















Musial, Kutis Honored At Elks Sports Dinner

Stan Musial and Tom Kutis headed a glittering list of St. Louis area sports notables who were honored Thursday night at the Elks Club's thirteenth an-nual Sports Celebrity Night at the Khorassan Room of the Hotel Chase.

A capacity crowd of 950 persons attended the dinner at which Musial was named the "Outstanding Sports Figure in St. Louis" for the second time and Kutis received the Bruce Campbell award for meritorious service toward sports.

Musial previously was voted the Outstanding Sports Figure in 1951-thus becoming the only two-time winner of the award. Kutis was honored for his long time sponsorship of teams in a variety of local sports and leagues and for his interest and work on behalf of St. Louis area

Charles McKinley accepted his son Chuck's award; Chuck O'Donnell was on hand in place of Carter and Larry Foust stood in for McMahon.

Bob Feller, a member of baseball's Hall of Fame was the principal speaker at the affair and Buddy Blattner was the master of ceremonies.

Musial was introduced by Cardinal sportscaster Harry Caray, who said that in his 16 years of covering the Red Bird great, he found that 'in his youthful years, Musial seemed older than his

Caray also noted that since in 1942 at 21, Musial hit .310, hit 10 home runs and drove in 72 runs and in 1962 at 41 he hit .330 and hit 19 homers and drove in 82 runs, that in 1982 at 61 Stan the Man would logically hit .345 with 28 homers and 92 runs-batted-in. In his remarks, Musial said hat "in 1951 when I first won this award, I had no plans about being back here in 1962." He also said that he had been rooting for Goalby, the young Belleville pro golf star, to win the award. In his turn Goaly, who was runner-up in the overall balloting, said that "finishing second to Musial or Arnold Palmer is like win-ning to me."

Musial brought loud applause from the crowd when he stated "I am not interested in retiring at this time."

Kutis reminisced about his early days working with boys clubs and said "I want to especially thank the managers of my many teams in many sports who are building character and teaching boys right from wrong."

Feller, who had an illustrious pitching career with the Cleveland Indians, recalled that he saw his first ball game in St. Louis back in 1935 during the era of the Gas House gang. He also spoke of his rookie year of 1938 when he faced the Cards in spring training and struck out eight of the nine batters he faced.





Gentlemen,

In separate meetings held with the Tandy League on April 29 and with the Hall Community League on May 15 a set of guidelines to govern our baseball participation during the season ahead were discussed and agreed and, therefore, are reported here. If you question any portion of the wording of either statement do not fail to mention it immediately or at the next joint meeting.

The Tandy League and the Hall Community League are in process of being merged into one complete whole. The mutual advantages of such a move will provide new leadership for the Tandy group, new prestige and organization to the Community group, and a new and better opportunity for recreation to meny, many players. We are desirous of your cooperation in making this merger work.

PLAYING REGULATIONS - 1962

- 1. Each team shall be limited to seventeen (17) players. In addition a team may have three managers or coaches. All of the players, managers, and coaches are expected to be uniformed.
- 2. Official roster lists are due after June 10. Must be in before the game of June 15. Seven day rule for contract cards is always in effect.
- 3. A trade of players already registered by two teams may be made at any time during the season. A free agent who has not played with his team for three scheduled Sundays (consecutive) may be granted his release by the league at any time that he requests it.
- 4. Except in cases of team emergencies, no new player may be signed by any team after July 15 (All Star game on July 15, 1962)
- 5. Any player given a release by a team during the season is prohibited from being signed by any team of higher standing.

I also think that a player of


