# Tuition will remain the same for next year

While tuition is on the rise at other area colleges, seven percent in one case, Lindenwood is holding the line.

On January 21, Lindenwood officials announced that there would be no tuition increase this fall for full-time students. President Dennis Spellmann said that tuition in 1998-1999 would remain \$9,950 annually.

"This institution has experienced sizable growth in the past couple of years, and we wanted to make sure that our students benefitted," Spellmann said.

Last year, Lindenwood was Missouri's fastest-growing fouryear college or university with nearly 18 percent growth.

Spellmann also stated that the overall growth of the school should slow slightly due to reaching residential capacity.



### Lindenwood housing near capacity

Lindenwood University will only have a limited number of residential housing openings for the coming academic year, so current students need to be aware of the procedures for signing up to retain their present rooms and to switch housing.

"I think we're at the first year in a long time where we're not going to grow in our residential population," said President Dennis Spellmann.

Michelle Giessman, of the university's housing office, said a week-long housing signup period will be held in Butler Parlor the week after class registration ends.

"It should be the final week of March or the first week of April," Giessman said. "It will be

very well publicized when we get closer to it."

Giessman said current students who wish to keep their rooms for the next academic year will have the top priority for sign-ups. After that, students who wish to make changes will be allowed to do so, starting with seniors and ending with freshmen.

President Spellmann said the room crunch will likely continue until new housing is complete. Construction of a new

residence hall is likely to begin soon.

"We'd like to have more (rooms) by the fall of 1999," he said.

Currently, the university can house about 1,500 students, about half of which are from St. Charles County.

"It is important for students to be aware that housing will be at a premium this year," Spellmann said. "They need to make sure they are on the ball when it comes time to take care of their housing for the fall."

Housing is in high demand mostly because of the university's meteoric growth in recent years. Last year, the university was recognized as the fastest-growing four-year college or university in Missouri. A student population of 8,000 is predicted for the 1998-99 school year, which is up from 800 just nine years ago.

### Lions in hot pursuit of magical .500 mark



Also helping the Lions is Ty Laux. He is a 6'3" swingman that transferred from S.I.U. Edwardsville. He has provided senior leadership that the team needed to be competitive.

Lindenwood Cross Country coach Clark Wille said he expects Bruening, who will graduate from Duchesne in May, could have an immediate impact on the women's team next year.


