Lindenwood entered a new decade, one which would bring many changes to the college. Amid the period of the Turbulent Sixties the college sought to move forward, keeping her traditions yet struggling to become relevant.

As Lindenwood entered the Seventies, she did so with an infant college, L.C. II, which brought men to the campus of white gloves, horses and Wednesday chapel.

Now that Lindenwood had taken her first step forward, she began to change rapidly. In the early Seventies, Jelkyl Theater was completed. Summer-stage began in 1978, bringing the theater attention it had never before received.

In 1972, Lindenwood grew again. L.C. III was added for evening students and night classes began. L.C. IV, for Individualized Education, became a member of the family in September 1975. Graduate courses in education, business, and the theater became a reality. Finally, a new program, the Bachelor of Medicine became an integral part of the community in September 1977 bringing Lindenwood into the ever-changing field of medecine.

changes were not the only ones that occurred in the Seventies. Physically, the college became more vital. In the summer of 1976, the hallways of dorms and the sidewalks felt a new step, that of the football cleat. A stadium had been sculpted from the hill behind Parker Hall and Lindenwood became the summer home of the St. Louis Football Cardinals. It was controversial, but they are now a vital part of the financial and public image of the college.

After much work by Beta Chi, the barn finally received a covered riding arena in Spring 1977. This aided the stables in the continued development of fine horses and riders.

Perhaps, the greatest change to occur during the Seventies was the addition of the new Student Center after a long struggle by the students. This single building has given the college the unity it needs to meet the future. It solidifies both resident and day students. It makes the day students feel that they are a part of the college community. The dream of the Seventies, from the Dome and Cobb's Tea Hole to the Student Center has become a reality.

## Dean Crozier Retires

Another change took place in May 1979. Dean Doris Crozier stepped down as Dean of Women, both students and faculty of Lindenwood College. She will return to full time service in the classroom, teaching sociology classes.

Dean Crozier first came to Lindenwood in 1972 where she became the mother of all the "Lindenwood girls." In reflecting on the changes she has seen occur at Lindenwood, she sighted the physical highlights of the Student Center and football field. In academics, Dean Crozier has seen a shift from humanist subjects such as pyschology to journalism and business. Students now talk about job and career aspirations not personal goals. She also felt that students have become more conservative and complacent since 1972 and she would like to see that change.

Because of her years of service to Lindenwood, the LINDEN LEAVES have dedicated the 1979 edition to Dean Doris Crozier for her outstanding contributions to the college community. Whenever anyone had a problem they knew where to get a helping hand or advice. Dean Crozier has always been there and has never closed her door to anyone. The women will miss the Tree-Trimming parties, the handwritten Dean's List cards, the smiling face at all of the organization meetings, and above all, the first person who knew your name from all the strangers when you were a freshmen.

Perhaps the fastest growing division at Lindenwood is the Natural Sciences and Mathematics. With the advent of Sputnik and the Space Age, science and mathematics sored in popularity. Now, with the need for advanced health care and the computer age, interest in this division remains high. Students are beginning to realize that science and math form a healthy foundation for any field.

Majors in this division include: Biology, Chemistry, General Science, Mathematics, Medicine, Medical Technology, and Physical Education. The faculty are all outstanding specialists with five holding Ph.d's in their field.

## Mathematics At Lindenwood

Biology and Chemistry have become a stepping stone to Medical Technology as well as the historic uses. Students prepare themselves for further study and careers in their field by working in courses like Microbiology, Anatomy, Organic and Physical Chemistry and Genetics. Many go on to Medical or graduate schools.

The newest program within the division is the Bachelor of Medicine. Lindenwood became the first program of its kind in the United States for physician's assistants. Designed to provide for health care in urban and rural areas, the students spend two years at Lindenwood getting a liberal arts kernel and then moves on to two years of clinical work in a hospital. It is definitely innovative and reflects the change of the seventies at L.C.

The field of mathematics is moving rapidly to meet the new decade and changes in society. It has often been said, "What in the worl is not computerized?" The math department provides courses for helping the students meet the needs of the computer age. Fortan Cobol, and Basic are studied as well as pure mathematics courses like Calculus, Linear Algebra, and the math major's nightmare,, Algebraic

Structure.

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## Dedicated Service



Another change came to Lindenwood during the last of the Seventies. Dr. William C. Spencer resigned as president of the Lindenwood Colleges, effective July 1, 1979. Dr. Spencer said he "would like to spend more time during the next few years involved in consultative, advisory, and teaching asignments than is possible when confronted with day-to-day administrative tasks."

Many good changes have come to Lindenwood during Dr. Spencer's presidency which began in 1975. During his first year, he introduced the concept of a cluster of colleges, each distinctively serving its own student body but with a common aculty and facilities. The Evening College was formally organized and the College for Individualized Education was established. The founding of these colleges has caused the enrollment to increase yearly instead of declining as with other institutions of higher learning. Dr. Spencer also served as the president of the small colleges and universities association while at Lindenwood.

Other changes ame to L.C. during President Spencer's administration. In 1976, the Football Cardinals made their summer home at Lindenwood. Wrought with many controversies and much opposition, Dr. Spencer's continued support of the stadium has given Lindenwood much needed publicity. In 1978, the Student Center opened after a long fund drive started by Mrs. Spencer. This building became a firm reality under President Spencer's guidance. The mortgage was completely paid off in May 1979.

Although there have been controversies and difficulties during his presidency, overall, President Spencer has had a positive and beneficial administration. His policies will long be remembered and the changes will have a lasting impact. We wish Dr. Spencer and his wife and best of luck and a very promising future.

## To Lindenwood



Another change has struck Lindenwood. Dean Patrick Delaney, the man of many talents who has held numerous positions at the colleges as well as the chalk throwing championship, has resigned as Dean effective August 1, 1979. Dr. Delaney will become vice president of academic affairs at Fitchburg College in Fitchburg, Massachusetts. He had been actively looking for a new position since last fall and was chosen for the job which is the second most important one at the college over 186 other applicants.

Dean Delaney came to Lindenwood in 1969 as a professor and chairmen of the biology department. In 1971, he was promoted to the Dean's Office of the Men's College. He was chosen by a committe of two students and five teachers who conducted a dean's search.

While at Lindenwood, Dean Delaney contributed a great deal to the college. As well as serving as dean and electrifying biology classes, he has served as the athletic director where he concerned himself with developing a good sports program.
