### LU Belleville Proud of First Student Teachers

The School of Education is proud to announce the placement of the first three student teachers from Lindenwood University-Belleville this spring semester. The practicum teachers include undergraduates Julie Sydow and Michelle Hemmer-Schwoebel, along with Samantha Scher, a member of the MAT graduate program. All placed in District 118, and the three women are facing the "intensives" of teaching in the elementary classroom in the coming weeks. This constitutes their last 12 hours at LU before graduation on May 12, 2012.

Sydow is completing her practicum at Union Elementary in Mrs. Schwoebel's fourth grade classroom. "This has been a definite learning experience outside of the teacher education program," Sydow stated. "I am impressed by all of the hands-on experience grading papers, teaching lessons, maintaining classroom management, and supporting the students in any way possible to achieve a successful academic experience. My transition into intensives has begun this week during ISAT testing. Today, I taught science and social studies; later in the week I will pick up reading and language arts. There have been plenty of opportunities in extracurricular activities as well to further my career in education by coaching

the fifth grade girls' basketball team. We had a successful winning season of six wins and two losses. I would like to thank my education peers, professors, advisor, and student teacher coordinator, Professor Suess, for their support through my endeavors. I could not get through without them! The personable relationships that I have built through the Lindenwood University-Belleville education program are a life experience that I will never forget!"

Hemmer-Schwoebel is thrilled to be working with her cooperating teacher and her son's former instructor, Mrs. Schaefer, in third grade at Roosevelt Elementary. "Mrs. Schaefer, along with the rest of the staff at Roosevelt, has been very welcoming," Hemmer-Schwoebel stated. "She even provided me with my own desk. They all treat me like a peer. I chose my host teacher because she had my son two years ago. He was a child that hated school and cried because he had to go. By the end of his year with her, he was crying when he had to leave. Now my son loves school; for that reason,

### Local Donor Provides Funds for Replacement Sculpture

Garrett Reuter, Lindenwood donor and local attorney at Greensfelder, Hemker, & Gale, presented the university with a Brother Mel Meyer replacement sculpture for the one that was recently stolen from the university.

The sculpture unveiling took place on March 9 at LU-Belleville in the presence of media outlets. Reuter, Vice President Jerry Bladdick, Assistant Vice President Mary Radcliff, and LU staff and students were present.

"The Glass Tower," the Brother Mel sculpture previously on display outside the Welcome Center on campus, was stolen on Jan. 6 by two unidentified men. Although a reward of \$500 was offered for its safe return, no one has yet to come forward.

"Lindenwood University-Belleville has shown a strong commitment to the community, and it makes sense for others to reciprocate," said Reuter.

Former president of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce, Reuter describes himself as "embedded in the community" and is currently on a variety of boards for community organizations such as Memorial Hospital. He is also a member of the management committee at Greensfelder, Hemker, & Gale, a law firm that services the Metro East, St. Louis, and the Chicago area.

"The support that we have received from the entire Belleville community after the stolen sculpture has been remarkable," said Bladdick. "Our campus is grateful for the generosity of Mr. Reuter. He has given us

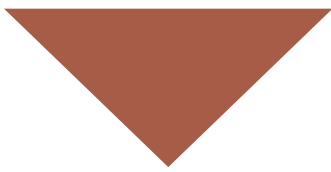
"It is good to put aside your goals and issues to help those who have bigger issues than us," said Lynx soccer player Corey Elsey.

### State Approves Offering of Biology Degree

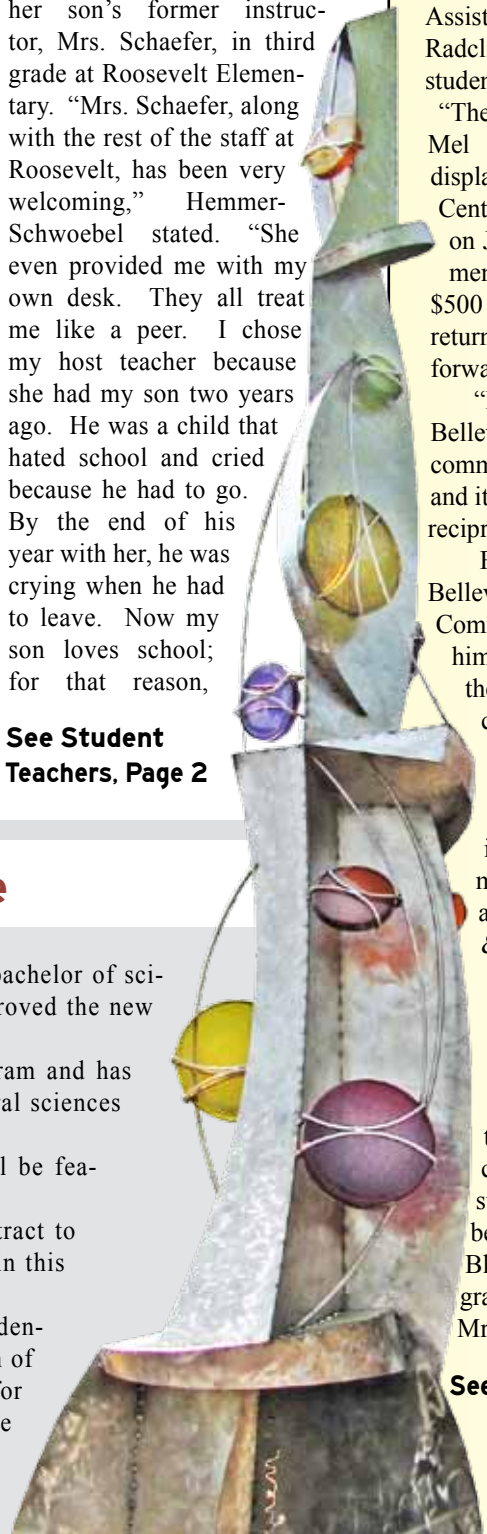
Students at Lindenwood University-Belleville can now earn a bachelor of science degree in biology; the Illinois Board of Higher Education approved the new degree on April 10.

"This new degree is an expansion of our natural science program and has proven popular with students considering advanced degrees in natural sciences and health," said Dr. Todd Mick, dean of academics.

Course requirements for the undergraduate biology degree will be featured in the 2012-13 academic catalog.

"I am excited to welcome the students this fine degree will attract to our campus," said Dr. Angela Wingo, dean of students. "I am certain this program will enhance and diversify our future student population."

In conjunction with the introduction of a biology degree to Lindenwood-Belleville, the campus is also gearing up to begin construction of a state-of-the-art chemistry lab scheduled to be completed in time for students' return in August. Mick says the campus will hire a full-time chemist for the 2012-13 academic year as well.





## Here We Grow Again; LU-Belleville Expands Degrees and Facilities

On the heels of record student enrollment this spring semester, Lindenwood University's Board of Directors recently approved \$2 million to go towards a new admissions center and communications center, complete with radio and television station, for the Belleville campus.

Along with this, the Illinois Board of Higher Education has approved five new undergraduate degree programs to be offered at LU-Belleville starting in fall 2012. They include bachelor of arts degrees in advertising and public relations; corporate communications; interactive media and web design; mass communications; physical education; and a bachelor of science degree in biology.

The new degrees are expected to bring in between 75 and 125 traditional day students in the fall, and Vice President Jerry Bladdick projects the total day student population to reach 800 during the 2012-2013 academic year.

"We've found that there is a great demand for these degree programs," said Bladdick. "Lindenwood University in St. Charles has a high academic reputation for its Communications Department with an impressive list of well-known alumni in the field. We want to duplicate that here in Belleville."

To accommodate the increase in degree programs, nine new full-time faculty members will be hired for the fall, adding to the 51 full- and part-time staff already employed on campus.



Estimated at \$500,000, the university's new admissions center will be located on the lower level of the recently renovated Senator Alan J. Dixon Student Center. With the capacity to hold 28 employees plus a conference room area, the new center will offer a one-stop shop for all new prospective undergraduate and graduate students interested in attending day or evening classes.

To complement the addition of three new degrees in the communications field, the university's \$1.2 million communications center will provide students with access to state-of-the-art radio and television studio equipment, as well as two high-tech classrooms. Scheduled to open in fall 2012, this facility will not only offer students an extracurricular activity in the field of media and broadcast, but it will also serve as a resume builder and opportunity for them to apply what they learn in the classroom.

Although initial radio and television broadcasts will be transmitted internally, Bladdick hopes to eventually make them accessible to the community at large.

In total, the university has spent approximately \$10 million in renovation and expansion of the Belleville campus.

I knew there was something I needed to learn from Mrs. Schaefer. She was good about throwing me right in the mix of things beginning day one. The experience offers a lot of practice in teaching, even though I do not start my intensives until after ISAT testing ends next week. I feel prepared for the task! I have already grown attached to the students at Roosevelt and am sad about having to leave them. I guess that is part of the job for every teacher.

"I am very grateful to Professor Sues and Dr. Yearian at LU because they truly walk education student teachers through each step of the process. I would recommend this program to anyone interested in pursuing a degree in elementary education. Furthermore, I am a non-traditional, returning student and a lifelong resident of Belleville who attended the old Belleville West, which is now the LU campus. I loved being back in the familiar buildings. Lindenwood is doing a great job restoring the campus. As a resident, I am so grateful for their investment in our community. I really loved the small class sizes, especially after previously attending a larger university where I felt like just a number and a face in the crowd. In addition, I appreciate that LU stands by their word of offering the classes that you need in order to achieve your degree. The teachers and advisors really do care that you succeed."

Scher's commitment to Franklin Elementary began years ago as a volunteer for the Belleville AmeriCorps, so she is right at home in Mrs. Odle's second grade classroom. "Becoming a teacher has been a long time dream for me," Scher stated. She earned her bachelor's degree in psychology from SIUE and assumed she would earn her master's in child psychology. "Little did I know that my experience through the Franklin Neighborhood Community Association, along with the faculty and students, would single-handedly change my career goals. It was at Franklin that I fell in love with teaching. Today, I wake up every morning motivated and ready to get to work; I can honestly say that I have never felt this way about another job. The faculty at Lindenwood, along with my cooperating teacher, have done an amazing job in preparing me for the challenges that lie ahead; I am confident that I will be successful in my career because of them. Standing in front of 27 8-year-olds while writing math problems on the white board honestly feels like home to me. I joked with my friends a few weeks ago that I am the most loved person in the world. Who else gets to have 27 valentines? Teaching is challenging and is not as easy as it looks, but watching my students conquer each challenge, no matter how small, is worth it all."

Scher stressed that she is overwhelmed with emotion knowing that she is at the end of the road, and in two short months, she will be a certified teacher. "The feeling is truly indescribable," she said.

Thirteen additional undergraduate elementary education students have applied for student teaching and graduation in the fall 2012. The Lindenwood University-Belleville Education Department could not be more proud.

## LU-Belleville Football Stadium Renovations



The Lindenwood University – Belleville Lynx football program will have a brand new stadium to call home during its inaugural season this fall. Monday, March 5, marked the groundbreaking for the new football stadium.

The original venue, a staple in the metro-east community, has been around since 1933. Formerly known as Township Stadium, the sports fixture is undergoing significant changes.

“We’re really excited to finally see the construction portion of the program begin,” said Scott Spinner, director of athletics. “A lot of planning has gone into this project, and it’s a big deal for the University and the community.” The new stadium will include complete renovations on the field, sideline bleachers, press box, and locker room. The state-of-the-art stadium will have a seating capacity of 4,129.



The \$2.3 million project will also feature a maroon and gray turf, a distinctive characteristic not seen in most stadiums. Spinner looks for the new turf to be a unique attraction for the community and future student-athletes.

“The field is going to generate a lot of publicity and serve our athletic program well,” said Spinner.

The renovated stadium is projected to be completed by July 15. Lynx Football will kick off its inaugural season this fall.



### Doster Named Women’s Lacrosse Head Coach

Lindenwood University–Belleville has named Austen Doster head women’s lacrosse coach.

After spending 2012 as assistant coach for the men’s squad, Doster will lead the Lady Lynx lacrosse team during its inaugural season in 2013. Doster helped start the women’s lacrosse program at Fontbonne, in addition to playing on a first-year team.

#### Ranked Top-10 in USCAA Coaches Poll

The Lindenwood University – Belleville baseball and softball teams are ranked for the fourth-consecutive week in the USCAA Coaches Poll. Baseball comes in a No. 10 this week, while softball was voted in at the No. 4 spot.

Baseball moves into the top-10 after spending the past two weeks in the No. 13 spot. Spalding holds strong at No. 1, while PSU-Greater Allegheny jumps to No. 2 after spending last week in the No. 6 spot. Rochester drops to No. 3, while Apprentice and Selma round out the top-five, respectively. The Lynx are coming off of a 0-3 weekend at NCAA Division II Oakland City, as they prepare to hit the road again. The team will travel to Paragould, Arkansas for back-to-back doubleheaders at Crowley’s Ridge.

Softball is ranked No. 4 this week, dropping from last week’s No. 3 spot. Carlow remains No. 1, with St. Mary of the Woods close behind in the No. 2 spot, while Spalding, LU – Belleville and PSU-Mont Alto round out the top-five, respectively. The Lady Lynx had an impressive outing at No. 2 St. Mary of the Woods, picking up a doubleheader sweep over the Pomeroy’s. Game two stretched to 18 innings, with Stephanie Holiday in the circle all 18 of those, before the Lady Lynx earned the 5-1 win.

### Lindenwood University – Belleville to join NAIA

Lindenwood University – Belleville has been accepted to join the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), following a three-year affiliation with the United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA). League officials made the announcement Sunday at the NAIA National Convention in Newport Beach, Calif. Lindenwood University - Belleville will compete as a full NAIA member effective August 1, 2012.

“We are honored to have been selected to join the prestigious colleges that are a part of the NAIA,” said Lindenwood – Belleville’s Vice President, Jerry Bladdick. “We are pleased to be able to carry on the Lindenwood tradition that started 40 years ago with the NAIA.”

With the addition of football next year, LU – Belleville’s roster grows to 23 sports in just three years of existence. This past fall, the Lynx brought home the first two national titles in program history, with men’s golf and men’s soccer winning the USCAA National Championship. Rapid growth and proven success led to the decision to take the Lynx’s competition to the next level.

“This is a great day in the history of Lindenwood University – Belleville athletics,” said Director of Athletics Scott Spinner. “We are committed to offering the best possible athletic experience to our students, and gaining membership to the NAIA signifies that commitment.”

Along with Lindenwood – Belleville, three other institutions were approved for membership in to the NAIA. Those institutions are Georgia Gwinnett College, Indiana University, Kokomo and St. Andrews University (N.C.). These four institutions were among the first set of institutions subjected to the NAIA’s new, more rigorous, annual membership process.

“We are pleased to accept these quality institutions as NAIA members,” said Ted Brown, chair of the NAIA Council of Presidents and president of Martin Methodist College (Tenn.). “This was the first year of a new process put in place to strengthen the review of membership applications, and it has worked well. We are taking a hard look at schools to make sure they are a good fit with the NAIA, so it’s more about a good fit than pure numbers.”

The NAIA Membership Committee reviewed each institution’s application and determined which institutions would move to the next stage of the process. Those institutions then participated in a campus visit by a membership evaluation team. The results of those campus visits were reported to the Membership Committee, which then decided whether to recommend institutions to the Council of Presidents for final approval.




