



Responsibility for Intellectual Leadership

President, Lindenwood College

HE QUALITY of intellectual leadership in our country in this decade will be decisive in determining the quality of our national community in the next half century. Educational institutions, large and small, must face responsibility for maintaining high standards and achieving greater excellence in these days of rising costs. Those who believe that privately supported institutions are vital to the strength of higher education in America will see to it that these institutions grow in strength.

Traditional confidence in the work of these institutions is not based on parochial sentimentalism, but on their achievement. For example, a recent study of the background of men who had won the Ph.D. degree and were listed in *American Men of Science* reveals that, of the fifty leading institutions in terms of the percentage of

graduates achieving this distinction, thirty-nine were liberal arts colleges. In depth and in breadth, the reach of the good small college is significant.

As we look at our history, we are confident that the small privately supported colleges have been a help. As we examine our needs with the responsibilities now before us, they become either a burden or a great opportunity.

The accompanying maps show the dispersion of former Lindenwood students in the United States and in the world community and give some indication of the impact of the college upon the larger community.

The Long-Range Planning Committee at Lindenwood College has completed its study of more than a year and a half and has made a report to the Board of Directors of the institution. This report spells out Lindenwood's needs to meet the challenging years ahead. I think of this program as vital to the maintenance of Lindenwood's position in the world of education and to the achievement of that greater excellence that must be expected of a successful college.

Substantial gifts and bequests have been made to the College over the years by its patrons and friends without solicitation or drives. While the total cost of the proposed development program is in large amount, we are confident that not only the immediate family of the College but also the friends of this kind of education will welcome the opportunity to invest in this program. Participants will have a feeling of satisfaction and pride in assisting a successful college to reach its goals for the future.

There are many forms of giving which can be tailored to an individual's interest and convenience. We have prepared material on the making of gifts by taking full benefit of tax laws and tax credits. The Means to Translate Today's Impact

Report of the Long-Range Planning Committee
to the Board of Directors

WENTY-ONE MEMBERS from the Board of Directors, Administration, Faculty, and the Alumnae Association form the Long-Range Planning Committee of Lindenwood College, St. Charles, Missouri.

Their report, which follows, was approved by the Board of Directors of Lindenwood College on May 24, 1961:

The days in which we are living are the most tense and exciting ones in human history. Scientific discoveries are increasing knowledge at an unprecedented rate. The educator is challenged to master this new knowledge and to find the means to translate the impact of these changes into meaningful educational experiences for the student. Western society is challenged intellectually as well as politically by Marxism. Rapid developments in communications and in the international situation require study of peoples and cultures unnoticed a few years ago but now vitally affecting our lives.

Lindenwood College is searching for ways to teach our new knowledge and to prepare women for their varied roles in this changing world. The faculty is making a thorough restudy of the purposes and goals of the College and of its curricular and extracurricular programs. It is encouraging accelerated programs for those students who wish to finish their college work before marriage. It is planning a flexible curriculum which will enable the mature woman, who wishes to return to college, to complete her work or refresh her course offerings before reentering her professional field.

In order to educate women for this challenging and changing world, Lindenwood College seeks the resources which will make possible a number of important changes in its educational program.

- 1. Curricular offerings must be expanded. Additional courses in the sciences and in the world's languages and cultures are now needed. As a liberal arts college Lindenwood is concerned also with improvements in its offerings in the arts and sciences now in the curriculum. An enriched program of lectures, concerts, and conferences (supplementing formal instruction) is also planned to deepen the cultural and religious life of the College.
- 2. New methods of instruction must be introduced. Electronic equipment can greatly facilitate learning in some areas. Plans are under way for placing more responsibility on the student for her own learning through independent study. Consideration is being given to a better organization of the college calendar in order to utilize time and facilities more effectively. These developments will call for greatly increased library resources as well as improved equipment in classrooms and laboratories.
- 3. Additional faculty members will be required to teach courses not now offered and to add sections to existing courses as enrollments increase. Changes in teaching methods and growing knowledge mean additional graduate study and time for research and preparation on the part of present faculty members. To attract and hold outstanding teachers, endowed chairs for distinguished professors are needed.
- 4. New buildings, alterations, and other improvements will be required for an improved educational program for a larger student body.

The resources needed for expanding our curricular offerings, providing additional instructional equipment, adding to the faculty, improving the present plant, and constructing needed new buildings are summarized in the presentation of the goals of the Lindenwood College Development Fund Program shown on page 7.

These new facilities and resources outlined in this report will make possible an improved education for Lindenwood students. Undoubtedly additional needs will be discovered as the Lindenwood College faculty and the Long-Range Planning Committee continue their exploratory work and as the College continues to make the changes needed to maintain its place as an excellent institution of higher learning.

The following resolution was adopted at the meeting of the Board of Directors on May 24, 1961:

"The Board of Directors has received the report of the Long-Range Planning Committee and the outline of the program through which the college seeks the necessary resources to strengthen and improve its program. The Board agrees that Lindenwood College must achieve all the recommended objectives in the shortest possible time and heartily approves the plan and the program presented by the Long-Range Planning Committee. The Board pledges its support of these objectives and calls on the college administration and the faculty to assist in every way possible to insure the support and participation of alumnae, friends, patrons, leaders in business and industry, and members of our churches."





Methods for Effective Giving

An outright gift

from income or capital in the form of cash, securities, life insurance, or property

- a. Gift can be made subject to donor's reservation of life income or annuity
- b. Gift can be made as a living trust

Giving by will

- a. Lindenwood may be included in a will for an outright bequest
- b. Lindenwood may be included in a will for a bequest with life income reserved for survivor(s)
- c. By will for a contingent bequest

Life Insurance

- a. Outright gift
- Proceeds may be funded to provide income for life to person named by donor.

Your own lawyer should be consulted on legal matters pertaining to, or for the drafting of, any legal instrument, such as a will or trust agreement, that is required to put your gift into effect. For more than a century Lindenwood College has emphasized the value of a liberal education for women. The great influence of women in all areas of human life challenges the College to provide them with a liberal education of the highest order. Lindenwood College is dedicated to continued excellence in education, and the College will continue to give the best education it can to the ablest students it can find.

Gift Suggestions

Faculty Additional endowments to increase faculty salaries; to endow chairs in particular departments; to create new distinguished professorships; to establish lectureships; to provide funds to assist faculty members with advanced study, research, and writing.

Students Increasing endowments for scholarships for able students who could not otherwise attend Lindenwood.

Religion and the Arts

Endowments for an enriched program of lectures and conferences planned to deepen the intellectual and religious life of the College, for musical concerts, and for a permanent art collection.

Library Funds for adding a substantial number of selected volumes to Lindenwood's library collection; microfilm equipment and library; rare and special reference works and manuscripts which cannot be purchased within the regular budget.

Higher Education

IS EVERYBODY'S CONCERN*

A CCORDING to one of the foremost authorities on our national manpower needs: "The state of the world for some centuries to come may hinge upon the effectiveness with which the United States employs her intellectual resources." For never in history has the need for educated leadership been so acute.

You may not at first realize it, but you have the same kind of stake in higher education as in national defense. These are the two sides of the same protective shield.

The progress of the United States as a dynamic and free society has been due in part to the fact that we have provided more educational opportunity of more kinds for more of our people than any other nation.

Higher education has been one of the main bulwarks of our national life. In a highly competitive world our kind of democracy can remain strong only if we have educated manpower sufficient to meet the demands of a nation still growing both in quality and in size.

We are already in an uncomfortable position. Right now there are critical shortages of educated manpower in education vital to the Nation's well-being. 
