GRANT FROM FORD FOUNDATION

The Ford Foundation has approved a grant of \$200,000 to Lindenwood and six other liberal arts colleges in Missouri to assist the colleges in recruiting and providing counseling and tutoring programs for disadvantaged students. The grant also will make possible the development of workshop programs for faculty members of the colleges, and the organization of a scholarship fund-raising program for needy students. Participating in the seven college consortium will be Fontbonne, Lindenwood, Maryville, Park, Tarkio, Webster, and Westminister Colleges. Lindenwood President, John Anthony Brown is the founding chairman of the consortium.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

The new fine arts building is currently progressing well ahead of schedule. and the college hopes to be able to begin utilizing the building sometime during the fall term. Labor difficulties in the building trades in the St. Louis area, however, may delay completion of the 28,000 sq. ft. addition to Lindenwood's teaching facilities. Spacious studio classrooms and large window walls facing North for even light are features of the structure. This building will make it possible to discontinue the holding of art classes in World War II guonset huts and a converted greenhouse.

FACULTY NEWS

A new procedure in recruiting faculty members was initiated this year by Dean Gary H. Quehl. In addition to the usual interviews, each candidate for appointment to the faculty was invited to meet alone with students who are majoring in the department concerned. Following the condidate's visit, students were asked to write a formal evaluation of the prospect and submit it to the Dean and the President for consideration. This new procedure has been enthusiastically received by the students, and has helped the college in recruiting faculty members who can significantly strengthen our academic program.

Dr. Patrick Delaney, Jr., who has been named Outstanding Teacher of the Year by the students at Holy Cross

College in Massachusetts for the past two years, will join the Lindenwood faculty in September as Chairman of the Biology Department, Dr. Delaney received his Ph.D. from Brown University, has a brilliant teaching record, and a reputation for involving undergraduate students in his research projects. Dr. Dominic Soda, who has taught at both Yale and Washington Universities, will come to Lindenwood as Director of the Center for the Undergraduate Study of Mathematics. He will be joined by Dr. Aaron Konstam, who is currently a research specialist with Monsanto in Dayton. Ohio. Dr. Konstam has served on the faculties of Wright State University, Brooklyn Polytechnic College, and the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology. He will become director of Lindenwood's new Computer Science Center. Mr. John Nichols, who is considered one of the best teachers of undergraduate mathematics students at Washington University, will also join us on the faculty of the Mathematics Center, Mrs. Jeanne Huesemann has been a member of the Lindenwood faculty since 1957 and will continue her outstanding teaching as the fourth member of the mathematics faculty. Professor S. Louise Beasley, who has been a member of the faculty at Lindenwood for the past twenty years, has elected early retirement. Miss

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Beasley served as chairman of the Mathematics Department for many years and her contributions to the growth of the department have been significant. Associate Professor of Mathematics Robert W. Murdock will be on leave of absence during the coming year to pursue individual research and study.

Dr. Lynnewood F. Martin has joined the faculty of the History Department. A specialist in medieval and early Renaissance history, Dr. Martin received his bachelors and masters degrees from Washington University and earned his Ph.D. degree at St. Louis University. He was formerly a member of the faculty of Quincy College in Illinois.

Mr. Craig Carlson, currently at Augsburg College, will join the faculty of the English and Communication Arts Departments, where he will teach creative writing. He is completing his doctorate degree at the University of Exeter.

Mr. Klaus Gradinger has been appointed assistant professor in the Modern Languages Department and will teach French and German. A native of Mainz, he is a graduate of the Saarbrucken University and has taught in Great Britain. France and the United States. Mr. Rudolph Hirschmann will also join the Modern Languages Department as assistant professor of German. A graduate of the University of Colorado and Valparaiso University, he is a doctoral candidate at the University of Rochester. He has also studied at the Universities of Gottingen, Berlin, and Bern in Europe. Mrs. Jane Mudd, who has been serving as an instructor of German for the past two years, will be on leave of absence during the coming year.

NEW FACULTY

Mr. Philip Enoch, a staff member at KSD-TV, will serve as an adjunct assistant professor of Communication Arts working in the areas of theater and film.

Mr. John Bartholomew, now teaching at Princeton Theological Seminary, will become Acting Chairman of the Department of Sociology in September, succeeding Dr. George Warheit, who has resigned to head an imposing research project at the University of Florida. Also joining the staff of the Sociology Department will be Carl Batt, a cultural anthropologist. Assistant Professor Batt has earned degrees from the University of the Americas in Mexico City and from Northwestern University. He is currently pursuing advanced studies in anthropology at Washington University. In addition to the full-time staff, Mr. Roosevelt Johnson has been named as a parttime instructor in urban sociology and education. He holds a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Southern Illinois University and is a doctoral candidate at St. Louis University where he also serves as a special assistant to the president.

VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP AIDS ANNUAL GIVING PROGRAM

Miss Thomas is a graduate of the University of Texas and received her master's degree in college administration and student personnel work from Indiana University. She has taught high school English and directed summer study programs in Mexico and Chile. She served as a counselor at Indiana University prior to accepting her present position in Dallas. The Dean will assume her duties on the campus this summer.

McCLUER, FINDLEY, TUCKER HONORED

President Emeritus Franc L. McCluer returned to the campus Friday evening, May 30 to address seniors and their parents at the annual baccalaureate services. The following day he presented The Honorable Paul Findley for the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters. Findley, Republican Representative in Congress from the 20th District of Illinois serves on the House Foreign Affairs Committee and is active in the International Movement for Atlantic Union. He is a Trustee of Illinois College and a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science. Representative Findley spoke at commencement on "The Quest for Personality," by individuals and nations. He cited the vast increase in military manpower and spending in the United States as a symptom of change in our personality as a nation. Also honored at the commencement exercises was former St. Louis Mayor Raymond R. Tucker, who is currently Professor of Urban Affairs at Washington University. He received the honorary Doctor of Laws degree. One-hundred forty-six students received degrees; the largest graduating class in the history of the college.

U.N. PRESIDENT TO OPEN LECTURE AND CONCERT SERIES

The President of the United Nations General Assembly will open the 1969-1970 lecture and concert program at The Lindenwood Colleges on Thursday evening, September 18. QUEHL AND BARNETT NAMED TO NEW POSTS

The establishment of the new

coordinate college, Lindenwood College II, has resulted in some major administrative changes to provide leadership for the new college so it can establish its own special emphases within the community of The Lindenwood Colleges. Dr. Gary H. Quehl, who has served as Dean of Lindenwood College for Women for the past two years, will become Vice-President and Dean of the new men's college. His special talents in research and planning will be most helpful in the development of distinctive approaches to higher education at Lindenwood II. Dr. Howard A. Barnett, Chairman of the English Department and Director of the Senior Synthesis course, has been named Vice-President and Dean of the Faculty of Lindenwood College for Women. Dr. Barnett came to Lindenwood in 1965 and holds the Alice Parker Chair of English. He received his Ph.D. from Indiana University and has taught on the faculties of Morris Harvey College and Wisconsin State University. Dr. John Anthony Brown has been elected president of both colleges.

SUMMER SESSION

More than 200 students have enrolled for Lindenwood's third annual coeducational Summer Session. Dr. James F. Hood, professor of history and Director of the Summer Session, reports that 45% of the students enrolled in summer session courses are regular Lindenwood students. 
SUMMER STOCK OPERA THEATER ORGANIZED

Starring sophomore music major Berte Baker, the cast will include students Vicki Dohrmann and Elisabeth Williams, and Assistant Professor Joseph Robbins. The opera will be under the musical direction of Mrs. Judith Sutton of St. Charles who will also accompany the singers. Curtain time has been set for 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday

evenings, July 9 and 10. Tickets for this summer's performances, at 25 cents each, will go on sale in late June.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE DEGREE PROGRAM ESTABLISHED

The Bachelor of Science degree will be offered by both of The Lindenwood Colleges in addition to the Bachelor of Arts degree in selected areas of concentration. The faculty has authorized the new degree program which will require three exploratory electives in each division instead of two. The departments of Political Science and Sociology also require a course in Social Science Statistics. The Bachelor of Science program will not require proficiency in a foreign language. Those areas of concentration offering the B. S. degree option are: Studio Art, Biology (including physical education and nursing), Chemistry, Communication Arts, Economics, History, Mathematics, Music, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology. Students interested in a divisional area of concentration in preparation for an elementary teaching credential may work toward the Bachelor of Science degree. Students interested in a secondary teaching credential should complete requirements for the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Areas of concentration in which students must meet the requirements for the Bachelor of Arts degree are Art History, Classical Civilization, English, Modern Languages and Religion.

MODIFIED HOURS PROGRAM ADOPTED

Following a trial period this spring and mutually advantageous discussion evaluation and planning among the students, faculty and administration, a modified policy on hours for women resident students has been adopted. The philosophy of student responsibility



with parental consent has been maintained.

The student leaders have agreed to enforce the policy through their House Judicial System. All residence halls will be closed at midnight Sunday through Thursday and at 2:00 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights. All freshman students must be in by closing time. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors who have written permission from their parents for extended hours may return to the campus after closing time and will be admitted to the residence halls by a campus security officer. The policy of providing residence hall keys to seniors which has been in effect the past two years has been discontinued. Students returning after hours will report to a central lounge adjacent to the student parking lot and a security officer will then accompany the student to her residence hall and admit her to the building. Locks on all of the residence halls will be changed this summer.
