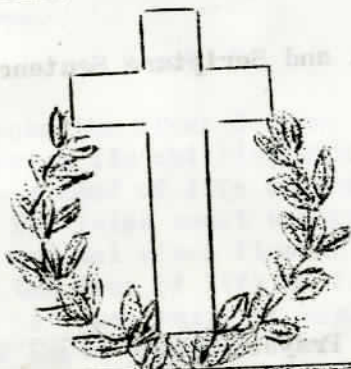

Next Year Maplewood's Gaps Will Be Legion

Howsam, Red Rue Rule On Pitching Changes

NEW YORK, April 18—The umpires misinterpreted the new rule regarding the changing of pitchers and the regulation should be reworded, Cardinal general manager Bob Howsam said today.

Howsam and his nine fellow National League general managers last winter adopted the ruling in an effort to curb delaying tactics by managers or coaches in changing pitchers.

The new regulation was put to a test quickly when the Cardinals protested their 5-3 loss to the Pittsburgh Pirates Saturday.

Howsam and field manager Red Schoendienst contend that, under the new rule, a manager or coach who goes out to talk to a pitcher, then turns his back, walks away, but then turns around and goes out to see the pitcher again, must leave him in until the man at the plate is retired, replaced by a pinch-hitter or gets on base.

Howsam and Schoendienst point out in their protest that the pitcher Saturday, Ray Washburn, made two pitches between coach Joe Becker's and Schoendienst's trips to the mound, and thus an entirely new situation had developed.

With two out in the seventh inning, Becker visited Washburn, who then missed the plate on the first two pitches to batter Tommie Sisk, Pittsburgh's pitcher.

Schoendienst tried to replace the tiring Washburn, but was denied permission under the new rule. After Washburn completed the walk to Sisk, left-hander Joe Hoerner was brought in and Manny Mota, batting for Matty Alou, clipped him for a two-run triple that gave Pittsburgh a 4-2 lead—and the ball game.

"If I could have replaced Washburn when I wanted to, Pittsburgh probably would have sent Mota to hit for Alou and I would have come back with a righthander," Red said. "so Jerry Lynch (a lefthanded bat-

ter) probably would have come in to hit for Mota. That way they would have used up three hitters and they wouldn't have had an outfielder left."

In the protest, the Cardinals maintained the old rule, requiring a pitcher to be removed on the second visit of a manager or coach to the mound in the same inning, should have applied.

Dave Grote, public relations director of the National League, said he had feared "bugs" would be found in the new rule and added that the rule probably would have to be overhauled.

Of course, chances of winning a protest are about as good as chances of selling sleds and earmuffs in the tropics.—RUSSO.
