Dr. Stephen Sherblom Will Present at the Association for Moral Education Conference in November

Dr. Stephen Sherblom will be presenting a conference paper entitled "Wisdom is more than expertise" at the Association for Moral Education's 45th annual conference in Seattle, WA, November 7-9, 2019. Psychological models of Wisdom are severely limited when compared critically with traditional wisdom traditions, seeming more like a restricted expertise rather than a wide-ranging life-changing development of moral maturity. Academic models tend to leave out those traditional aspects most at odds with current American society – humility, self-awareness, and a deep sense of connection to other people, the planet, and all life. This paper argues that without those more spiritual elements any model of wisdom will be inadequate, and probably doesn't deserve to use the word Wisdom, which has a long and rich tradition we ignore at our peril.
