49-Year-Old Muny Player Recalls Days of Doyle, Mueller and Shea

Back in 1932, Babe Ruth hit .341 and had 41 homers. Stan Musial was 12 years old, John F. Kennedy was 14. And Virgil Siemer, a 5-foot-8 shortstop weighing 125 pounds, signed a Muny Baseball Association contract with the old Stroot and Carroll team.

In 1961, Babe Ruth had been dead 13 years, Stan Musial was nearing the end of his sparkling career in the National League, John F. Kennedy was inaugurated as President of the United States. And Virgil Siemer, 5-foot-8 and weighing only 140 pounds, still was playing in the Muny Leagues.

"It gets tougher every year," said the 49-year-old infielder of the Union Printers in the North-South Traveling League. "It's not as easy getting down to first. But like they say, if you hit it far enough you can walk to first."

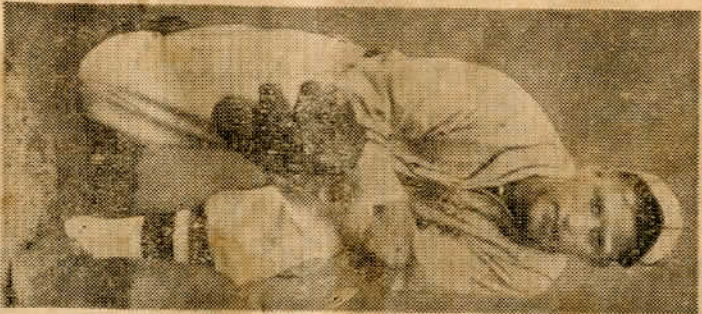
Five Years in Minors.

The man who is believed to be the oldest active Muny player also put in five years in the minor leagues.

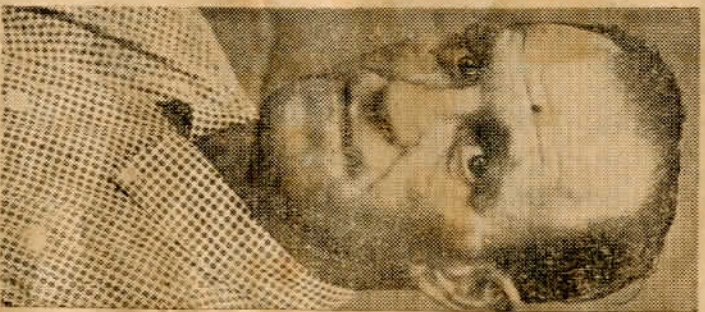
He was in Class D one year, in 1927 at Paducah, Ky., and Class B four years. His best minor league season was his last, 1941, when he hit about .310 with Norfolk, Va., under the tutelage of a man who only a few years later became the wizard of the Whiz Kids of Philadelphia, Eddie Sawyer.

"My brothers got me interested in baseball," Siemer said. "I had a bunch of them (seven). Four of them played with me on that 1932 Stroot and Carroll team. One of them was Oscar, who played for the old Boston Braves in 1925 and '26. He died last year."

In recounting his career, Siemer, a varnish-maker who lives at 930 Surrey Lane, couldn't help but wander down memory lane.

To the children, names such as Jess Doyle and Walter Mueller and Hap Currier are known only through their father's conversation, but to Siemer, a man who played on 13 amateur baseball pennant winners and five city champions, they are milestones in a still-going enterprise.

"I plan to continue and I guess I'll play again, if the guys on the team want me," Siemer said. "If they figure I can help, I'll be in there, even though I'm just about ready to quit running the bases and take up coaching. That's what I'd like to do now—coach."

The last time Siemer tried coaching, it led to a wedding. "When I was 21, I coached this girl's softball team," he recalled. "There was a girl named Esther Pitz on the team. I had met her about five years earlier, at a bowling alley, but just didn't

Opening Of Munny Baseball

The adage that the rich get richer seems to be true in the Munny Baseball Leagues which open their season today. Al Mick, manager of the Kutis North that won the Munny playoffs last season expects to have "one of the best teams I've ever directed."

One reason for Mick's optimism is the addition of Pitcher Don Mumm and Catcher-Outfielder Hal McBride. Lefty Mumm was with the Cardinals' Houston farm club, and last season he worked with the Cards themselves, as a man who charted the pitchers, pitch by pitch—looking for patterns and tipoffs in a scientific sort of way.

Mobridge was with the strong Carondelet Sunday Morning Club. He gives Mick support for veterans Pete Vitale, Lee Engert and John Geringer in the outfield, and for Catchers Jack Calio and Eddie O'Connor. The Kutis North infield again will have Virg Stemer at first, Al Hedrick at second, Ken Kortum at shortstop and Bob Lewis at third.

Besides Mumm, the pitchers will be Dick Looser, Ed Gerken and Elmer Sexauer.

Opener at Fairground.

Kutis North plays Borbein-Young at 12:45 this afternoon at Fairground Park field No. 2. Lou Boggiato, another of the area's most successful sandlot managers, again will direct Borbein-Young. Jerry Mann will manage the Union Printers, who play the 3:30 game against the North Side League's new team, United Auto Workers Local 25 from the Chevrolet plant. Local 25 replaces the Polish Falcons in the league.

The North and South Side Munny leagues again will play an inter-league schedule. In the South Side openers at Carondelet Park diamond No. 1, the Kimacks will play Kutis South at 12:45, and Carondelet Sunday Morning Club will oppose the Independent Hawks at 3:30. The Kimacks and Hawks are new to the league, the Hawks having won the Khrony League senior championship last season. The newcomers replace the Coast Guard and Webster A.C.

Kimacks Vs. Villas For Title

There is one last question to be answered by the Munny Baseball Association before the equipment is put away for fall. The question: Who is the 1961 playoff champion?

The answer will be available today after the Red Villas and Kimacks meet at 2:30 o'clock at Heine Meine field.

The survivors in the two-losses-and-out playoff have suffered a defeat apiece. The Kimacks were knocked off earlier in the annual post-season event by Kutis North, since eliminated. The Red Villas' defeat was inflicted by the Kimacks, 3-2, in 10 innings.

The Kimacks will send the Munny Association's most successful pitcher of 1961 to the mound while the Red Villas will use one of the most experienced hurlers in the league.

Starting for the Kimacks, coached by Joe McDonnell, will be Mal Murphy. The one-time Yankee farmhand had a 13-1 record during the regular season, in which the Kimacks had a 15-2 mark. In the playoffs, he personally has accounted for his team's 5-1 record.

Opposing him will be Eddie Albrecht, the 32-year-old right-hander who threw for the old St. Louis Browns.

The Villas go into the contest with the leading hitter in the playoffs, Bob Ruck, who has hit .501. He is backed by Jim Helein (.474), Bill Housewright (.438) and Don Hirbeck (.375).

The Kimacks top playoff hitters are Bob Foster (.474), Bob Ladd (.360), Bill Fries (.360), Ted Shamburg (.333) and Ray Maurer (.320)—not to mention Murphy himself, who has a .368 batting average to go with his sparkling pitching record.

Second-Placers Are Matched In Intercity

Only three games remain to be played by each Intercity Traveling League team and that means that either Collinsville or Mercer—the second place teams in the Red and Blue Divisions, respectively—can virtually put aside any pennant ambitions after today's action.

The No. 2 teams meet at 2:30 o'clock at Wilson Park in Granite City. Collinsville goes into the contest trailing Moose Lodge by two games, while Mercer is a game behind McAteeers. Moose Lodge, meanwhile, will meet at Troy and McAteeers will play at Pochonontas at Jones Park No. 1 in East St. Louis. Each game will start at 2:30 o'clock.

The only other game scheduled ends Granite City Sacred Heart against Maryville. Carpenter will get a forfeit from White City, which has withdrawn from the league.

Vitale's Merritt

Wins on

Two Hits

Measured by current athletic standards, Pete Vitale is a small man. Measured by his bat, he stands tall in any circle.

At least he did yesterday after his grand slam home run enabled Kutis North to post a 6-3 victory in the Mundy Baseball Association playoffs. The big blow by the former New York Yankee farmhand, who was hitting only .283, followed an intentional pass to Bill Funkhouser in the second round of the winners' bracket.

"It was great," said the 5-foot-9 infielder who quit pro ball in 1956 after four seasons. "When I got to third I wasn't sure I'd make it. I didn't think I could run that far."

But run he did. And the four runs pushed across by the 28-year-old, 175-pounder in the third inning at Fairground Park No. 2 were all that Don Mumm really needed to top the Kimnacks' Mal Murphy in a pitchers' duel that became one hitter's heaven.

Mumm, now 9-1 for the season, held a 2-1 lead over Murphy (14-3) going into the last of the third.

Wellman Helps Merritt.

While Vitale was showing Mundy fans what the hitters could do, onetime Cardinal Lloyd Merritt, throwing for the Ceresias at Maine Field in another second-round game in the winners' bracket, was upholding the pitching fraternity's reputation. He stopped the Brooklyn Robins, 3-0, on two hits while battery-mate Doug Wellman, who had been drafted by the Ceresias from the Union Printers, had a hand in all the Ceresia runs. Wellman had two doubles, drove in two runs and scored one.

If not for Vitale's blow, the Kimnacks, who had split with Kutis North in their two meetings during regular season play, might have avoided joining the Robins in the losers' bracket of the two-losses-and-out tournament. They scored twice in the fifth. A tumbling catch by left-fielder Rick Lessman on Bob Forche's long smash probably kept the Kimnacks from scoring more in that inning.

The two other Kutis North runs came in the first when Todd Sickle, who left in the fifth inning because his injured left leg had been acting up, tripled a run and scored the house's single.

SPECIAL PLAYS

In order to keep Busch Stadium fans posted on plays on the field, particularly unusual ones, the Cardinal management has adopted a method based on the game situations listed below. Whenever a situation listed below occurs, the corresponding number will be flashed under "Batter" on the scoreboard.

- 61. Error on the player receiving ball.
- 62. Error on the thrower.
- 63. Wild pitch.
- 64. Passed ball.
- 65. Batter out. Infield fly rule states that with first and second base occupied or with bases loaded and less than two out, batter is out if he hits fly ball that can normally be caught by an infielder.
- 66. Batter is automatically out and may not run when catcher drops third strike with first base occupied and less than two out.

- 67. Umpire ruled ball hit ground and was trapped and, therefore, not a legal putout.
- 68. Player is automatically out when attempted bunt on third strike is foul. Scored as strike-out.
- 69. Base runner is out. Ran out of baseline to avoid fielder with ball.
- 70. Batter is out because he ran outside three foot line approaching first base and interfered with play.
- 71. On appeal to umpire runner is called out for failure to touch base.
- 72. Runner is out as base runner was struck with fairly batted ball. Credit batter with single. Give putout to infielder nearest runner struck by ball.
- 73. Ground rule double and base runners may advance two bases as batted ball bounced out of playing field.
- 74. Batter is awarded first base because of catcher interference. Charge catcher with an error but do not charge batter with time at bat.
- 75. Pitcher balk. All runners advance.
- 76. On appeal to umpire base runner is out because he left base before catch of fly.
- 77. Proper batter is out. Player batted out of turn.
- 78. Base runner is out because of interference with player fielding batted ball.
- 79. Following runner is out when same base is occupied by two runners as base legally belongs to preceding runner. Following runner must be tagged.
- 80. Base runner is awarded base to which he was running because fielder obstructed his running.
- 81. Interference by spectator.
- 82. Runner is out for failure to retouch intervening bases when returning to base on caught fly ball.

- 83. Thrown glove struck ball. Two bases on thrown ball and three bases on batted ball.
- 84. Batter failed to exert ordinary effort to avoid being hit by pitched ball. Does not constitute a hit batsman.
- 85. Both runners are out. Runner interfered with possible double play.
- 86. Batter is out. Hit by own fair batted ball.
- 87. Batter is out for interfering with catcher's fielding or throwing.
- 88. Each runner may advance one base without liability to be put out when fielder falls into bench, dugout or stands after catching fly ball.
- 89. Batter is automatically out when fielder intentionally drops fly ball or line drive with first base, first and second bases, first and third bases or first, second and third bases occupied and with less than two out.

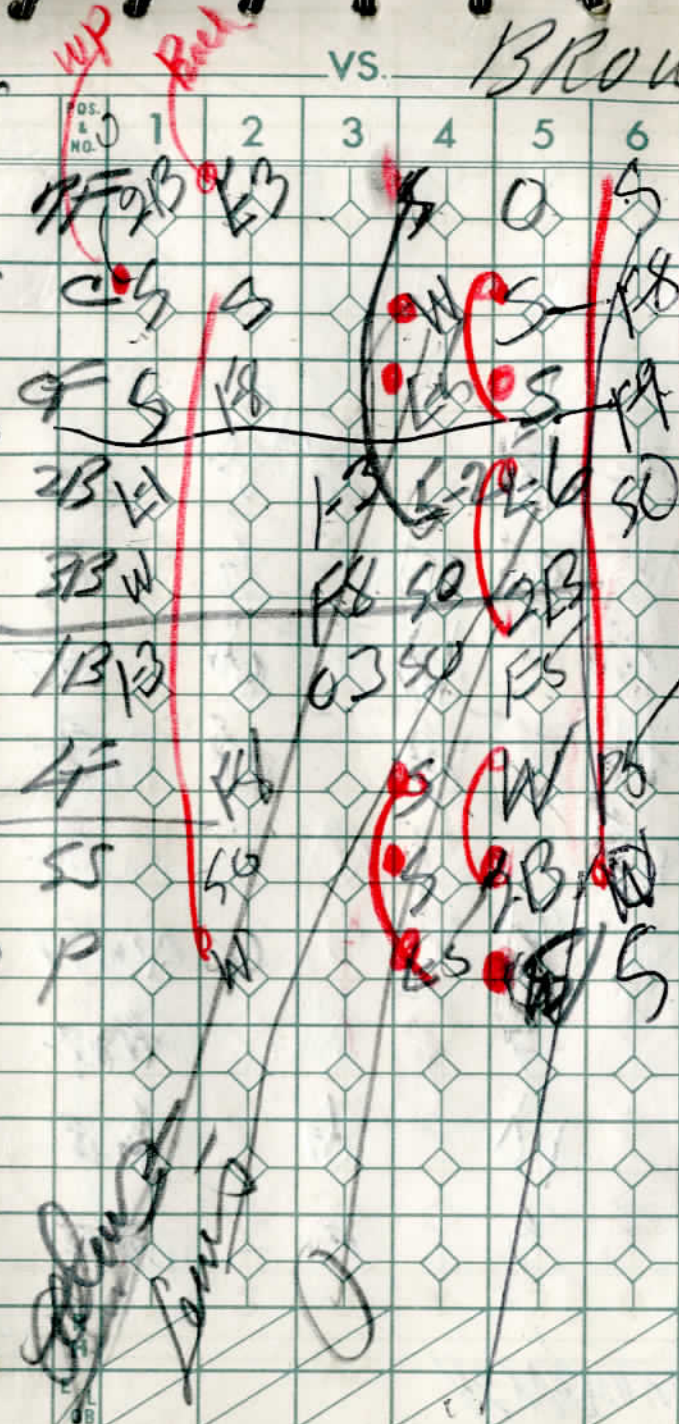

Pete Fix, Longtime Muni 'Judge,' Urges Limit on Ex-Pro Players

By Bob Ruhl

The former "Judge Landis" of the Muni Baseball Association still can hand down an opinion.

P. G. Fix, who will be 70 years old on July 5, is retired from the Muni program, but there are few of the city's athletic leaders who don't remember the man who served as president of the leagues in 1942-43 and managed teams as far back as 1924.

Fix was known for the firmness in his decisions concerning Muni baseball. And under his ruling hand, the amateur baseball league enjoyed its greatest years.

"I feel that the Muni League as it was originally set up was preferable to the present set-up in some ways," Fix said.

"The teams were limited to two former professional players apiece," he said. "I feel strongly about the use of so many professionals today. A team with several former pros will outclass and discourage the opposition and hinder the development of younger players.

"I was always tough on professionalism," he said.

Fix also feels that a playoff system to include the Khoury and C.Y.C. senior leagues with the Muni League would have more appeal than the present method of each holding its own championship playoffs.

Going to Europe.

Fix is planning a trip next month to Europe. As an international counselor for the Lions Club, he will attend a convention in Nice, France. This will mark the longest period he will have been away from baseball since 1924.

"I hope to see some athletics while I'm in Europe," he said. The enthusiasm he still has for sports was easily discernible.

The man referred to as "Dad" by the players he once coached still enjoys seeing several games a year and looks back to 1927 when the playoff game drew close to 10,000 fans,

outdrawing the Browns that day.

Fix now tries to stay out of the spotlight. "I usually drive out near the outfield and watch a game," he said, "or stand back from the stands. And I read everything about the Munys in print."

Fix first began to make baseball news when he coached the DeMolay Sentinel team, made up of boys from 17 to 21, to nine divisional titles from 1924-34. He left the coaching ranks in 1934 to succeed Al Fleishman on the Central Council, which once was the ruling body for all Muni sports.

'32 Team Won Title.

His 1930 team reached the Muni final and two years later it won the championship. Many of those players Fix coached for 10 years with the Sentinels still keep in touch with him.

Among the many pro players who played under Fix were Boots Hollingsworth, later with the Browns and Detroit; Hal Kleine, once with the Indians;

and Bob Keely, now a scout.

Many awards have been heaped upon Fix and in 1957 friends honored him at a testimonial dinner.

Fix has some other plans in mind besides the trip to Europe. "You know, I just can't wait to see our new stadium," he said.

Wiesler Says Low Salary Paid In Majors Induced Him to Quit

Manager Gus Lombardo is happy that one of his prize south-paw pitchers, Bob Wiesler, has lost some of the fire in his fastball.

"Boy, if I were as fast as I used to be, I wouldn't be pitching here," said Wiesler, a former major leaguer now awaiting his first start as a member of the Ceresias team of the Muny North-South League.

The one-time Beaumont High ace smiled after making the crack about his fastball, and the huge "chaw" of tobacco in his mouth squirmed back and forth as he laughed. He is more than happy to have an opportunity to continue pitching.

Wiesler, now 31 years old, began his pro career in 1949 with Independence. He spent time with Kansas City, the New York Yankees and Washington, finishing his tour of the "big time" in 1957 with the Senators.

Was 3-2 With Yankees.

He played last season with Dallas-Fort Worth in the Texas League where he compiled a 2-1 record, striking out 24 and walking 33 in 66 innings. His best season in the majors was with the Yankees in 1954 when he had a 3-2 mark. In '56, he was 3-12 with Washington.

"I had to get out after last year," Bob said. "The money just wasn't good enough to keep at it. If I were single, I might have stayed. But my wife, Irene, was kind of put out when I told her I wanted to quit."

The Wieslers have two children, twins Bob and Vickie.

"The clubs in the majors put out all that bonus money to untold kids," Wiesler said. "But they don't want to pay seasoned players. And with the number of minor league teams getting smaller each year, it's getting tougher to make a living."

Would the big lefthander go back to playing for pay if the circumstances were right?

"Darned right I would," Wiesler said. "I like to play ball. And I guess it's kind of a dream to go back and try again. I see where Mal Murphy (former Ki-mack hurler now at Macon, Ga.) is back in professional baseball." Wiesler, now a selector for a frozen food concern, is glad that he gave pro baseball a try.

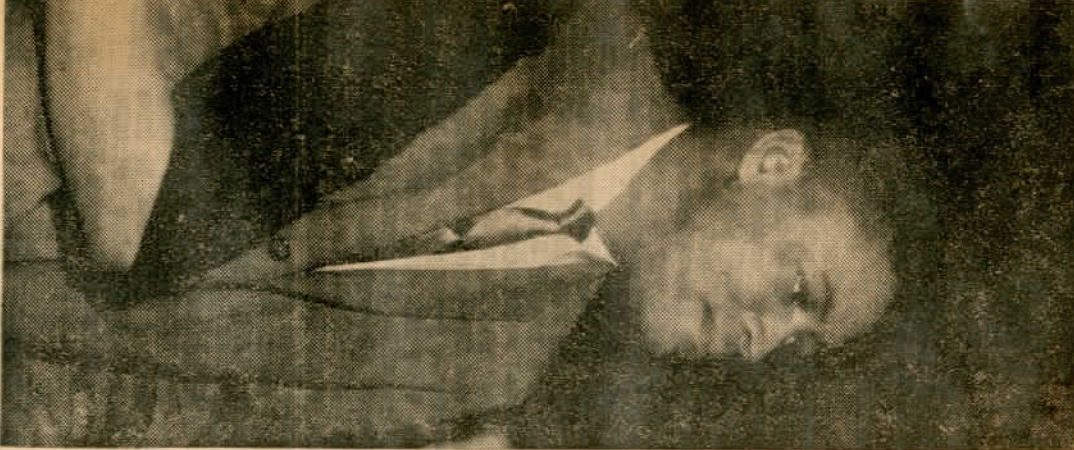

Judnich, a .285 Batter Last Year Hitting at .381 Clip for Ho...
 SAN FRANCISCO, June 5 (UP)—The late John McGraw spoke as follows:
 "Rogers Hornsby knows more baseball than any man who ever lived."
 That was the highest tribute any man ever received from the fiery manager of the New York Giants—and maybe it is only now that Hornsby has set out to passing on a little of this knowledge to his hirelings in the Pacific Coast League.
 At any rate, Hornsby has an under-rated Seattle Rainier club battling for the loop leadership; and on top of that he has a bunch of fellows who couldn't punch their way through a fog bank in some previous years, battling for the league hitting championship.
 Right now the top man in the loop is Walt Judnich. Walt was a bright prospect 16 years ago when he first broke in. Then he seemed to lose the knack of hitting. After a long tour in the minors, he was hitting only .229 for Pittsburgh in 1949 before being sent to San Francisco. Under Lefty O'Doul, Judnich batted only .269 in 1949 and he was shipped to Seattle. There in 1950 the best he could do was hit at a .285 clip—which isn't very encouraging for an outfielder.
Judnich Is Hitting .381.
 But under Hornsby this season, Judnich is clouting at a .381 mark and shows no signs of a let-up. Hornsby may be the difference—or it may be new vitamins.
 Judnich, however, isn't Hornsby's only success. His biggest surprise package is Jim Rivera, the rookie from Pensacola of the Class B Southeastern League. Rivera has been the sensation of the loop this year and currently is hitting .350.
 The best he could do in the lower minors was .328.
 In the Class AA Texas League last year, Catcher Joe Montalvo batted only .222. But Hornsby advanced him to Class AAA and he is hitting .333. Another catcher, Bud Sheely, son of the former major league first baseman, never was able to get near the .300 mark in several past PCL seasons. This year he has divided the backstop duties with Montalvo and is hitting at a .317 pace.
 Last year infielder Wes Hammer batted only .241 for San Antonio in the Texas League. Hornsby advanced the lad to Triple-A and he now is the Rainiers' regular second baseman, batting a more respectable .253.
Knows His Pitchers Too.
 It may be that Hornsby knows a bit about pitching, too—or at least he can tell the hurlers what to throw to the opposing batsmen. In any event, Marv Grissom, a 33-year-old been-arounder, won nine and lost 10 at Toledo last year. This season under Hornsby he already has won 11 while losing only five.
 He took Paul Calvert from Detroit, where the bespectacled hurler never did much. In his first appearance, all Calvert did was to twirl a no-hitter.
 On the basis of his showing it is probable that Hornsby will follow in the footsteps of managers Casey Stengel, Bucky Harris, Charley Dressen and Paul Richards and make it back to the majors.

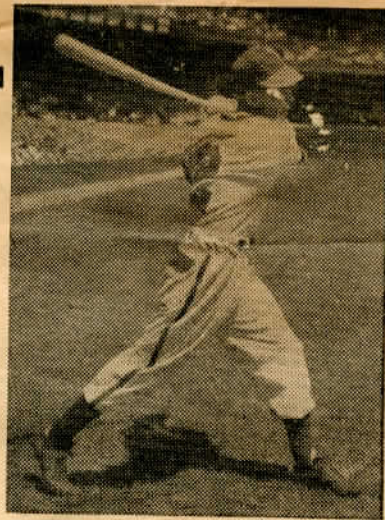

THEY HIT

.400 - -

ALL players starting off in professional baseball have their hearts set on reaching the major leagues where the pay-checks are largest and the living expenses highest. Comparatively few of the thousands upon thousands of hopefuls reach the top and stay there for longer than the proverbial cup of tea. Those who do make it hope to play on a winner.

All of this is understandable, and it carries many advantages. But ambition doesn't stop short of the very top. The player on a pennant winner hopes to shine in baseball's biggest attraction, the World Series. He performs in a stadium that seats tens of thousands and besides them other millions watch his every move. His name and deeds are carried around the world. Wonderful inventions, television and radio!

A fellow who plays in every game of a fall classic and has the good fortune to bat .400 or better naturally feels proud of that accomplishment. The *Little Red Book of Baseball* lists 51 World Series hitters with .400 or higher marks. Seventeen of them did their sharpshooting for the losing side. They may have been heroes in defeat, but the accolade goes to the winner—also the larger check. This article is dedicated to the 17 who deserved a better fate for being hot at the right time.

After the first game of the 1907 World Series resulted in a tie, the Chicago Cubs, under the leadership of the peerless Frank Chance, defeated Hugh Jennings' Detroit Tigers four straight. Playing first base for the Bengals was one Claude Rossman. Claude went zero for four in the deadlocked contest, but then found his batting eye. In the second skirmish he connected for three hits, including a triple, in four at bats. In both the third and fifth battles he negotiated two bingles in four tries. In the fourth tussle Claude launched a single in four efforts. Net result: 20 at bats, eight hits, .400 even. Rossman was a .277 hitter on the year. His teammate, the great Ty Cobb, averaged .350 with the mace that season, but in the Series was a .200 sticker.

When the New York Yankees met the New York Giants for the championship of the baseball world in 1923, the American Leaguers triumphed, four games to two. The Giants had two players appearing in all six engagements who hit .400 or better. One was Charles Dillon Stengel,

now skippering the Yankees and known as the Ol' Perfesser. Casey got two for three in the first game of the 1923 set, and his second blow was a game-winning, inside-the-park homer. In contest number two he wasn't officially at bat, although he appeared in the line-up. The Giants copped the third encounter, 1-0, on another Stengel four-master. It was his only safe connection in three efforts. In game number four he went two for two; in number five, zero for three; and in the finale, zero for one. His totals were 12 at bats, five hits—.417. That winter Casey was traded to the second division Boston Braves which prompted him to remark that if he had hit a couple of more homers in the Series he probably would have been shipped to Terre Haute.

The other Giant who hit .400 in that 1923 autumn show was Frankie Frisch, then labeled the Fordham Flash. The Dutchman, at his best when the pressure was on, hit safely in five of the six combats. The only one in which Frank failed to connect was contest number five in which "Bullet Joe" Bush limited the Giants to three hits, all made by Irish Meusel. In all, Frank made 25 plate appearances, and gathered 10 bingles for an even .400.

Neither Casey Stengel nor Frank Frisch led the Giants at bat in the 1923 World Series games. That honor went to Jack Bentley, and while he doesn't rightly belong in this story because he didn't play in every game, his performance merits special mention. He did appear in five of the six conflicts, as pitcher and pinch-hitter, and posted a .600 average.

IN 1945 Chicago's pride and joy, Phil Cavarretta, led the National League at bat with a percentage of .355, and was voted the most valuable player in that loop by the Baseball Writers Association of America. That season Chicago won the pennant, but lost the World Series to the Detroit Tigers, four games to three.

Phil was horsecollared in only the fourth struggle. In the first he collected three safeties; in the second, one, in the third, one; in the fifth, one; in the sixth, two; and in the seventh, three. In 26 times at bat he fashioned 11 hits, which included two doubles and a round-tripper, for a percentage of .423.

Nineteen-hundred-forty-five marked the second time that the popular Cavarretta hit better than .400 in a World Series and came out with a loser's purse. In the 1938 set, when the New York Yankees trounced the Chicago Cubs four straight, Phil banged the sphere for .462. He connected successfully in every game, totaling six hits in 13 plate appearances. The Cubs had another regular in that Series who made free with the Yankee pitching to the tune of .471. He was smooth Stan Hack, who coined eight bingles in 17 tries, and like Phil, connected safely in every game. But the gold and glory went to the Yankees.

Riggs Stephenson, who in his college days at the University of Alabama was a teammate of the Sewell boys, Luke and Joe, was a mighty man with a bat in his fists and in 1932, playing for the Chicago Cubs, hit .324, which was below his lifetime average. The Cubs won the pennant and then had the misfortune to meet in the World Series the New York Yankees, led by Joe McCarthy who had been fired by Chicago's Mr. Wrigley a couple of seasons before. New York swamped Chicago in four outings, averaging more than nine runs per game. But all the clouting wasn't done by Ruth, Gehrig and Company. Riggs Stephenson batted .444 for the losers. He launched three bingles in five tries in the curtain raiser, made two in four attempts in the second tilt, went into something of a slump in the third encounter, getting only one for four, but he came back with two hits in five chances in the closing contest.

The St. Louis Browns won their only American League pennant in 1944 and then tangled with the St. Louis Cardinals for baseball's biggest prize. The National Leaguers bagged four games out of six. The Browns hit .183 for the Series, but their first baseman, George Hartley McQuinn, collecting seven wallops in 16 turns at the plate, posted a nifty .438. He registered in the H column in five of the six scraps. During the regular campaign the Pride of Ballston, Virginia, was a .250 clubber.
