| According to the words of Mohammed, the Hajj pilgrimage is the fifth of the fundamental Moslem practices and institutions known as the Five Pillars of Islam. The Hajj is an obligation to be performed at least once by all male and female adults whose health and means permit it. It is interesting to note that prior to the age of the great European world explorations, the pilgrimage to Mecca was the single largest expression of human mobility. Nowadays about 2,000,000 persons perform the Hajj each year, and the pilgrimage serves as a unifying force in Islam by bringing together followers from diverse countries and language groups. |
| ShenandoahFrank Ticheli |
| The setting for Shenandoah was inspired by the freedom and beauty of the folk melody and by the natural images evoked by the words, especially the image of a river. Sometimes the accompaniment flows quietly under the melody; other times it breathes alongside it. The work's mood ranges from quiet reflection, through growing optimism, to profound exaltations. |
| The origins of the folksong date to the 19th century. It has been attributed variously to a coal miner in Pennsylvania, to a young protégé of Stephen Foster, and to a homemaker in Lexington, Kentucky. Many variants on the melody and text have been handed down through the years, the most popular telling the story of an early settler's love for a Native American woman. |
| Raging MachinesBrian Balmages |
| Raging Machines is an aggressive work with a mechanical element to it. It is a thrilling musical roller coaster that seeks to portray its title. The opening theme recurs throughout the work with various accompanying textures as it modulates through several tonal centers. Eventually, the music comes to rest in a short, lyrical section. As this section builds, harmonies become more complex and musical intensity continues to rise. The final section reintroduces several mechanical elements along with new material as aggression takes over one more time in a fury of sound. |

| This challenging circus march is a rollicking romp from start to finish, attempting to capture the excitement of a child's first trip to the circus: the thrill, the laughter, the joy. You'll hear lots of comical percussion, in-your-face brass and whirling woodwind runs, all competing for your |
