Lindenwood's KCLC named best student-run radio station in St. Louis

Lindenwood University's student-run radio station, KCLC, was recently named the 1998 Best Student-Run Radio Station in St. Louis by the March of Dimes during the organization's annual Achievement in Radio Awards ceremony.

The awards are part of an annual broadcast competition sponsored by the organization to celebrate excellence in St. Louis-area radio.

Lindenwood's winning entry consisted of a number of student-produced on-air promotional announcements highlighting news coverage, music programming and sports. Production Director Dennis McGrane, a junior majoring in communication, digitally edited the material and was on hand to accept the award on behalf of KCLC.

"We are extremely pleased to be recognized by the March of Dimes in this competition," said Lindenwood President Dennis Spellmann. "We are proud of this group of students and the award is a wonderful honor to kick off our golden anniversary of broadcasting at the university."

KCLC, a 25,500-watt FM station at 89.1 MHz, is owned by Lindenwood University and began operating as an AM station in 1948. KCLC-FM began broadcasting in 1968. The stations are used as student learning laboratories in conjunction with the university's communication division.



Men's track team brings home first ever national title

The Lindenwood University men's track team won the NAIA national indoor track championship Feb. 27 and 28 in Lincoln, Neb.

Lindenwood won by just six points, holding off a challenge from Azusa Pacific, California Baptist and Oklahoma Baptist Colleges. The Lindenwood finish is credited in large part to individual national

champions Sharif Karie in the mile (4:05.47) and Gezachw Yossef in the 1,000 meters (2:25.31). Yossef finished second to Karie in the mile (4:06.21), and Karie was second in the 800 meters (1:55.17).

These two athletes in the three events accounted for 36 of Lindenwood's 62 points.

"It was an incredible performance and a tribute to a hardworking team," said Coach John Creer: "But I did say team.

1998 BASEBALL PREVIEW

LIONS EXPECT NOTHING LESS THAN POST SEASON PLAY

Talking to Coach Shane Bowyer about this year's season gets him really excited. He knows that he has the big guns to take the conference title. Bowyer knew that last year's team was missing just a few ingredients. After an excellent season of recruiting, the Lion sluggers are polishing up for what they hope will be a run at the title. The biggest chunk of recruiting came from Ft. Scott Community College in Kansas, where the Lions were able to pick up three impact players. Here is a breakdown of this year's team.

HITTING: The phrase that will be heard all throughout this year will be "Run Production." In addition to last year's leaders of Jaime Montenegro and Richard Austin, the Lions were able to add speed and power to this year's line-up. Brad Burbridge and Steve Lutbeg will lead-off for the Lions this year. If they can reach base, there should be no problem bringing them home. The middle of the order may be the best in school history with the recent addition of first baseman Sandy Barretti of Puerto Rico. Last year for Ft. Scott, Barretti hit 27 home runs and drove in more than 100 runs. The addition of Barretti will help third baseman Montenegro. Last year he led the team in hitting, and with Sandy behind him, his numbers should go up from last year. Also contributing to the power section of the line-up will be Pat Origliasso. The rest of the line-up is very strong, and there will be several players that can hit as a D.H. This team could very well average ten runs per game.

<u>PITCHING:</u> If you keep up on baseball, you know that it is important to have a number-one starter. Major league teams have been paying millions just to have that number-one guy. Coach Bowyer has that this year in Junior college transfer Alex Correa. In his sophomore year at Ft. Scott, Correa went undefeated and had a microscopic earned run average. What will make the Lions even tougher is the depth of the rotation. Bowyer feels that he will get quality innings out of his entire staff.

<u>FIELDING</u>: The Lions will be very tough in the field, especially up the middle. Jeff Maldari will be in center and has the speed to cut many balls off in the alley. Ryan Froehlich and Dalphie Correa will be a dangerous tandem that will turn many double plays at second and short. Correa who played with brother Alex and Barretti, has tremendous range and his arm has major league potential. Joining Correa and Froehlich will be Montenegro at third and Origliasso at first.

Lindenwood's Sean Birren finished 3rd in the nation in a strong field in the 5,000 meters (14.36.90), and the 4X400 relay team consisting of Tanner Waits, James Williams, Carl Haywood and Kirthly Richardson, clinched the national championship for the team with a second place finish (3:17.22) in the final event. Lindenwood had led by just two points prior to that.

In the long jump, Chris Matheny finished 5th with a jump of 23', and Julian Smith took 3rd in the triple jump with a 48'11". Lindenwood also earned points from a fourth place finish by Gezachw Yossef, Robert Walker, Eddie Harris and Sharif Karie in the distance medley relay (10:05.81).

This is Lindenwood's first-ever national championship. Karie was declared tournament MVP.

1998 Softball Preview

The excitement can be felt everywhere on campus for this year's lady sluggers. Coach Rob Westling has put together what he hopes is a team that will bring home a league championship. This year's squad has has a good balance of youth and experience that should build the blocks for not only this season but years to come.

Hitting: This year's team is blessed with both speed and power. The Lady Lions will be able to manufacture runs with their speed and blast home runs with the middle of the batting order looking like murder's row. One of the main contributors to this year's offense should be junior standout Tracey Dames. She is coming into the 1998 season after all-conference performances in her Freshman and Sophomore year. Last year she was able to lead the Lions in many power categories. This year she hopes to build on those numbers. Although coach Westling is looking for Dames to have a great year, he hopes to get some production out of senior Julie Metzger, junior Chris Berendzen and Junior transfer Kelly Austene. The rest of the lineup will have the job of getting on base for the big guns to drive them in. Leading this category will be sophomores Karen Peer and Sarah Hickey and freshmen Michelle Patrico and Mellissa Bullington.

<u>Pitching:</u> The Lady Lions will have a luxury that few teams have when it comes to pitching – depth. Leading the way will be freshman transfer Sallie Henry. She will be the Lions number one sarter on the mound. There will be a battle for the number-two spot between Austene, sophomore Steffani Theobald and freshman Tracie Cassidy. All four ladies were to get a lot of work over the week-long road trip in Florida over spring break. This depth will give coach Westling many options when it comes down to crunch time.

Fielding: As in previous years, Westling will demand that the defense be the strong suit for the Lady Lions. This year's team looks to be no different. Setting up the defense will be the job of senior Julie Metzger. She will be calling the plays from behind the plate with a great arm and excellent defensive skills. Austene should lead the team in fielding percentage from first base. The middle infield will be quick and talented with the play of Sarah Hickey and Mellissa Bullington. Junior Chris Berendzen will look to cool down the hot corner at third. The outfield will be played by committee as several ladies will get playing time this season. The biggest asset to the defense will be Tracey Dames, who can play several positions in the field. Dames should see action at first, third and behind the plate. This will give Westling the ability to rotate many players, strengthening an already solid defense.

Lady Lions finish season one short of 20 wins

The Lindenwood women's basketball team took steps in the right direction during the 1997-98 season. The Lady Lions finished 19-11 overall and 11-7 in the Heart of America Conference. They even got their first ever win in the conference tournament with a 76-66 win over William Jewell at home before losing to top seed Benedictine.

Building on this year's success should be easy the team will lose of only two players to graduation. Several transfers and freshmen should make the Lions a good bet for another run at the



conference title. Coming back for the Lions will be the heart of the team that includes first-team all-conference player Jamie Bonney and all-conference selections Tracey Dames and Katie Mortensen.


