

Daniel Newton came to Lindenwood University in December of 2006 as the school's Sports Information Director. He is in his 14th year working full-time in a Sports Information Office.

At Lindenwood, Newton helps with the public relations effort and statistical operations for the 27 NCAA sports. From 2006-11, he also assisted with the public relations for 21 Student Life Sports. Besides his regular duties, Newton has assisted with starting the Lindenwood Athletics Hall of Fame in

2007, created a new athletics website in 2009, and led the redesign of the athletics website in 2012. He has also researched many historical items about Lindenwood athletics, including creating record books for many athletic teams.

Newton served as the NAIA media relations contact at the 2009-11 NAIA Swimming and Diving National Championships, and worked in the press room at the 2009 and 2011 NAIA Division I Men's Basketball National Championships.

Prior to coming to Lindenwood, Newton served as the Media Relations Coordinator at Truman State University from 2002-2006 and was the Assistant Media Relations Director at Portland State University from 1999-2002. He has also worked in press rooms for various professional teams, including the Portland Trailblazers (NBA) and Portland Beavers (Triple A Baseball), and was the assistant media relations contact for the 2000 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball West Regional.

Newton worked as a student assistant in the Sports Information Office at Truman from 1996-99 and received a bachelor's degree in business administration from Truman in 1999. He earned his master's in sports management from Lindenwood in 2009.

Newton is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America. He has won numerous awards from that organization for his work on designing and producing media guides.

Daniel and wife, Jennifer, reside in St. Peters, Mo., and have two sons, Bryan and Jordan.



Mike Morgan is entering his second year as the Assistant Sports Information Director at Lindenwood University. Before moving into his current role, he served as a graduate assistant in the Sports Information Office for two years.

To go along with his primary sports, Morgan will design all media guides, game day programs, and graphic design work that will be displayed on the Lindenwood athletic website.

In 2011, he helped start the www.

lindenwoodlions.com Sports Network, which provides a source for Lindenwood fans to hear all types of athletic events. Morgan can also be heard hosting numerous coaches shows and doing play-by-play on the lindenwoodlions.com Sports Network.

Prior to his time at Lindenwood, Morgan was the Director of Broadcasting/Media Relations Director for the River City Rascals, a minor league baseball team in O'Fallon, Mo.

After his stint with the Rascals, he moved on to become the Senior Staff Writer for *St. Louis Scoop High School Sports Magazine*, where he wrote over 35 feature length articles a month to go along with designing the magazines and directing a staff of 10 writers.

In 2009, Morgan was the play-by-play voice for the Lindenwood football team which played in the NAIA National Championship game against Sioux Falls. That was Morgan's second stint as the play-by-play voice. In 2004, Morgan was behind the mic for the first ever undefeated regular season in school history. He was also the Sports Director for the campus radio station, KCLC, his final two years of his undergrad.

Morgan received his bachelor's degree in mass communication from Lindenwood in 2004 and his master's degree in business communications in 2011, also from Lindenwood.

Morgan is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (COSIDA).

Mike and his wife, Nichole, reside in St. Peters, Mo., and have a son, Kevin, and two daughters, Natalee and Reaghan.

2012 SEASON PREVIEW

Just like at the start of every new football season there are question marks for just about every team in the country. For the 2012 edition of the Lindenwood Lions, that is the case as well. The questions start with who will take over at the quarterback position, can the running game stay healthy, can the offensive line hold up against the higher competition, and will the defense continue to improve under Deion Melvin?

Ouarterbacks

The Lions will bring back one quarterback from last year's squad. The three signal callers on the Lions squad this season have zero starts. At the top of the depth chart will be junior college transfer Ben Gomez. The transfer had the best spring of any quarterback. Gomez has a big arm and can also scramble away from pressure well. That aspect is something the offense hasn't had since Philip Staback.

Taylor Jasin is second on the depth chart and is the only quarterback that has any game experience in the Lions offense. The senior from St. Charles, Mo., has been part of the program for five years. In 2011, Jasin appeared in six games and completed five of 10 pass attempts with an interception.

Rounding out the Lindenwood quarterback position is true freshman Dillon Miller. Miller is from Eugene, Ore. and is the son of former St. Louis Rams quarterback Chris Miller. The freshman is the future of the quarterback position. He is very athletic and will be a perfect quarterback for the Lions system. The plan with Miller is to redshirt him this season and then compete for the starting position.

Running Backs

Completely opposite from the quarterback position, the Lindenwood running backs have over 33 starts, 45 touchdowns, and over 3,300 yards. The backfield is one of the most experienced positions on the field.

At the top of the depth chart is Denodus O'Bryant. Possibly one of the best running backs to ever put on a Lindenwood uniform O'Bryant will have one last season toting the rock. The senior burst onto the scene in 2009 when he was an NAIA All-American on his way to 1,000 yards rushing. After battling some injuries in 2011, O'Bryant is primed and ready to go out as the top running back in school history.

Backing up O'Bryant will be Nate Orlando. Orlando has been a member of the Lions for six years. Orlando has battled knee injury after knee injury, but when he is on the field he contributes. His best year came in 2010 when he rushed for almost 600 yards and scored 12 TDs. Orlando will be the backup on the depth chart but will see plenty of game action.

Back from a stellar freshman season is Marvin Byrd. The sophomore played defense in the spring but is back on the offensive side of the ball. Byrd will be an asset on offense for Lindenwood due to his ability to catch the ball out of the backfield and run it. His freshman season saw him score five touchdowns and rush for 249 yards.

Redshirt freshman Chris Gilyard rounds out the very talented running back corp. Gilyard has as much talent as anybody on the field and is very quick. He will see plenty of action this season.

Wide Receivers

As deep as the running back position is, wide receiver might be deeper. Of the 2,593 yards last season the Lions return over 75 percent of the production.

The receivers are led by Andrew Helmick. The coaching staff says that Helmick might be the best receiver the program has ever had. That is saying a lot since that position has had three guys in the past four years sign NFL contracts. Helmick has all the attributes that the next level looks for. He has height, speed, hands, strength, and toughness. Helmick is also a great blocker and can also return kicks.

Returning after an injury last season will be Matt Angell. He was injured in the 2011 spring game and missed the whole 2011 season. Angell is a versatile receiver who can do everything. He has speed, good hands, is a good blocker, and can even carry the ball out of the backfield.

Alex Robinson is back for another season after having a stellar freshman campaign. Robinson was second on the team in receiving in 2011 with over 400 yards and four touchdowns. The coaching staff believes if Robinson can stay healthy over his four years in a Lindenwood uniform, he will shatter numerous receiving records.

Terrance Jackson and Tim Celestine both are back and will look to build on a good season from a year ago. The duo of Jackson and Celestine combined for over 300 yards and five touchdowns. Celestine can also be an option for the offensive coaches out of the backfield. In 2010, he rushed for over 100 yards and scored a touchdown.

Donnie Jennert will be a key addition to the wide receiver corps. Jennert is a 6-5, 210 pound transfer from Iowa State. He was a key recruit for the Cyclones and will bring speed and athleticism to Lindenwood.

Sam Sealer and Jaron Alexander are two youngsters who will see some playing time, and will contribute. After his senior season in high school, he was named the top wide receiver in the Kansas City area. Alexander is a true freshman who brings lots of speed. The freshman holds the 100meter dash record for the state of Missouri.

Last season saw the offensive line came under fire. The big guys up front had a tough time at times keeping the defensive line out of the backfield. But what many don't remember is that most of the games the line struggled were against NCAA Division I competition. This season, the o-line returns some key members and adds stellar talent.

Senior Matt Atley and Matt Andreolli anchor the offensive line. The pair has been part of the program for five years each. Atley can play center or guard and the team will need him to have good season for the team to have a good season.

Jacob Heneisen will also be on the line and looks to be a contributor in his sophomore season. Kadre Pinder joins Heneisen on the line after transferring from Ohio University. Pinder hasn't played in two years but is very athletic for a 6-5, 320 pound lineman.

JT Young is the final piece of the offensive line puzzle. Young is a redshirt freshman from the St. Charles, Mo. area. He had an up and down spring but the coaches believe he will have an immediate impact at either guard or tackle.

Defense

Under new defensive coordinator Deion Melvin, the 2011 Lindenwood defense had a bounce back season from 2010. The numbers might not have looked like they improved the defense, but made strides and big plays against increased competition.

Defensive Line

The Lions have lots of depth across the front four. Joe Day and Sean Gracy will be the starters at defensive end. Day and Gracy combined for 10 sacks last season and 17 tackles for loss. Chaz Fulton and Malach Radigan will anchor the interior of the defensive line. Fulton is primed to be a star on defense, and Radigan has played a lot in his five years in the program.

Jon McComb and Cody Reider will see plenty of playing time at the defensive end position. Reider led the team in sacks last season with six, and McComb piled up four quarterback sacks.

Linebackers

The line backing corps lost a couple of key contributors in Tyler Espy and Tyler Epstein but still returns some talent.

Alex Meraz will anchor the linebackers. The senior has been around for five years and has been a major contributor. Dillon Hawkins is back after starting every game last season and was ninth on the team in tackles with over 30.

Brock Reed will be the starting outside linebacker, and some consider him the best football player on the team. He is strong, fast, and a big hitter. Reed was second in the team in tackles in 2011 and compiled four sacks and an interception.

Wes Kuhn is a walk on and has made his way onto the depth chart. AJ Chappelle will also see some time as a linebacker after transferring from Eastern Illinois. Ashanti Watson and Connor Harris are two more linebackers that will see playing time. Harris is a true freshman who was the Lions biggest recruit in the 2012. Harris was a member of a state championship team on which he was the starting quarterback, linebacker, and kicker. The freshman could also see some playing time on the offensive side of the football.

The Lindenwood secondary is very talented at the starting position but is lacking some depth. Cody Fogle is back for his senior season and has been a starter since his freshman season. Fogle was third on the team in tackles in 2011 and his one of the hardest hitters in the conference.

The Lions two cornerbacks might be the most talented group in the MIAA. At one corner is Pierre Desir who was an all-conference player at Washburn University. He dominated recievers at the line of scrimmage and is very physical. On the other side is Tevin McCaskill, a transfer from junior college who got over 20 Division I offers out of high school.

Jaz Granderson is a transfer from Northern Iowa and has a wide range of coverage to go along with being a big hitter. Justin Broome is the only experienced player in the back up position. Broome is the back up for all four positions in the defensive secondary.



Ninth Season § Record at LU 74-22

Patrick Ross, the winningest football coach in Lindenwood history, is in his ninth season as the head coach of the Lindenwood program in 2012. He is in his 11th season overall as a collegiate head coach.

Ross owns a career coaching record of 88-29 (.752), his teams have appeared in the NAIA Football Championship Series six times, and twice he has earned National Coach of the Year honors. In his first eight years in St. Charles, he has compiled a record of 74-22, won three HAAC championships, and advanced to the NAIA national playoffs five times, including a trip to the national championship game in 2009. He became the all-time leader in wins at Lindenwood in 2007, and his .771 winning percentage shatters the previous best mark for the program.

The Ross era at Lindenwood has been marked by winning and excitement. The Lions have become one of the top scoring teams at any level of college football over the last eight years. Ross has directed

the top-five offenses in school history and seven of the top nine. Lindenwood has averaged 37.6 points since Ross has come to Lindenwood, including 44.7 points over the last five years.

While Lindenwood was at the NAIA level, Ross' players won 10 All-American awards, including six first-team honors. Jeff Hynes was twice named the Rimington Award Winner as the best offensive center in the NAIA. Ross coached three HAAC Players of the Year with DeDe Dorsey winning the award in 2004 and Denodus O'Bryant winning back-

to-back awards in 2009 and 2010. Ross' players were named first-team all-HAAC 37 times, 32 players were named second-team all-conference, and 27 received third-team honors.

Ross did one of his best coaching jobs in 2011 as he led Lindenwood through its transition season as the program moves from the NAIA to the top NCAA Division II conference. The Lions went 8-3 and were the only second-year transition school to record a winning record. Lindenwood opened the season with a 22-20 win over Northern Colorado, the program's first win over an NCAA Division I scholarship team. Among the team's other big wins were last-minute victories over NCAA Division II powerhouse Texas A&M-Kingsville and NAIA power Azusa Pacific.

Lindenwood's offense continued its highscoring ways despite the tougher competition and having a new quarterback and nearly a completely new offensive line. The Lions averaged over 40 points and 367.9 total yards a game.

In 2010, the Lions went 9-2 overall in their final season of NAIA play and finished second in the HAAC with a 9-1 mark. Lindenwood advanced to the NAIA Playoffs for the fourth straight season and fifth overall appearance in

Ross' tenure. The Lions had one of the best offenses in the entire country. Lindenwood possessed the No. 1 passing offense, the best passing efficiency, top offense yards per game, and second most points scored.

In 2009, Ross led the Lions to their best season in program history as they advanced to the national championship game. The Lions went 10-0 during the regular season and won the program's third HAAC

Championship. Lindenwood hosted playoff games in the first and second rounds and then traveled to Helena, Montana, where they faced Carroll College. The Lions would beat the Saints and move on to the national championship against defending champions, Sioux Falls. Sioux Falls upended the Lions 25-22.

For the second straight season in 2009 the Lions had one of the most prolific offenses in the country. The Lions averaged over 53 points a game which was tops in the country and broke the school record for points scored with 744. Lindenwood finished ranked second in the country when the final polls came out, which was the highest ranking the school has ever accomplished. After the season, Ross was named HAAC Coach of the Year.

In 2008, Ross led the Lions to within one play of reaching the national championship game. The Lions went 9-1 during the regular season and finished second in the HAAC. Lindenwood hosted a first-round playoff game and put up 65 points in the first postseason win in school history. The second postseason win came a week later in the quarterfinals when a last-second field goal gave the Lions a three-point win. In the semifinals, Lindenwood went into the house of NAIA powerhouse Carroll and didn't back down. The Lions scored a touchdown to pull within one in the final minute, but a failed two-point conversion ended the team's run toward a title.

Lindenwood had one of the top offenses in the country in 2008, setting school records with over 40 points and 460 yards of total offense a game. The Lions ranked fifth in the NAIA in total offense and sixth in scoring. On the other side of the ball, Lindenwood allowed less than 21 points a game and held four teams to single-digit points. Ross was named

National Coach of the Year by Victory Sports Network after the season.

Ross was also named National Coach of the Year in 2004 in his first year at Lindenwood, after he led one of the most amazing one-season turnarounds in college football history. The Lions went 11-0 in the regular season, tying the number of wins the team earned in the previous four years combined, and won their first HAAC title. In 2007, Ross directed the Lions to another conference title and national playoff appearance. Behind another high scoring offense, Lindenwood won its first 10 games and finished the regular season ranked ninth in the nation.

Prior to coming to Lindenwood, Ross was the head coach at Ottawa (Kan.) for two seasons. He posted a record of 14-7 there, winning the 2003 KCAC title and advancing to the national playoffs. Prior to his stint at Ottawa, Ross served as the defensive coordinator for three years and an assistant for one at Kansas Weslevan.

Ross has had five Lindenwood players sign NFL contracts and numerous others have signed contracts with other professional leagues. Dorsey and Brian Schaefering have played in the NFL, while Zac Atterberry, Marcel Thompson, and Roren Thomas signed with NFL teams after their Lindenwood careers. Dorsey was a member of the 2007 Super Bowl Champion Indianapolis Colts, and Derrick Ward, a former player for Ross at Ottawa, won a Super Bowl ring in 2008 with the New York Giants.

Ross and his wife, Stacey, have three kids, Peyton, Caden, and Shaelene.

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR CRAIG SCHULER

Ninth Season

Craig Schuler is entering his ninth season in 2012 with the Lindenwood football program. He has been on Patrick Ross' staff since the first day of the Ross era.

Schuler came to Lindenwood in 2004 and has been a major part of the program's turnaround. In 2012, he will serve as the offensive coordinator and running backs coach, as well as being the team's recruiting coordinator and assistant head coach. This season will be Schuler's 24th coaching football. In that time, he has won eight conference championship rings, including three as a member of the Lindenwood staff, and coached in 18 NAIA national playoff games.

Last season, Schuler helped Lindenwood go 8-3 during its transition season from the NAIA to NCAA Division II level. The Lions picked up the first win in school history over an NCAA Division I scholarship team, and had a winning record versus NCAA Division I and II teams. Lindenwood had the best record among football programs in its second NCAA Division II candidacy year.

Over the past three seasons as the offensive coordinator, Schuler has led a Lindenwood offense that has been one of the highest scoring teams in the country at any level. The Lions' offense has averaged 49.6 points per game over the past 36 games, and has broken numerous national and school records along the way.

The 2009 Lions averaged over 53 points per contest and set a school record in points scored with 744. That year also saw the Lions' offense rack up the awards, with freshman tailback Denodus O'Bryant being named the MVP of the league. That high-powered offense led Lindenwood to the NAIA National Championship game.

In 2010, Schuler worked with another record-setting offensive unit, one which racked up 8.9 yards per play and 551 yards per game. O'Bryant was named the conference MVP for the second time, and the rest of the Lion running backs, coached by Schuler, helped the Lions post ground game numbers off the charts. Nate Orlando rushed for over 600 yards and 12 touchdowns, while four other backs rushed for over 200 yards. As a unit, the running backs scored 31 touchdowns on

the ground.

The Lions continued their remarkable three-year run on offense in 2011, averaging 40.3 points per game against one of the toughest schedules faced by any Division II team in the nation. The Lions scored 60 touchdowns in 2011, giving them 140 trips to the end zone in their last 22 games.

Since Schuler arrived at Lindenwood, the Lions have posted a record of 74-22, won three HAAC championships, and advanced to the NAIA Football Championship Series five times. Prior stops on the coaching trail for Schuler include 11 years at Benedictine (Kan.) and two at Avila (Mo.). He has served as a coordinator on both sides of the ball while coaching in the HAAC, and was a high school head coach in the Southern California Division I ranks.

Schuler and his wife, Alison, have two daughters, Nikki and Katie.





DEION MELVIIN

Second Season

Deion Melvin is entering his second season as the Lindenwood football defensive coordinator in 2012, and he is in his 23rd season as a football coach.

Melvin brought a new scheme and a new attitude to Lindenwood's defense last season. The Lions recorded 35 sacks during the year, eight more than the next highest season total during the Patrick Ross era. Lindenwood also had 83 tackles for loss and allowed 352.8 yards and 23.6 points a game. The team allowed 20 points or less in six contests.

The defensive unit played a big role in two of the team's biggest victories. Against NCAA Division I Northern Colorado, Lindenwood did not allow a touchdown in the second half in a come-from-behind 22-20 victory. In the win at Texas A&M-Kingsville, the Lions' stopped the Javelinas on the one-yard line with just 23 seconds remaining to preserve a six-point win.

In 2009 and 2010, Melvin was an assistant at Ball State. He was the linebackers coach during the 2009 season before being promoted to special teams coordinator the next year.

Melvin also had coaching stints at Bowling Green, Georgia Southern, Missouri State, Western Illinois, and East Aurora High School. He was at Bowling Green from 2007-08, and coached the inside and outside linebackers, and was assistant special teams coordinator. In 2006, he coached the running backs at Georgia Southern. From 1999-2005, he was at Missouri State as the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. From 1993-98, Melvin coached at Western Illinois as the inside and outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator. His coaching career started at East Aurora from 1990-92.

At the college level, Melvin has coached seven All-Americans and two Buck Buchanan award winners, which goes to the top defensive player in NCAA Division I Football Championship Series. He coached 14 all-conference winners, six academic first-team all-conference players, and eight players who were named the team MVP. He also coached two players who finished first in the nation for tackles.

Melvin was an All-American and all-league honoree at linebacker

during his college career at the College of Dupage. He was an all-state and all-conference award winner at East Aurora High School.

Melvin graduated from Western Illinois with a bachelor of science degree in community health in 1994.

Melvin and his wife, Beverly, have two daughters, Lywanna, a student at Ball State University, and Sherese, a student at Francis Howell North High School.



HISTORY LINDEN





Austin Bortle is entering his fourth season as a member of the Lindenwood football staff in 2012. Bortle is in his second year as a full-time assistant after serving as a graduate assistant for his first two seasons. He will coach the defensive line this upcoming season.

In 2010, the Lions had three receivers catch over 500 total yards. Two of the receivers had over 800 yards. The receivers also caught 42 touchdown passes. In 2009, Lindenwood was even more balanced with five receivers having over 400 yards on the season. Those five players caught 223 passes for 3,343 yards and 34 touchdowns. The receivers played a big role in Lindenwood advancing to the NAIA National Championship game.

Bortle played his college football at Lindenwood and was a very successful offensive weapon. In his final season as a Lion, he was named to the honorable mention All-HAAC squad. During his time between the lines, Bortle caught 57 passes for 667 yards and seven touchdowns. He also compiled 18 rushing attempts for 91 yards.

Bortle played his high school football at St. Charles High School and was an all-conference performer.

Bortle graduated from Lindenwood with his bachelor's degree in 2008 and his master's in 2010.





Mike Preston is starting his first season with the Lindenwood football team in 2012. He will coach the team's offensive line.

Preston has coached at all levels of college football and was most recently at Yale for three years. Yale had a 16-14 record during that span. The Bulldogs improved their rushing yards and total offensive yards every year that Preston was at the school.

Preston previously coached on Patrick Ross' staff at Ottawa in 2002 and 2003. Other coaching stops for Preston include Wingate, Lewis & Clark, La Verne, Western Illinois, and Washington. He coached the tight ends at Wingate in 2008 and helped the team go 8-3. He was the defensive line coach at Lewis & Clark in 2007 and the offensive coordinator at La Verne from 2005-06. Preston coached the defensive line at Western Illinois after his stint at Ottawa. His coaching career began at Washington from 1997-2000, where he was the offensive assistant and offensive line coach. At Washington, he was a part of the program that won the 2001 Rose Bowl.

Preston graduated from Washington in 2005 with a degree in sociology.





Kent Maugeri is in his fourth season in 2012 as an assistant coach for the Lindenwood football program. Maugeri is in charge of the Lindenwood secondary and is the team's special teams coordinator.

Since Maugeri joined the Lions as a full-time coach in 2009, the team's secondary has become one of the team's best units. Lindenwood has recorded 51 interceptions, and it has allowed just 214.7 passing yards a game in that span.

Against the toughest schedule in school history, the Lions intercepted 13 passes and allowed less than 240 passing yards a game. Three of those interceptions were returned for touchdowns.

In 2010, the secondary held opponents to under 190 yards passing a game. The unit also picked off 15 total passes. In 2009, the Lindenwood secondary picked off 23 passes and held opponents to just under 220 yards passing per game. The Lions had nine interceptions in four postseason games that year during the team's run to the NAIA National Championship game.

Maugeri was a graduate assistant on the 2008 Lindenwood staff. A native of Daytona Beach, Fla., Maugeri gained a number of years of experience in the highly competitive North Florida high school ranks.



Marcus Yokeley returns to the Lindenwood football coaching staff in 2012. He will coach the defensive line, focusing specifically on the defense tackles

Yokeley previously worked at Lindenwood from 2006-08. After one season as a graduate assistant, Yokeley was named a full-time assistant in 2007.

Yokeley spent the 2011 season as the defensive coordinator at Avila. For the 2009 and 2010 seasons, Yokeley worked on both the offensive and defensive sides of the football for the Missouri Tigers. As a graduate assistant, his time was spent coordinating camps, breaking down and evaluating film, compiling reports, and running the weekly opponent scout team.

During his playing days, Yokeley was a defensive back at Truman State. He earned honorable mention all-conference honors and was a two-time team captain. In his prep days, he earned first-team all-state defensive back honors in 2002 at Marshall High School.

Yokeley earned his undergraduate degree from Truman State in psychology and his masters from Lindenwood University in education.




Brett Ballman

Running Backs

Brett Ballmann is in his second season as a graduate assistant on the Lindenwood football coaching staff and he has been a part of the Lindenwood program since 2005. He will be coaching the running backs in 2012.

Last season, Ballmann was an offensive assistant coach for a Lindenwood squad that put up over 40 points a game. The Lions averaged 367.9 total yards of offense and scored over 40 points six times. Wide receiver Andrew Helmick had one of the best seasons in school history for a wide receiver, and Lindenwood quarterbacks averaged 235.7 passing yards a game. The running game averaged 132.2 yards a contest and scored 25 rushing touchdowns.

Ballmann was a backup quarterback for Lindenwood from 2005-09. He appeared in nine games as a senior and completed six passes for 167 yards and two touchdowns, and he rushed for a touchdown. Ballmann was a student assistant coach at Lindenwood during the 2010 season.






Pete Brown is in his third season on the Lindenwood football coaching staff and his second as a graduate assistant. He will be in charge of coaching the linebackers in 2012.

In 2011, Brown was a defensive assistant for the Lindenwood squad that went 8-3 during its transition season to the NCAA. The defense played a big roles in those victories, including late stops in last-second victories over Northern Colorado, Texas A&M-Kingsville, and Azusa Pacific. The Lions forced 25 turnovers on the season and recorded 35 sacks

Brown was a student assistant coach on the 2010 Lindenwood squad and prior to that, was a linebacker in the Lindenwood program.






Mike Bunton is in his first season as a graduate assistant on the Lindenwood football coaching staff. He will coach the wide receivers during the 2012 season.

Bunton ended his five-year Lindenwood playing career last season and departs as one of the top special team returners in school history. He averaged 21.2 yards on kickoff returns and had 1,058 yards and two touchdowns. He averaged 18.9 yards on punt returns and had 547 yards and four touchdowns. He concluded his career with 2,662 all-purpose yards, including 80 receptions for 875 yards and five touchdowns.

Bunton was a first-team all-conference kickoff returner in 2008 and a third-team all-conference wide receiver in 2010. Last season, he was named the team Special Teams Player of the Year and repeated as team captain and the winner of the team's leadership award.

Bunton was the 2006 St. Louis Post-Dispatch Offensive Player of the Year after his senior season at Parkway North High School. He was an all-state performer in both football and baseball.





Rickey Hunley Jr. is entering his first season on the Lindenwood coaching staff in 2012. He will help coach the team's defensive secondary.

Hunley has been a defensive secondary coach at both the high school and collegiate levels for the past seven years. His high school coaching career has encompassed stops at Theodore Roosevelt High School in Des Moines, Iowa, and Grandview High School in Grandview, Mo.

During the 2007 season, Hunley coached at his alma mater, Drake University. He helped tutor a first-team Sports Network Mid-Major All-American Defensive Back and two first team All-Pioneer Football League defensive backs. He also served as an athletic academic coordinator and tutorial coordinator at Iowa State University in 2008.

During his collegiate football career, Hunley was a defensive back at Drake University (2000-2003). He was a member of Drake's PFL championship team in 2000 and served as team captain his senior season. Hunley earned his undergraduate degree from Drake University in sociology.

Hunley and his wife, Nakisha, have a son, Taylor.




Philip Staback is in his second season on the Lindenwood coaching staff, including his first as a graduate assistant. He will coach the quarterbacks in 2012.

Staback was a student assistant on last year's squad that went 8-3. The Lions threw for 235.7 passing yards a game and had 23 touchdowns through the air. He helped the starting quarterback complete over 60 percent of his passes for 2,204 yards and have over a 3:1 touchdown-to-interception ratio.

Staback was the top quarterback in school history in 2009 and 2010. In 2009, he led Lindenwood to the NAIA National Championship game and was an honorable mention All-American. He completed 67.5 percent of his passes for 3,381 yards and 36 touchdowns. He had just six interceptions on the season and threw the biggest touchdown pass in school history in the final minute of a victory at Carroll in the NAIA semifinals. The next season, Staback earned first-team All-American honors after throwing for 3,329 yards and 34 touchdowns. He completed 75.3 percent of his passes and set an NAIA record for most yards per passing attempts. Staback still holds the NAIA career records for most yards per passing attempts and highest percentage of passes for a touchdown.

Staback is currently playing professional football for the Wichita Wild in the Indoor Football League.






Anthony Vitale is in his first season on the Lindenwood coaching staff in 2012. He will help coach the team's offensive line.

Vitale is a 2012 graduate from the University of Redlands. He was married in 2009 to his wife, Diane.







Darren Bardot is in his first season as a student assistant on the Lindenwood football coaching staff and will help coach the offensive line


Bardot was a member of the Lindenwood football team for the last four years as a backup center. He appeared in 13 games during his Lions career.

THE MID-AMERICA INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS ASSOCIATION



The Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association, a 15-member conference (beginning in 2012-13) of NCAA Division II institutions in Missouri, Kansas, and Nebraska, was first organized in 1912 as the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Over the past 100 years, the MIAA has gained the reputation of being one of the top NCAA Division II conferences in the nation. MIAA student-athletes have won 15 NCAA team championships and, since 1964, more than 160 individual national titles. The MIAA currently conducts championships in eight sports for men and nine for women.

For the men, champions are crowned in football, cross country, basketball, indoor and outdoor track & field, baseball, tennis and golf. The women compete for titles in volleyball, cross country, soccer, basketball, indoor and outdoor track & field, softball, golf and tennis.

The MIAA turned a new page on July 1, 1992, when the NCAA Division II conference changed its name from the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association to the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

The decision to make the change originated in 1989, when Pittsburg State University and Washburn University became the first schools outside the state of Missouri to gain membership in the MIAA.

The conference was first organized in 1912 with 14 member institutions. Of those original members, the University of Central Missouri, Truman State University, and Northwest Missouri State University still remain a part of the MIAA.

The first change in membership came in 1924, when the MIAA reorganized to include only the five regional Missouri state colleges: Central, Truman (at the time known as Northeast Missouri State), Northwest, Southeast Missouri State University, and Southwest Missouri State University (now Missouri State).

Over the next 56 years, three schools joined the membership: the Missouri School of Mines (later the University of Missouri-Rolla) in 1935, Lincoln University in 1970, and the University of Missouri-St. Louis in 1980.

The 1980s brought the biggest changes in the conference. In 1981, Southwest Missouri State University opted to move to NCAA Division I and the MIAA appointed its first full-time commissioner, Ken Jones, in

He would be in the position for 16 years, retiring in 1997. Former Gulf South and Metro commissioner Ralph McFillen succeeded Jones, serving 10 years before his retirement in 2007. Jim Johnson succeeded McFillen in July of that year and served as commissioner until September of 2010. Dr. Bob Boerigter succeeded Johnson in September

Southwest Baptist University brought membership back to eight schools in 1986, before the major expansion of the conference in 1989. Pittsburg State, Washburn, Missouri Southern State College (now University), and Missouri Western State College (now University) formerly members of the Central States Intercollegiate Conference began competition in the 1989-90 season.

Southeast Missouri State left the MIAA following the 1990-91 season to move on to NCAA Division I, and was replaced by Emporia State University in the 1991-92 season.

In August 1991, Judy Willson was hired as the MIAA's first fulltime sports information director. She left in 1994, and was succeeded by Matt Newbery, formerly the assistant sports information director at Pittsburg State. He became the assistant to the commissioner for media relations in 2005. Kellen Coleman replaced Newbery in 2009 as the Director of Communications. A third full-time staff member was added in 2005, as former Emporia State track and field athlete Natasha Oakes was hired as the assistant to the commissioner for compliance. She became the Assistant Commissioner for Compliance and Internal Operations/SWA before being succeeded by Renee Hultgren in 2010. The current MIAA Assistant Commissioner for Compliance and Internal Operations/SWA, Amber Feldman, replaced Hultgren in 2011. Larry House joined the staff in August 2007 as coordinator of external affairs and is now the assistant commissioner for championships and business development.

The current membership of the MIAA is at 11 schools, with the departure of Missouri-St. Louis in 1996 and Missouri-Rolla in 2005, the forfeiture of membership by Lincoln in 1999, the addition of Fort Hays State University in 2006 and the University of Nebraska Omaha in 2008, the re-joining of Lincoln in 2010, and the departure of Nebraska Omaha in 2011.

On July 29, 2010, the MIAA CEO Council voted to extend invitations to the University of Central Oklahoma and Northeastern State University to become members of the league, and on September 24, 2010, it voted to extend invitations to the University of Nebraska-Kearney and Lindenwood University to become conference institutions, beginning in 2012-13.

2011 MIAA FOOTBALL SEASON

The 2011 MIAA season was another season in which the eventual national champion came from the conference. This season it was the Pittsburgh State Gorillas. The Gorillas finished the season with an overall record of 13-1 and a conference mark of 8-1.

The national champ's only loss of the season came early in the season when it fell to the Washburn Ichabods. Northwest Missouri State finished in a three-way tie in second place with Washburn and Missouri Western, who all finished 7-2 in conference play.

Central Missouri finished in fifth with a record of 6-3 and Emporia State and Fort Hays State finished tied for sixth. Truman and Missouri Southern both finished with a record of 2-7 while Lincoln placed ninth after an 0-9 season.

Four MIAA schools competed in the NCAA Division II National Championship. Northwest Missouri State, Missouri Western, Washburn, and Pittsburgh state all competed in the postseason.

Northwest Missouri State beat Missouri Western in the opening round 35-29 and Washburn beat Abilien Christian 52-49. The second round saw Northwest upend Midwestern State in overtime 38-31.

Pitt State avenged its only loss of the regular season when it beat Washburn 31-22. The quarterfinals pitted Northwest Missouri State against Pitt State. The Gorillas throttled the Bearcats and won 41-16 and kept the momentum going into the semifinals.

In the final game before the championship contest, Pitt State beat Delta State 49-23. The last game of the 2011 season was a win for the Gorillas against Wayne State 35-21.

2011 SEASON IN REVIEW

The 2011 season was a season full of question marks for the Lindenwood Lion football team. Who was going to take over at quarterback for Philip Staback? How was the new defensive coordinator going to fit in? Was the offensive line going to be good enough? Could Denodus O'Bryant continue to be one of the best players in the country? Most importantly, could the Lions compete with the level of competition they would be playing against?

A lot of the questions were answered in the first week of the season. Lindenwood travelled to Greeley, Colo. to take on NCAA Division I FCS, Northern Colorado. It looked like at the start of the game that Northern Colorado was going to be much better than the Lions.

The Bears drove right down the field and scored the first points of the game after going on a 12 play 65-yard drive that resulted in a touchdown. But the Lions were able to cut back into the lead with a pair of James Neal field goals. After Northern Colorado scored to extend the lead 14-6, Lindenwood scored its first touchdown on the year to make the socore, 14-13.

Neither team was able to score in the third quarter, but to start the fourth, the Lions took their first lead of the game. O'Bryant scored on a 71 yard touchdown pass from new quarterback John Uribe to give the underdogs a 19-14 lead.

Just two minutes later, the Bears cut their deficit to just two via a 35- yard field goal. Trailing by just two, Northern Colorado looked to take control of the game with a field goal with just over a minute to play in the contest.

Now down by a point, Lindenwood did not give in to the Bears. With 59 seconds left in the game, the Lions drove down to the Northern Colorado four yard line. After Lindenwood centered the ball in the middle of the field, Neal lined up to kick the game-winning field goal.

What happened next was that the Lions pulled off one of the biggest wins in school history and a major upset.

Lindenwood compiled 447 yards compared to the Bears 263. Therman McGowan and O'Bryant led the team in rushing with 74 and 70 yards respectively. In his first start in center, Uribe threw for 294 yards

and one touchdown. O'Bryant led the team in receiving yards with 97 and a score.

After a big win, the Lions would return home to Hunter Stadium for their home opener against a familiar foe. The Graceland Yellowjackets, of the HAAC conference, was Lindenwood's next opponent.

It was a quick start for the Lions. Lindenwood scored 27 points in the first quarter to take a 27-0 lead. The second quarter was much less exciting. The only scoring for either team was a touchdown scored by Ty Munnerlyn. The home team held a 34-0 lead at the halftime break.

Mike Bunton was the first to get in the end zone in the second half after a 48 yard punt return.

Graceland was finally able to break the shutout with a 24-yard field goal. The final quarter

was once again all Lindenwood. The Lions added 26 points to their total and rolled to a 67-10 victory. The Lindenwood defense was absolutely dominate in the contest. Graceland compiled -7 yards rushing and just 108 through the air.

Uribe had a good game under center for the second straight week. He completed over 50 percent of his passes for 232 yards and two touchdowns. Andrew Helmick caught a touchdown pass and Bunton led the team with 57 yards receiving.

The second game of a two-game home stand saw Saint Joseph's come to St. Charles. For the second straight game, Lindenwood scored at least 20 points in the first quarter. The Lions scored on their first three out of four possessions to take a 20-0 lead. Justin Broome added to the Lindenwood lead in the second quarter with a 94 yard interception return.

As he did a week before Bunton returned a punt for a score, this time it was for 90 yards. Saint Joseph's finally got on the scoreboard in the third quarter with a pair of touchdowns. Lindenwood closed out the contest with 14 points in the final quarter to start the season 3-0 for the third straight season.

Week four saw the Lions take on their second NCAA Division I FCS team of the season. This time Lindenwood travelled to Vermillion, S.D. to take in the South Dakota Coyotes. Unfortunately, for the Lions this time was not as successful. The Coyotes scored 13 points in the first half and 17 in the second half to roll to a 30-0 win.

South Dakota's defense was too much for the Lindenwood offense. The Lions totaled only 147 yards of total offense, which included -10 yards rushing. Uribe was sacked seven times against the much bigger Coyotes front four.

The middle game of three straight road games saw Lindenwood take on an NCAA Division II school, the University of Missouri Science and Technology.

The first half of the game was frustrating for the visitors. The Lions offense drove up and down the field but had no points to show for it. Missouri S&T took advantage of some turnovers and held a 19-0 lead heading into the locker room.

Lindenwood finally got on the scoreboard in the third quarter when McGowan scored on a 20-yard run to cut the lead to 19-6. Both teams struggled the rest of the quarter to move the ball, but with just under 10 minutes to play in the final quarter the Lions scored to cut the lead to six. Lindenwood had a chance to win, but a crucial turnover late in the game gave Missouri S&T the win.

After losing two games in a row for the first time since 2007 the Lions tried to break the skid in a tough environment at Texas A&M-Kingsville.

The first 15 minutes was all Lindenwood, in which it scored the first 20 points of the game. The Javelinas did not go down quietly though. Kingsville scored three straight touchdowns to close out the first half to take the lead into the locker room.

After losing its lead, Lindenwood took all but 90 seconds to regain the lead in the third quarter. Helmick scored on a 31 yard pass from Uribe to take the lead. The Lions added to the lead when Bunton scored on his third punt return of the year which gave the visitors a 34-21 lead.

The Javelinas answered the Bunton score just one minute later with a 38 yard run. The lead was down to six for Lindenwood but once again Helmick scored to stretch the lead back up to 13. Kingsville was able to score a touchdown late, but the Lions defense held onto the lead.

The Javelinas outgained Lindenwood 506-301. Even though the defense gave up a ton of yards it forced Kingsville into three turnovers. McGowan had his best game of the year rushing with 90 yards and also caught two passes for 102 yards. Uribe threw for over 250 yards with three touchdown passes to Helmick.

With the two-game skid snapped, the Lions made their way back home to Hunter Stadium for the start of a four-game home stand. The first game was the school's homecoming game against Kansas Wesleyan.



At the end of the first quarter Lindenwood was up just 10-6. The next 15 minutes was an offensive onslaught by the Lions. They scored 34 second quarter points to head into the break with a 44-9 lead.

The offensive outbreak continued in the third quarter with 17 more points to give the home team a 61-16 lead. There was no points scored in the fourth quarter and Lindenwood won its fifth straight homecoming game.

The offense piled up over 500 total yards, including 226 on the ground and just under 300 through the air. Gary Wilson led the team on the ground with 94 yards and a score. Helmick had another 100 yard receiving game and scored three touchdowns.

Up next for the Lions was a game against Azusa Pacific, who came into the game with a 6-1 record. The opening quarter saw both teams kick field goals, then both teams traded touchdowns. With the contest tied at 10, Lindenwood was able to score with just 12 seconds to go in the half to take a 17-10 lead.

Lindenwood led 24-10 after a touchdown by Alex Robinson early in the third quarter. Azusa Pacific scored 21 unanswered points though, capped off by a touchdown run with 6:39 remaining in the game.

The Cougars forced a three-and-out on Lindenwood's next possession, but punter Morris Kesseloff kicked a 51-yard punt that forced Azusa Pacific back to its six-yard line. Azusa Pacific did not pick up a first down and was forced to punt. McGowan fielded the punt at Azusa Pacific's 44-yard line and tied the game at 31 with a punt return touchdown.

Azusa Pacific went three-and-out again on its next possession, and Lindenwood took over with a minute remaining on its 13-yard line. On

the second play of the drive, Uribe rolled out right and found Helmick wide open down the field. Helmick caught the pass near midfield and went untouched for the winning score.

The third straight home game saw the Lions take on another old foe, Culver-Stockton. Since the opening kick of the contest it was all Lindenwood. After scoring 90 points against the Wildcats the previous season, the Lions put 70 on the scoreboard in 2011. The running game compiled over 300 yards rushing and 433 total yards.

Freshman Marvin Byrd had a breakout game with 119 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Tim Celestine led the team in receiving with 50 vards and a score.

The final home game of the season was against future MIAA opponent, Central Missouri. On the first possession of the game, O'Bryant broke free for an 84 yard touchdown scamper to give the home team a quick 7-0 lead.

After holding the Mules to a field goal on their first possession, Helmick put together a big kickoff return to set the team up near midfield. Five plays later, Lindenwood scored on a five-yard pass Uribe to Terance Jackson.

The Lions forced a fumble in the red zone on the Mules' next possession, but the rest of the game was almost all Central Missouri. The Lions picked up just three more first downs offensively in the first half, and the Mules scored two touchdowns and kicked a field goal to lead 19-14 at halftime.

In the third quarter, Central Missouri put the game away by outscoring Lindenwood 28-7. Lindenwood added seven more points in the fourth quarter when Helmick had a great catch after getting one-on-

> one coverage with his defender, and he reached the ball across the goal line for a 44-yard touchdown strike.



LINDENWOOD 22, NORTHERN COLORADO 20 SEPT. 3 - GREELEY, COLO. NOTTINGHAM FIELD



James Neal kicked a 21-yard field goal as time expired in the game to give Lindenwood its biggest regular season victory in program history. The Lions knocked off NCAA Division I FCS Northern Colorado by a 22-20 margin.

Northern Colorado took a 20-19 lead with 1:10 remaining in the game when Dave Eden kicked a 25-yard field goal. Lindenwood came right back, sparked by a 44-yard kickoff return by Andrew Helmick. John Uribe completed five-of-five passes for 46 yards in the final drive. The biggest was a 28-yard pass that Helmick acrobatically caught at the two-yard line. After a two-yard loss on a running play, Lindenwood called timeout and Neal kicked his third field goal of the game.

Northern Colorado scored a touchdown on its first possession after going 12 plays and 65 yards, and scoring on an eight-yard pass from Seth Lobato to David Deans. Lindenwood had two long drives early in the game but had to settle for Neal field goals on both. After a Lions' fumble early in the second quarter, the Bears had to go just 36 yards to take a 14-6 lead. Lindenwood finally got in the endzone with 9:23 left in the second quarter on a Therman McGowan one-yard run.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Lions took their first lead of the game at 19-14 with 11:14 remaining in the fourth quarter. Uribe completed a short pass up the middle to Denodus O'Bryant, and O'Bryant outran everyone for a 71-yard touchdown reception.

Northern Colorado kicked a field goal on its next possession and Lindenwood was forced to punt after a dropped pass on third down near midfield. The Lions' defense had the Bears backed up to third-and-25 on their next possession, but Northern Colorado got a second life with a 30yard pass completion. An energized Northern Colorado offense completed several more passes to get into the redzone, leading to the field goal that put the Bears ahead temporarily.

Lindenwood finished with 447 yards of offense, compared to 263 for Northern Colorado. Lindenwood had 131 yards rushing and 316 passing. Lindenwood also won the time of possession battle by nearly 10 minutes. Defensively, the Lions held Northern Colorado to four-of-16 on third down conversions, and allowed just 101 rushing yards and 162 passing

O'Bryant finished the game with 97 receiving yards and 65 rushing yards. McGowan also rushed for 73 yards. Helmick caught eight passes for 77 yards, and Alex Robinson had four catches for 75 yards. In his first game as a Lion, Uribe threw for 294 yards and had one touchdown and one

Defensively for the Lions, Tyler Epstein had a team-high 10 tackles, including one for a loss. Brock Reed had nine tackles and one sack. The Lions had five tackles for loss and two sacks in the contest.

LINDENWOOD 67, GRACELAND 10 SEPT. 10 - ST. CHARLES, MO. HUNTER STADIUM



The Lindenwood football team opened up the home portion of its 2011 schedule with a strong defensive performance during a 67-10 victory over Graceland. The Lions allowed just 101 yards of total offense, the second lowest total in program history.

The defense set the tone in the first half when it allowed just one total yard of offense. Graceland had eight possessions and lost yards on half of them. The Yellowjackets were one-of-10 in the half on third and fourth downs, and they only ran one play from Lindenwood territory.

The defensive effort helped the offense have good field possession. In the first quarter, the Lions had an average starting position of Graceland's 37 yard line, and they scored four quick touchdowns because of that. John Uribe threw two touchdown passes to Alex Robinson and Andrew Helmick, and Denodus O'Bryant and Marvin Byrd had rushing scores. Lindenwood scored another touchdown in the second quarter when Ty Munnerlyn scooped up a Lion fumble in the endzone, and the home team led 34-0 at halftime.

Lindenwood went up 41-0 midway through the third quarter when Mike Bunton returned a punt 48 yards for a touchdown. After that score, Graceland's offense had its only sustained drive of the night, going 13 plays and 62 yards. The drive ended with a 24-yard field goal.

After that field goal, Lindenwood's defense returned to its shutdown form, with only one long pass of 33 yards keeping the team from setting a school record for fewest yards in a game. The Lions added a safety, two more rushing touchdowns, a punt return touchdown, and a field goal the rest of the way. A fumble recovery touchdown by Graceland ended the scoring.

Lindenwood's defense ended the game allowing minus-seven yards rushing, which ties a school record. The Lions had six sacks for 50 yards, and 18 tackles for loss for 99 yards. The Lions forced 11 punts, two turnovers, one turnover on downs, and one safety in 17 possessions.

Jon McComb, Cody Reider, and Cody Fogle all had team-highs with seven tackles. McComb had 2.5 tackles for loss, while Reider and Steven Butler had two. Tony Ritzman recovered a fumble, Nick Grubbs forced a fumble, and Justin Broome intercepted a pass. A total of 15 Lions had at least 0.5 tackles for loss.

Offensively, Uribe threw for 232 yards and two touchdowns. Mike Bunton was the leading receiver with three catches for 57 yards, and Mike Bunton caught three passes for 50 yards. Therman McGowan was the leading rusher with 30 yards and three attempts. Byrd finished with two rushing touchdowns.

Game Notes: Lindenwood improves to 2-0 overall and Graceland falls to 0-2 ... the six sacks by the Lions was the third-most for a single-game ... James Neal's 44-yard field goal was the longest of his Lindenwood career ... LINDENWOOD 55, SAINT JOSEPH'S 14 SEPT. 17 - ST. CHARLES, MO HUNTER STADIUM



The Lindenwood football team picked up its first victory in program history over an official NCAA Division II team on Saturday evening at Hunter Stadium. The Lions downed Saint Joseph's by a score of 55-14.

The offense got the Lions off to a good start by scoring touchdowns on its first three possessions, allowing Lindenwood to lead 20-0 after one quarter. The first two scores were set up by long returns by Mike Bunton. Alex Robinson scored the first touchdown after catching a 13-yard pass from John Uribe. Therman McGowan had the second touchdown on a 12-yard rush. The third drive was 85 yards long and was capped off by a 29-yard pass from Uribe to Terance Jackson.

The second quarter was dominated by the two defenses. The Pumas appeared poised to score late in the half when they reached Lindenwood's 10 yard line. Justin Broome though stepped in front of a pass and returned it 94 yards for a Lindenwood touchdown and a 27-0 halftime lead.

Lindenwood's lead reached 34 early in the second half when Bunton had a 90-yard punt return after Saint Joseph's went three-and-out. The Pumas finally got on the board on their next possession, but the Lions answered just 1:33 later on a 23-yard Andrew Helmick touchdown reception. Saint Joseph's had one more touchdown in the third quarter, before the Lions finished the game off with touchdown runs by McGowan and David Ortega.

Lindenwood finished with 399 yards of total offense, with 143 on the ground and 256 through the air. The Lions did not have a turnover in the contest.

Uribe threw for 191 yards and three touchdowns, and Ortega completed all three passes he attempted for 65 yards. McGowan had a 100-yard rushing game with 104 yards, and he also caught one pass for 24 yards. Robinson and Jackson both caught three passes for 48 and 41 yards, respectively.

Defensively, Lindenwood made Saint Joseph's one dimensional in the game as the Pumas finished with 375 passing yards and just 32 rushing yards. The 32 yards rushing tied for the eighth-lowest rushing total allowed in Lions history. The Lions sacked the Pumas quarterback five times in the game.

Broome finished with two interceptions and six tackles. Christian Golder had a team-high seven tackles and two pass breakups. Chris Howard had six tackles, two tackles for loss, and one sack.

Game Notes: Lindenwood improves to 3-0 on the year and Saint Joseph's falls to 0-3 ... Lindenwood's defense has allowed an average of 42.0 rushing yards a game this season, including a 12.5 average the last two games ... the Lions averaged 29.7 yards on kickoff returns and 42.0 yards on punt returns ... The University of Missouri Science and Technology Miners scored 19 first-half points and held off a late Lindenwood rally for a 19-13 victory over the Lions.

The first half was dominated by the Miners. Lindenwood was held to a season-low four yards rushing on 13 carries. The Miners forced two turnovers and recovered an onside kick.

Missouri S&T scored the only three points of the first quarter, and widened its lead in the second quarter with 16 more points to take a 19-0 halftime lead. Lindenwood was held scoreless for the entire first half for the first time since 2005 when Culver-Stockton blanked the Lions in the opening half. The Miners gained 19 first downs compared to Lindenwood's five. The Lions lost two costly fumbles, one in the red zone, and the Miners capitalized on all three of their red-zone opportunities to grab the halftime advantage.

The Lions began a comeback attempt with just under 10 minutes left in the third quarter when Therman McGowan ran in a touchdown from 20 yards out. After surrendering 234 yards in the first half, the Lindenwood defense was able to slow down the home team in the second half. The Miners were able to gain only 108 yards in the second to give the Lions a chance to come back.

The lead was cut to six with 9:18 remaining when John Uribe completed a 12-yard touchdown pass to Terance Jackson. Later in that quarter, Lindenwood stopped the Miners on third down and forced a punt with 2:11 to go in the game. After converting on a third down and three, the Lions gained seven on the ensuing play. On second down, quarterback John Uribe was flushed from the pocket and threw an interception that sealed the win for the Miners.

On the night, the Lions outgained the Miners 367-342. The Lindenwood ground game was held to just 69 yards compared to the Miners' 147. For the game, the Lions were just 2-for-12 on third downs.

Uribe was 21-of-39 for 298 yards with a touchdown and one interception. McGowan led the way for Lindenwood rushing with 69 yards and one touchdown. Through the air, Andrew Helmick led the team with 123 yards receiving.

Chris Howard led the defense in tackles with nine, while Donald Collier made seven stops. Tyler Epstein and Joe Day each tallied a quarterback sack.

With the loss, the Lions fall to 3-1 on the season. Lindenwood travels to NCAA Division I South Dakota next weekend.

The Lindenwood football team fell short in its bid to upset another NCAA Division I opponent this season. The Lions fell to South Dakota, which is ranked No. 21 in the NCAA Division I FCS national rankings, on Saturday afternoon by a 30-0 score.

South Dakota was able to slow down Lindenwood's normally high-scoring offense. The Lions finished with just 147 total yards of offense. The Coyotes sacked John Uribe eight times which caused Lindenwood to have negative rushing yards for the game.

Lindenwood's defense kept the game close for awhile. The Lions were winning the field position for the first couple of possessions until South Dakota got seven points after an eight-play drive that was sparked by a 37-yard pass on the first play. The Coyotes added two field goals on their next two possessions and they led 13-0 at halftime. Lindenwood punted on all six of their full drives in the half and only had 61 yards for the first two quarters.

South Dakota put the game away with 10 points in the third quarter. Down 23-0, Lindenwood had its best scoring chance as it went on a 17-play, 71-yard drive. The Lions converted three third-down opportunities and reached the South Dakota 15-yard line. On fourth-and-seven, Lindenwood elected to go for it and Uribe's pass to Andrew Helmick came up one yard short. The Coyotes added one more insurance touchdown late in the game.

The Coyotes ended the game with 336 yards of total offense, with 151 rushing and 185 passing. South Dakota had 22 first downs, compared to 10 for the Lions.

Uribe finished the game 25-of-26 passing for 157 yards. Alex Robinson led the team with seven receptions for 53 yards. Therman McGowan was the leading rusher with 51 yards.

Defensively, Chris Howard and Brock Reed each had 10 tackles. Lindenwood's defense had five sacks and six tackles for loss, led by Kellen Dreyer who had a sack and three tackles for loss.

Game Notes: Lindenwood falls to 3-2 overall while South Dakota improves to 3-2 ... the shutout snaps a Lindenwood school record of 99 straight games without being shutout. The last time Lindenwood was shutout was the first game of the 2003 season ... the Lions are now 2-3 against NCAA Division I programs, including a 1-1 mark this season ... LINDENWOOD 41, TEXAS A&M-KINGSVILLE 35 OCT. 8 - KINGSVILLE, TEXAS JAVELINA STADIUM



The Lindenwood football team earned another big victory during its transition season to the NCAA Division II level. The Lions stopped Texas A&M-Kingsville on a goal-line stand with 19 seconds remaining for a 41-35 victory. Andrew Helmick caught three touchdown passes to lead Lindenwood to the win over a program that has participated in the last two NCAA Division II playoffs.

The back-and-forth game started with the Lions jumping out to a 20-0 lead. Lindenwood forced turnovers the first two times the Javelinas touched the ball and that led directly to 10 points. The first score came on a Thomas McGowan 17-yard run, and that was followed by a James Neal 29-yard field goal. Later in the quarter, Neal kicked another field goal, this one from 41 yards out, and the Lions led 17-0 after 15 minutes.

The first time the Lions had possession in the second quarter, it took John Uribe two plays to take Lindenwood 92 yards. The first was a 68-yard pass reception to McGowan, and the next play was a 24-yard touchdown pass to Helmick. The rest of the half was all Texas A&M-Kingsville, though, as it scored three straight touchdowns to take a 21-20 lead into halftime.


In the third quarter, special teams helped turn the momentum back to the Lions. Helmick returned the opening kickoff 50 yards to set Lindenwood up in Texas A&M territory. Four plays later, Helmick caught a 31-yard touchdown reception to put Lindenwood ahead. Later in the quarter, Mike Bunton returned a punt 77 yards for a touchdown. The Javelinas answered with a touchdown on their next drive that cut Lindenwood's lead to 34-28.

After trading punts, special teams came into play again early in the fourth quarter. Texas A&M-Kingsville recorded just a six-yard punt that gave Lindenwood the ball on Texas A&M-Kingsville's 35-yard line. Three plays into that drive, Helmick caught his third touchdown pass, this one from 24 yards out. Once again, TexasA&M-Kingsville was able to answer as it went on a 13-play drive that ended in a touchdown that made the score 41-35.

Lindenwood took over with 4:42 remaining in the game. On third-and-one early in the drive, McGowan found a hole and rushed for 37 yards down to the Texas A&M-Kingsville seven-yard line. Lindenwood rushed three straight times to force the Javelinas to use all of their timeouts, but a missed field goal attempt gave Texas A&M-Kingsville the ball on its 20-yard line with 2:18 left.

Texas A&M-Kingsville's final drive started with three straight incomplete passes. On fourth-down, it completed an 11-yard pass to keep the drive going. The Javelinas' quarterback completed four of his next five passes, and the Javelinas had first-and-goal from the Lindenwood seven-yard line. After an incomplete pass on first down, they rushed for five yards on second down, and were stopped at the one-yard line on third down. On the fourth-down play, Chris Howard and Christian Golder forced a two-yard loss on the rush to seal the win for the Lions.

Texas A&M-Kingsville had 506 yards of total offense, over 200 more than Lindenwood. The Lions rushed for 44 yards, a number hurt by allowing nine sacks, and 257 yards passing. The Javelinas had 165 rushing yards and 341 passing yards. The Lions overcome those numbers by having a +3 turnover margin and a big advantage in special teams play.

LINDENWOOD 61, KANSAS WESLEYAN 16 OCT. 15 - ST. CHARLES, MO. **HUNTER STADIUM**



The Lindenwood football team won its fifth straight Homecoming contest at Hunter Stadium with a 61-16 win over Kansas Wesleyan. The Lions started out slow but an 84-yard kickoff return touchdown from Denodus O'Bryant sparked 30 unanswered points for Lindenwood.

The Lions finished the game with 508 yards of total offense, compared to 245 for Kansas Weslevan. Lindenwood's defense allowed just 10 points, and both of those scoring drives were started by turnovers in its own territory. Offensively, Lindenwood rushed for 226 yards and three touchdowns, and it passed for 282 yards and four touchdowns. It also had a big advantage in field position, as its average starting position was the Kansas Wesleyan 48-yard line, 26 yards better than the Coyotes' starting

Lindenwood opened the game with two straight interceptions, the second which was returned for a Kansas Wesleyan touchdown. That lead lasted just 11 seconds though as O'Bryant, who was playing his first game back from an injury, with his seventh career kickoff return touchdown. Later in the quarter, a Kansas Wesleyan interception set up a 42-yard field goal from James Neal.

In the second quarter, Lindenwood's offense began to click as it scored touchdowns on five of six possessions. Andrew Helmick led the assault with three touchdown receptions, and Marvin Byrd and Gary Wilson each had a rushing touchdown. The Coyotes managed just a field goal in the period and Lindenwood led 44-9 at halftime.

David Ortega led the Lindenwood offense to 17 points in the third quarter. He rushed for one touchdown, threw another to Terance Jackson, and set up Neal's second field goal of the day. Kansas Wesleyan had one short touchdown drive in the third, and neither team scored in the final 15 minutes.

Helmick finished the day with four catches for 108 yards, and seven other Lions had at least one reception. Uribe threw for 153 yards and one touchdown, and Ortega threw for 120 yards and one score. Gary Wilson led the rushing attack with 94 yards, including 66 on his rushing touchdown.

Nick Grubbs led the defense with seven tackles. Joe Day, Nick Tepea, and Chris Howard each had six. Day had a tackle for loss, Tepea intercepted a pass, and Howard had a pass breakup. Cody Reider had two sacks, James Wofford had the other interception, Alex Meraz had a forced fumble, and Dreyer recovered that fumble. Reider and Christian Golder both blocked a kick on special teams.

Game Notes: Lindenwood improves to 5-2 on the season, including a 2-0 mark against NAIA schools ... Kansas Wesleyan falls to 2-5 ... the Lions have won 10 out of their last 11 Homecoming games and are 18-4 all-time on Homecoming ... Lindenwood is averaging 62.5 points the last two times that it has faced a member of the KCAC ... Andrew Helmick has six touchdown receptions on just nine catches over the last two games, and he has 201 receiving yards in that span ... the Lions defense had double-figure tackles for loss for the third time this season ... James Neal improved to eight-of-nine on field goals this season, including three-ofthree from longer than 40 yards ... Lindenwood has five special teams return touchdowns this season, with four on punt returns and one on kickoff returns.

LINDENWOOD 38, AZUSA PACIFIC 31 OCT. 22 - ST. CHARLES, MO. HUNTER STADIUM



The Lindenwood football team scored two touchdowns in the final three minutes for a come-from-behind 38-31 victory over Azusa Pacific at Hunter Stadium in St. Charles. The Lions scored the game-winning touchdown with 29 seconds remaining when John Uribe completed an 82-yard pass to Andrew Helmick.

Lindenwood led 24-10 after a touchdown by Alex Robinson early in the third quarter. Azusa Pacific scored 21 unanswered points though, capped off by a Terrel Watson run with 6:39 remaining in the game. The Cougars forced a three-and-out on Lindenwood's next possession, but Morris Keseloff kicked a 51-yard punt that forced Azusa Pacific back to its six-yard line.

Azusa Pacific did not pick up a first down and was forced to punt. Therman McGowan fielded the punt at Azusa Pacific's 44-yard line and tied the game at 31 with a punt return touchdown.

Azusa Pacific went three-and-out again on its next possession, and Lindenwood took over with a minute remaining on its 13-yard line. On the second play of the drive, Uribe rolled out right and found Helmick wide open down the field. Helmick caught the pass near midfield and went untouched for the winning score.

Both teams opened the game by kicking a first quarter field goal. Denodus O'Bryant scored the first touchdown with a six-yard run early in the second quarter. Azusa Pacific answered with a touchdown drive to tie the game at 10.

Lindenwood's special teams, which also blocked a field goal kick in the second quarter, came up big again late in the period. Blake Arnette forced a fumble on a punt return, and Cody Reider fell on it to give Lindenwood the ball in the red zone with 1:12 left in the half. On third-and-one from the three, McGowan picked up the first down, and then scored one play later.

Lindenwood scored on its first possession of the second half when Uribe found Robinson for a 21-yard reception. Azusa Pacific again answered right away and that was the final scoring for the third quarter.

In the fourth, the Cougars tied the game with 8:42 remaining, and then took advantage of a Lindenwood fumble for another quick score with 6:39 remaining.

The Lions' defense held the NAIA's top scoring team well below its average in rushing yards and points. Azusa Pacific did finish with nearly 60 yards more of offense, but Lindenwood's special teams play once again was the difference in a Lindenwood win.

Uribe threw for a season-high 313 yards and had two touchdown passes. McGowan led the rushing attack with 47 yards and he also had 61 receiving yards. Helmick finished with seven receptions for 137 yards. Robinson had six catches for 59 yards and Mike Bunton had 48 receiving yards.

Chris Howard led the defense with 14 tackles, and Cody Fogle was also in double-figures with 10. Brock Reed had the other forced turnover with a fumble recovery.

LINDENWOOD 70, CULVER-STOCKTON 24 OCT. 29 - ST. CHARLES, MO. HUNTER STADIUM



The Lindenwood football team won its fourth straight contest with a 70-24 victory over Culver-Stockton. The Lions have now won 26 consecutive regular season games at Hunter Stadium in St. Charles.

Lindenwood broke out its big plays against the Wildcats, with six touchdowns being scored from 30 yards or longer. All three areas of the game also scored as the Lions scored touchdowns passing, rushing, on a punt return, a fumble return, and an interception return.

The Lions jumped out to a 28-7 lead after the first 15 minutes of play. Therman McGowan was the star of the quarter with back-to-back touchdowns. With the Lions leading 7-0, he returned a punt 80 yards to put Lindenwood up by 14. After Lindenwood got the ball back on a punt, McGowan took the first handoff and scored on a 48-yard touchdown run.

In the second quarter, the Lions stretched their lead to 49-17. Andrew Helmick continued his recent hot streak with his 10th receiving touchdown of the season. The exclamation on the half was a 70-yard interception return touchdown by Nick Tepea. Lindenwood scored its 49 points in the half despite having the ball for less than seven minutes.

Lindenwood extended its lead by 14 more points in the second half as it outscored the Wildcats 21-7 for the final two periods. All three Lions scores were on the ground from Marvin Byrd, David Ortega, and Gabe Caine. The touchdown by Caine was the first of his career.

Lindenwood finished the game with 433 yards of total offense. The Lions had 313 yards on the ground, the seventh-most in school history. Culver-Stockton compiled nearly 400 yards of offense, but Lindenwood forced six turnovers in the game.

Byrd finished the game with 119 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Tim Celestine, Caine, and McGowan all finished with over 50 yards rushing. Tim Celestine and Helmick each had a team-high 50 yards receiving and a touchdown. John Uribe completed four-of-five passes for 107 yards and two touchdowns.

Lindenwood's final touchdown came from Chris Howard who had a 46-yard fumble recovery, and Howard also led the team with 10 tackles. Other interceptions came from Malcomb Jones and Mike Cobb, and other fumble recoveries were by Brock Reed and Cody Fogle. Donald Collier, Cody Reider, and Reed all had forced fumbles. Reider was one of four players with a sack, and he had a team-high 1.5 tackles for loss.

Game Notes: Lindenwood improves to 7-2 on the season, while Culver-Stockton falls to 1-8 ... the game was the last game of the season for the Lions versus a NAIA program; Lindenwood went 4-0 on the season against NAIA teams ... Lindenwood defeated Culver-Stockton for the sixth straight time ... the 70 points were the most this season by Lindenwood and the fifth-most in school history ... the Lions now have six punt return touchdowns this season with three each from Mike Bunton and Therman McGowan ... John Uribe passed 2,000 yards passing for the season, the fourth Lindenwood quarterback to hit that mark for a year.

The Lindenwood football team got off to a quick start at Hunter Stadium against Central Missouri, the first Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) team that the Lions have faced in program history. The Mules scored 30 unanswered points at one point and defeated Lindenwood by a 47-28 margin.

On the first play of scrimmage against its future conference rival, Lindenwood's Denodus O'Bryant rushed for an 84-yard touchdown score. After holding the Mules to a field goal on their first possession, the Lions' Andrew Helmick had a big kickoff return to set the team up near midfield. Five plays later, Lindenwood scored on a five-yard pass from John Uribe to Terance Jackson. The big offensive play on the drive was a 43-yard pass from Uribe to Helmick.

Lindenwood forced a fumble in the red zone on the Mules' next possession, but the rest of the game was almost all Central Missouri. The Lions picked up just three more first downs offensively in the first half, and the Mules scored two touchdowns and kicked a field goal to lead 19-14 at halftime.

In the third quarter, Central Missouri put the game away by outscoring Lindenwood 28-7. Lindenwood's lone touchdown was set up by another O'Bryant run. This one was for 70 yards down to the Central Missouri nine-yard line. On the next play, Therman McGowan finished the final nine yards when he outran the defense to the right-hand corner of the end zone.

Lindenwood added seven more points in the fourth quarter when Helmick had a great catch after getting one-on-one coverage with his defender, and he reached the ball across the goal line for a 44-yard touchdown strike.

For the game, Lindenwood finished with 370 yards of offense, including 168 on the ground and 202 through the air. Central Missouri had 531 yards, including 429 passing. The Lions had one more turnover in the game but were just four-of-16 on third and fourth-down plays, compared to eight-of-16 for the Mules.

Lindenwood's offense was led by its big two of O'Bryant and Helmick. O'Bryant rushed for 179 yards on just 11 carries, and he finished with 227 all-purpose yards. Helmick caught nine passes for 147 yards and had 191 all-purpose yards. Uribe finished with 202 yards passing.

Defensively for the Lions, Tyler Epstein had 11 tackles and a fumble recovery. Christian Golder recorded eight tackles, one tackle for loss, and one fumble recovery. Justin Broome intercepted a pass, forced a fumble, and had a pass breakup. Sean Gracy had two sacks.

Game Notes: Lindenwood falls to 7-3 on the season and Central Missouri improves to 7-3 ... the Lions fall to 2-2 on the season against NCAA Division II programs ... the loss snaps Lindenwood's 26-game regular season home winning streak ... Denodus O'Bryant had the 14th-best rushing day in Lindenwood history ... Andrew Helmick moved to fifth in Lindenwood's single-season reception (54) and receiving yards (858) lists, and is second for single-season receiving touchdowns (11), one shy of the record ... John Uribe threw at least two touchdown passes for the fifth straight game ... the crowd of 4,531 was one of the largest home crowds in Lindenwood's history.

LINDENWOOD 48, CENTRAL OKLAHOMA 14 NOV. 12 - EDMOND, OKLA. WANTLAND STADIUM



The Lindenwood football team earned a big victory over a future conference opponent in Edmond, Okla. The Lions defeated Central Oklahoma by a 48-14 score in their final regular season contest.

Lindenwood's defense dominated the first half, as it allowed just 127 yards and no points, and forced two turnovers. The first turnover was an interception by Chaz Fulton late in the first quarter and he returned it 57 yards for the first touchdown of the game.

The Lions' other touchdowns in the half, both in the second quarter, were also set up by the defense. Twice, Central Oklahoma went three-and-out and punted the ball to Lindenwood at midfield. The first time, Lindenwood scored on a 22-yard pass to Thomas Stubbs. Its next possession, Denodus O'Bryant finished off the drive with a one-yard touchdown run.

Lindenwood went up 28-0 early in the third quarter on a 26-yard pass from David Ortega to Alex Robinson. Central Oklahoma finally got on the board midway through the third quarter on a passing touchdown. On the ensuing kickoff, Andrew Helmick returned it 100 yards to put Lindenwood back up by 28 at 35-7. The Bronchos scored one more touchdown in the third quarter, but Lindenwood completed the victory with two touchdowns in the fourth. Therman McGowan had a five-yard run and Helmick caught a 44-yard touchdown pass from Joe Plassmeyer.

Lindenwood finished the game with 358 yards of offense, including 250 on the ground. Central Oklahoma had 318 total yards, and just 48 rushing. The Lions defense forced three interceptions in the game.

In his first start of the season, senior quarterback Ortega threw for two touchdowns, and Joe Plassmeyer also had a touchdown pass. McGowan rushed for 101 yards, and Helmick had 54 rushing yards and 43 receiving yards. Robinson caught two passes for 36 yards.

Defensively, Chris Howard had nine tackles. Brock Reed and Malach Radigan had the other interceptions for the team, and Christian Golder had five tackles, one tackle for loss, and two pass breakups.

Game Notes: Lindenwood improves to 8-3 on the season, while Central Oklahoma falls to 2-9 ... the Lions improve to 3-2 on the season versus NCAA Division II programs ... Andrew Helmick tied the school's single-season receiving touchdowns records of 12 with his fourth-quarter score ... Chris Howard passed 80 tackles on the season, just the tenth Lion to accomplish that during the Patrick Ross era at the school, and he now has 253 tackles for his career ... Helmick's special teams touchdown was the eighth special team score of the season for Lindenwood.

LINDENWOOD FOOTBALL PLAYOFF HISTORY

1998 NAIA FIRST ROUND LINDENWOOD 10, SOUTHWESTERN 12 NOV. 21 · WICHITA, KAN.

The Lindenwood football team made its first postseason appearance in 1998 when the No. 16 Lions travelled to No. 3 Southwestern (Kan.) for a first-round NAIA Football Championship Series game. Lindenwood had better statistics in the game except for the main one as the Lions fell 12-10.

The Lions struck first when they took the opening kickoff, ran 15 plays, and scored on a one-yard run by Marceo Haywood. Southwestern responded later in the quarter with a touchdown, but the Moundbuilders missed the extra point. Neither team scored the rest of the half, and Lindenwood led 7-6 at halftime.

In the second half, Southwestern took a 12-7 lead early in the third quarter after a touchdown but missed its two-point conversion. Dante Buscaglia cut that lead to 12-10 with a 25-yard field goal with 9:24 left in the game. Later in the quarter, Lindenwood nearly scored the gamewinning touchdown, but it was called back due to a penalty. Lindenwood had to settle for a 50-yard field goal, but Buscaglia's try came up a few vards short.

Haywood led the team with 274 all-purpose yards. He had 158 rushing yards, 45 receiving yards, and 71 punt return yards.

2004 NAIA FIRST ROUND LINDENWOOD 19, HASTINGS 20 NOV. 20 · ST. CHARLES, MO.

The first home playoff game in Lindenwood history ended in heartbreak as No. 16 Hastings kicked a field goal as time expired for a 20-19 win over the No. 5 Lions.

The two teams traded field goals in the first quarter before Lindenwood went ahead in the second quarter on a 76-yard run by DeDe Dorsey. Hastings added two touchdowns later in the quarter, and Lindenwood trailed 17-13 at halftime after Jared Tatom kicked a 23-yard field goal with less than a minute remaining in the half.

In the second half, Lindenwood took the lead on the first play of the half when George Mumphard caught a 62-yard touchdown reception. The Lions missed the extra point though, which came back to haunt them. On the final drive, Hastings drove down to Lindenwood territory and kicked a 28-yard field goal at the buzzer.

Lindenwood ended the game with 431 yards of offense, 188 more than Hastings. Dorsey collected 195 rushing yards, 15 receiving yards, and 15 kickoff return yards. Emiliano Salazar threw for 225 yards, and Mumphard had 72 receiving yards. Jake Sharp had a team-high 12 tackles, and Brian Loeb had three tackles for loss.



2007 NAIA FIRST ROUND LINDENWOOD 14, ST. FRANCIS 35 NOV. 17 • FORT WAYNE, IND.

No. 12 Lindenwood jumped out to a 14-0 lead over No. 3 Saint Francis (Ind.) after one quarter, but the rest of the first-round playoff game belonged to the Cougars as they defeated the Lions by a 35-14 score.

The Lions scored on a pair of Richard Murrell runs in the first quarter to take a two-touchdown lead. Saint Francis answered with three touchdowns in the second quarter and added insurance touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters. Saint Francis' defense shutdown Lindenwood after that second Murrell score, as the Lions had just 147 yards of offense for the rest of the game.

Saint Francis outgained Lindenwood 445-281 for the game. The Cougars especially controlled play on the ground with 274 yards, which helped them have nearly 39 minutes of possession. Lindenwood turned the ball over twice, and did not force a turnover.

Hakeem Abdullah had a team-high 81 rushing yards and 32 receiving yards. Ben Kisner threw for 158 yards and Murrell finished with 50 rushing yards. Jared Shoemaker led the defense with 16 tackles and one pass breakup.



2008 NAIA FIRST ROUND LINDENWOOD 65, LAMBUTH 48 NOV. 22 • ST. CHARLES, MO.

The No. 7 Lindenwood football team won a shootout in the firstround of the NAIA Championship Series, defeating No. 16 Lambuth by a 65-48 score.

The two teams combined for 1,245 total offensive yards, including 865 through the air. Lindenwood was able to prevail after forcing six turnovers, including five interceptions, while the Eagles forced just one interception.

Lindenwood jumped out to an early 14-0 lead after one quarter, taking advantage of three Eagle turnovers. In the second, both teams scored three touchdowns and missed one extra point, making it 34-20 Lindenwood at halftime.

Early in the second-half, the Lions appeared to put the game away with touchdowns to go up 48-20. A 41-yard Eagle touchdown late in the quarter though set the stage for a wild fourth quarter.

Lindenwood scored first on a field goal by Halley Ferrell to go up 51-27. Lambuth scored two times though in 2:06 to pull within 51-41, with an onside kick recovery between the two scores.

Lindenwood missed a field goal, however, with the short field, and Lambuth answered with a third straight touchdown. After another onside kick failed, Lindenwood finally appeared to put the game away when Dario Camacho broke a third-and-four run for a 22-yard touchdown with 1:43 remaining.

2008 NAIA SECOND ROUND LINDENWOOD 34, MORNINGSIDE 31 NOV. 29 • SIOUX CITY, IOWA

Halley Ferrell recorded the biggest kick in school history as his 25-yard field goal with three seconds left in the game gave No. 7 Lindenwood a 34-31 victory over No. 6 Morningside in the quarterfinals of the NAIA Football Championship Series.

Ben Kisner threw three first-half touchdown passes, including one with 15 seconds remaining, to give Lindenwood a 21-14 halftime lead. The Lions extended their lead to 10 with a field goal late in the third quarter, but Morningside answered with 10 straight points that tied the game and set up a wild finish.

Dario Camacho put Lindenwood ahead with 2:20 remaining on a sixyard run, but Morningside answered with a touchdown just 1:35 later. The Mustangs left too much time on the clock though, as Lindenwood went 63 yards in six plays to set up Ferrell's game-winning kick.

Camacho finished with three touchdowns, with two receiving and one rushing. He had 102 yards on the ground and 83 through the air. Rudy Fleming caught 10 passes for 169 yards. Ben Kisner threw for 445 yards and three touchdowns. Defensively, Darrel Trice and Brandon Gould each had nine tackles.

2008 NAIA SEMIFINALS LINDENWOOD 37, CARROLL 38 DEC. 6 • HELENA, MONT.

In Lindenwood's first semifinal appearance, a two-point play decided the game between No. 7 Lindenwood and No. 1 Carroll. The play went Carroll's way as the Fighting Saints survived by a 38-37 score.

Carroll dominated the game early on as it jumped out to a 38-17 lead late in the third quarter. Lindenwood stormed back though as two quick touchdowns cut that lead to 38-31. On the Lions' final drive, they went 99 yards and scored a touchdown on fourth down. Kisner completed a four-yard pass to Rudy Fleming for those six points. The team elected to go for the win in the hostile environment, but its two-point conversion pass was broken up.

Nate Orlando scored two touchdowns in the game, including one on a 94-yard kickoff return. Ben Kisner threw for 223 yards and three touchdowns. Marcel Thompson caught six passes for 73 yards and one touchdown. The other touchdown receptions came from Austin Bortle. Ryan Zimmerman led the defense with seven tackles, including one for a loss.

The No. 3 Lindenwood football team advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NAIA Football Championship Series with a 42-14 victory over No. 20 Langston.

The Lions defense was the story of the game as it did not allow a point until midway through the fourth quarter. It forced two turnovers, one of which was returned for a touchdown, and twice in the first-half stopped Langston on fourth-and-short plays. Those early stops by the Lindenwood defense helped the squad jump out to 21-0 halftime lead. The Lions then scored touchdowns on their first three possessions of the second half to wrap up the contest.

Lindenwood's defense finished the game with four sacks and 12 tackles for loss. It held Langston to just three yards per rush and only 235 yards through the first three quarters. Wright finished the game with seven tackles, including one sack and two tackles for loss. He also blocked a field goal attempt and an extra point attempt. Alexander led the team with eight tackles and had two pass breakups to go along with his interception. T. J. Prell had three tackles for loss.

Offensively, Philip Staback finished with 210 yards passing and had three touchdowns and no interceptions. Fleming caught five passes for 114 yards and had 48 yards on kickoff returns. Thomas had 49 yards rushing, 11 receiving, and 62 on punt returns. Eight different Lions had at least 10 rushing yards in the game, and nine had at least 10 yards receiving.

2009 NAIA SECOND ROUND LINDENWOOD 64, OTTAWA 26 NOV. 28 • ST. CHARLES, MO.

The No. 3 Lindenwood football team had its best quarter in school history in the third when it outscored No. 5 Ottawa by a 37-0 margin. Those 15 minutes helped the Lions advance to the NAIA Football Championship Semifinals with a 64-26 victory over the Braves.

The Lions used a pair of first quarter touchdown runs by Denodus O'Bryant to jump out to a 13-0 lead. Ottawa responded with a touchdown and field goal to open up the second quarter, before a late Lindenwood drive netted seven more points when Philip Staback hit Matt Angell with a 19-yard touchdown strike. The Lions then prevented the Braves from scoring on a two-minute drive and Lindenwood led 20-10 at halftime.

The tone of the third quarter was set on the first play when the special teams forced a fumble on the kickoff and Lindenwood took over on the Ottawa five-yard line. It took just one play for LeMarian Parson to score on a run from there. The defense forced a quick punt on Ottawa's next possession, and the Braves had a bad snap on the punt. That forced the punter to field the ball with his knee on the ground, giving Lindenwood the ball back at the Ottawa 25. It took the Lions just three plays to score from there, with the scoring play being a four-yard run by Matt Angell.

The next four times Ottawa touched the ball, the Lindenwood defense forced more turnovers. A fumble forced by Parks Peterson led to a Staback touchdown pass to Rudy Fleming. An interception was returned for a 40-yard touchdown by Damian James. Two other interceptions led to another touchdown, this one from Staback to Matt Bramow, and a field goal by Halley Ferrell. When the dust settled in the quarter, Lindenwood was in complete command by a 57-10 score.

O'Bryant rushed for 101 yards on just 11 carries and had two rushing scores. The Lions offense finished with 393 total yards, including 155 on the ground and 238 passing.

The No. 3 Lions scored a touchdown with 55 seconds remaining for a 42-35 win over the No. 2 Fighting Saints.

In the second quarter, the offenses of both teams dominated and the Lions went into halftime with a 28-21 advantage.

O'Bryant scored again early in the third quarter on a 10-yard touchdown reception from Staback. Carroll answered though with two straight touchdowns, the final one coming six seconds into the fourth quarter, which tied the game at 35.

The defenses took over for much of the fourth quarter. After a Lindenwood turnover deep in Carroll territory, the Lions' defense forced a turnover on downs. Both teams punted twice after that, with the final punt giving the Lions the ball at their 12-yard line.

On the first play, Staback completed a 49-yard pass to Marcel

Thompson to put the ball into Carroll territory. On the next play, O'Bryant rushed for 29 yards to take the ball to the 10-yard line. After two rushes for no gain, Staback found Bramow in the corner of the endzone for a 10-yard touchdown reception with 49 seconds remaining.

Carroll completed one first down on its final drive, but Lindenwood forced another turnover on downs to seal the victory and a trip to Rome, Ga., for the program's first ever appearance in the NAIA Football National Championship game.

Lindenwood finished with 570 yards of offense, 188 on the ground and 382 through the air.

Staback completed 26-of-36 passes for 382 yards and three touchdowns. O'Bryant rushed for 157 yards and two scores and had 43 yards receiving and another score. Bramow had seven catches, two for touchdowns, and 79 receiving yards.

2010 NAIA FIRST ROUND LINDENWOOD 38, SAINT FRANCIS 46 NOV. 20 • ST. CHARLES, MO.

The No. 5 Lindenwood football team saw its 2010 season come to an end at Hunter Stadium when No. 10 Saint Francis upset the Lions by a 46-38 score. The game had five ties and was not settled until Saint Francis' Austin Coleman hauled in a 15-yard pass from Shaine Tierney with 22 seconds remaining in the game.

The two offenses were the story of the game as the defenses combined to force just two punts. The big difference was two Lindenwood turnovers that Saint Francis turned into 14 points.

Lindenwood had 476 yards of total offense, compared to 438 for Saint Francis. The Lions averaged 9.2 yards per play, and the Cougars had 5.1 yards per play. Lindenwood couldn't get the Cougars off the field though as Saint Francis completed 11 third-down plays and was four-offour on fourth down. The inability to get the ball out of the Cougars' hands led to Saint Francis holding the ball for over 40 minutes.

Staback finished his Lindenwood career by throwing for 354 yards and four touchdowns. Helmick caught five passes for 108 yards, and Holland had four receptions for 87 yards. O'Bryant had 65 yards rushing and 68 receiving.

Defensively for the Lions, Damian James and Chris Howard each had nine tackles. James had 0.5 tackles for loss and one pass breakup, and Howard had two tackles for loss. Cody Fogle, Nick Tepea, and Dan Carlisle all forced fumbles, but Saint Francis recovered every one. Tepea also had six tackles, two tackles for loss, and the game's only sack.



2009 NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

LINDENWOOD 22, SIOUX FALL 25 DEC. 19 · ROME, GA.



The Lindenwood football team fell just three points short of its first ever national championship as No. 1 Sioux Falls beat the No. 3 Lions, 25-22, to win their second consecutive NAIA National Championship.

Lindenwood's defense played its best game of the season, giving up just one offensive touchdown and holding the Cougars, who came into the game averaging 53.6 points, to their lowest point total of the season. The Lions offense, though, was also held below its season numbers by the number one defense in the NAIA.

The big difference in the game was special teams, as a Lindenwood miscue led to a Sioux Falls safety and two big kickoff returns helped the Cougars score their only touchdowns of the game.

Lindenwood won the field position battle in the first quarter but could not take advantage because of numerous small mistakes on the offense side. A dropped pass stalled the team's first drive and led to a punt after a good kickoff return had given the Lions the ball around midfield. Later in the quarter, Lindenwood misplayed the kickoff and was trapped inside the 10 yard line, and on the first play, a bad snap caused Lindenwood to take a safety. The defense was strong early inside Lindenwood territory, allowing just two field goals and having an interception on Sioux Falls' first three drives which gave the Cougars an 8-0 advantage.

Lindenwood's offense finally got things going in its first drive of the second quarter. Richard Murrell kept the drive going with a seven-yard rush on fourth and one, and the drive ended when Matt Bramow made an acrobatic catch in the endzone for a 19-yard touchdown reception. After a three-and-out by Sioux Falls, the Lions quickly took the lead on a three-play 55-yard drive that ended on another Philip Staback touchdown pass to Bramow. Lindenwood's defense made one more first-half stand, recovering a fumble on the Sioux Falls five with under a minute remaining in the half, and the Lions went into halftime ahead 14-8.

The two big special team returns by Sioux Falls occurred in the third quarter, starting with the opening kickoff which the Cougars returned 91 yards to go ahead 15-14. Lindenwood took momentum back when Denodus O'Bryant broke off a 45-yard touchdown run, and Staback rushed for the two-point conversion to make it 22-15. Another big kickoff return by the Cougars put the ball deep into Lindenwood territory, and it took Sioux Falls just three plays to tie the game with a two-yard touchdown run.

Both teams appeared poised to score on their next possession, but neither came away with points. O'Bryant broke off another long touchdown run, but had it called back with a holding call, and the Lions eventually punted. Sioux Falls drove down inside the red zone, but Dan Carlisle intercepted a pass in the endzone to end that drive and the game went into the fourth tied at 22.

After Carlisle intercepted Lorenzo Brown, the Lion offense went three-and-out and was forced to kick the football back to the Cougars. On the ensuing drive the Cougars converted on a key third-down play, but the drive would stall at the Lindenwood 24-yard line. Braden Wieking kicked his third field goal of the game, this one a 41-yarder to give the Cougars the lead.

Lindenwood would get the football back on its own 24-yard line. After an eight-yard carry by O'Bryant, Staback would rush for a first down. The Lions were stopped on the next three plays and punted the ball away with 7:21 remaining. The Cougars looked ready to run the rest of the clock out, going 13 plays and picking up five first downs, including one on fourth down and one on third. With 1:18 to play, Lindenwood forced a fumble and Carlisle recovered to give Lindenwood one final chance.

The Lions went for it all on the first play with a deep pass to Marcel

Thompson, but the throw just overshot the receiver who had a step on his defender. After a three-yard run by O'Bryant, the Lions had a sack and incomplete pass to seal the Cougars' championship.

Lindenwood finished with 233 total yards of offense, compared to 376 for Sioux Falls. The Lions won the turnover margin by three and held Sioux Falls to under 200 yards in the air and on the ground.

Brandon Gould led the defense with eight tackles and an interception. Parks Peterson also had eight tackles, including two for losses 1.5 sacks, and one pass breakup. Carlisle had two turnovers in the contest.





ABOUT LINDENWOOD ATHLETICS

The Lindenwood University Athletics Department has grown significantly over the past two decades, going from just a few sports to one of the largest athletics departments in the nation. From 1999-2011, Lindenwood had one of the top all-around athletics departments in the NAIA. In 2010, the University announced that it was applying for NCAA Division II membership, and its application was accepted later that summer. After two candidacy years, Lindenwood will be an NCAA Division II Provisional member during the 2012-13 school year.

Lindenwood will have 27 sports compete at the NCAA level. All 21 NAIA championship sports will make the transition to the NCAA. These include baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, women's volleyball, and men's wrestling. Six other sports will be added as NCAA sports. These are field hockey, gymnastics, women's ice hockey, men's and women's lacrosse, and men's volleyball. Twenty-four of these sports will compete at the NCAA Division II level. Gymnastics, women's ice hockey, and men's volleyball will compete at the National Collegiate level, which is made up mostly of NCAA Division I programs.

In 2012-13, Lindenwood joins the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA), one of the top conferences in NCAA Division II. Other schools in the 15-team league are: University of Central Missouri, University of Central Oklahoma, Emporia State University (Kan.), Fort Hays State University (Kan.), Lincoln University (Mo.), Missouri Southern State University, Missouri Western State University, University of Nebraska-Kearney, Northeastern State University (Okla.), Northwest Missouri State University, Pittsburg State University (Kan.), Southwest Baptist University (Mo.), Truman State University (Mo.), and Washburn University (Kan.).

The MIAA sponsors conference championships in 19 sports. On the men's side, championships are awarded in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, soccer, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and wrestling. Women's championships are in the sports of basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

Men's lacrosse is a member of the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), men's volleyball is a member of the Midwestern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association (MIVA), women's gymnastics is a member of the Midwest Independent Conference (MIC), women's hockey is a member of College Hockey America (CHA), women's lacrosse is a member of the Western Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (WILA), and women's swimming and diving is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC). Men's swimming and diving and field hockey are both independent.



Athletics Philosophy



ATHLETICS DIRECTOR - JOHN CREER



John Creer is entering his 21st year at Lindenwood and his 11th year as the Athletics Director. Before becoming the athletic director at Lindenwood, Creer served as the Dean of Students from 1991 until 1999.

Creer is currently leading Lindenwood's move to the NCAA Division II level. He has helped the program enter the candidacy stage in the NCAA process. Creer oversees 27 sports that are seeking membership in the NCAA.

Prior to Lindenwood's move to the NCAA, Creer oversaw an athletic department that included 21 NAIA sports programs and 25 other varsity programs that competed in other national organizations. While he was athletics director, those programs captured 40 national championships and 134 conference championships. In the NAIA, the athletics department finished in the top five in the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup in every season but one since he became Athletics Director. In 2001-02 and 2002-03, Lindenwood won the Directors' Cup for being the top overall athletics department in the NAIA.

During Creer's tenure, the Athletics Department has grown in the number athletic programs and in the quality of facilities. Creer has been part of the construction of the Lou Brock Sports Complex and the Lindenwood Track, the purchase of Lindenwood Ice Arena, and the major renovations of Harlen C. Hunter Stadium.

Before moving into the administrative side of athletics, Creer was one of the most successful track and field coaches in the country. Creer began his head coaching career in 1970 at Winter Haven High School (Fla.), where he coached the cross country teams and assisted with the track and field teams. In 1973, Creer accepted a teaching position at Kathleen High School in Lakeland, Fla., and was head coach for the cross country and track and field teams.

In 1975, he moved onto the collegiate level when he became the head cross country coach and assistant head coach of the track and field team at Troy State University. After the 1977 season, Creer moved onto the Division I level at the University of Florida. At Florida he was the associate head coach of the track and field team from 1977-1978 and in 1978-79 became the interim head coach of the Gators.

Next up for Creer was the international level. In 1979, he was the assistant national coach for the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's Olympic track and field team. In 1983, he would become a head coach at Wayland Baptist University. After a five-year stint at Wayland, Creer was hired to be the head cross country and track and field coach at Missouri Baptist. In 1991, Creer would move to Lindenwood, but it wasn't until 1996 that he became the head coach of the cross country and track and field teams.

During Creer's coaching career he coached three national championship teams in women's track and field, seven men's track and field team championships, two world champions in track and field, three Olympic silver medalists, one Olympic bronze medalist, 15 Olympic games participants, 125 individual national champion, and 512 All-Americans.

Not only has Creer coached national championship teams and national champions, he has been awarded many individual accolades. He has been the NAIA National Coach of the Year eight times, the NCCAA National Coach of the Year, the West Texas Hall of Fame Coach of the year three times, and the NAIA region and conference coach of the year numerous times.

To go along with all of the coach-of-the-year awards Creer has been inducted into four Halls of Fame. He was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in 2001, the Missouri Baptist Hall of Fame in 2006, the Lindenwood University Hall of Fame in 2007, and in 2009 he was inducted into the Wayland Baptist Hall of Fame

Along with his numerous duties at Lindenwood, Creer is the chair of the Lindenwood Athletics Hall of Fame committee and is on the Board of Directors for the St. Charles YMCA.

Creer received his bachelor's degree in English from Western Michigan University in 1970 and earned his master's degree from Troy State in educational administration and supervision in 1976.

Creer and his wife Liz have three daughters (Kimberly, Jennifer, Ashley), and three grandsons, and one granddaughter.

Hunter Stadium is one of the busiest places on campus throughout the year. It is the home for Lindenwood football, men's and women's soccer, field hockey, and both men's and women's lacrosse programs. The stadium was built in 1976 by the St. Louis football Cardinals as a place to hold their training camp. In 1988, the stadium was renovated and a new artificial turf was installed. Eleven years later in 1999, Hunter Stadium debuted a new turf called Astro Play. After the 2004 season, Hunter Stadium would undergo its biggest renovation. The stadium was be completely renovated, including end zone seating, a brand new two-story press box with luxury boxes, and a new concession area. In 2009, the playing surface at the facility was replaced with Enviroturf. The next renovation was more of an addition. An academic success center, plus coaches' offices, and new locker rooms, were added in 2012. The three-story building was added behind the south endzone. The facility has hosted NAIA football playoff games in 2004, 2008, 2009, and 2010, and the NAIA Women's Soccer National Championships in 2001 and 2002. In 2009 and 2010, the St. Louis Rams held training camp scrimmages at Hunter Stadium. Both games drew over 5,000 specators. During the NFL lockout in 2011, several St. Louis Rams players chose Lindenwood for offseason training. The stadium is named after Dr. Harlen C. Hunter, who founded the St. Louis Orthopedic Sports Medicine Clinic in Chesterfield in 1979, the first clinic of its kind in the St. Louis area.

Hunter was the key to the upgrades of the playing surface in 1988.

STUDENT-ATHLETE CENTER

The Lindenwood University Student-Athlete Center is a 43,450-square-foot athletic building with an academic support center, new locker rooms for football and other Hunter Stadium sports, coaches' offices, and a Hall of Fame Room. The building will opens in early September.

President James D. Evans said Lindenwood's Board of Directors approved the construction of the building, just outside of 6,000-seat Hunter Stadium over which was Kirchner Plaza behind the west end zone.

Evans and the Board of Directors wanted the opening of the building to coincide with Lindenwood's entry into the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) in fall 2012. The MIAA is widely considered the toughest NCAA Division II conference in the nation.

"We have been told our facilities are among the finest in Division II," said Evans. "This building will definitely be in keeping with that statement. It will help keep our institution competitive for years to come."

The ground floor of the building will house home and visitor locker rooms and athletic training facilities. The nearly 3,000-square-foot academic success center is on the second floor, along with locker rooms for men's and women's soccer, men's and women's lacrosse, and field hockey. The third floor overlooks the bleachers and the scoreboard, and consists of coaches' offices, a Hall of Fame Room, and meeting rooms.

LINDENWOOD ATHLETICS HISTORY

Athletics has been an important part of Lindenwood University throughout its 185-year history, from the school's beginnings as an all-girls school to the last 40 years as a coed institution. Over the last decade, Lindenwood athletics have reached their greatest heights as the Intercollegiate Athletics Department has been one of the most successful programs in the country at any level.

Early Years

There were not many Lindenwood publications in the 1800s, but the few that have been found refer to athletics at the school. An 1898 edition of the school newspaper, *Under The Lindens*, leads with a story about the importance of physical training at the school:

"Few ladies' schools, and especially in the West, can boast of better facilities for gymnastic training. Each student is required to take regular training in the gymnasium under the direction of a competent teacher, the value of which training need not be dwelt up."

In 1905, a permanent athletics association was organized for the first time at Lindenwood to oversee sports at the school. The first programs included tennis, bowling, fencing, basket-ball, and walking clubs, with the big event being the senior-junior basket-ball contest in which a prize of \$10 went to the winning team. It is believed that in the mid-1940s Lindenwood women's teams began playing intercollegiate athletics, with the major sports being field hockey and basketball. Equestrian also became one of the biggest athletic competitions around the Lindenwood campus during this time period.

Modern Athletics Department

The beginning of the current Lindenwood Athletics Department can be traced to the early 1970s, when the school began to open its doors to male students. Sports such as baseball, basketball, and soccer were added to the varsity roster and the school began its association with the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

The first major impact that the Lindenwood athletic department had on a national scale would not come until the 1980s when the women's soccer team became a yearly threat for the national title. The Lady Lions would never win a national championship, but they reached the national tournament 13 times and had two runner-up finishes and three third-place showings. Lindenwood women's soccer was a part of one of the greatest collegiate championship games of all-time when it and Simon Fraser played scoreless soccer for over 162 minutes before Simon Fraser scored in the fifth overtime.

1990s

The 1990s marked the beginning of a major expansion of the Lindenwood Athletics Department. By the turn of the century, the school would field a team for all 21 sports in which the NAIA offered a national championship. The biggest addition was a varsity football team in 1990. The program won its inaugural game by a 21-14 score over Dana College and went on to have a winning record its first year, foreshadowing what would become one of Lindenwood's top programs.

The highlight of the decade came in 1998 when the indoor track and field team won the NAIA National Championship, the first ever title for the Lindenwood athletics program. The Lions led by just two points heading into the final event of the competition, but the school's 4x400 relay team finished second to seal the championship. Current Athletics Director John Creer was the head coach of that program, and Sharif Karie was named the meet's outstanding performer.


Aside from the men's track and field national championship, it was the women who provided the top highlights for Lindenwood throughout the 1990s. The women's basketball team advanced to three national tournaments and won five conference championships and five conference tournaments during the decade. As mentioned earlier, women's soccer was a threat nearly every year to have a high finish at the national tournament. Softball became a regular winner late in the decade, going to three national tournaments from 1998-2000.

Heart of America Athletic Conference (HAAC)

Lindenwood briefly belonged to the American Midwest Conference for three years in the 1990s before joining the Heart of America Athletic Conference (HAAC) in 1996. The school's affiliation with the HAAC, an 11-team league with schools in Missouri, Kansas, and Iowa, would be its longest with a conference in its history.

Almost from the very beginning, Lindenwood raised the reputation of the HAAC on the national level. The athletics program wasted little time in becoming the most prominent member of the conference, finishing second in the conference's all-sports trophy standings in 1996-97 and then winning the HAAC all-sports award every year since.

Lindenwood won nearly 46 percent of the total conference championships during its time in the HAAC. Its 128 HAAC titles are 93 more than the next closest school has won in that span. In fact, in just 15 years, Lindenwood won more HAAC titles than any other school in conference history,



despite the fact that many of the HAAC schools have been in the league since it was started in 1971. Runner-up to Lindenwood is William Jewell, which has won 108 titles in 40 years. No other HAAC school has won more than 87 conference titles.

On a national scale, Lindenwood has won 10 NAIA National Championships since joining the HAAC, including five in sports that are sponsored by the conference. The other 10 HAAC programs have combined to win three national championships during the league's history.

2000

The last 10 years of Lindenwood athletics have been marked by two main themes – continued expansion and success. The two themes merged in 2008 for the biggest accomplishment of the program's history when two athletes with Lindenwood ties competed in the Olympic Games.

NAIA Success

The last decade has seen Lindenwood's NAIA programs make the leap from being good to being elite.

Lindenwood won 10 NAIA national championships, with nine of them coming since the 2002-03 school year. Half of these have come from the Lions wrestling team, which has won five titles starting with the 2002 national championship. Besides its 1998 title, men's track and field has also won two other indoor national championships and one outdoor title. The final national championship came from the 2004 men's soccer team.

In the annual NACDA Directors' Cup standings, Lindenwood has finished seventh or better for 13 straight years, and only once in that span has the school finished outside the top five. It has four runner-up finishes, and twice Lindenwood has won the Directors' Cup. In 2001-02, Lindenwood won the Directors' Cup for the first time. That year, the school had seven top-ten national finishes as it edged the second-place school by 23.5 points. In 2002-03, Lindenwood repeated in another close contest that saw the school win by 28.5 points. That year, the school again had seven athletic programs with top-ten finishes at their national events.

Lindenwood has also had several exciting runs at national championship events throughout the years. The Lions football team began building a powerhouse with the hiring of Patrick Ross in 2004. The program reached its greatest heights in December 2009 when it played in the NAIA national championship game, losing by just three points to future NCAA Division II school Sioux Falls. Men's basketball reached the NAIA Division II semifinals in 2006 and advanced to the second round of the NAIA Division I National Tournament in 2011. On the women's side, volleyball head coach Ron Young has taken his team to three NAIA national championship events in the last four years, including a quarterfinal showing in 2007. Women's track and field has been coming closer to a national title in recent years, including a third-place finish at the 2009 outdoor championships.

NCAA


In 2009, Lindenwood University President Dr. James D. Evans formed a committee to explore what level would be the best fit for the Lindenwood Athletics Department. The committee recommended that NCAA Division II was a better fit than the NAIA, and on Feb. 12, 2010, the Lindenwood Board of Directors voted unanimously to allow the administration to apply for NCAA Division II membership. On July 12, 2010, Lindenwood was accepted into its first year of NCAA Division II candidacy, and the next summer it advanced to the second year of the candidacy phase. In the summer of 2012, Lindenwood was accepted into the provisional year for NCAA Division II. As part of the transition, Lindenwood announced on Sept. 24, 2010, that it was joining the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association for the majority of its sports programs.

2008 Beijing Olympics

During the opening ceremonies of the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics, two Lions were among the athletes who marched into the stadium. Lindenwood University was even mentioned by Bob Costas on the national telecast that was seen by over 34 million people, making the school just one of two United States colleges mentioned during the parade of athletes.

The athlete that Costas talked about was Donald Thomas, who has one of the most unique stories in track and field history. Thomas was a junior varsity basketball player at Lindenwood who tried the high jump one evening in order to win a dare. Less than two months after winning that dare, he finished second at the national championships in the indoor high jump and helped Lindenwood win a team national title. After graduating from Lindenwood in 2006, he used his final year of eligibility to become an NCAA Division I national champion at Auburn University. He then burst onto the national scene by winning the 2007 World Championships. At the Olympics, Thomas, who was representing the country of the Bahamas, finished 21st after clearing 2.20m.

A Lindenwood athlete at the time, Sean McLelland was also a participant at that year's Olympics, representing the United States in the International Skeet Shooting competition. McLelland had his best international performance at the event, tying for sixth after hitting 118-of-125 targets. That showing advanced him to a shoot-off to determine who would advance to finals, and he fell short in that round. Despite being one target short of making the finals, he still finished ahead of 13 shooters above him in the world rankings, including five in the top ten.

NAIA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

2004 MEN'S SOCCER



The 2004 Lindenwood men's soccer program didn't start its postseason run off with much success. The Lions didn't win the HAAC championship or the regional tournament. But after the Lions received an at-large bid to the NAIA National Tournament, they turned everything around and ended the season on top of the NAIA soccer podium. The Lions lost in the Region V final against McKendree 2-1. That was the last time the Lions would lose in 2004.

The Lions traveled to Olathe, Kan., for the NAIA National Tournament, and it was a good stay. In the first round the Lions, the No. 3 shut out No. 14 Judson (Ill.) 3-0. In the quarterfinals the Lions matched up against Holy Names from California and were victorious 4-1. Next up in the semifinals for the Lions was No. 10 Berry (Ga.), and it was a 1-0 shutout victory.

After that win, it was on to the finals against Auburn Montgomery. It was a rainy, cold night in Olathe, and the Lions scored the game's first and only goal in the 61st minute. Milivoje Cecaric scored on a header from a corner kick and it was all the Lions needed. The Lions won the program's first national championship in four tries at the NAIA National

Ignacio Novas was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player, and goalie Edin Sabic was the Outstanding Defensive Player. Martin Barreiro joined Novas and Sabic on the all-tournament team, and Novas. Barreiro, and Andres Sanchez were honorable mention All-Americans.

Lindenwood finished the 2004 season with a 19-3-1 overall record.

1998 MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

The 1998 indoor track and field team won the first national championship in Lindenwood history. In a close meet, the Lions clinched the title when the 4x400 relay team came in second in the final event. Lindenwood finished with 62 points, six more than runner-up Azusa Pacific. Sharif Karie was named the meet outstanding performer after winning the mile run and finishing second in the 800m. Gezachw Yossef also won an individual title by winning the 1,000m race. The 1998 national champion indoor track and field team was coached by John Creer and was inducted into the Lindenwood Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

2003 MEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

The Lindenwood Lions men's outdoor track and field team won its first NAIA national championship in 2003 in Olathe, Kan. The Lions scored 65 points, which was four more than runner-up Dickinson State. Head Coach John Creer had two national champions on the squad. Fabian Florant was the national champion in the triple jump, and the 4x100 meter relay team won the national championship. The relay team was composed of Kevin Arthurton, Irvin Browne, Deno Campbell, and Kurt Gibbons.

2005 MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

The 2005 indoor track and field team won the program's second national championship when it scored 100.25 points, which was well ahead of Virginia Intermont's point total of 82. Kendrick Triggs was named the meet's outstanding performer after winning the national championship in the 55m run, the 200m dash, and as a member of the 1600m relay. Other national champions were Juan Walker in the 55m high hurdles and Haddow Weatherbone in the 400m dash. To go along with the athletes receiving awards, head coach Lane Lohr was named the 2005 coach of the year.

2006 MEN'S INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD

In 2006, the Lindenwood Lions men's indoor track and field team won its second straight national championship. The Lions beat out Virginia Intermont for the second straight year, 94.5-81. The men clinched the title with strong performances in the triple jump and shot put. After the 4x400 relay, the last track event, Lindenwood was down to Virginia Intermont by 12.5 points. The triple jump and shot put were not yet completed, and Lindenwood was able to use these events to its advantage to take the title.

Junior James Jenkins was able to successfully defend his indoor triple jump title from 2004. Freshman Carlos Mattis was in eighth place coming into the finals but was able to improve to third place on his last jump. Senior Kelley Jackson was leading the shot put after the preliminary round and was able to increase his lead in the finals to take the victory. Lindenwood's sprinters were strong as usual.

Junior Mike Rodgers won the 60m dash with a meet record time of 6.72 and won the 200 with a time of 21.07. Senior Haddow Weatherborne was able to overcome cramps that caused him to collapse in the 400m run and place second in the 200-meter dash. Freshman Rascive grant placed third in the 60m dash and fifth in the 200m dash. Freshman Aron Rono successfully completed a tough distance double, winning the mile in 4:11.37 and placing second in the 3,000m run with a time of 8:24.33.




2002 WRESTLING

The 2001-02 Lindenwood Wrestling Team won the program's first national championship and helped build the foundation for what would become the top wrestling program in the NAIA. Eleven of the team's 12-member national squad earned All-American honors at the national meet and the Lions scored 180 points, winning the meet over the host school, Montana State-Northern, by 13 points.

Three wrestlers earned individual national championships. Dustin Teeman, Brian Holt and Dustin Zahursky. Brant Bruner, Chad Smith, Eric Brown, and Wayne James finished third, while C.J. Campbell, and Roger Miller had fifth-place showings. Jeff Carlson and Nathan James both finished eighth, and Josh Buchanan rounded out the squad. The whole national championship team was later inducted into the Lindenwood Athletic Hall of Fame.

2005 WRESTLING



The Lindenwood Lion wrestling program won a national championship in 2002 and as runner-up in 2003. After a brief two-year hiatus from the top two spots, the Lions were right back on top in 2005. The Lions started off the season the number one ranked team in the country and would end the season in the same spot. After a successful regular season, the Lions moved onto the Tyson Event Center in Sioux City, Iowa, for the NAIA National Championship. The Lions would score 178.5 points, 50 more than the second place team, Missouri Valley.


Three wrestlers earned individual national championships, and the Lions had a total of five All-Americans. Andrew Bradbury won his second consecutive national championship in the 125 lb. weight class. Roger Miller won the heavyweight national championship, and Mike Rio took home the 149 lb. title. Head Coach Joe Parisi was named the NAIA Coach of the Year for the second time.

2007 WRESTLING

The Lindenwood Lions wrestling program had national championships in 2002 and 2005, but in 2007 the Lions started another run of titles. The 2007 squad scored 177 points, which was 67 points more than the second place team, Embry Riddle. Not only did the Lions win the national championship, they crushed the field of the NAIA.

The Lions had seven All-Americans and two individual national champions. Jake Dieffenbach won his second consecutive national championship at 165 lbs., and John Salter won at 1744 lb. Head coach Joe Parisi also won his third NAIA Coach of the Year.

2008 WRESTLING



After winning their third national championship in six years, the Lindenwood Lion Wrestling Team was looking for its fourth overall and second consecutive in 2008. The Lions finished second in the regional championships, but that was the last time they would finish second. At the NAIA National Championship, the Lions would win their second championship in a row after scoring 130 points, 21.5 in front of McKendree.

The Lions had four wrestlers in the finals, and that produced three individual national champions. Raymond Stephens won the 133 lb. crown, Ryan Moyer was the champ at 149 lb., and Matt Cauley was the top wrestler in the 174 lb. weight class. To go along with the national champs, five wrestlers were All-Americans.

2009 WRESTLING



Already one of the most successful wrestling programs in the country, the 2009 Lindenwood Lions team added to its growing dynasty on the mat. The Lions would win their fifth national championship and third in succession. With the national championship, Lindenwood has won the third most national titles in the NAIA.

The Lions scored 167 points, 41.5 points ahead of Southern Oregon. Three Lions won individual national titles, starting with Matt Cauley at 177 lb., who was also named wrestler of the year, Raymond Stephens in the 133 lb. weight class, and Jeremy Powell at 157 lb.

With the three national titles, the Lions had the fourth most individual titles in the history of the NAIA. To go along with the national titles, the Lions placed eight grapplers on the All-American team.

PRESIDENT - DR. JAMES D. EVANS



James D. Evans, an accomplished scholar, teacher, author, academic administrator, and a successful behavioral consultant, has been the president of Lindenwood University since the summer of 2006.

President Evans joined Lindenwood's faculty in 1974 as an assistant professor of psychology, and he advanced to the rank of professor of psychology in 1985. He was named dean of social sciences in 1994, dean of sciences in 1995, and dean of faculty in 1996. He was elevated to the post of provost in 2000.

Since becoming president, Evans has articulated a mission-based vision for Lindenwood – focus on students, strong academic programs, cutting edge technology, increased emphasis on student development, and open and clear communication with the university's constituencies.

Under Evans' leadership, the administration has recruited some of the nation's top university teachers for Lindenwood's growing faculty. He played an integral role in establishing the University's first doctoral program, a doctor of education degree, and he is shepherding Lindenwood's pursuit of additional doctoral degrees. Under his leadership, specialized accreditations in the Social Work Department and the School of Business and Entrepreneurship have been obtained.

Evans is a catalyst for continuing physical plant improvements at Lindenwood. Under his leadership, the University has constructed additional residence halls, a new student center, and a major renovation and expansion of Harmon Hall. Three new extension campuses in Wildwood, O'fallon, Mo., and Downtown St. Louis, have been added during Evans' presidency. Evans is focusing on improving the campus landscaping and beautifying all of the Lindenwood University educational sites. Additionally, he has ensured that the school will be on the cutting edge of educational technology through wireless Internet connectivity at all of its major sites and campuses.

Evans received his PhD in research psychology from Iowa State University in 1974; his MS in psychology from Iowa State University in 1969; and his BS in psychology from Geneva College in 1968. He is the author of two books and has been named to Who's Who in the Midwest and Who's Who Among America's Teachers. He is on the board of directors of the St. Charles Optimists Club, Partners for Progress, the RCGA, the United Way of Greater St. Louis, and the Economic Development Center of St. Charles.

He and his wife, Lois, a retired educator, live in St. Charles, Mo. They have a daughter, Laura L. Luebbert, who resides in Ferguson, Mo.

Student organizations are an important part of university life, providing opportunities for students to design and implement programs, events and activities that extend


and amplify the goals of Lindenwood's mission. Students may complement their academic experiences by becoming involved with approximately 71 student clubs and organizations,

LINDENWOOD EXPANSION

Lindenwood University is in the middle of a bold campus expansion plan that blends the old with the new and provides facilities that will carry Lindenwood well into the future.

The expansion already has yielded the grand new 138,000-square-foot J. Scheidegger Center for the Arts, eight new 180-bed residence halls for Lindenwood students, and a new main entry gate near the southeast corner of the campus at the intersection of First Capitol Drive and Kingshighway.

Currently, the university is in the final months of construction of a \$9 million student-athlete center adjacent to Hunter Stadium. The signature element of the three-story, 43,000-square-foot building is an Academic Success Center to support athletes' academic endeavors. The building will house locker rooms for Hunter Stadium's NCAA sports, athletic training facilities, coaches offices, and a new Champions' Room.

Other growth includes the renovation and expansion of Harmon Hall, which now houses the university's School of Business and Entrepreneurship. Nine classrooms and several seminar halls, breakout rooms, the Dunseth Auditorium, and office space have been added. The existing interior has also been updated and remodeled and a new façade added to the entire building.

The Evans Commons opened in August 2011. The 119,000-square-foot structure includes a second dining hall, multipurpose courts, a suspended jogging track, a workout facility, recreation rooms and plenty of areas for student relaxation.

These projects are the result of dynamic growth on the campus going back to 1989. Currently, Lindenwood educates approximately 17,000 students a year in all programs.


UNIVERSITY RECOGNIZED FOR HELPING SHAPE ST. LOUIS' FUTURE



ST. LOU



St. Louis is located 20 miles east of St. Charles and is an independent city and the second-largest city in the state of Missouri. The city had a 2010 population of 319,294 and is the principal municipality of Greater St. Louis, population 2,845,298, the largest urban area in Missouri, the 4th-largest urban area in the Midwest, and 15th-largest in the United States.

St. Louis was found in 1763 by French explorers Pierre Laclède de Liguest and Auguste Chouteau. Rapids on the Mississippi River made St. Louis the northernmost navigable port for many large boats, and by the 1850s, St. Louis had become the largest US city west of Pittsburgh, and the second-largest port in the country, with a commercial tonnage exceeded only by New York City. With its French past and numerous Catholic immigrants in the 19th and 20th centuries, St. Louis is one of the largest centers of Roman Catholicism in the United States. Rapid immigration from Europe along with migration from the South pushed city's population to 856,796 in 1950. However, since 1950, the population of St. Louis has fallen to 319,294 as residents moved to surrounding suburbs.

St. Louis is situated near the confluence of the Missouri and the Mississippi Rivers, is the heart of Greater St. Louis, a metropolitan area of nearly 3 million people in Missouri and Illinois, the Illinois portion of which is commonly referred to as the Metro-East. It is home to some of the country's largest public and privately held corporations, including AT&T, Express Scripts, Enterprise Rent-A-Car, Graybar, Scottrade, Edward Jones, Emerson, Energizer, Anheuser-Busch, Inc., Boeing Defense, Space & Security, Purina, Monsanto Company, and MasterCard.


St. Louis is a rabid sports town. The city is home to three major sports proffesional teams.

The St. Louis Cardinals are the most successful national leauge baseball team with 11 Word Series Championships. The team also has numerous Hall of Famers. The NHL's St. Louis Blues also play in St. Louis. The St. Louis Rams moved to the city in 1995 and were crowned Super Bowl Champions in 1999 and made it to the final game in 2001.









The St. Louis Zoo in Forest Park in St. Louis, Missouri. It is recognized as a leading zoo in animal management, research, conservation, and education. Admission is free based on a public subsidy from a cultural tax district, the Metropolitan Zoological Park and Museum District (ZMD); fees are charged for some special attractions. A special feature is the Zooline Railroad, a small passenger train that encircles the zoo, stopping at the more popular attractions.

The city purchased its first exhibit, the Flight Cage, from the Smithsonian Institution following the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair. After the zoo was established, new exhibits, areas and buildings were added through the decades to improve care of the animals, the range of animals and habitats shown, as well as education and interpretation.





ST. CHAR

Since 1769, St. Charles, Missouri, a restored historic city on the Missouri River, has been welcoming visitors to its shores. Founded by French Canadian fur trader Louis Blanchette, the city was named Les Petites Cotes, ("The Little Hills"), which later evolved into Saint Charles. The town regularly welcomed guests from many nations and grew into an important trading center for countless pioneers. Because of its strategic location on the Missouri River and its entrance to the western territory known as the Louisiana Purchase, it was a critical destination for tens of thousands of travelers.

Today, over 65,000 people call St. Charles their home. The City of St. Charles is headquarters for Aspect, Our365, RX System, NewCo Enterprises, Patriot Machine, and Client Services and home to the regional offices of Coca Cola Enterprises, Sysco and American Freightways.

St. Charles is the oldest city on the Missouri River. St. Charles' sister city is Ludwigsburg, Germany.





Almost 200 years ago two brave men launched one of the most amazing adventures of all time. President Thomas Jefferson asked Meriwether Lewis and William Clark to find a route to the Pacific coast. You may know them as the famous Lewis & Clark.

In 1804, they left from Saint Charles to explore new lands from Saint Charles to the Pacific Ocean. During their journey, Lewis and Clark came face-to-face with many wild animals, discovered unknown plants and encountered many Indian cultures. The Lewis and Clark Museum is a great place to learn more about the path Lewis and Clark took. The trading post is filled with the unusual Indian artwork they found during their travels.

Main Street has long been the hub of commercial activity for St. Charles. The 13-block stretch of downtown St. Charles runs from Boone's Lick Road to Clark, and boasts a bevy of shops, restaurants and businesses.



The temporary, but first, site for the state capitol.

Missouri's first legislators met in the buildings of the First Missouri State Capitol State Historic Site to undertake the task of reorganizing Missouri's territorial government into a progressive state system. From June 4,1821, to Oct. 1,1826, heated debates of state's rights and slavery filled the rooms of the temporary Capitol.

The second floor of two adjoining Federal-style brick buildings was divided and used as Senate and House chambers, an office for the governor, and a small committee room. The first floor of the Peck brothers' building housed a general store and Ruluff Peck's family residence. Chauncy Shepard operated a carpenter shop on the first floor of the adjoining building.
