









Lindenwood Dedicates Senator Alan J. Dixon Student Center

Lindenwood University's Belleville campus hosted a ribbon cutting and dedication ceremony for its new student center, named in honor of former United States Senator Alan J. Dixon, on Friday, August 5, 2011.

Dixon served the state of Illinois for 43 years, including the Illinois legislature, various state offices, and the U.S. Senate. One of his most notable career accomplishments was his co-sponsorship of legislation that produced the state's community college system.

A Belleville native, Dixon has strong ties to Lindenwood and its Belleville campus. He attended Belleville Township High School, as did his mother and three children. His wife, Joan Fox Dixon, is a Lindenwood alumna and was named the school's Harvest Queen in 1952.

Dixon served as the keynote speaker during Lindenwood's 2008 Commencement ceremony. The following year,

his granddaughter, Fawne Yearian, earned a master's degree in business administration from the university. Dixon's daughter, Stephanie Yearian, is currently an instructor at the Lindenwood-Belleville campus and recently earned a doctoral degree in education from the school.

"Naming the new facility after Dixon is a special way to recognize his contributions to higher education as well as the close relationships he and his family share with our school and with the community," said Mary Radcliff, assistant vice president and executive director of community relations. "It's more than fitting that we named the space after him."

The Alan J. Dixon Student Center houses a new cafeteria, additional classrooms, a recreation area, an upper-level student lounge, a computer lab, and a contemporary library. It also features a space dedicated to memorabilia from Dixon's many decades of public service.

LU Named 'Great College to Work For' Second Straight Year

Lindenwood University has been singled out for recognition in the "Great Colleges to Work For" report assembled by the Chronicle of Higher Education. The results of the study were released July 25, 2011, in the Chronicle's fourth annual report on "The Academic Workplace" and were derived from a survey of more than 41,000 employees at 247 colleges and universities in the United States.

Lindenwood was singled out in the study with recognition in the areas of collaborative governance, teaching environment, job satisfaction, confidence in senior leadership, supervisor/department chair relationship, and tenure clarity and process. Additionally, the University was one of 30 four-year schools nationwide singled out in a new feature of the report, the "Honor Roll," which recognizes institutions that scored well across

multiple areas of recognition.

Employees were asked to respond to 60 statements about their institutions on a five-point scale. The overall assessment was based primarily on the surveys and also on an institutional audit that captured the demographics and work-place policies and practices of each institution.

"This recognition from the Chronicle of Higher Education's 'Great Colleges to Work For' survey speaks volumes about the ethos of collegiality and other-centeredness at Lindenwood University," said Lindenwood President James D. Evans, Ph.D. "The campus community, as a whole, has been working to optimize a work climate of mutual support and respect here, and the high marks shown by

Public Safety at LU-Belleville



Lindenwood University Belleville students will notice some big changes in public safety this fall when they return from their summer break. As Lindenwood grows, administration is always looking for ways to keep students safe. With the new expansion of the Security Office on campus, officers will now have the ability to monitor locations throughout campus on 24-hour video surveillance and utilize other tools to ensure the safety of our student body.

Beginning in the fall 2011 semester, LU will offer new Blue Light emergency stations throughout campus. "In the event of an emergency, students can use the call station and an officer will be dispatched to their location," said Mike Sims, Lindenwood Officer and Sheriff's Deputy for the St. Clair County Sheriff's Department. "The call goes into 911 dispatch and an officer from both the city and Lindenwood will be dispatched to the location."

Along with the new stations, Lindenwood will still offer the Officer Escort stations located throughout campus. These stations provide students with a phone number to call and station number to give the officer. The officer will then meet the student and provide an escort to her or his vehicle.

As our campus grows, so do the services Lindenwood offers its students. The new improvements and additions to the campus security department are just another way Lindenwood is dealing with 21st century issues while maintaining the safety of its students.

Student Counseling and Resource Center

The growth of the Lindenwood University-Belleville campus has been exciting. One place that stands out is the Student Counseling and Resource Center (SCRC). The SCRC is designed to provide personal and career counseling services for students, faculty, and staff at LU-Belleville. Professional Counseling graduate student counselors offer these counseling services under the supervision of Dr. Chavaux-Turnbull and Dr. Patterson-Mills of the Counseling Department.

The personal counseling and career services provided vary, just as the population of the campus varies. Here are some examples to help determine when our services would be useful:

John was excited to start college. He is from a small town and has not traveled much. He was looking forward to meeting new people and seeing new places. Since arriving on campus, he has not felt quite right. Although he calls home at least once daily, he really misses being home. The longing for home has brought on a sense of loneliness. John has begun to isolate himself from others. He notices he is sleeping more and he has no appetite, even though he is an athlete and works out with the team almost every day.

For many young adults, college is the first time they are away from home, family, and friends. Although exciting, loneliness and depression can set in, especially with the new demands of academics and living on your own for the first time. The SCRC counselors offer support and strategies for coping with home sickness and the anxiety surrounding new experiences.

Beth and Stephanie have been close friends since they started college. Both play volleyball and have done well in their classes. Like many college students, they go out to the clubs to blow off steam. Until recently, there have been no problems regarding their "...off-time." However, Beth has noticed Stephanie going out more often and staying out later. She also noticed Stephanie has started missing classes because of her late nights. Beth is concerned but not sure she needs to talk to anyone about what she sees.

The consumption of alcohol and other substances may be common with college students. Often students feel something is going on with their friend(s), but are afraid to expose them. Always remember that confidentiality is a key part of counseling. The SCRC follows all confidentiality guidelines. This means no one, on-or-off campus, knows who is coming to the center or who has been there in the past. The counselors can help you help your friend(s). Coming to see us could be the best thing you ever do for yourself or your friend.

Most individuals who come see us come on their own. Others can be formally referred by faculty or staff. We are here to work with you on any issue. We want the students of LU-Belleville to be healthy, both mentally and physically. The SCRC can provide you with the tools to be successful in school and in life.



GOT BOOKS?

Camping at Lindenwood University-BellevilleBy Julie Sydow and Dr. Stephanie Yearian

Do you know how much fun it is to read books in a tent with a flashlight? Education students of Lindenwood-Belleville enjoyed camping with local school children from June 6 to June 24, 2011. Camp Lynx Tales, the inaugural reading camp for the Belleville campus, was a threeweek session of reading strategies in phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and reading comprehension. Elementary students of all reading levels, ranging from first to fourth grade, attended camp from Union School, Ellis School, Roosevelt School, and St. Mary St. Augustine. Children had the opportunity to work one-on-one with reading practicum students from Lindenwood University-Belleville under the direct supervision of Dr. Stephanie Yearian, an elementary education advisor and instructor on

"My LU interns were encouraged to change their mind set from student to instructor; they were the teachers of Camp Lynx Tales!" stated Yearian. Camp Lynx Tales fulfills the practicum requirement of Analysis and Correction of Reading Difficulties for teacher apprentices who have met the prerequisite of the reading methods course, EDU305. Both Lindenwood and elementary students were committed to the partnership that was fostered through the individualized instruction. Pre-service teachers also taught at least one group lesson, administered pre and post reading assessments with parental permission, and kept a reflective journal of the experience.

Camp Lynx Tales gave children the opportunity to experience summer vacation in a book. Students enjoyed teacher read-aloud sessions, partner reading, informal inventories to assess strengths and weaknesses in reading, tutoring assistance, along with activities and snacks, which complemented the literary themes. The first team of teachers, led by Julie Sydow, encouraged the students' imagination through "destination camping" within the states of Illinois, Alaska, Colorado, Wyoming, Texas, Hawaii, and Washington, D.C. Literature shared included L is for Lincoln (Wargin, 2004), March of the Penguins (Jacquet & Maison, 2005), and Going on a Bear Hunt (Rosen & Oxenbury, 2007). The daily schedule began with one-on-one tutoring, followed by a theme related snack, and ended with a fun-filled group activity. Activities included a visit from Elwood (the Lynx mascot, Nelly Newell), a field trip to Matt's Café for snow cones (while studying Alaska with Tommy Terrell), and horseback riding in Texas, provided by Elena Macia and The Riding Center of Freeburg, Ill. (featured in the Belleville News-Democrat). Teachers also modeled arts and crafts in a number of ways. Jon Sehr made stove pipe hats from brown paper sacks, Jennifer Nester directed the construction of small campfires with tissue paper and polished rocks, Sabrina Sayles created the American flag by cutting out studenttraced hands from red and blue paper, Jordan Stuhlsatz prompted a class book of observations in the wild, and Lindsey Lickenbrock helped string Hawaiian leis.

A second team of teachers, led by Lori Kinney, took the children on a camping adventure in the Caribbean while reading about pirates. Fun festivities for this theme included pirate ships, parrot puppets, making pirate hats and eye patches (Michelle Hemmer-Schwiebel), treasure chests created by Julie Maul, a visit from a pirate (Alex Halfmann), a reader's theater directed by Carnecia Carter, and a fast-paced scavenger hunt around campus which was planned by Brad Reibold and Danielle Beishir. Books shared included Do Pirates Take Baths? (Tucker & Westcott, 1997), Pirates Don't Change Diapers (Long, 2007), and Pirate Pete's Giant Adventure (Kennedy, 2006). Camp songs were accompanied by Allen Siedle on his recorder.

The culminating activity was a field day with relays held in the future Lynx football stadium, a water balloon toss provided by Caleb Cook, outdoor reading in the sunken garden, and hot dogs and snow cones served by Julie Sydow and Stephanie Hodge. Thanks to Gary Lopez and Steve Suess for helping to make Camp Lynx Tales' inaugural year a great success! Camp Lynx Tales provided a great adventure in reading, and Lindenwood-Belleville looks forward to next summer's exploration through books.

THE LINDENWOOD LYNX ARE READY TO POUNCE ON THEIR COMPETITION NEW SPORTS TEAMS

The school will be welcoming wrestling, women's golf and men's and women's bowling to its roster of winter sports, as well as baseball, softball, and men's and women's lacrosse to the spring season.

Last year, the school had eight United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) affiliated teams, including men's and women's basketball, cross country, soccer, men's golf, and women's volleyball. This number will expand in the upcoming school year as wrestling, baseball and softball will also compete in the USCAA.

LU – Belleville will also offer 10 Student Life sports, which will not compete in the USCAA but will compete nationally in various collegiate athletic associations. These sports include field hockey, spirit squads (cheerleading and dance), men's and women's tennis, men's volleyball, men's and women's bowling, men's and women's lacrosse, and women's golf.

Traci Nelson, women's field hockey coach, will be leading the women's lacrosse team. She played DIII during her college years and currently coaches the St. Louis Speed Club. Prior to coming to Lindenwood, she served as an assistant coach for Villa Duchesne's women's lacrosse team.

Men's baseball welcomes Head Coach Logan Johnson from Webster University, formerly the head assistant pitching coach from 2009-2010 and assistant coach from 2008-2010. In 2010 he helped Webster win its fifth consecutive St. Louis Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SLIAC) championship in 2010.

"I'm very excited to begin our inaugural season this fall," Johnson said. "We've got a roster full of talented players that have all made a commitment to help build a solid tradition of success. This is an exciting time for the baseball program, athletic department and the University as a whole. It's great to be able to build a program from the ground floor. There is a lot of hard work ahead, but the players we have coming in are anxious to get started this fall."

Paul Collum is the new men's wrestling coach hailing from Missouri Baptist University. He has had success as a coach during his five-year stint with the university and a successful solo track run. During his time with Iowa Central Community College, he won the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) national title in his weight class, helping his team to a second place finish. When he continued at Missouri Valley College, he won the national title at the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) in his weight class, again helping his team to a second place finish.

With a resume of coaching positions with University of Missouri-St. Louis and Maryville University, Charlie Kennedy joins the Lindenwood University coaching staff. In 2009, Kennedy led Ursuline Academy to the MWAA Conference Championship.

Kennedy reports that "expectations are flying high for Lynx softball. The fall schedule will include some travel to Springfield, Ill., and over to St. Louis, Mo."

The team will begin its season on Sunday, Sept. 11, and will also be hosting a team fundraiser trivia night on Saturday, Sept. 17, at Belleville West High School.

Dan Mertzlufft will be joining Lindenwood's coaching roster as the men's lacrosse coach. He has previously served as the assistant coach for Christian Brothers College (CBC) and head coach at Rockwood Summit High School in Fenton, Mo.

"I am really excited about what's taking place at Lindenwood University-Belleville," Mertzlufft said. "This school takes pride in everything that they do, and they support our student athletes 100 percent. The facilities we have--and will have--will allow me to build one of the top teams in Men's Collegiate Lacrosse Association (MCLA)."

Dan Polites, PGA professional, will be coaching the women's golf team this season. He has previously coached Althoff Catholic High School's men's golf team, leading it to three consecutive regional titles (2008-2010), two sectional titles (2009-2010), and a third place state finish in 2010.



This second-annual event will be held at 5 p.m. on Tuesday, August 30, at the LU – Belleville soccer field. This year's event will feature a commemorative coin giveaway to celebrate the now annual event between two Belleville schools. One side will feature the LU – Belleville Lynx mascot, and the other will display the new SWIC Blue Storm mascot, the Snow Leopard. The first 100 fans to arrive at the Lynx Soccer Field will receive the coin. Free hot dogs, soda, and water will be available to all fans courtesy of PFoodman Catering. Prior to the game, Belleville Mayor Mark Eckert will flip the coin at midfield. Also preceding the game will be a short ceremony honoring Lynx Head Coach Dan Hogan for his 200th victory. Hogan reached the 200-win plateau last season on October 13 with a win against Blackburn University.

Recruiting

a new generation

Setting a record enrollment for the day program, the admissions staff utilizes today's technology and society to bring in new students.

While the office is swamped with visitors and paperwork in preparation for the 2011-2012 school year, you might see some counselors sitting on Facebook. This isn't for personal use, however. It's one of the newest recruiting tools. "Sometimes you can't get in touch with a student," Melissa Shreve said. "It's just another way to contact them."

Not all the recruiters use Facebook though. Some prefer using only traditional measures of phone calls, letters, and emails. Phone calls remain the most common method for contacting students. A number of counselors echo the sentiment that teens prefer texting. "You can call a teen five times, leave voicemails, send emails and never hear back; shoot a teen a text and you have an answer in seconds," Chad Fournie said.

Admissions Counselor Logan Johnson said developing a campus is a process that takes time. "Now that the word is getting out about the programs and the University, I think that student-athletes are recognizing the unique opportunity that they have here. It is very rewarding to know that we have recruited a student-athlete that was also recruited by other schools. It shows that we have a lot to offer students academically as well as athletically."

Visiting high schools, junior colleges, and college fairs, the admissions staff is reaching out to more general students. Meanwhile, word of mouth continues to be a strong, positive recruiting tool. The new athletic programs bring additional general students as well as athletes. Johnson calls the biggest challenge in recruiting the hesitancy some people have regarding how a new program will turn out. He said the recruiting experience has been "very positive" during his time here. "Starting a college baseball team is a very exciting opportunity, but it's a challenge to put together a plan for success that

student-athletes will buy into. I think that we've done a great job as a staff of putting a solid framework in place and showing potential players how and why we will be successful as a program."

Fellow coach and admissions counselor, Dan Mertzlufft, witnessed the rapid growth in St. Charles during his undergraduate years. He foresees our Belleville campus growing as St. Charles did. His ability to bring these visions to life makes students aspire to come and be a part of Lindenwood. "I see Lindenwood-Belleville being one of the top private schools in the area, both academically and athletically because of our facilities and degree programs." As a coach, he sees the facilities as a great selling point. "Our facilities outmatch any competitor with the amount of support student athletes receive," Mertzlufft said.

Whether it is through a Facebook message, text message, or traditional communication channels, Mertzlufft said working at such a great institution makes recruiting easier. "The University sells itself."




