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ASHCROFT TO DELIVER COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

Missouri Attorney General John Ashcroft is scheduled to present the keynote address at Lindenwood's 1983 commencement, May 7 at 10 a.m. It will be held on the commons in front of Sibley Hall or, in case of rain, at the St. Charles Presbyterian Church, Watson and Gamble streets.

A Republican, Ashcroft currently is serving his second term as the state's 38th attorney general. He was appointed state auditor in 1973, serving for nearly two years until being named Assistant Attorney General in 1975. He ran for the office, capturing it in 1976 and again in 1980, a year when he established a new record for a state official by carrying 96 percent of Missouri's counties.

Ashcroft graduated cum laude from Yale University and, in 1967, received his law degree from the University of Chicago. Prior to public service, he taught business law at Southwest Missouri State University and practiced law with his wife, Janet, in Springfield. Both are the coauthors of COLLEGE LAW FOR BUSINESS, a textbook used in junior colleges and private schools of business, and IT'S THE LAW, another college textbook published in 1979.

He is the president of the National Association of Attorneys General, serving as a member of the association's Budget and Executive committees. Ashcroft also represents all Attorneys General of the United States as a member of the prestigious American Bar Association House of Delegates. He also is a member of the American, Missouri and Cole County Bar associations as well as the Bar Association of Metropolitan St. Louis.

More than 320 graduates will receive bachelor's and master's degrees at Lindenwood's spring commencement exercises.

LINDENWOOD ADDS SHORT TERM TO SCHEDULE

To allow students to complete one, two or three hours of credit, Lindenwood is instituting a new May term for undergraduate and graduate students. From May 2-27, three off-campus courses and a variety of on-campus courses will be offered during both day and evening hours. Scheduled are courses in biology, business administration, economics, English, fashion marketing, history, mathematics, science and speech communication.

Coupled with the new intensified term, Lindenwood is offering a reduction in tuition for day and evening offerings for undergraduates. Tuition for the May term is \$100 per credit hour compared to \$135 per credit hour for day classes and \$110 for evening courses. Tuition for graduate students remains at \$150 per credit hour.

The new term fills the gap between Lindenwood's spring term, which ends April 30, and the beginning of the summer session on June 6. For further information on the new term and a schedule of course offerings, contact the Office of the Registrar.
