

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
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Letter from the PRESIDENT

SCIENCE STUDENTS LEAVE INTERNATIONAL IMPACTS By Phoebe Pinkner | University Photographer/Videographer

Associate Professor of Earth Sciences Dr. Ana Londono had an idea in 2021—one that felt almost too far-fetched to be possible. She wanted to initiate a service-learning project where students would connect with a rural community in Latin America, meet virtually with the locals, learn about the environmental challenges they faced, propose an action plan to remedy those issues, and empower students to affect positive change in the world. This is precisely what happened in the 2022 spring semester.

For many students in Londono's Fundamentals of Environmental Science class, this was their first time engaging with the subject. Londono contacted the NGO Global Bergade, whose facilitators connected her students with the rural community La Palma in southern Honduras.

When the student participation costs were shown to be higher than expected, Associate Provost for Engaged Learning Dr. Mark Valenzuela found the money necessary to ensure each of Londono's students were able to engage in the project.

Once the service-learning began, students quickly learned La Palma had a strong sense of community and belonging, low crime rates, strong leadership, and awareness of their most pressing issues. These included lack of jobs, clean water, sanitation, transportation, and education. "...All these things I take for granted on a daily basis. I was so grateful to learn about [La Palma's] challenges, and I can now use this experience to ground myself," student Saskia Fuchs said. "We all get stuck in our own problems and thoughts from time to time, forgetting how lucky we are and how privileged our issues are."



Over the course of the semester, Londono's students were forced out of their comfort zones by communicating in Spanish, confronting real-world environmental issues, and drafting sustainable solutions for a community thousands of miles away.

"This was an amazing learning experience in so many ways... it has shaped the way I see the world," said student Ella Dishong.

Global Brigades facilitators recommended the students meet a need of the community and present them with the relevant tools, empowering La Palma to solve the issue themselves. This approach was designed to ensure the community's long-term self-sufficiency.

"Even with the language barrier and extra hours we encountered, there was a community that relied on us, so we had to made it work," Londono stated.

At the end of the project, the students created a community action plan and presented it to La Palma's community leaders, not knowing if they would accept it or not. The students presented it not as a solution that would solve all their issues, but as a course of action that could improve the locals' quality of life in a multitude of ways.

The plan focused on La Palma establishing committees and utilizing reforestation to improve their living situation. By planting trees in and around their community, La Palma was better positioned to gain water accessibility, shadier areas for humans and livestock, increased firewood stores, less erosion, and future job prospects. The community leaders showed interest in the idea, asking the students numerous questions.

"Seeing how appreciative the community was after the presentation made the work worth it," said student Justin Sherman.

Within a week of presenting, the students learned the La Palma community had already approached the local Global Brigades chapter to start the reforestation process.

"I've always known that I play a very small part in this world. I've done my fair share of traveling, and after I left the Marine Corps, I thought I was done [affecting change]. Seeing that I can make a change without leaving was eye-opening," said Sherman. "Now that the project is over, I want to see what other impacts I can make going forward."

"This experience reminded me that I need to see my passion and knowledge as a gift that I can use to make a difference," stated Fuchs. "You are never too small to make a difference or inspire other people." Seeing how appreciative the community was after the presentation made the work worth it.

INCLUSIVE ECOSYSTEM GRANT

TechSTL, St. Louis Community College and Lindenwood University have received a nearly \$300,000 research grant to study barriers to resources

for entrepreneurs of color and workers in technology startups across the region.

Researchers will use the inclusive ecosystem grant funds from the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation over the next three years to compile data on the gaps in resources and startup growth for entrepreneurs of color. They also will explore upward mobility, job training and diversity in the tech industry. The technology group is working with faculty and staff from Lindenwood University's Center for Applied Economics, which will serve as the primary project lead.



LINDENWOOD SCOREBOARD LIVES ON

Thanks to the generous support of Simmons Hanly Conroy Law Firm, Lindenwood University installed a new video board in Harlen C. Hunter Stadium to enhance the gameday experience. The existing system was refurbished and repurposed, and in partnership with installers from Conference Technology, was donated to a local school district. Lindenwood's former score board now serves the Christian School District in O'Fallon, Mo.



COMMUNITY GARDEN ON CAMPUS

Lindenwood University has partnered with St. Charles County Farm Bureau to create the Lindenwood Open Classroom, a community garden for students and the community to learn together. This space has so much potential for students to learn about sustainability, the community to come onto campus and see what Lindenwood all is about, along with outside organizations being able to teach right on our campus. The garden opened in March with a Planting Party. Materials and funding were donated by St. Charles County Farm Bureau along with the manual labor and teachings from Boerding Farm.

FACULTY PROFILE

In 1984, **Mira Ezvan** joined the faculty at Lindenwood College. Throughout the last 38 years, Ezvan's impact on students and colleagues has enriched lives and imparted a legacy of excellence. As one of the most senior members on campus, Ezvan has served as University Marshal at commencement carrying in the mace as an official part of the ceremony. Ezvan is currently a Professor of Information Systems in the Robert W. Plaster College of Business and Entrepreneurship.

How did your path lead to Lindenwood? After completing a master's in information systems at Technical University of Wroclaw (Politechnika Wroclawska) in Poland in 1978, I was offered a graduate assistantship through an academic exchange program with Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. Upon completion of my PhD, I joined the faculty of Lindenwood College in 1984, where I designed and taught courses in management information systems for the Department of Business.

What keeps you at Lindenwood? The most rewarding part of being at Lindenwood for the past 38 years has been to witness the University' growth in terms of enrollment as well as academic reputation. The opportunity to interact with generations of students and to work with supportive colleagues and deans has been so professionally fulfilling and personally enjoyable. I never expected to be at Lindenwood for so many years, to serve as Faculty Marshal at graduation ceremonies, and to become one of the more senior faculty members on campus.

In 2019, at the gala celebrating the 100th anniversary of Lindenwood's Plaster College of Business and Entrepreneurship, I had a chance to talk to some of my



former students who have gone on to become very successful in their careers, and who remembered me fondly as their Management Science professor. Knowing that I have made a positive difference in their lives, and knowing that I helped prepare them for their careers and

lives has been a tremendously rewarding. I guess you could say teaching at Lindenwood has become a large part of my extended family and even my identity.

What advice do you hope your graduates remember when they leave Lindenwood? I hope they appreciate the value of education, and be tenacious, resilient, and adaptive to change. Courses that were challenging, that took them out of their comfort zone, hopefully prepared them for an everchanging world and an uncertain future. Life-long learning is not just a slogan; it is a reality we all need to embrace.

What is something unique you'd like to share? Even though I teach quantitative courses and come from an engineering background, I am a strong proponent of liberal arts education. Knowing history, literature, fine arts and foreign languages is to me an integral part of college experience. I speak French, German, and of course, my Polish is impeccable. It is gratifying to travel, to learn about other cultures and know how to converse with others, whether I am in Krakow, Dresden or Paris. I enjoy reading (currently my personal favorites are Olga Tokarczuk and Alice Munro) and I am very fond of long walks and foreign movies.

Connor Harris was a three-time All-American and four-time all-MIAA selection during his career as a Lion from 2012–16. The Lee's Summit, Mo. native started all 48 games in which he appeared in at Lindenwood and finished his career as the NCAA All-Division record holder for career tackles with 633. Following the 2016 campaign, Harris was recognized as the winner of the Cliff Harris Award as the National Small College Defensive Player of the Year. Harris went on to sign a free agent contract with the New York Jets in 2017 before spending time with the Arizona Cardinals and the Cincinnati Bengals organizations during 2017 and 2018.



PATRICK ROSS | HEAD COACH | FOOTBALL | 2004-16

Patrick Ross directed the Lindenwood football program from 2004–16 and remains the winningest head football coach in program history with a record of 93-57 (.620 winning percentage). Ross led the Lions to four Heart of America Conference Championships and five NAIA postseason appearances. Following his first season at Lindenwood in 2004 which resulted in an 11-1 record, Ross was recognized as the Schutt Sports National Coach of the Year. Ross would earn a similar honor after a 13-1 season in 2009 when he was honored as the NAIAfootball.net National Coach of the Year. Ross helped to cement Lindenwood's place as a national power with back-to-back NAIA National Semifinal appearances in 2008-09, which included a trip to the NAIA National Championship game in 2009.

JANEL TEIKEN | STUDENT-ATHLETE | CROSS COUNTRY/TRACK AND FIELD | 1990–94

Janel Teiken was a standout within the Lindenwood cross country and track and field program from 1990–94. By the end of her time as a Lion, Teiken had claimed 15 all-district awards between outdoor track, indoor track, and cross country. Teiken, a native of Kearney, Mo., qualified nine times for the NAIA National Championships combined in cross country, indoor track, and outdoor track. Teiken became the first female runner in program history to receive recognition as an NAIA All-American, earning the distinction for the 3,000-meter run at the 1993 NAIA Indoor National Championships. As of 2022, Teiken remains in the top 10 times for two running events for Lindenwood Track and Field records.

RANDY KARRAKER | MERITORIOUS SERVICE AWARD

Randy Karraker graduated from Lindenwood University in 1984 with a degree in communications. Since that time, Karraker has built a career as a premiere sports voice within the St. Louis region. Karraker has become synonymous with St. Louis sports in roles that include everything from talk radio host to play-by-play broadcaster on the most recognizable networks in the area. Karraker continues his involvement at Lindenwood University in a variety of ways that include time spent as a charter member of the President's Council, a member of the Alumni Advisory Board, and as the emcee of numerous athletics events, including several Hall of Fame Induction Ceremonies.

A FAMILY LEGACY By Hazel Denother '23

Lindenwood legacy is a big part of sisters Jane Rogers and Nancy Calvert's lives.

Their mother, Eloise Worthington, was the first member of the family to fall in love with the school. Eloise attended Lindenwood for a year and a half; she dropped out because of the expense of college post-Depression and because she and her soon-to-be husband, Preston Calvert, were making wedding plans. Eloise was proud of her alma mater, and it remained an important part of her life.

Nancy and Jane first visited Lindenwood in the summer of 1956, when Nancy was a rising high school senior. Nancy fell in love with Lindenwood and decided to commit to the school that very day. Jane, at just eight years old, was pre-registered the same day.

Both Jane and Nancy studied communications and were involved with Lindenwood's KCLC radio station. They each had a special relationship with Martha Boyer, former communications professor and founder of the Lindenwood radio station, and they admired her unique and progressive teaching style. They said of their university experience, "[We love Lindenwood] for the education and experiences it provided for each of our careers and our lives."

Since her graduation in 1961, Nancy has led an impressive career in marketing, advertising, and public relations. In 1976, she became the first woman to hold an executive position

at the Electro-Motive Division of General Motors when she became director of public relations and advertising. In 1989, she became director of marketing communications at Shure Incorporated in Evanston, Illinois. Ever-loyal to her alma mater, Nancy donated equipment to Lindenwood through her job at Shure.

Jane graduated from Lindenwood in 1967 and went on to receive a Master of Arts in communications at Indiana University, her father's alma mater. Jane has worked as a market research executive at Cahners Publishing Company and eventually founded her own successful media consulting business, Preston/Rogers Associates, Inc., which has clients throughout the United States and the United Kingdom.

Staying involved with Lindenwood has been very important to the sisters and to their late mother. In a 2002 speech at a Lindenwood alumni awards presentation, Nancy said, "... [Our] mother was always happy to give what she could to Lindenwood. More importantly she urged both of us to give back to Lindenwood in time, talent, and financial support because of the fine education it afforded us and how well it had prepared us for the work world."

Eloise, Jane, and Nancy are members of the Sibley Heritage Society, and the sisters are members of the Butler Society. They were also active with the Board of Directors, the Alumni Association, and the Board of Trustees. Jane and Nancy established an endowed scholarship in honor of their late parents and a scholarship for Jane's late husband. In 2005,

A GREATER MISSION


Jennifer Fear '88, Eric Reinsfelder '87, and Dave Tilden '86 have joined forces for an incredible journey spanning the Appalachian Trail to raise awareness and support for Multiple Sclerosis and to impart a legacy that lives on for years to come.

"My first steps on the Appalachian Trail were in October 2016. Earlier that year I'd been hospitalized after losing the use of my legs," Fear said. Diagnosed with multiple sclerosis, a degenerative autoimmune disease attacking the central nervous system, Fear was determined to fight. "As a way of pushing back against MS, I did my first long-distance hike—a 76-mile section of the Appalachian Trail through the Smoky Mountains, followed by a thru-hike of Missouri's 230-mile Ozark Trail in 2020."



Fear wasn't going to stop there and began to consider what it would take to hike the entirety of the Appalachian Trail. "I knew what I'd be asking of my body and that to do it, I needed a much bigger 'why' than just me. I wanted to raise awareness and funds to fight a disease affecting some 1 million

people in the U.S. A ground crew came together to support the project, college friends Dave Tilden and Eric Reinsfelder among them, and FEARSOME is the result."

After nearly two years of conversation and planning, they're ready. 2,194 miles of trail stand before Fear, who will be joined by Tilden as her hiking partner and on-trail chef. Reinsfelder will also be supporting the hike, helping to coordinate and plant the journey—reuniting college friends from more than 30 years ago for a greater cause.

"Lindenwood afforded us the opportunity to bond with friends that we have now known for much longer than we were old at the time. Family. Our friendships are so deep and meaningful that we still stay connected and support each other," Reinsfelder shared.

The three have many fond memories from their years at Lindenwood—Fear remembers her nights competing as a

soccer player under the lights and working in the KCLC studio, while Reinsfelder recalls basketball games, a late-night concert on the turf that rolled over into the old Butler Dome, and Tilden "making us the best breakfasts on Saturday mornings."

In addition to making a memorable breakfast for others, Tilden's favorite memory was the sense of family with the students who lived together.


In February 2022, Lindenwood University announced its bid to reclassify from NCAA Division II to NCAA Division I athletics.
