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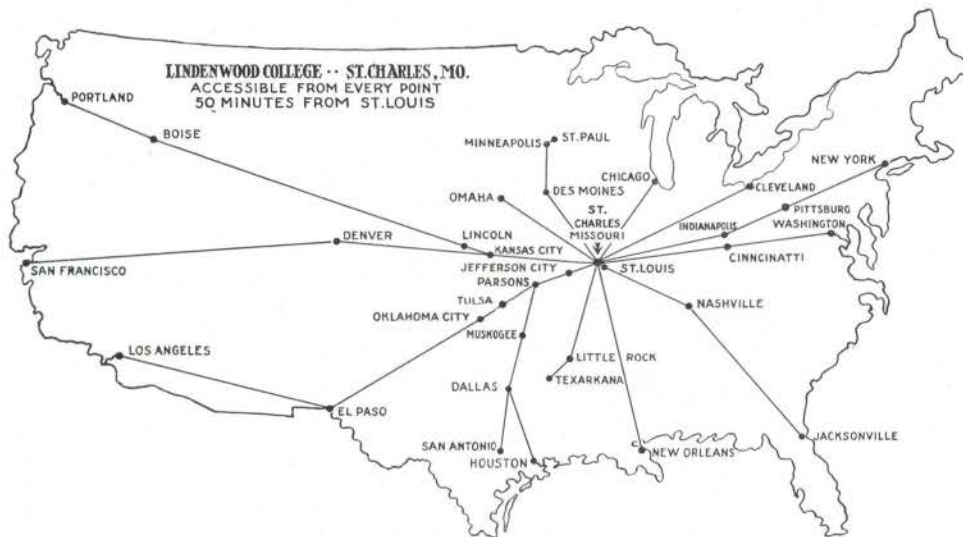

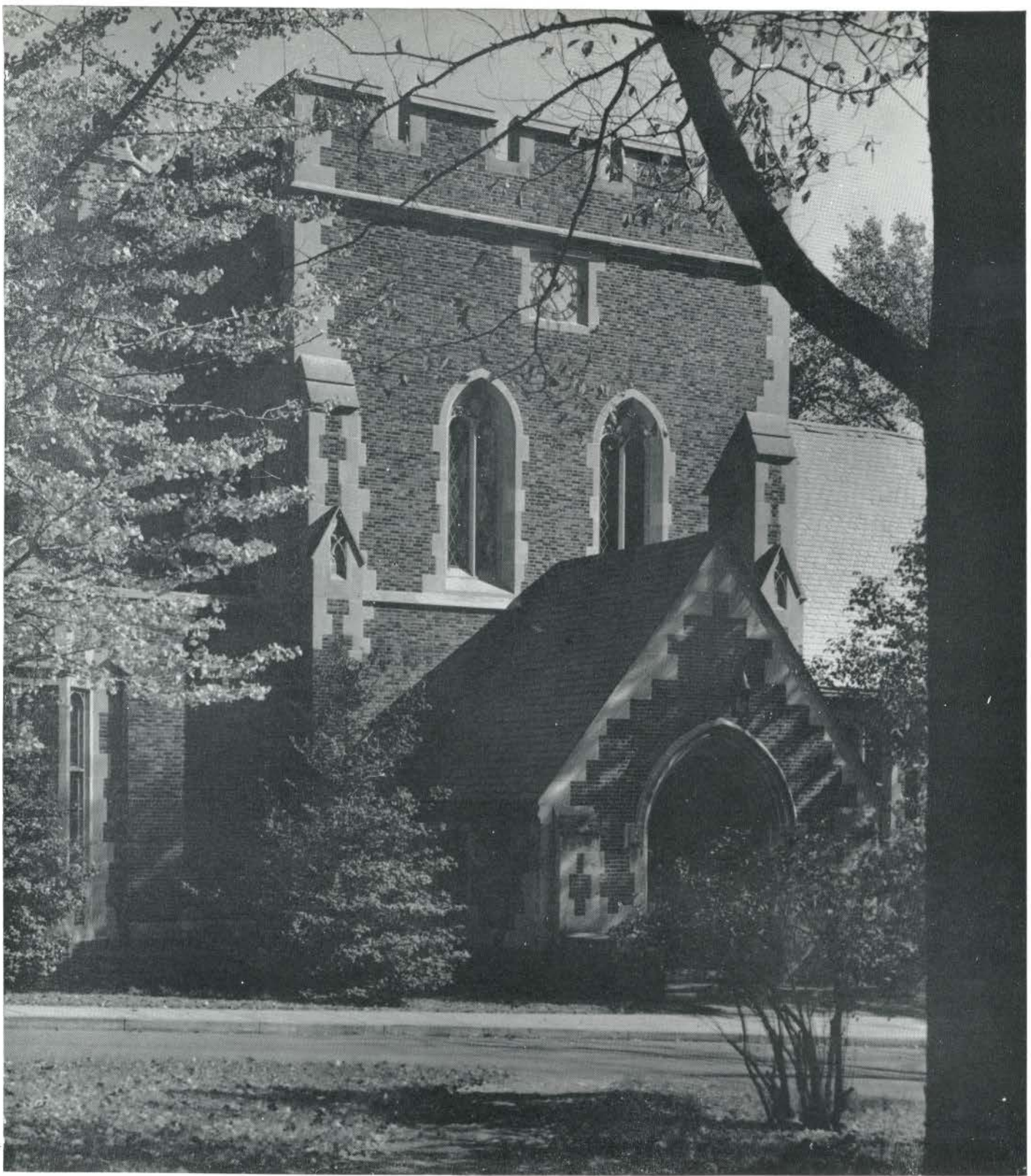
Let your mind be full of curiosity to explore great books, and the wisdom of the ages.

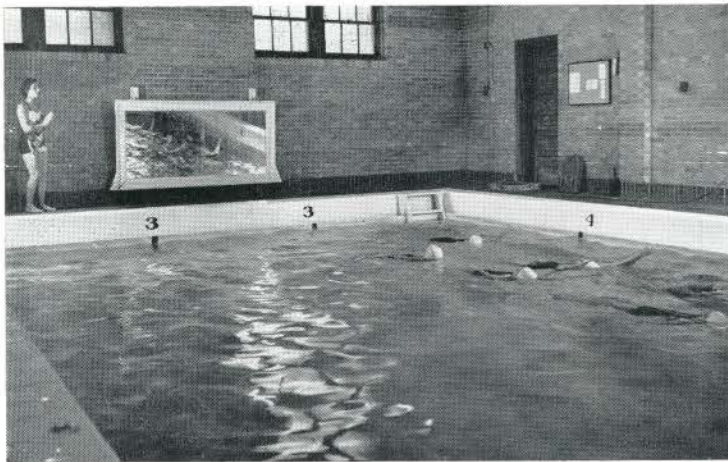

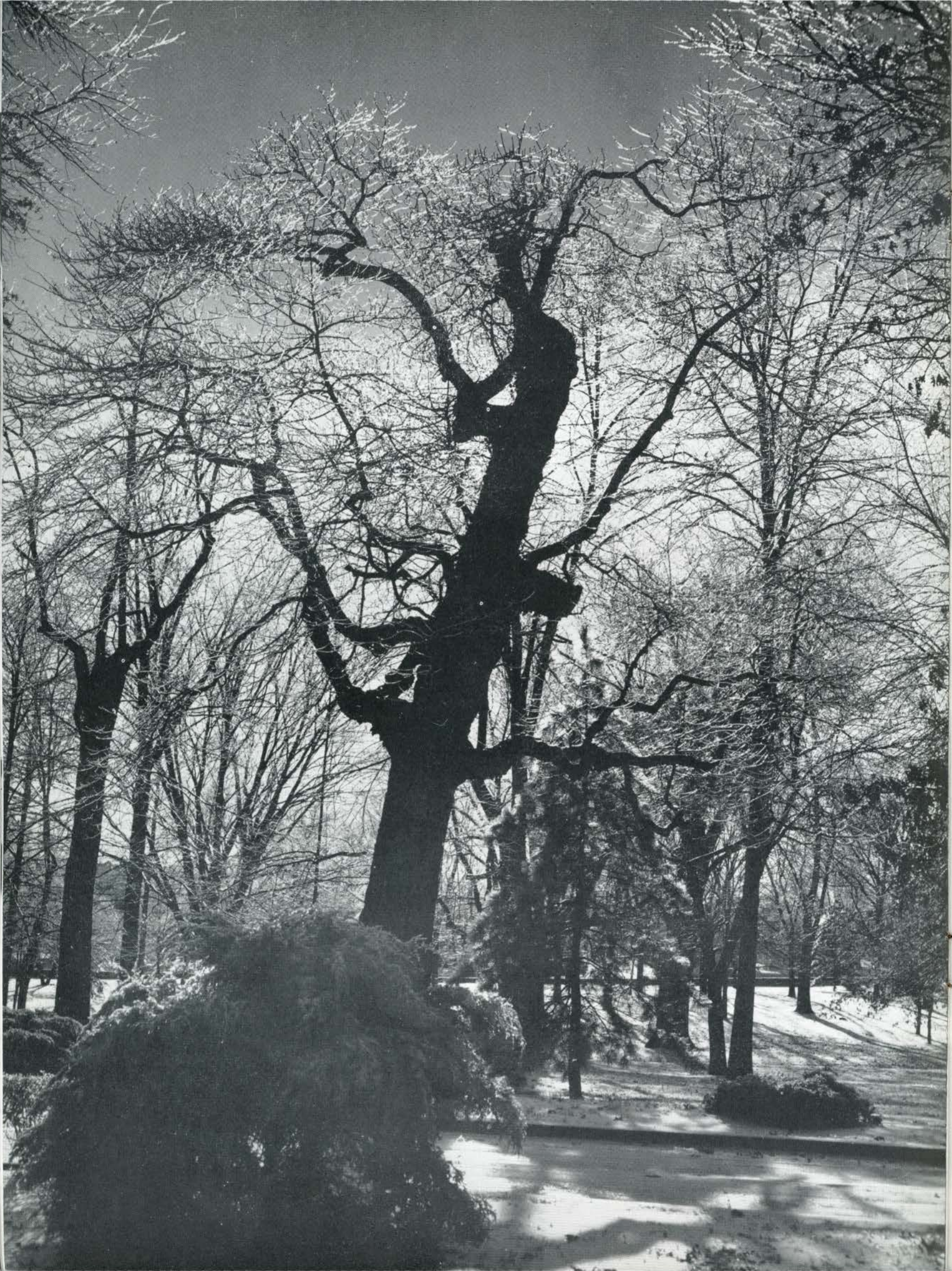

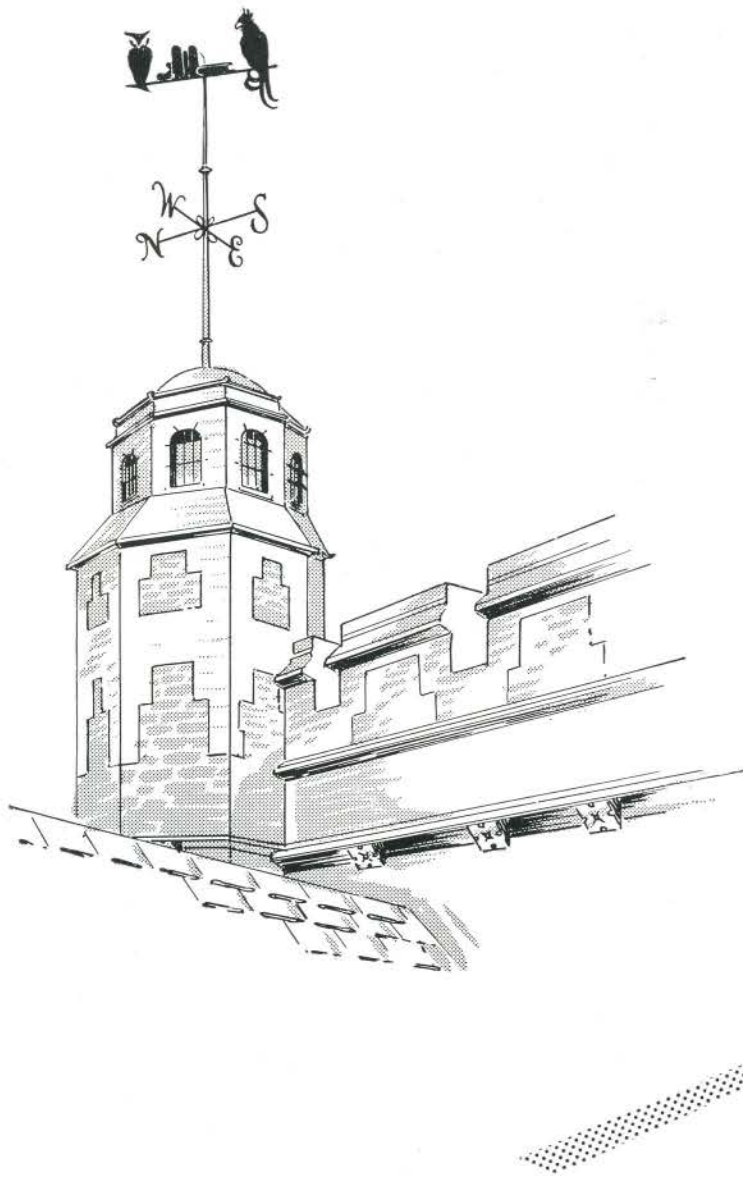

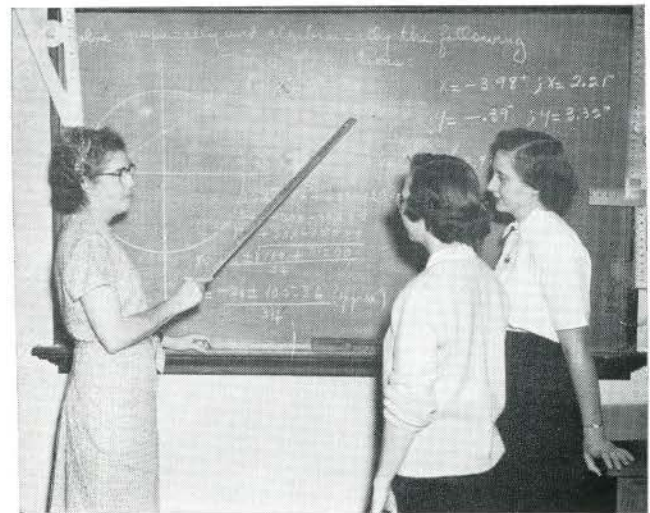

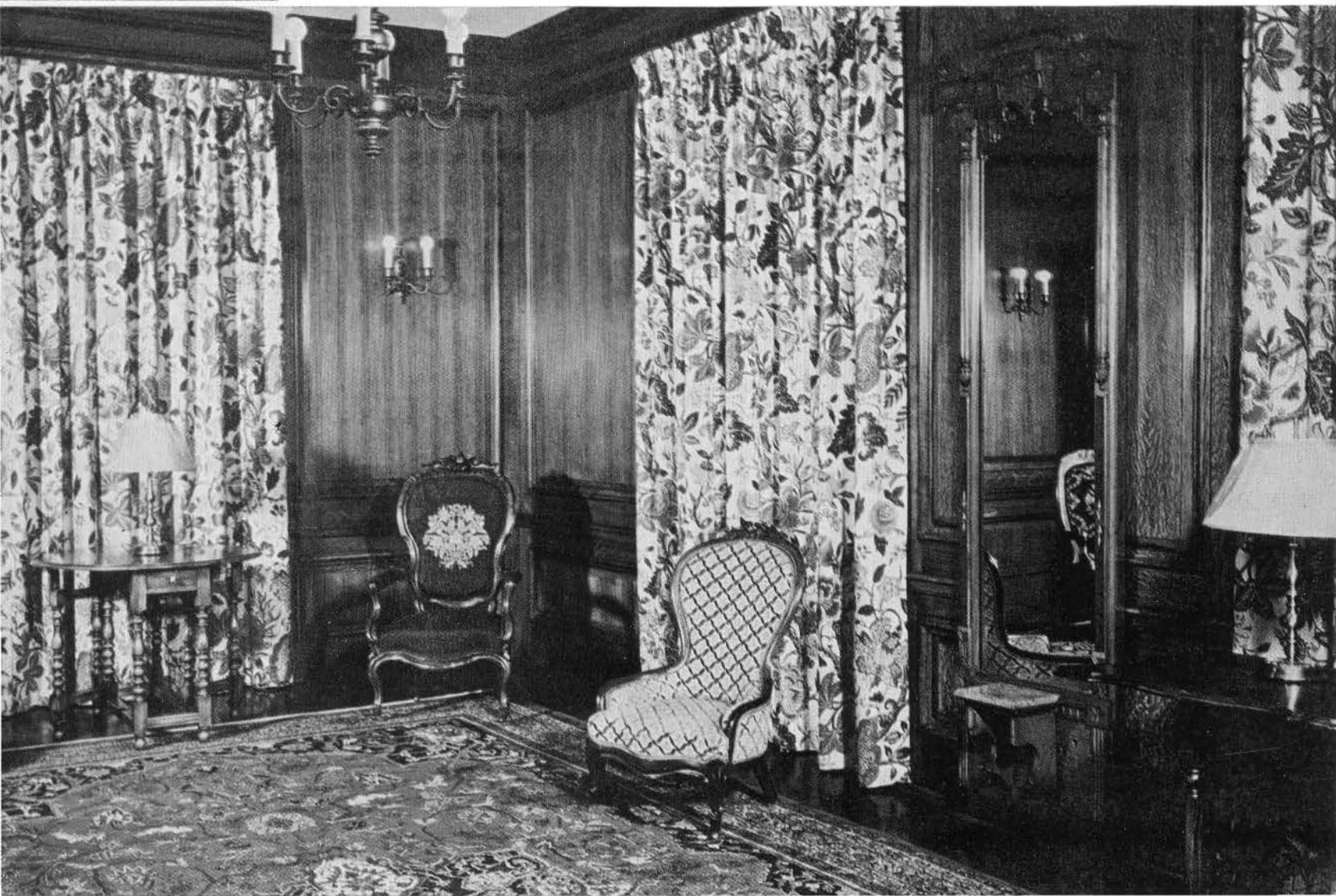

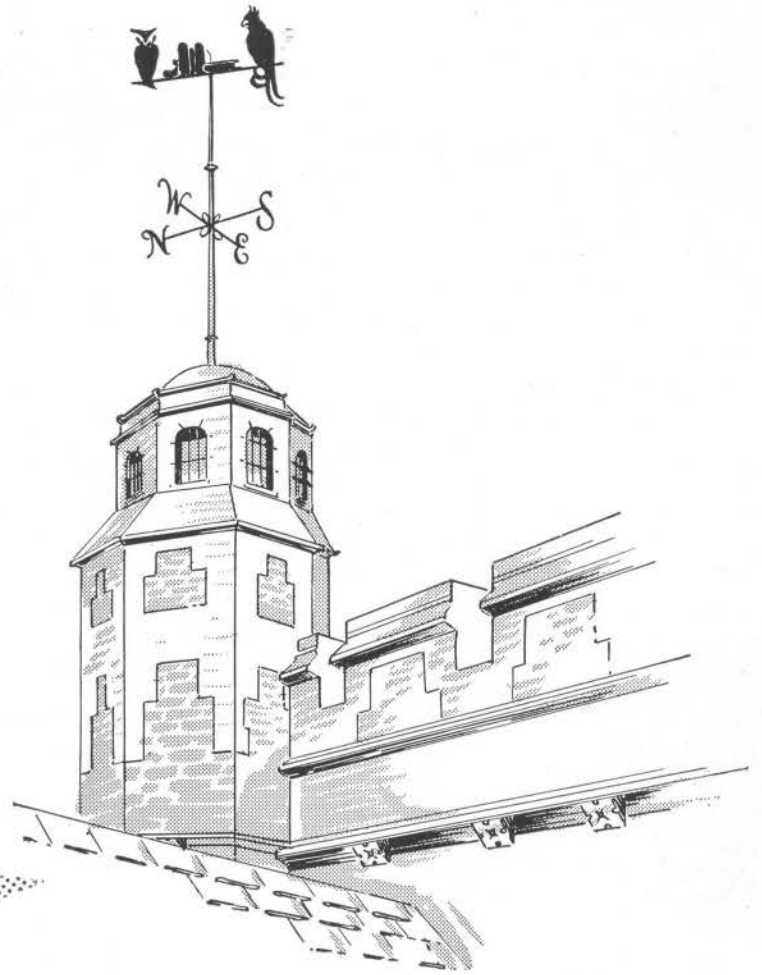

Vocational Home Economics

The Home Economics Department of Lindenwood College has been approved by the State Department of Education to give vocational teacher training. This is the only college for women so approved in the State of Missouri. Young women so trained have opportunity to be appointed to teaching positions in high schools whose Home Economics Department falls under the provisions of the Smith-Hughes Act. Such positions command high ranking earnings in the teaching profession.

A major in Foods and Nutrition includes practice in four fully equipped kitchens and in a Home Management House where students "run a home."

So long as men get hungry they will need women who know how to prepare and serve a good dinner.



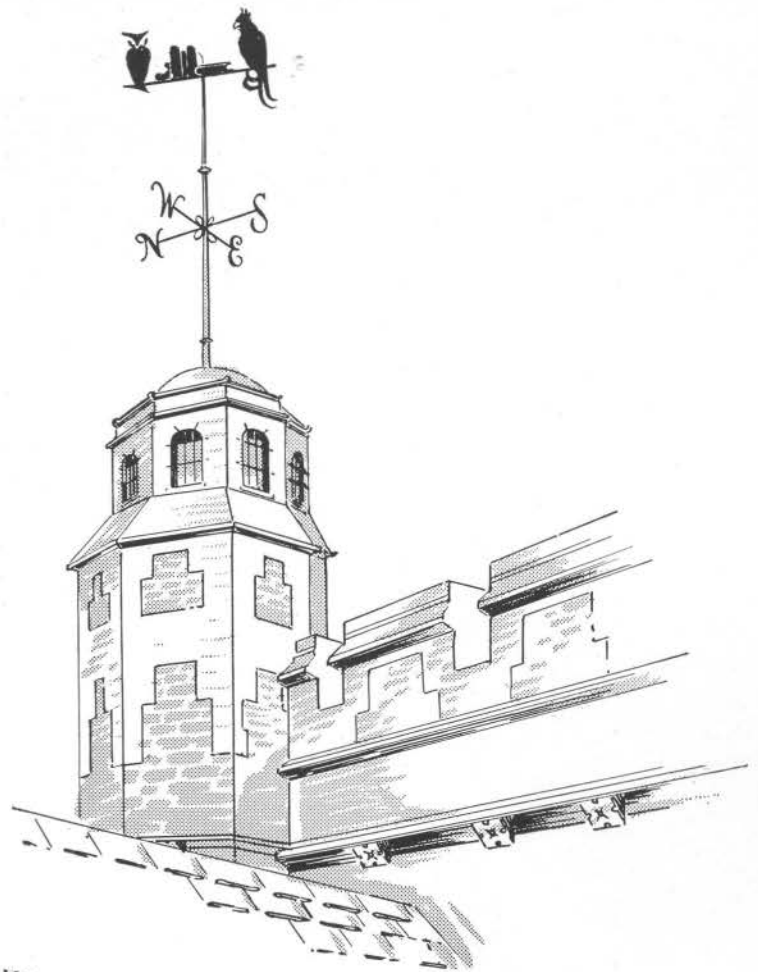
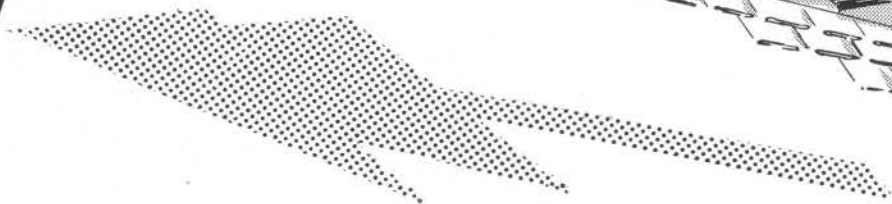

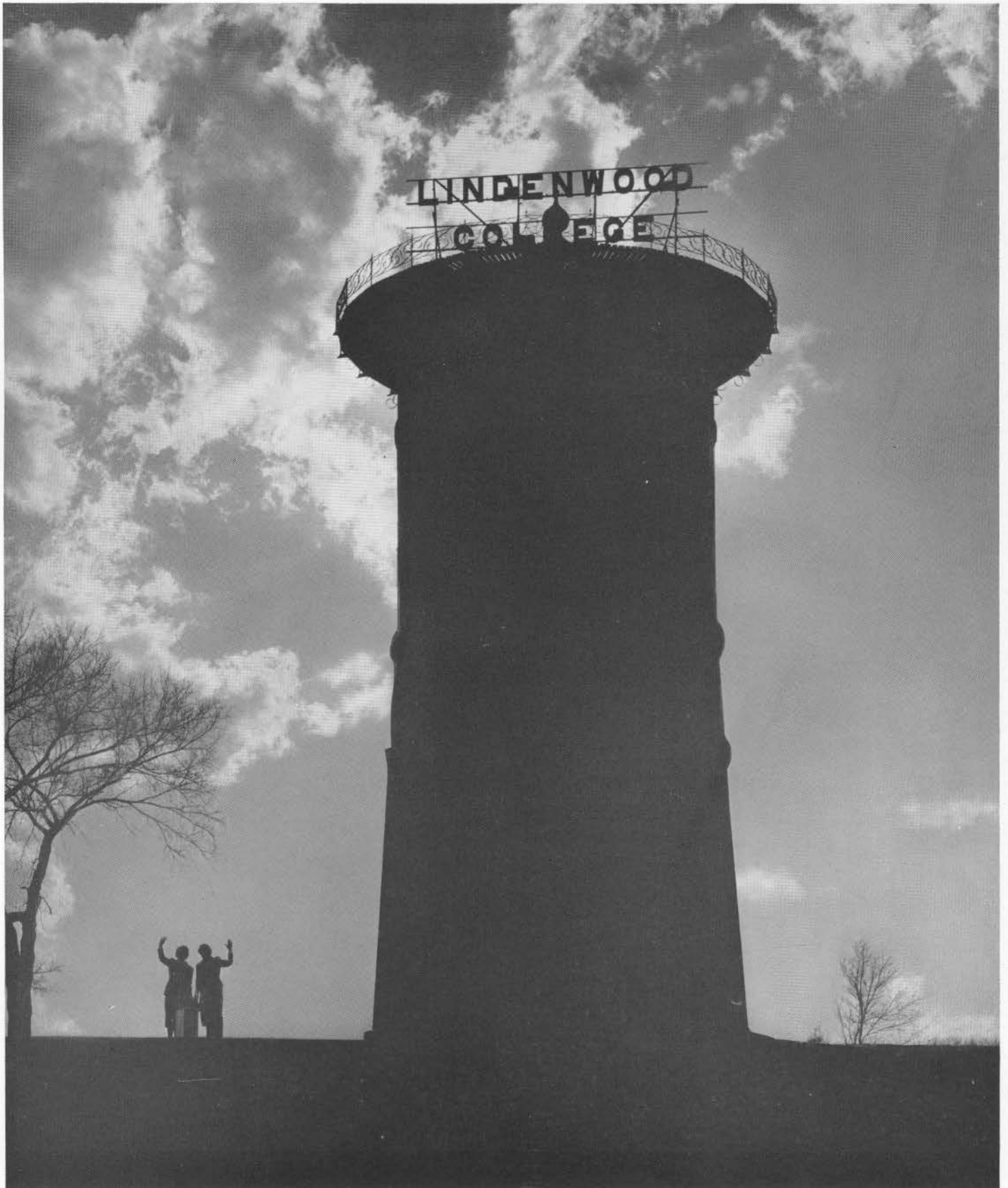
This major leads to the A.B. degree. Through electives occupational competence may be acquired.
