





\$3 Million Software Gift Boosts Fashion Design Program

Lindenwood University has announced it will receive a \$3 million gift of software from Lectra, headquartered in Paris, France. Lindenwood will use industry-leading fashion and textile CAD software, U4ia and Modaris, in its fashion design program, providing students the opportunity to train in textile design (U4ia) and patternmaking (Modaris).

Lindenwood is the only university in Missouri implementing this CAD software program into its curriculum, said Florence Dewan, a fashion design professor at Lindenwood who worked with Lectra to secure the donation.

Lectra is the world leader in the design and distribution of software and hardware dedicated to the major industrial users of textiles, leather and other soft materials. Lectra's global team of 1,350 employees serves 16,000 customers in more than 100 countries.

"We are grateful to Lectra for this tremendous gift," said Lindenwood President Dennis Spellmann. "And we are excited for our students, who will have the best tools in the industry to prepare them for a career in fashion and retail business industries. Coupling these tools with the dynamic faculty and gifted students promises to catapult our program and help meet the industry needs for the future."

Lectra's national director of marketing, Tim Copeland, said the company was aware of Lindenwood University's respected faculty and its commitment to putting students first in everything it does.

"We are looking forward to a tremendous partnership with Lindenwood University," said Copeland. "Lectra and Lindenwood have a common commitment to excellence. We will all benefit from this partnership; but most importantly, the students will be the biggest winners."

Marsha Parker, dean of fine and performing arts at Lindenwood, said the benefit of the gift was actually threefold.

"It enhances our academic programs, improves employability of our graduates and provides an economic benefit for corporations," she said. "If a May Company, Target or Sears, hires a Lindenwood graduate, they will not have to incur the cost of training that employee in this stateof-the-art software, which is in use all over the world."

Copeland said Lindenwood would receive the software in mid-summer, in time for installation and training prior to the beginning of the fall semester.

\$5 Million Stadium Renovation Underway from www.lindenwood.edu

A \$5 million renovation of Lindenwood's Harlen C. Hunter Athletic Stadium began this spring. Completion is expected this fall. The project is expected to employ dozens of construction workers throughout the summer.

The plans call for new bleachers throughout the stadium, and an increase in capacity to 7,000. A special VIP section will include end zone seats. Plans also call for

a decorative patio entrance with kiosk ticket booths. A new concession stand will be located beneath end zone seating.

"We have had the best athletic program in the nation for the last two years, and our facilities will reflect that," said Lindenwood President Dennis Spellmann after the LU Board of Directors approved the construction plan.

A new walkway into the stadium

will be constructed over John Weber Drive and Boschert Creek. The stadium will be surrounded by ornamental brick and iron fencing to match the architecture of the rest of the campus.

Besides hosting an estimated 70 Lindenwood events annually, the stadium plays host to community charity events and high school athletic events.

Lindenwood Receives Maximum 10-Year Accreditation

Citing enrollment increases, new construction without debt, and "one of the hardest working and dedicated faculties in American higher education," the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools has granted Lindenwood University the maximum 10-year accreditation.

"We are happy with the outcome," said Lindenwood President Dennis Spellmann. "But we expected this. Our board, faculty and staff work hard to put students and their educational needs first."

An HLC team visited Lindenwood recently for an exhaustive week of review and interviews. The accreditation was granted based on observations, interviews with faculty, staff and students, and the university's own self-study, which was prepared by a 22-member steering committee. Notable items in the HLC team's 41-page report included:

- The main campus continues to serve the core of the university, being home to approximately 2,700 full-time undergraduates. Intercollegiate sports are a major focus of the university and have proven to be a significant factor in its recent recruiting success.
- Prudent financial management has generated spectacular surpluses of \$15-\$20 million per year. As a result, the institution functions without debt. The university pours those surpluses back into capital improvements, scholarships, and financial aid for students.
- During interviews the faculty and others applauded the administration for the university's financial solvency while at the same time generating tremendous growth in new and renovated buildings.

- The university has an organizational structure that is lean at the top, with lines of authority that are clear and unambiguous. The administrative work of the university reports through 12 senior staff directly to the president who is a hands-on day-to-day decision maker.
- Lindenwood is blessed with what is arguably one of the hardest-working and dedicated teaching faculties in American higher education. Students made comments that illustrated the high value they place on the faculty and staff for their effectiveness as instructors and the care and attention they give to students.
- Campus expansion such as in Belleville, IL, the Daniel Boone Home, and the proposed \$100 million master plan demonstrate a palpable momentum and commitment to students and to the future.

- Review of their background and face-to-face conversation revealed a board of trustees that understands and implements its responsibility to provide oversight for the university's future programs, finances and facilities.
- Evidence of increasing university commitment to, and investment, in technology bode well for the university's continued ability to accomplish its purpose.
- Lindenwood has excelled at enhancing the physical infrastructure of the university. Evidence of this is construction of new buildings, renovation of old buildings, acquisitions near campus and at remote sites, added parking spaces, and efforts to make a beautiful campus even more aesthetically attractive.

There are two types of loans available to students:


- Parent Plus Loans Credit-based loans that parents may apply for.
- Alternative Loans Loans that offer students additional funds. These loans are not federally guaranteed. They are credit based and may require a co-signer.

There are two ways in which bills can be paid by students:

- Students/parents may make payments to Lindenwood University (there is a fee).
- Students/parents may request Lindenwood University to direct debit their checking account. For this type of payment, there is no fee.

Lindenwood wants to work with students to make sure that no one has to give up on affording an education. Men and Women's Tennis: Game, Set, Match.



The men's team this year was led by Medhi Bensouda, the team captain. Helping Bensouda out in the lineup was Pedro Lunardelli and Neal Hopson. "The men were very deep this year, from one through six. This was a strong team that was good throughout the lineup," stated Murphy. The men defeated NCAA Division I and II teams such as SIU-Edwardsville, Universities of Sioux Falls, Wisconsin-Whitewater, and Western Kentucky. The schedule for next year will only get tougher, as

The Lions finished the season at 35 wins and 29 losses, after battling injuries all season with key players such as Eric Hollinger and John Ehlers, two awesome right-handed pitchers who suffered from tendonitis. Head coach Brian Behrens is pleased with the team's consistency as it is only his first year coaching the Lions. He brought in many recruits; David Arnold proving to be the most promising as he is arguably the best hitter on the team. Another great hitter who had an excellent season is junior center fielder Mike Kraatz. The team has a deep bench and a solid bullpen. 



Aug 31 Modern Times (Charles Chaplin)

Man vs. Machine! Chaplin's Little Tramp plays an assembly line worker fighting back against the mind-numbing monotony and timeclock rigidity of industrialism.

Sept 7 Lord of the Flies (Peter Brook)

From William Golding's novel, the story of 30 English schoolboys stranded on an uncharted island are left to form their own utopia. Their perfect world quickly becomes a battle of jocks vs. nerds with the future of civilization in the balance.

Sept 14 A Clockwork Orange (Stanley Kubrick)

The film takes aim at the ineffective and inhumane methods often devised by governments to stem criminal behavior, asking what sacrifices we're willing to make to live in relative security. Then there's the trickier question of whether the removal of free will destroys an individual's essential humanity. Does the State have the right to do this, to "kill the criminal reflex"? Would execution be a preferable fate? Finally, Kubrick illustrates the fickle nature of public opinion. Those that laud the government's methods one day revile them the next.-- James Berardinelli

Sept 21 Ghost in the Shell (Mamoru Oshii)

Based on the Manga by Masamune Shirow, and winner of "Best Theatrical Film" and "Best Director" in 1997's World Animation Celebration Awards, this film presents a world caught in the grip of information overload, where artificial intelligence is more than the real thing, and only the Ghost separates man from machine.

Sept 28 Umberto D (Vittorio De Sica)

Umberto is upright, neat, exact, and the cut of his clothes shows that he was once respectable. Now he is a retired civil servant on a fixed income that is not enough to support him, not even in his simple furnished room, not even if he skips meals. He and his dog are faced with eviction by a greedy landlady who would rather rent his room by the afternoon to shame-faced couples.—Roger Ebert

Oct 5 Ikiru (Akira Kurosawa)

The old man knows he is dying of cancer. In a bar, he tells a stranger he has money to spend on a "really good time," but doesn't know how to spend it...It is not so bad that he must die. What is worse is that he has never lived.—Roger Ebert

Oct 12 Cries and Whispers (Ingmar Bergman)

Karen and Maria come to the aid of their dying sister, Agnes, but jealousy, manipulation, and selfishness come before empathy. A profound meditation on death and the meaning of life.

Oct 19 Harvey (Henry Koster)

Jimmy Stewart, in his favorite and one of his best roles, plays Elwood P. Dowd, a harmless man who likes to hang out with his friend Harvey. Harvey, we are told, is a six-foot threeand-a-half-inch tall pooka. When his family has enough of Harvey they have Elwood committed. Dowd explains his situation to his doctor: "I wrestled with reality for 35 years, and I am happy to say I won out over it."

Oct 26 The Ruling Class (Peter Medak)

Peter O'Toole plays Jack, the new Earl of Gurney. Jack thinks he is God. His psychiatrist thinks Jack will be cured by meeting another maniac who thinks he is God. It works. Jack no longer thinks he is God, he now believes himself to be Jack the Ripper. As the Ripper he finds he fits beautifully into the House of Lords, whereas the God of love had no place there whatsoever.

Nov 2 Ordet (Carl Dreyer)

A farmer's family is torn apart by faith, sanctity, and love—one child believes he is Jesus Christ, a second proclaims himself agnostic, and the third falls in love with a fundamentalist's daughter.

Nov 9 Diary of a Country Priest (Robert Bresson)

Based on the novel by Georges Bernanos, the story of a young priest, who upon arrival at his first parish, finds himself alienated from his flock after witnessing an influential count philandering with his daughter's governess. Plagued with health problems that lead to gossip about him being a drunkard, and finding little solace in the advice of his wellmeaning mentor, the young man does his best to shepherd the townsfolk even as their disinterest and malice cause him a crisis of faith.

Nov 16 Elmer Gantry (Richard Brooks)

Sinclair Lewis' novel about a shady salesman, Elmer Gantry, who finds his calling as a revivalist preacher. This film is a biting satire on hypocrisy as we see religion become business.

Nov 23 Lilies of the Field (Ralph Nelson)




