Welcome! Welcome Home!

Several years ago, I stated that Lindenwood has an essential spirit that surpasses particular individuals, groups, and times. It is likely that most of our *Connection* readers would agree with that view. We might well be the largest "small college" in the country, in the sense that we now compare to Notre Dame in size but still prize each student and focus our mission and ourselves on his or her unique development *and future*. Through the good times and the challenging times, in the 19th, 20th, and 21st centuries, during the women's college years, the multiple-colleges years, and the era of the large private university, Lindenwood has always been "about the student."



In the same vein, one of Lindenwood's self-study reports, prepared for the Higher Learning Commission, leads off with the following proclamation:

Lindenwood is a personal, student-centered university with a large family and a spirit that transcends all the generations of students and professors who have passed through her stony gate.

We are a large family indeed! We continue to grow demographically with the expansion of our student body, of course, but the growth is longitudinal as well. Our students become alumni, then parents, and many eventually enter the role of "Lindenwood Parent," when their children matriculate here.

The Lindenwood community wants to be every student's multi-generational higher education destination. For that reason, we do everything possible to engage each student during his or her Lindenwood years. The very successful "LU for Life" program that we conduct for our first-year students is that crucial first step in the process of extending the University family across generations. Part of that program involves having the parents spend a Parents Day here each fall. I recognize some of those parents because they took a class or two from me on this very campus – late in the last century. It is not unusual to discover that a few of the parents – sometimes alumni, sometimes not – are Lindenwood students presently, usually in one of our evening or graduate programs. Such discoveries are unmitigated serendipity to me because we want the University family to keep on growing and to stay engaged.

As already mentioned, we commence development of a lifelong relationship with our students in their freshman year. An early start is necessary but not sufficient, however. We realize that the bond with LU, even if strong at the time our students graduate, is not always self-sustaining. It has to be refreshed and nourished, just like any durable family tie. Accordingly, we have increased our initiatives designed to reach out to alumni who might not have – and might never have – college-age offspring. In addition to Homecoming, the alumni picnic, and other regular alumni events, the Lindenwood Alumni Relations Office now schedules "young alumni" gatherings that we hope will give even more *Connection* readers a tangible reason to reconnect with their *alma mater*.

We are also conducting more cross-country outings to reacquaint ourselves with some of our mature alumni who have not come back to Lindenwood in many years. Maybe we will see you on our next trip!

Receives Lindy Award

MLB Network personality Greg Amsinger ('01) was honored this spring as Communications Alum of the Year at the annual Lindy Awards. The presentation was March 27 at the J. Scheidegger Center.

"This is a once-in-a-lifetime honor," said Amsinger, who actually missed a show in order to come back to St. Charles. "I love my alma mater."

Amsinger has been with MLB Network since its launch January 1, 2009. He is a studio host for the network's signature Emmy Award-winning show MLB Tonight. In 2011, he was given his own show on Saturday afternoons called MLB Player Poll—it replaced the long running This Week in Baseball.

Amsinger is also one of the hosts for the Fox Saturday Baseball Pregrame Show. His responsibilities at MLB Network include hosting on location at the All-Star Game and the World Series. This year marks the sixth straight year Amsinger has hosted the MLB Draft.

Before landing at MLB Network, Amsinger worked for CBS Sports covering primarily college sports. He was the first primary host for CSTV (College Sports Television), when the network launched in 2003. The network was later purchased by CBS. Amsinger got his local television start in Terre Haute, Ind., as a weekend news anchor and weekday reporter. After three months, he became the sports director and he anchored the 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. newscasts.

He worked numerous part-time radio jobs after graduating from Lindenwood, including a two-year stint as producer of Cardinals baseball on KMOX. Other side jobs included play-by-play broadcaster at KSLQ, and he was the inaugural voice of the now-defunct River City Renegades indoor professional football team.

"Lindenwood rolled the dice on an average student and gave me a shot," said Amsinger, who is from St. Charles. "I'll be forever grateful."

Amsinger and his wife, Erica, live in Bridgewater, NJ., and recently celebrated their 12th anniversary. They have two children—Vanessa and London.

Preserving, Polishing Miss Aimee B's Alum Honors Past, Forges Future of Iconic Tea Room

Artists don't often have much in common with restaurateurs, but Zack Smithey doesn't usually take a common approach to anything.

Smithey ('06, '09) is an accomplished artist who has sold his work all over the St. Louis area. He visualizes. And he dreams. And one of his dreams about a decade ago was to own a restaurant.

Earlier this year, he and his wife, Brie, purchased an iconic St. Charles eatery and tea room, Miss Aimee B's, on First Capitol Drive. It's where Smithey's art and his dreams have come together in a very real way to preserve and enhance a century-old restaurant/tea room that is on the National Registry of Historic Places.

"We want to respect the past and the heritage of the building," said Smithey. "But we also intend to make it more inviting to a larger audience."

Smithey isn't just giving lip service to the past. He became close friends with the previous owners, Judy Howell and Sherry Pfaender, who have spent hours with the Smitheys sharing stories, history, expectations, and dreams.

"We've had more positive feedback from customers than negative," said Smithey, who has removed Miss Aimee B's faux Victorian wallpaper and painted the walls. "But there will be more changes."

Smithey said he won't be as much of a rebel as Miss Aimee B's founder, Aimee Becker, a Lindenwood alumna (1908) who dared to wear her hair down instead of in the standard bun. But Smithey does plan to make changes upstairs by adding local handmade arts and crafts for sale. He also wants to install wifi upstairs and sell coffee, smoothies, beer, and wine to attract a younger crowd.

"Upstairs will almost be like a separate entity," said Smithey, who hopes to attract Lindenwood students. "We'll probably try to open earlier for the coffee crowd and stay open later for the lounge group. We may even have some of the local breweries come in occasionally do some tastings."

But the core business, he said, will stay the same.

"In fact, we'll probably be doing more special-event dinners and maybe some 'first Fridays' with different types of activities," he said.

Smithey graduated from St. Charles

High, then got his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree ('06) and a master's in education ('09). He taught in the Francis Howell School District for seven years before resigning to focus on art full-time.

He and Brie were married in 2010, and the hard-working dreaming couple began building a life together.

"We got the inside scoop that the previous owners were ready to retire from Lexie, Brie's younger sister," Smithey said. "She's been working in the kitchen for the last couple of years."

Smithey immediately tapped into his dream from a decade earlier.

"I look at Miss Aimee B's as a grand sculpture I can mold to make everybody happy," he said. "I tend to just jump into things. Brie is the analytical one. She has been able to crunch the numbers, the demographics, and the business model and make everything work."

"We look at two things from two different points of view," said Smithey, "and we complement one another. It works well."

And it will work well for Miss Aimee B's.

Becker Left Mark At Lindenwood

Aimee Becker's historic home has always had an air of classical dignity. It was a warm, elegant, and inviting place.

Becker, who was born in 1890, lived almost her entire life at 837 First Capitol Drive, a home in which she wanted to honor the past but not lose sight of the present. She loved entertaining, cooking, and Lindenwood.

When Becker was no longer able to live on her own, she donated the building to the St. Charles Historical Society, an organization she dearly loved. After Becker passed away in 1984, the society rented the home for a few years, and then made the difficult decision to sell. The owners created Miss Aimee B's to honor Becker. Today, a new set of owners, with strong Lindenwood ties, plan to take the establishment into the future.

Even today, the restaurant remains warm, elegant, and inviting.

Lindenwood's archives contain a treasure trove of history on the generous Becker, including an audio recording outlining Lindenwood's history during her life.

Not long before Becker died, she donated \$50,000 to Lindenwood to establish the Aimee Becker scholarship.

Becker lived her final years at Parkside
Meadows Nursing Home, still making sure
to attend Lindenwood functions almost
until the time of her passing.

Students, Benefactors Meet at Endowed Scholarship Dinner

The annual Endowed Scholarship Dinner took place Friday, Feb. 7, in the Spellmann Campus Center's Anheuser-Busch Leadership Room. The dinner is an opportunity for students to thank their scholarship donors and for donors to meet their scholarship recipients.

"This event gives donors and students a unique opportunity to meet," said Rachel Lamp, Institutional Advancement Special Projects Coordinator and organizer of this event. "Donors are truly invested in the success of Lindenwood students, and the opportunity to meet the students their donations directly affect is a special moment. It also gives our students a chance to meet and learn more about their donors."

Thanks to alumni and friends of Lindenwood University, hundreds of students are able to enjoy the Lindenwood experience. Through endowed scholarships, Lindenwood is able to offer money to students who might not otherwise have assistance with their tuition. Lindenwood hopes to reach 200 available endowed scholarships in the next few years; currently there are nearly 140 scholarships available. Scholarship criteria is determined by the donor. Scholarships are offered in areas from academics to athletics. All students must meet university admissions criteria and maintain an acceptable GPA while studying at Lindenwood.

Endowed scholarships are part of the bedrock that funds student scholarships. Through a generous donation, endowed scholarships are founded at \$25,000. Each year, the interest earned from the endowment is granted to a student who fits the criteria set forth by the donor. These scholarships are awarded annually, and since only the interest is awarded from these funds, the scholarship is available in perpetuity. Many donors fund endowed scholarships as naming opportunities for themselves or in memory of a colleague, professor, alum, or loved one.

Angela Fowle is Director of Foundry Art Centre

Lindenwood Alumna Angela Fowle ('05, '06, '08) was named executive director of the Foundry Art Centre in St. Charles in July after a series of other positions, including volunteer in 2004, shortly after the facility opened. The



three-time graduate maintains close ties with Lindenwood, including recent work with a graduate business class to develop marketing for the centre.

Fowle, who has a BA and an MA from Lindenwood in art history, heard about the facility in its early days and decided to volunteer there; she was later offered a part-time job in which she worked before moving to Miami in 2007.

"At the invitation of Laura Helling ('06) (then director of the centre), I came back in 2010 as education manager," Fowle said.

Helling, who graduated from Lindenwood in 2006, became director in 2009. When the exhibitions manager position became available in 2011, Fowle applied for it and was hired to that post, in which she served until her promotion to director last summer, after Helling moved on.

The centre, so named because it is located in a former railroad car foundry building, seeks to connect people in the community to the arts through exhibitions, studio artists, music and theatre performances, and educational programs. Artists may lease studio space at the centre; Fowle said their work has to be juried in order to do so, but lease rates are low. The centre's galleries have temperature and humidity controls at Smithsonian-caliber levels, which has allowed for world-class exhibits to come through.

Fowle also curates exhibits at facilities outside the foundry, including venues like Lambert Field and Des Peres Hospital, the latter of which was put on jointly by Art St. Louis and the Foundry.

This is an exciting time at the Foundry, Fowle said. The St. Charles City Council recently approved funding to maintain the building, which the city owns, freeing up money for the facility's core functions, and this year, the Foundry is celebrating its 10-year anniversary. A slate of exciting events and exhibitions is planned. One

highlight is a photography exhibit, which starts May 2 and will run until Aug. 1. The exhibit, part of Syracuse University's collection, contains 30 pieces from some of the early giants of photography, "the ones who brought photography to the forefront as an art form," Fowle said.

Also planned is a chili cook-off and a bus trip to Oak Park, Ill., led by Fowle, to tour several homes built by famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright. Visit the Foundry's website at foundryartcentre.org for more details on anniversary-year programming.

Fowle said it was, in part, her experience at Lindenwood through two prior degrees that caused her to come back for a third, an MFA in writing, which she completed in 2008

"I had such a positive experience...I

didn't want to leave," Fowle said. "It was all a student could hope for."

Today, Fowle continues to maintain her connection to the University. Currently, and for the second consecutive term, she is working with a graduate marketing class in the MBA program to formulate marketing plans for the Foundry.

"David Rosenwasser was my initial point of contact, and the class is taught by Cheryl Snell," she said. "I am so impressed with these students. They did surveys on our brand and logo, as well as our classes and their specific attendance. I took four of our board members to see their presentation. Very impressive.

"I'm very pleased to have a continuing relationship with Lindenwood. It is such a joy and a pleasure."

The digital entertainment field has experienced explosive growth in recent years--trained multimedia artists are in higher demand than ever before. Lindenwood University alumnus Wes Murrell is among the crop of local young professionals making waves in the fiercely

competitive industry.

Murrell ('09) has worked since 2012 as a production assistant at Coolfire Studios in St. Louis, Mo. The self-described perpetual idea powerhouse specializes in television content production, and has recently added services geared toward digital and webbased entertainment.

In his role at Coolfire, Murrell flexes his creative muscles through concept development, character design, digital animation, cartoon illustrations, and other artistry. He described his work as having two primary areas of focus.

"On the reality television show side, I create show logos and other graphics like title bars that go at the top or bottom of the screen," he said. "On the digital side, I create character ideas for animated show concepts. So, for example, if there was an

idea for a show about a family living in Paris, I create preliminary ideas on who the family is, how the characters look, and what the set might look like."

He makes St. Louis his home now, but Murrell is originally from Florida. He and his family moved to St. Louis when he was 16. Murrell and his twin brother initially attended college together in Tennessee. When his brother transferred to Lindenwood after just one semester, Murrell soon followed, transferring to LU after his freshman year.

While earning a degree in communications with an emphasis in multimedia design from Lindenwood, Murrell served as an illustrator for The Legacy student newspaper. He designed a comic strip that was featured regularly in the publication and also created editorial cartoons to accompany stories.

"I always wanted to come up with new ideas and create things," he said. "I don't ever remember wanting to do anything else. I can be indecisive in other areas, so it's been nice to have always had that clear direction on what I want to do."

After graduation in 2009, Murrell worked briefly as a security officer and then as a

custodian before landing a graphic design job in 2011. His boss happened to be the brother of the Coolfire Studios president.

"My first design job was great, but I'd always wanted to work at Coolfire," said Murrell. "I had the full support of my boss and, after working for him for a couple years and pitching show ideas, he recommended me for a position there."

Murrell may have landed his dream job, but that hasn't stopped him from pursuing other lofty goals. He earned a master's degree in English education from Lindenwood and also currently produces his own online digital animation series at www.ThePrinceofBanes.com. He hopes to see it turned into a television series, and eventually into a feature film or film series.

Wherever his creative ambitions take him, Murrell is confident he will keep creating and evolving as an artist.

"Doing what I'm doing here in St. Louis makes it possible for me to grow and try things I might not have the freedom to do elsewhere," he said. "I feel very fortunate, and I definitely plan to make the most of every opportunity I have."



Reflects University Heritage, Individuality

In the spring of 2011, alumna Marilyn Geery ('83) approached President James D. Evans with an interesting concept for a Lindenwood tartan. Traditionally, tartans have defined a particular group of people, particularly in Scotland, specifically where a person is from, based on the color and design. Tartans can be designed by any individual or group who wishes to create an identifying pattern.

"I noted that several colleges and universities donned their own tartans," said Geery, "and with Lindenwood's strong history and heritage, I believed Lindenwood deserved her own as well."

Although the date of the origins of tartan is not known, the clan system in Scotland started around the 12th century. A tartan's complex design of interwoven patterns and the interplay of colors reflect the intricate nature of Celtic art. Different colors and varying patterns begin to develop as the

weavers in each area of the clan developed their individual patterns, and colors used depended on the dyes available in the area. So, particular styles of tartan began to be associated with an area or clan.

Evans' wife, Lois ('77, '85, and '97), and Judy Shanahan, Executive Assistant to the President, were put to the task of creating the Lindenwood tartan. Evans and Shanahan went to Thistle & Clover on Main Street in St. Charles to determine the colors and to create the unique Lindenwood pattern. Jerry Dyer, owner of Thistle & Clover, has a computer program in the store to create imaging of tartan patterns based on the specifications of the creator.

"It took Lois and Judy five to six sessions to create the pattern, which is typical," said Dyer, "but the pattern is unique to Lindenwood University and is comprised of Lindenwood colors, both school colors and colors from the historical Sibley Crest."

The tartan colors are black and gold, to play off the official school colors, and

red, green, and blue are intermixed in the pattern, reflecting the Sibley Crest, to represent the Lindenwood heritage. After the colors and pattern were chosen and designed, the final selection was then sent to the Scottish National Registry. The colors, pattern, and thread counts were submitted to make sure it didn't duplicate another tartan that was already officially registered.

No two patterns are exactly the same, and the Scottish National Registry makes sure exclusivity is maintained with each tartan thread count; also, once registered, the official tartan of a group cannot be reproduced without permission. Geery made a gift to the University by purchasing the official registration of the Lindenwood tartan and presenting it to President Evans last fall. The Lindenwood tartans were woven in Scotland, and the tartans can only be purchased through the Lindenwood Spirit Shoppe.

Crossing Paths Again St. Clair's Influence Remembered By Officer

Many years ago, Missouri Highway Patrol sergeant Terry St. Clair spoke about safety at Block Yeshiva High School, a tiny Orthodox Jewish school in St. Louis. That day was really no different than any other for St. Clair. He did his job, then he went home

Daur Nodari went home that day, too. The Block Yeshiva student walked in and told his mother about St. Clair's presentation and declared that he knew his life's calling. He wanted to be a police officer.

"I saw that cool looking uniform and wanted to be like him," said Nodari. "He definitely influenced me."

Today, Nodari is a detective for the University City, Mo., Police Department and a Lindenwood alumnus ('09). St. Clair retired from police work in 2002, and is now the program manager for Lindenwood University's LCIE Criminal Justice Program. As fate would have it, the two crossed paths again years later.

"I was his faculty advisor here at Lindenwood," said St. Clair. "I'm grateful I had the chance to influence him and help him."

St. Clair said the most rewarding part of his job at Lindenwood is the chance to work with people and help them plan their future.

"I may not be carrying a gun, but I am still dealing with people and being flexible and helping them each and every day," he said. "There are a lot of similarities."

St. Clair spent 30 years in police work, first as an officer in Springfield, Mo., before moving to the highway patrol, where he served in a variety of capacities—patrol officer, field supervisor, public information officer, and even hostage negotiator. But at the age of 51, he retired and moved into higher education.

"The young officers don't think too much about the danger of the job," St. Clair said. "As you get older you realize how dangerous it can be."

St. Clair said his public information appearances – like the one at Block Yeshiva High School – prepared him well for the classroom. He taught for a few semesters at the community college level,

and one day the phone rang.

"It was Lindenwood," said St. Clair. "I wasn't looking for a full-time job, but it didn't take long and I was working there."

St. Clair became program director for criminal justice in 2004. He loves the classroom, and he particularly loves advising.

"It's not just about helping them select the right courses," said St. Clair. "That's fundamental. I try my best to learn about people, find out about their families, what they like. I try to build relationships."

St. Clair's typical day opens with a handful of emails and voicemail messages from students who need help on a wide range of matters—from selecting a course to figuring out financial aid. He's in the customer service business.

"We are really trying to satisfy what the

students need, helping them stay enrolled and reaching their dream of having a college degree," said St. Clair. "It's what makes Lindenwood stand out--our personal attention."

St. Clair said that, contrary to popular belief, the criminal justice program isn't filled exclusively with future or current police officers.

"There are a wide variety of career opportunities that go along with the degree," St. Clair said. "We have people with the Division of Aging, youth services, probation and parole, and analysts. There are people in it for self-improvement, too, and we have a large share of police officers and future officers."

And, like Daur Nodari, they're all being influenced by Terry St. Clair.

Hunn's Rebellion A Piece of Lindenwood Lore

The 1960s were a time of great transition around the world, and Lindenwood University was not immune to the sweeping changes the decade ushered in. Alumna Patricia Mayfield Hunn ('64) participated in this season of change by helping redefine an important part of Lindenwood's campus culture—the dress code.

Hunn grew up in St. Charles, Mo., just a few blocks away from the University. Her mother, Marie Mayfield, was a secretary for the dean of students and had also worked for the St. Charles Board of Education.

"At the time, it was an accomplishment for my mother to have gone to secretarial school and to work in education, but she wanted more for me," Hunn said. "There was always an understanding that I would go to Lindenwood. There was never any question about it."

When Hunn enrolled as a freshman in 1960, Lindenwood was an all-female school. The fashion of the day for undergraduate women included sweater sets, gloves, neck scarves, long skirts, and dresses. The school's dress code prohibited women from wearing slacks.

One frigid and icy January day, Hunn was feeling apprehensive about walking to class while wearing a skirt. She reasoned it would be logical to wear slacks instead, as the temperature outside had dipped to seven degrees.

"I still wanted to look nice, so I got out my best slacks. They were lined wool trousers," she said. "I paired them with nylons and little black flats and I walked to school. I wasn't trying to be rebellious, I was just being practical!"

Upon her arrival, Hunn was immediately called into the office of long-time faculty member Homer Clevenger, PhD, and reprimanded for her dress code violation.

"Dr. Clevenger said, 'Miss Mayfield, you know what the dress code is. Women are not to wear slacks,'" she recalled. "He was trying to be diplomatic, but I kept trying to tell him how cold it was. He repeated himself three times before excusing me

from his office."

Hunn went home that day feeling wary of bending the rules once more. But, the next day proved to be as cold as the one before it and Hunn decided to choose comfort over conformity once again.

"The other girls at school thought it made perfect sense, and so they started wearing slacks, too," she said. "Looking back, I guess I broke the barrier, but at the time I never thought any more about it or the consequences of breaking the dress code."

After that winter, dress styles continued to change on campus. Slacks became more acceptable for everyday wear, skirt styles became shorter and slimmer, and some of the clothing now associated with the 1960s counterculture began to appear.

While the dress code didn't formally change until a little later, Hunn had made her mark. She kept her focus on her education and graduated with a degree in elementary education from Lindenwood, in 1964. She taught for nine years in St. Charles before becoming a full-time homemaker in 1973.

She and her husband, Glenn, whom she married in 1968, raised two daughters at their home in Chesterfield, Mo. Hunn was actively involved in her children's school activities and later became a regular volunteer for several service organizations.

Since her husband's retirement in 2005, the couple spends every winter at their second home in Bonita Springs, Fla. Hunn enjoys quilting and spending time on her other interests and hobbies, which don't include breaking additional fashion barriers.

"I don't have any plans like that. I guess I've calmed down," she laughed.

There are only a few dozen shooting ranges in the United States that boast a five-star rating from the official trade association for America's firearms industry, the National Shooting Sports Foundation. An LU alumnus, Paul Bastean ('07), is involved with one of the select facilities that have received the honor. He owns Ultimate Defense Firing Range and Training Center in Saint Peters, Mo.

"I didn't set out to create just another business," Bastean said during the 2010 grand opening of Ultimate Defense. "I also wanted it to be a training facility that welcomes new and experienced shooters to advance their skills, and an environment where people interested in preserving our Second Amendment rights could gather and share ideas."

Since the facility's opening, Bastean's immensely popular range has added eight additional instructors and introduced a catalog of 24 training courses that cover all aspects of unarmed and armed self-defense. It has also become an educational and training center dedicated to expanding the knowledge of shooting sports and hunting throughout the Midwest.

The creation of Ultimate Defense was a natural progression for the O'Fallon, Mo., native, who learned to hunt and shoot at an early age on his family's farm. After graduating from high school in 1989, Bastean worked for several years as a certified diamond sales expert for a national retail chain and became involved in competitive shotgun sports. He won several national titles in skeet, five-stand, and sporting clays divisions.

In 1998, Bastean entered the Eastern Missouri Law Enforcement Training Academy and graduated at the top of his class. He was swiftly recruited by the Lake Saint Louis Police Department and became the lead firearms instructor.

"My skill set has very practical purpose," Bastean said. "Firearm instruction is something that I enjoy, much like other people enjoy hobbies for relaxation and enjoyment, but I also help people learn to how to conduct themselves in legal and lawful acts of self-defense."

In 2000, Bastean was promoted to sergeant and named day shift operations commander. In 2003, after concealed carry legislation passed in Missouri, he launched Missouri Concealed Carry Training, LLC, for members of the general public to achieve higher levels of firearms proficiency while obtaining concealed carry permits.

The business was met with immediate success, but Bastean wanted to take things to the next level. He enrolled in the LCIE

adult education program at Lindenwood and earned an undergraduate degree in criminal justice from the University in

"I needed some additional background to make my business the best it could be," he said. "I gained writing and professional presentation skills that helped me fine-tune my business plan. The organization and planning skills it takes to balance family, school, and a full-time career came directly from Lindenwood."

Bastean combined his natural talent, experience, and education to successfully grow his company into the 18-lane firing range, training facility, and retail center that became Ultimate Defense in 2010. He's trained more than 17,000 people in proper firearm operation and concealed carry protocols, he mentors numerous individuals around the country on range planning and development, and he is frequently called upon by Missouri lawmakers to advise on firearms legislation.

But despite the impressive success of Ultimate Defense and his ongoing involvement in relevant endeavors, Bastean remains dedicated to his career in law enforcement.

"Being a police officer is not just something I do, it's who I am," said Bastean. "I'm not quite ready to hang the badge up just yet."

School of Sport, Recreation, and Exercise Science to Launch in Fall

Lindenwood University is launching a new School of Sport, Recreation, and Exercise Sciences in the fall of 2014. The new school, which will incorporate departments previously housed in the schools of education and American studies, will be led by Dr. Cynthia Schroeder, who was hired to the post in January.

The new school will include all undergraduate degree programs in athletic training, physical education and health, recreation administration, and exercise science, the latter of which includes a popular minor in nutrition and a graduate program in human performance.

Schroeder said the creation of the school was prompted by strong growth in all areas of health and fitness sciences, exercise science, and recreation administration. She added that she's already received approval to add an adapted sports recreation minor to the program lineup and emphasized that her focus moving forward will be on increasing growth in all areas of the school.

"I believe this new position as Dean will be an exciting and challenging position due to the potential growth opportunities in each of our areas of exercise science, recreation, athletic training and physical education, and health," Schroeder said. "Through our facilities, resources, and talented faculty and staff, we will be able to offer a state-of-the-art experience, both in the classroom as well as practically, for our

existing and future students."

Schroeder was hired full-time at Lindenwood in 2010 as an associate professor in the Department of Health and Fitness Sciences and has served as department chair and coordinator of the human performance graduate program. She holds a doctoral degree from the University of Kansas and has numerous publications, presentations, and professional experiences to her credit.

"Cynthia will be creating the foundations of an exciting new academic school with the help of some of the most experienced, knowledgeable, and dedicated faculty in the areas of sports, recreation, and exercise science," said Lindenwood President James D. Evans, PhD. "I have every confidence in her leadership and the talented faculty members who are joining forces with her to create what promises to be a fast-growing and vital new school at Lindenwood."

Belleville Study Abroad Program Kicks Off

The Lindenwood Belleville campus marked another first in campus history as six students and one professor journeyed halfway around the world to study international business in Malaysia in January.

Belleville campus business professor Dr. Mark Roselli was excited to introduce a study abroad program and lead the first group of students on the 20-day educational and cultural experience.

"As part of the international business course, our main focus was to explore business practices in Malaysia, but also to learn more about the culture and gain a greater understanding of the environment and eco-tourism there," said Roselli.

The group visited a variety of businesses, from a cave tour service run by a British expatriate to a bank, where they learned that Islamic laws prevent Malaysian finance institutions from charging interest on loans.

"At each restaurant we ate, hotel we stayed, or activity we participated in, we took the opportunity to talk with the business owner and learn more about their experiences creating and running a business in Malaysia," said Roselli.

The group also visited museums, Islamic mosques, and Hindu and Buddhist temples to discover how closely religion and culture influenced Malaysian business practices.

"We learned that you need to be able to interact culturally if you want to be successful in business," said Whitney Reichert ('14).

"Those who study abroad will make friends along the way, creating networking opportunities around the world," she said.

"The most memorable part was all of the people that we met," said Eugenia Benazar ('16). "I will never forget how nice and open they were to explain to us their culture, religion, and traditions."

Eco-tourism was another concept that the group explored by visiting an elephant sanctuary, trekking through the rainforest to the Chiling Waterfall, and going caving. After they interviewed the business owners, the group participated in the activities that the organizations provided.

"The highlight of the trip was when we went caving," said Benazar. "I had never experienced something like that before; it was an amazing activity."

"I was able to bathe a baby elephant and then go caving in water that was up to my neck while using a rope to climb along the walls," said Reichert. "Traveling is a

great way to push yourself to do things that otherwise you would have thought you could never do."

Upon returning home, the students and Roselli shared their experiences, photos, and souvenirs with the entire Belleville campus community by hosting a lunch on campus, complete with authentic Malaysian food.

Roselli said the next study abroad trip has already been set for January 2015. He and biology professor Dr. Fran Sandmeier plan to take 20 students to Costa Rica as part of the sports management class Adventure and Eco-Tourism and the natural science class Tropical Biology. Roselli hopes that other faculty will be inspired by the growing number of students signing up for study abroad courses at the Belleville campus, which may lead to more trips per year.

"Studying abroad expands students' perspective and understanding so that they can appreciate 'the other' or anything different, whether it is race, culture, or language," said Roselli. "What better way to live out the Lindenwood mission of being 'a citizen of a global community' than to experience a new country on a study abroad trip?"

New Men's Residence Hall to Change Belleville Campus Skyline

With the opening of a brand new women's residence hall in December 2013, the Lindenwood University Belleville campus is ready to grow again--a new men's dormitory in under construction.

In November 2013, the Lindenwood Board of Directors approved the construction of the men's residence hall, the second new student housing facility to be constructed in less than a year at the Belleville campus. The new \$4 million men's dormitory will have a capacity of approximately 200 students and will face the campus across from West Main Street.

Construction began in February 2014, and the facility is expected to be complete in time to house students near the end of this year's fall semester.

"We are thrilled with our Board of Directors' decision to approve the construction of a second residence hall, which will enable us to better accommodate our growing residential student population," said Dr. Jerry Bladdick, President of Lindenwood University-Belleville. "With the addition of our women's dormitory in December, our student housing capacity is currently around 800, and the new men's dorm will give us the ability to house 1,000 students on campus in fall 2014.

"The vote of confidence we continue to receive from our Board of Directors is truly appreciated, as is the support we receive from the Belleville, St. Clair County, and southwestern Illinois residents," said Bladdick.




"A lot of people there went to Lindenwood," Gamble said. "I visited the campus and thought it was gorgeous."



Online Bachelor's Programs Ranked Among Nation's Best by U.S. News

Lindenwood University's online bachelor's degree programs have been ranked among the best in the nation for 2014 by the prestigious *U.S. News and World Report*.

The recently published rankings placed Lindenwood's online bachelor's degree programs 124th among more than 280 schools evaluated. The publication's website states nearly 1,000 programs were surveyed and only regionally accredited schools that met the federal standard of 100 percent online course delivery were evaluated.

The rankings were based on a variety of measures, including student engagement, faculty credentials and training, peer reputation, and student services and technology. Lindenwood's online bachelor's degree programs include bachelor of arts degrees in business, criminal justice, and general studies.

Also listed were Lindenwood's online LINDENWOD

graduate education programs, which were ranked 166th, and its online

graduate business programs, which were ranked 169th.

Jann Weitzel, PhD, Vice President for Academic Affairs, spoke to the growing popularity of online degree programs and their importance in the overall realm of Lindenwood's academic apparatus.

"Offering online degrees encourages students who are unable to be present on campus the opportunity to enroll at Lindenwood and experience a top notch education, including, but not limited to, active military personnel, international students, working adults, and students from across the nation who are unable reside in St. Charles," she said. "Online courses are also available to resident athletes who

travel with teams, students who participate in arts productions that require high amounts of rehearsal time, and those who must work and cannot attend classes on campus on a regular basis."

Lindenwood President James D. Evans, PhD, said the listing is a fitting recognition of this relatively new and growing delivery format.

"We truly appreciate having the excellent quality of our online programs recognized by *U.S. News*, because that means that influential individuals who monitor and evaluate that delivery format were duly impressed by our online curriculum and delivery system," Evans said. "This citation is one more recognition of Lindenwood's successful commitment to continuous quality improvement."

Desir's Job Search Plays Out on National Stage

Pierre Desir's post-Lindenwood career has followed the same path as most Lindenwood University graduates. He built up an impressive resume while going to school, and then began the interview process with prospective employers.

The one big difference? Desir's job search was followed by countless people on his journey to become the first Lindenwood University Lion taken in the NFL draft. Desir was drafted by the Cleveland Browns in the fourth round of the NFL draft on May 10.

Desir's story has drawn national interest—he was one of five players featured in the ESPN series *Draft Academy*. The series followed Desir and four NCAA Division I football players for months to capture the behind-the-scenes moments as the players prepared for the NFL draft.

"Having a camera following me around was weird at first, but over time I got used to it," said Desir. "They filmed me at the Senior Bowl, the Cliff Harris Award Ceremony, the (NFL) combine, and my Pro

Day."

The senior cornerback started to gain national attention at a pair of all-star games in January. He first competed in the East-West Shrine Game, and played well enough to receive an invitation to the biggest college all-star game, the Senior Bowl.

The big question mark for Desir was whether he could continue his college success while going against Division I players. Desir said by the second day of practice at the East-West Shrine Game, he knew he could play at the highest level, and scouts soon agreed. Desir even made the highlight reel in the Senior Bowl with an interception in the endzone.

Desir had two big events in February. First, he received the inaugural Cliff Harris Award as the best defensive player at the NCAA Division II, NCAA Division III, and NAIA levels. He then became the first Lindenwood player to participate in the NFL Combine.

"The combine was a great experience because I was able to talk to coaches and GMs that I didn't get a chance to talk to earlier," said Desir. "It was also great to get exposure to the different teams and to see their prospective on you."

Desir had one more high-profile event when Lindenwood hosted its first Pro Day on March 19. Desir and two other former Lindenwood football players worked out for scouts in attendance.

Desir's story is unique because of his family-first attitude and the support he gets from "Team Desir," the group of family and friends that has supported him throughout this process. Desir also acknowledges the support he has gotten from Lindenwood.

"Everyone at Lindenwood from the staff, coaches, players, and students have shown me nothing but love," said Desir. "The coaches and the staff have been helpful with helping me get anything I need during this process. I couldn't have asked for better support from my Lindenwood family.

"In life, you always want to be the first at something, but I never imagined that I would have the opportunity to be the first Lindenwood player drafted. I am very humbled and blessed to have played for a team and to have attended a university that has helped me get into that position."

Fall Highlights Include Nationally Televised Football Game

The Lindenwood football team has one of the most exciting home schedules in program history in 2014, including visits from two of the last three NCAA Division II national champions. The home schedule opens on Thursday, Sept. 11, with a showdown against Pittsburg State. The Homecoming contest will be on Oct. 11 against Northwest Missouri. Other home dates include Missouri Western (Sept. 25), Missouri Southern (Oct. 25), and Central Oklahoma (Nov. 8). The Missouri Western game will be televised nationally on CBS Sports Television.

The Lions will have an experienced program taking the field this fall with 18 starters returning, including 10 on the offensive side of the ball. Eight of those returners earned all-conference honors last season, including Alex Robinson who was a second-team selection at the wide receiver position.

The men's soccer team reached the NCAA quarterfinals last season and was ranked No. 1 in the country at the end of the regular season. Lindenwood will look to return to the national tournament this fall, led by its defense that allowed just .73

Veteran Coaches Garner Honors

Two long-time members of the Lindenwood Athletics Department recently received honors in their respective areas.

Lindenwood men's soccer head coach Carl Hutter received news that he will be inducted into the St. Louis Soccer Hall of Fame this fall. Hutter recently completed his 20th season at Lindenwood. It was one of his most successful years as he led the Lions to an MIAA Championship and advanced to the NCAA Division II Tournament Quarterfinals. He has won 294 games at Lindenwood and won one NAIA National Championship. Hutter also coached in the St. Louis area at Harris-Stowe and was a player for the Hornets.

Lindenwood Athletics Director John Creer was inducted in April into the Drake Relays Hall of Fame. Creer was inducted into the coaches' wing of one of the most prestigious track and field meets at the collegiate level. Creer was the head track and field coach at Lindenwood from 1995-2003 and helped Lindenwood win two NAIA National Championships. Prior to coming to Lindenwood, he also coached at Wayland Baptist and Missouri Baptist. His Wayland Baptist squads won numerous relay titles at the Drake Relays, including an record six relay titles in 1988.

Women's Lacrosse Claims RMAC Title

The Lindenwood women's lacrosse team strengthened its schedule in 2014 but that has not changed its winning ways. The Lady Lions had another successful season that included their biggest wins in program history, a top-five national ranking, and a third straight conference title.

Lindenwood played six nationally-ranked teams throughout the regular season and held its own against the best programs in NCAA Division II. One of its biggest wins came in April with a 13-9 victory over Florida Southern, which was ranked fifth at the time. The team took control of that

match with five straight goals late in the first half, and then held on for the win. That victory vaulted the team up the national rankings and into the top-five for the first time.

Lindenwood's conference had a new name in 2014, but the results stayed the same. The Lady Lions captured their third straight NCAA Division II conference title with a perfect 5-0 record in Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference play. The team is now 23-0 all-time in NCAA conference matches.

Student Life Sports Bring Home the Hardware

It's been a banner spring for Lindenwood Student Life Sports, with four teams winning major national championships.

One of the biggest came from the synchronized swimming team March 22 in Oxford, Ohio. The Lady Lions won the first collegiate team title in program history, sweeping all four finals events at the U.S. Collegiate Championships. In doing so, Lindenwood became the first program other than Ohio State or Stanford to win the title since 1980. Just three weeks later, the Lady Lions won four gold medals at the U.S. National Championships in Oro Valley, Ariz. The victories came in the solo tech, solo free, duet tech, and duet free events.

Men's bowling captured the second Intercollegiate Team Championship (ITC) for the program April 18 in Reno, Nev. The Lions defeated Urbana 3-0 in the best-of-five baker final to hoist the Kerm Helmer Cup trophy. The finals match will be broadcast on the CBS Sports Network Tuesday, May 27 at 7 p.m. Not to be outdone, women's bowling won the Carlson Cup national title April 6 in Indianapolis, Ind. The Lady Lions also came within one match of advancing to the team final at the ITC, settling for third place, giving the bowling program its best combined finish in history at the event.

The beat continued for shotgun sports with the 11th straight national title at the ACUI Clay Target Championships March

30 in San Antonio, Texas. Lindenwood swept all six major team events, earning 21 individual medals and eight individual titles.

Roller hockey won its second straight national title and 10th overall at the 2014 National Collegiate Roller Hockey Association Division I Championship April 12 in Aston, Penn. The Lions outlasted Neumann University 2-1 in the finals to take the crown.

Belleville Basketball Makes History

The Lindenwood University-Belleville men's basketball team and Head Coach Scott Spinner made history last season when the NAIA announced the Lynx had received a bid to the NAIA National Championships in Kansas City, Mo.

After finishing the regular season 22-8, which included an 11-game winning streak, the Lynx headed to the NAIA National Championships for the first time in program history. During the streak the Lynx knocked off previous No. 1 and No. 3-ranked Freed–Hardeman by a combined three points. The national championship berth marked the first time that an athletic program at Lindenwood–Belleville took part in an NAIA national championship.

The Lynx fell to No. 2 Pikeville in the opening round, finishing the season with a 22-9 record. Craig Anderson led the Lynx this season averaging 21.5 points per game.

He also averaged 6.2 rebounds. Anderson scored in double figures in 29 games, including 12 games of at least 25 points. He was also named NAIA Third Team All-American, marking the first NAIA All-American in program history. Garrett Gaffner was second on the team in scoring, averaging 11.2 points per game, and led the team in rebounding, averaging 8.3 rebounds a contest.

The Lynx made history February 25 when the NAIA announced Lindenwood-Belleville had cracked the top 25, checking in with a No. 24 rank. This marked the first time an athletic program at Lindenwood-Belleville has been ranked in the NAIA. The Lynx will participate in the American Midwest Conference next season for the first time.
