#### VOLUNTEERS SOUGHT FOR RELAXATION STUDIES

Volunteers 17-50 years of age are invited to participate in an ongoing study of relaxation involving imagery currently being conducted at Lindenwood. Participants will learn a process for relaxing which uses imagery during two sessions which will begin March 11. The research is being conducted by Richard Rickert, Ph.D., associate professor of philosophy and LCIE faculty advisor. Those interested in volunteering should contact Dr. Rickert at extension #227.

Dr. Rickert and two psychotherapists recently have completed an initial study of several processes for relaxation using imagery. The continuing research will provide a further testing of these processes, he said. Subjects in the study are residents of the St. Charles community and Lindenwood students.

#### SPAINHOWER TO DELIVER CONVOCATION TO STUDENTS

President James Spainhower will conduct a convocation for Evening College students at Lindenwood's Lake St. Louis Center on March 15. It will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Lakeview Lounge, 1000 Lake St. Louis Blvd., Lake St. Louis. The convocation, similar to recent ones at the main campus and satellite branches in Clayton, St. Louis and West St. Louis County, is part of recent efforts to unite all Lindenwood students "to build a sense of a total college among the institution's various components," Dr. Spainhower said. The session is open to all Lake St. Louis residents as well as Lindenwood faculty members, staff employees and Evening College students.

#### PROFESSOR PLANS SPRING STUDY TO MEXICO

Raymond Scupin, Ph.D., assistant professor of anthropology, is sponsoring a travel/study course to Mexico May 12-23. The trip is designed to offer Lindenwood student and other interested persons with opportunities to experience and learn about various aspects of Mexican culture. Scheduled are tours to sites and museums in Mexico City, archaeological sites in the area, pyramids in Teotihuacan, trips to Cuernavaca and Taxco and a visit to the famed Folkoric Ballet.

To obtain two social science credits for the course, "Cultures of Mexico," students must register, pay the \$200 tuition and satisfactorily complete the course. Students will be expected to complete some reading assignments and to keep a journal. Alumni and interested friends of Lindenwood are invited to accompany the class. The cost for the trip, including round-trip air fare from St. Louis to Mexico City, travel and lodging, is \$700.

### PRODUCTIVE GRADUATES IS PROGRAM'S GOAL

Lindenwood has embarked upon a unique prototype program designed to teach students the value of work in life and in society. The innovative work-study program will contribute to the discovery of new insights into the value of the work ethic and into an increase in productivity, college officials say. The concept of the new program involves three components - reinforcing and redefining personal values, strengthening basic academic skills and preparing students for work experiences with practical applications.

Spearheaded by new leadership under Dr. Spainhower, Lindenwood's value approach centers upon recognizing the primary importance of values in higher education and in life itself. Lindenwood is reaffirming its historical commitment to the intellectual values implicit in the Judaeo-Christian faith, Dr. Spainhower said.

To strengthen basic academic skills, Lindenwood is increasing its measurement of general skill performance, focusing upon written and verbal communications. It also is encouraging its students to take part in cooperative education programs in the business community, according to Ed Watkins, a national career development specialist who is working with the Lindenwood program.

To better prepare students for more productive employment positions, Lindenwood recently received a federal grant totaling nearly \$72,000 for the implementation of this program to better serve the needs of future graduates and the area's business communities.

According to Watkins, the program offers students and employers learning ctions, consisting of full-time cooperative education, part-time internship programs on and off campus, summer jobs and part-time employment. Compensation for students in the program can consist of salaried positions, volunteer time or college credit of up to 24 hours during a four-year period. Geared toward the promotion and connection of student skills to the business community, the new program will help insure that students have a professionally-related work experience before they graduate.

Coupled with new approaches to values, the program enables students to learn how to work. In learning the value of work, they can discover their own talents and aptitudes, develop basic academic skills and, then, choose their course studies and majors with some degree of certainty and discernment. The work experience also enables undergraduates to gain more job apprentice to test their fields of interest, Watkins said. In its first operation last semester, the program placed 50 of 61 students who enrolled.

Lindenwood recently reapplied for additional financial support for continuation of the program. One of the keys to continued funding stems from Dr. Spainhower's leadership which commits the institution to teaching "that there are educational values inherent in a college program that provides, encourages and requires actual work experiences as integral features of its academic curriculum," Watkins said.

In announcing the cutback, Dr. Spainhower said he realized there "are times when long-distance calls should be made, but we can and we must reduce this expense. I would encourage restraint in making long-distance calls. Remember, we still have a 20¢ stamp and, frequently, a letter will accomplish the same objective as a telephone call and at much less expense."
